Secondary Block Enrollment Closed

Due to the unexpected large number of students in the secondary education block, the enrollment is being closed and the program will not be open to further enrollment next fall.

This limitation is due to the lack of suitable student teaching locations and teaching staff required. There were 44 applicants for the secondary block this year.

However, if a student changes his plans for next fall and wishes to teach, he may apply to a graduate school that offers grants to liberal arts students who want to prepare for teaching. Anyone interested in these programs should see Mr. Weckmuller.

PRE-REGISTER MAY 23 FOR SUMMER SESSIONS

College students may pre-register in O.M. 310 on May 23 for the first summer school session. This service is being made available so that full-time students may avoid waiting until June 10 or 11; however, it is not necessary to register at this early date.

For the first time during summer school girls dorms will be opened and the student dining area will be used.

Two new faces will be added to the staff for the summer sessions.

Mr. Roger Jacob, from Westside High in Omaha, will be teaching history 202 and 305. Mr. Phil Panum, a junior college teacher and alumnus of Dana, will teach American Government and Geography.

Nebraska Coach Tom Osborn Will Speak To Dana Athletes

The annual Athletic Banquet honoring the year's outstanding Viking athletes will be held Monday evening, May 8, in the cafeteria. Master of Ceremonies is Mr. James Olsen of the art department. Dr. Tom Osborn, assistant coach at the University of Nebraska, will be the guest speaker of the evening.

Dr. Osborn received his B.A. from Hastings State College, Hastings, Nebraska. As a senior he was voted Nebraska's Outstanding Athlete of the year, and was one of two persons chosen by the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics as Outstanding Athlete in the United States. He will speak on "The Fellowship of Christian Athletes."

Honored Dana athletes will receive awards under five categories. All-conference players chosen by conference officials will be honored, as well as the most valuable player in each sport selected by the player's teammates. Seniors who have lettered four years in a sport will receive a 'D' Blanket and those who have lettered three years will receive plaques. These presentations are

made by the 'D' Club.

A scholar athlete award will be given to the player who maintained the highest scholastic average while participating in a sport. The Honor Athlete award, will go to the outstanding Viking senior athlete.

Pep Club, Great Danes, Band, Cheerleaders, Faculty and Administration and 'D' Club members have been invited to attend the honorary banquet.

Student Show Part Of Art Activities

May 7th a new art show will open in the Linden Room of the Campus Center which will feature the work of two senior art students. Russ Brabeck will show the work he has done in sculpture and Jim Wardrip will display canvasses of painting and pencil.

The art department will also have a Spring Show featuring the art work of all the art students. This will be an Art Fair with paintings and sculpture for sale which can be purchased by Dana students.

Students To Be Honored In Banquet Ceremonies

Outstanding students will be honored during an evening Honors Banquet on May 18. The banquet will replace the previously annual Spring Honors Convocation. Members of Alpha Chi, Who's Who, Phi Alpha Theta, and last semester's Dean's List will be honored along with scholarship winners and seniors who have received scholarships, fellowships and assistantships to further their education.

Dr. Clifford Hansen, of the philosophy department will serve as Master of Ceremonies of the event. Father Harrington of Creighton University in Omaha will be the guest speaker.

Father Harrington, a native of Milwaukee, Wisconsin, entered the Society of Jesus in 1935, and was ordained a priest in 1948. He received his bachelor and master degrees from St. Louis University. Doctorate studying in English literature was done at Columbia University, Fordham University

in New York City, and University of Edinburgh.

He began teaching in Regis High School and College. In 1956, after employment at the Rockhurst College in Kansas City, he came to Creighton as Assistant Professor of English. The following year he was appointed acting Dean of the Graduate School, becoming full Dean in 1958. Presently he is Vice President for Academic Affairs.

Father Harrington is a member of many academic societies and educational organizations. He also serves on several state commissions in the field of Higher Education. He has long been interested in encouraging students to prepare for advanced studies and is responsible for the development of the lecture and concert series at Creighton as well as the development of the Foreign Film Forum for viewing and discussing the better works of the cinematic art.

The seventy honored students, their parents, and fifteen faculty members and their wives will be invited to attend the banquet.

Band Plans '67-68 Four State Tour

The Dana College Band will give a concert Sunday, May 7, for the season's opening of Venable Park in Omaha.

The concert will be from 3 p.m. to 4 p.m. and will be performed for the Omaha Chapter of the Danish Brotherhood.

The band is now making tentative plans for the 67-68 collegiate year. These plans include a four state tour of Iowa, Kansas, Missouri, and Nebraska.

Next fall the band will also take part in the "Festival of Reformation," a celebration of the 450th anniversary of the Reformation. The program will combine the choruses and bands of Dana, Midland, and Concordia Colleges, and will be presented November 7, 1967 in the Omaha Music Hall. A second performance is scheduled for Grand Island, Nebraska on November 14.

