Ed. Majors To Take Achievement Tests

Sophomores and juniors who plan to enter the Elementary Education Program must take the California Achievement tests.

Sophomores anticipating entering this program must take the battery of exams covering areas in language, reading and mathematics. Juniors who either have not previously taken tests or have not achieved a grade placement of 11.5 in spelling and 12.3 in each of the other areas are required to take the examinations, also.

The tests will be administered Thursday night, April 13 and Saturday morning, April 15 according to the following schedule:

Reading vocabulary

Reading comprehension

Campaigns for 1967-68 Student Council officers and Judicial Committee elections open officially (tomorrow, April 1; at 10 a.m. At that time, the posting of Campaign signs marks the beginning of a week of campus politics at Dana.

The Elections Commission, Gary Winter (chairman), Al Anderson, Judy Olsen, Craig Lindholm, Pete Nissen, and Mary Sue Peterson, has scheduled two formal campaign events to precede the final elections.

Candidates for all offices except Judicial Committee will deliver speeches in DHA, Monday, April 3 at 7 p.m.

Beginning at 8 o'clock Wednesday night, presidential candidates will engage in a debate on campaign issues and answer questions from the floor. Dan Busse, present Student Body President, will moderate the event. In addition to these slated events, candidates may hold rallies and speak to a meeting of students at any pre-arranged time during the week of campaigning.

Final elections will be held Friday, April 7. The voting poll, located in the Student Center in front of the Student Body office, will open at 8 a.m. and close at 2 o'clock that afternoon.

"Write-in" campaign may be initiated for any position on the ballot.

Newly elected officers and committee members will assume their positions and duties as soon as they are installed during a general meeting of the student body. (See inside for stories)

Graduate Exams To Be Given Friday

Graduate Record Examinations will be given to all first and second semester seniors Thursday and Friday afternoon, April 6-7.

The exams consist of two types: The Area Test, required of all seniors, measures the achievement of the individual student in his general background of learning. Areas covered include the social sciences, the sciences, and the humanities. The exam will last four hours.

The second test to be given will measure the advancement of the student in his major field and is given only to those seniors whose major is covered by the tests. The time period will be three hours.

Conflict in Vietnam Topic for Analysis

John Hlavacek, notable news analyst will speak on the "Vietnam Perspective" 7:30 Monday night, April 3, in DHA. Mr. Hlavacek has appeared on campus before, the first time under the sponsorship of the History Club, a second sponsor was a local Grange Chapter, and this time History Club and Student Congregation jointly sponsor him.

Mr. Hlavacek, a graduate of Carleton, was a rated news analyst for the National Broadcasting Company before coming to Omaha to become a member of KMTV's news staff. His job, gathering world news, analyzing it and presenting it to the public, has taken him on trips including Latin and South America and Vietnam. The lecture including pertinent slides, will be followed by a "question and answer" period and will end at approximately 9:30 to allow Mr. Hlavacek to return to Omaha in time to present his nightly news program "Hlavacek Reports" at 10:15.

Members of Chi Rho will have a meeting with students from St. John's Seminary of the Benedictine Order on Saturday, April 1, in the President's Room.

The Vikings should have a balanced and experienced defense this year as returning lettermen number eleven and cover all positions excepting 2nd base.

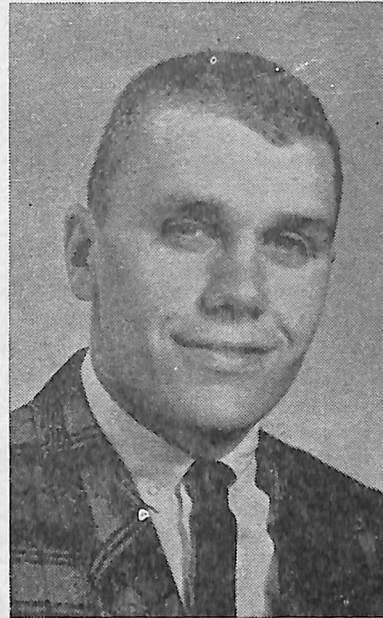

Ekklesia Koinonias Recent Graduate To Hold Election Resides In Togo

The congregation council elections as provided for in the constitution will be held at a congregational meeting held sometime during the past two weeks of April. At this time a president, vice-president, and treasurer plus six other members at large will be elected.

The members which were elected in February and the other six members at large will have three semester terms of office while the president, vice-president, and treasurer will have a term of office of one year.

The congregation council of EKKLESIA KOINONIAS presented a proposed constitution to the Board of Regents during their last meeting on campus. The proposed constitution would give the congregation full membership in the Central District of the American Lutheran Church. During the meeting between the Board and church council delegates, David Solevad and Pastor Jensen, the board recommended changes necessary for constitution to comply with college, church and state laws.

The church council will be meeting to make the necessary changes on the constitution which will subsequently be presented to congregation for approval or further revision. The constitution will be presented to the congregation at a congregational meeting which will be held following a Sunday morning service. Approval of the constitution would mean that this constitution would replace the old Guidelines as the informal pattern of administration. Final approval would follow the approval of the Board of Regents when it is again presented during the Board's fall meeting.

While the congregation is unable to become an official congregation of the Central District at the Central District Convention in April, the congregation will be represented. President of the Central District, Dr. Fritschel, has personally asked that delegates from the congregation be present. The council will honor this invitation and elect a delegate to accompany Pastor Jensen to the convention.

Karl Petersen, '66 Dana graduate has begun a two year assignment in Togo, West Africa for the Peace Corps

After ten weeks of training at Dartmouth College in Hanover, New Hampshire, Karl and his fellow Peace Corps classmates spent February doing field work in Miami and Grenada, West Indies. Their training at Dartmouth centered on French language, technical skills and African and Togalese history.

Karl, public health volunteer, will be working in villages teaching nutrition, preventive medicine, and maternal child care. Some of his fellow volunteers will be working under rural development and agricultural programs. These new volunteers will bring the number of Peace Corpsmen serving in Togo up to 115.
