Powers To Speak On American Space Effort

Sunday, March 5, 8:00 p.m. in A.M.A. Lieut. Col. John A. Powers, information officer for the Mercury Astronaut program will speak on "America's Space Effort—where is it going?"

One of the voices most frequently heard during America's orbital space flights was that of five-foot, six, "Shorty" Powers. With reports on the flight of Lieut. Col. John N. Glenn Jr., Comdr. Alan B. Shepard Jr. and Capt. Virgil Grissom, Colonel Powers spoke from the Mercury control center at Cape Canaveral.

In the Shepard flight Colonel Powers made the expression "A-OK" a by-word. It was widely copied to describe a first class job. It also made Colonel Powers known to the public.

Colonel Powers flew missions in Korea, was appointed bomber operations chief of the fifth Air Force headquarters staff, and briefing officer for the United Nations staff in Korea.

He was assigned to the Mercury project when it started three years ago and will end his tour of duty April 6.

Dana Hosts the Lettermen In Concert On March 8

Tony Butala, Jim Pike, and Bob Engemann, better known inclusively as the "Lettemen," Capitol Recording stars, will appear in concert on campus March 8, in Borup Coliseum at 8 p.m.

The trio is known as a performing as well as a vocal group. One thing everybody in America hears about Denmark is the food, especially pastries. There aren't enough wonderful adjectives to describe the latter. Every block seems to have a bakery. This is a terrible situation if you don't want to gain weight or spend all of your money.

The meals here are different than those at home. What you have for breakfast depends entirely upon the family and generally speaking, the menu is not at all like that of American's. They do have eggs but I haven't seen any toast yet. French toast is unheard of and pancakes and sweet rolls are not breakfast foods.

For lunch we usually have open face sandwiches called smirrebrid. Everything goes on these sandwiches from chocolate to ham. Most of the Danes use a ryebread for these sandwiches. Suppers are generally like those I'm used to—meat and potatoes. After supper is finished there is a coffee time in the living room. This is when the pastry is served in our house. I see by my watch it is time for that now and nothing is going to make me late for Danish delicacies.

