Sam Levenson Entertains For 'Salute to the President'

Saturday, November 2, in Borup Coliseum the "Salute to the President" will take place at 8:15 p.m. This program is to honor Dr. C. C. Madsen the present and twelfth president of Dana College. Admission for students is \$1.00 and \$2.00 for adults.

Entertainment for this program will be by Sam Levenson, the ex-school teacher, who has become one of America's best loved comedians. Sam got started as a humorist as a result of the humorous notes he used to drop on the desks of his fellow teachers, and the monologues he would deliver at lunch. Soon he began making appearances for five dollars an engagement. By 1948 he was making five times his teaching salary from his humor. It was at this time that Sam hesitantly left teaching and

devoted all of his time to being a performer. He has never lost interest in education and has continued to be of service to the educational world over the past years. Many honors have come his way because of this fine de-

votion, and one of his favorite plaques reads, "To the man who has done more for the welfare of the teaching profession since leaving it than many people who have remained in it."

Another credit to the versatile Sam, is a new book, currently on the best seller list entitled, **Everything But Money**. This is an autobiography dealing with conditions at the time he was growing up. "He thought bed and board were the same thing, and he didn't know meatballs were supposed to contain meat." Sam graduated from Brooklyn College, but didn't get his diploma that day because he couldn't afford the \$1.78 fee. Twenty-three years later he received the certificate for free when he was cited as the "Brooklyn College Man of the Year."

Busy Art Dept. May Get Foundry

An outstanding part of Dana's curriculum is the Art Department, under the direction of Rev. F. William Thomsen and Mr. James Olsen.

This semester the art students are sculpturing, painting, drawing, and designing. Next semester the department hopes to develop a foundry for bronze casting, under the direction of Mr. Olsen. Dana is one of the few schools in this area that will offer bronze casting. To participate in this program, an art student must have taken the basic art course.

This year there are 13 classes in art. Rev. Thomsen and Mr. Olsen each having six classes, and Mrs. Nielsen teaches Public School Arts and Crafts. To major in art, a student must have 30 hours in art, with a probability of 34 hours. There are currently 16 majors in this field.

Art talent is displayed all over the campus. The Dragon's Head, Mickelson Hall, and the library house many of the paintings and sculpturings of former Dana art students and professors. The mosaic on the science building is the work of Rev. Thomsen.

For those who are interested in the talent of these students, Rev. Thomsen extends a warm invitation for them to come to fourth floor Old Main and view the many works on display.

"Many of us have been impressed during these opening weeks of school with the general atmosphere of pride and concern for the appearance of Dana's campus which seems to characterize our student body, staff and faculty. This is apparent in such little things as use of sidewalks instead of "cross-cutting", avoidance of "litterbugging", and concern for the neatness of the Campus Center.

There are, admittedly, a few exceptions. Should you by chance be one of these, we invite you to join the majority. Visitors invariably comment on the beauty of our campus. What has, up to now, been known as South Hall has been named Rasmussen Hall in honor of Christine Rasmussen and her husband, the late John Rasmussen. Formerly of Plainview, Nebraska, Mrs. Rasmussen now lives in Pasadena, California. Dana was recently presented with a 400 acre tract of land on the Platte River south of Omaha by Mrs. Rasmussen. A plaque and a portrait of the donors will be unveiled at the dedication ceremonies on Friday.

The Campus Center, constructed at a cost of six hundred thousand dollars, was made possible by an anonymous gift of one hundred thousand dollars and a Federal Loan.

The dedication ceremonies will begin at 4:00 p.m. at Rasmussen Hall and will continue to the Campus Center.

A.L.C. Convention May O.K. \$20 Million Fund Drive

The Biennial Convention of the American Lutheran Church, held in Minneapolis from October 19-25, had as Dana's representatives: Dr. C. C. Madsen; Boas Weismann, Director of Development, at Dana; Pastor Richard Jensen; and Dan Busse, President of the Student Body.

One of several matters of concern at the convention was to adopt a program which would lead a drive within the A.L.C. This drive will be used to raise 20 million dollars for the colleges and seminaries of the American Lutheran Church.

The program, once approved, will begin immediately after the convention and carry through into 1967. Dr. George Schultz, Executive Secretary of the Board of Trustees of the A.L.C. will be given a leave of absence to lead the drive. This will be the first time for a pro-

gram as this on such a major scale.

When asked whether or not he felt the program would be approved, Dr. Madsen replied, "Yes, I'm sure it will be. All the college people are optimistic."

Dan Busse, selected as one of a small number of students, made a presentation at the convention in support of the drive.

The Convention not only serves as an ingathering of representatives from various areas of the A.L.C., but also as an opportunity for each corporation of the American Lutheran Church to present its report and handle various business affairs.

Dana's corporation meeting included the status report given by President Madsen, and the filling of six vacancies on the Dana Board of Regents.

Dana was by the score 13-10 early in the fourth period, but lost to hard running Yankton, 27-10. The running of Roger Heirings and Cerone's 35-yard run to a touchdown on a pass from Jim La Point just broke the backs of the Vikings.