Volleyball Team To Compete Saturday

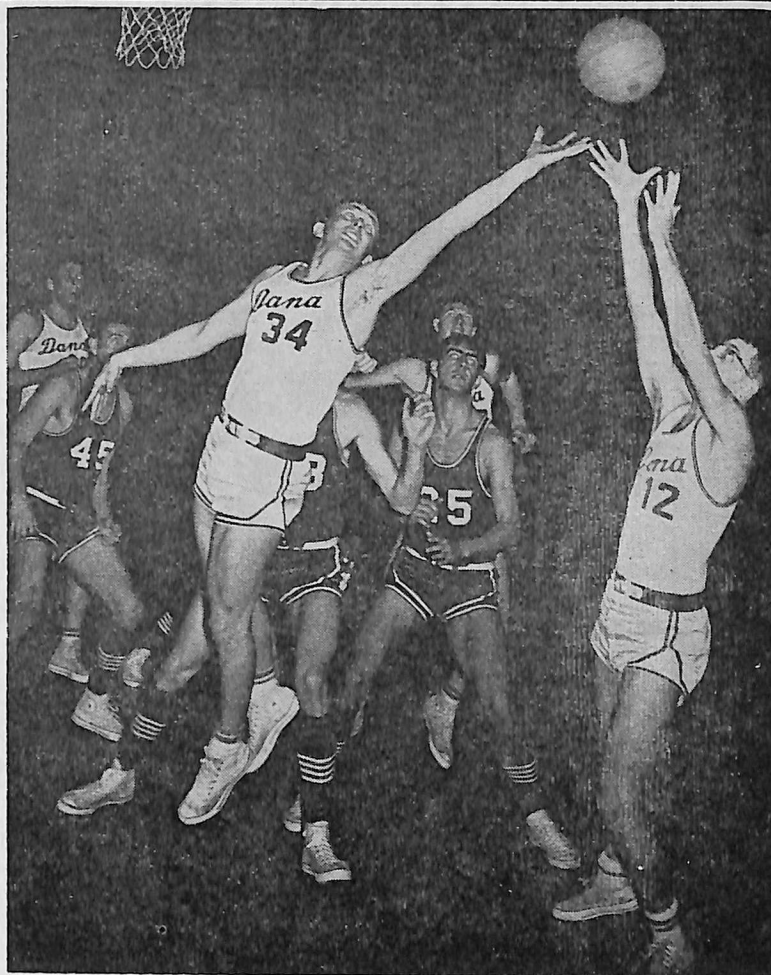

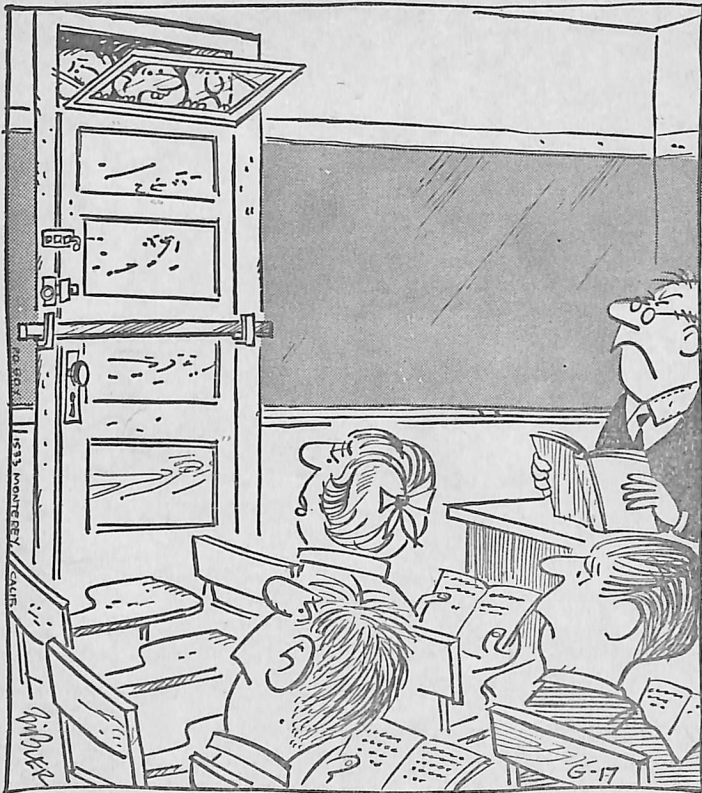

The sport has gone soft. Ski resorts now have all the comforts of home—if your home happens to have a plush bar, a heated swimming pool, a padded chairlift, boutiques and a built-in baby sitter. Skiing, in fact, has become almost an incidental activity at some ski resorts; indeed, some of the most enthusiastic patrons here at Squaw Valley and at other resorts don't even know how to ski. They rarely venture outdoors.

So why do they come here? "Men. M-E-N. They're here in bunches, and so am I, baby," answers slinky, sloe-eyed Betty Reames as she selects a couch strategically placed midway between the fireplace and the bar. "For fun," answers Debby Bump, a winsome college sophomore who likes the rock-and-roll parties at Squaw Valley. "To dance," answers Tryphon Nichols, a high school teacher here with his wife. "Where else can you get the kids to come with you these

days?" answers a Los Altos, California housewife who spends her time here reading while her children ski.

Aware that an increasing number of their customers never make it to the slopes, many resort owners are trying to find new ways to take the money of this snug, warm bunch. Squaw Valley houses half a dozen bars and restaurants and often has three different bands and a folksinger entertaining at the same time. Aspen, in Colorado, throws a mid-winter Mardi Gras. Sun Valley, in Idaho, has a shopping village ("Please don't call it a huge, asphalt parking lots," says

Population Tallies Net Gain of 11%

Final tally of enrollment at Dana for second semester shows a net loss of 8.8% over first semester and an 11½% increase over second semester last year.

One hundred and sixteen students did not return to Dana after first semester. Of these 20 finished degree requirements, 4 finished the teaching block, and three left to study for one semester in Denmark. The remainder either withdrew during the first semester or did not re-register after finals. Dr. Rasmussen, Registrar, is presently engaged in compiling a report of reasons for the withdrawals and various "transfers."

The present enrollment lists 739 students. This figure includes five special (full time) students, post grad (full time) and 43 part time students. Enrollment in night school is not included in the total cited.

Freshmen still outnumber the other three classes with 267 members, the class populations decrease with each ascent in level—sophomores, 169, juniors, 144, seniors, 110. Men outnumber women by a ratio of 2:1.