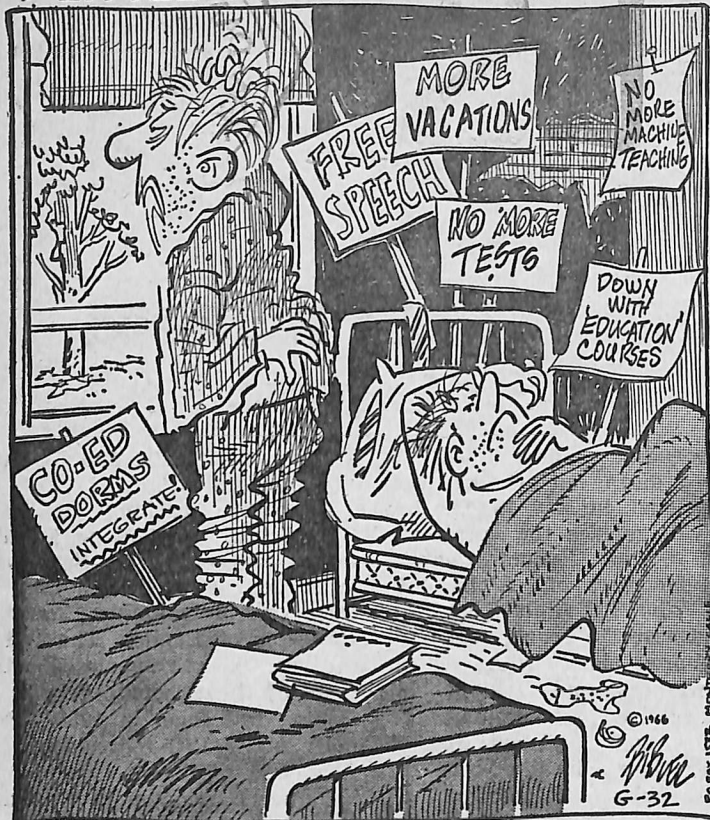
BANSEN TO LECTURE ON SCANDINAVIA AT JOSLYN

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Visitor Admires St. Peter's In Rome, But Denmark Feels More Like Home

Well, I made it back to Denmark after 16 days on the road. Copenhagen has never looked so good even though it was suffering from its perpetual rain.

I was in Rome five days. Naturally I saw the usual number of sights that a tourist has to see. I arrived there Easter morning but I missed the Pope by ten minutes. I did see him Wednesday, however. St. Peters was really beautiful though. It is getting so that I have seen so many cathedrals that most of them hardly phase me any more but St. Peters really impressed me.

The Roman ruins were also very interesting but the thing that really took my eye was the orange trees in the emperor's gardens. My first orange trees! The Roman ruins still support a large population. I saw every type of alley cat imaginable in them.

I thought that Denmark traffic was bad but I take it all back. Italy outranks Denmark easily in this matter. Around most of the main cathedrals and coliseums there are at least 5 lanes of traffic and no places for crossing. The only way to get to the other side is to close your eyes and walk. There is no sense in waiting for a break up in the traffic either because there are none. Somehow I made it every time but I'll never know why.

And the buses! The bus to the Vatican is a double decker. In Copenhagen the bus ride is very bumpy and often the buses are packed but Italy packs them in tighter and I think the favorite hobby of the drivers is to see how often they can make them

jerk. But at least being in a crowded bus has one advantage. It is impossible to fall down.

Another thing I really appreciate the Danes for is their attempt to learn other languages. Even if I didn't know any Danish, I could easily get along anywhere in Denmark with my English and German. Not so in Italy! The shopkeepers usually speak English, a necessity to their trade since tourists provide a good share of their business but the average man on the street, including the policemen do not speak any languages other than their own native tongue. Movies' too, usually have dubbed Italian voices rather than the subtitles underneath that you find in Denmark.

I really enjoyed my Easter vacation though and I've really learned a lot. But as I have said before, Denmark has never looked so good.—Kay

Concordia's dominance of the discus and shot-put events enabled them to slip past a stubborn Dana crew (97-72). The Vikings were themselves quite successful in pulling down several first places, while Midwestern is still a young crew needing experience more than anything.

The first place winners for Dana were: 440 yard relay team composed of Winchell, Williams, Bracher, and Lammers (42.4), Neal in the broad jump with a leap of 21'9", Vasby went 12 feet for first in the pole vault, Wiggins ran a 4:48.3 mile, Lammers

ran the 100 yard dash in 10.4 seconds, and also ran a winning time of 23.4 in the 220 yard dash.

The Viking mile relay team ran a 3:31.3 time to secure second place. Concordia's Bulldogs won first with a time of 3:31.1.

Senior Working To Break Own Record

Leon Bracker, a 21 year old senior from Underwood, Iowa, is on our list of featured athletes this week. As a freshman, Leon tried his hand at basketball and turned out to be the leading scorer on the freshman team. He was intramural representative of his floor as a sophomore.

Leon didn't go out for track as a freshman but starting as a sophomore, he has excelled in the sport and is a three year letterman at Dana. Running on the 440, 880, and 1 mile relay teams Leon played a part in the setting of new Dana records in each of these events in 1966. He also set an individual record as a junior, whipping off the 440 yard dash in a handy 51 seconds flat. Running on slow tracks and often in

bad weather thus far this season, Leon hasn't yet had a chance to break his own record in the 440, but hopes to before the year is out. He was unofficially clocked at under 50 seconds in his leg of the mile relay at Concordia this year.

With a major in physical education and a minor in elementary education Leon is taking 15½ hours this semester including two courses in his major area. He took the teaching block last semester and upon graduation, hopes to go into elementary teaching or junior high coaching. Leon is also in the process of planning a June wedding, to Miss Joanne Gochenour, a 1966 graduate of Dana.

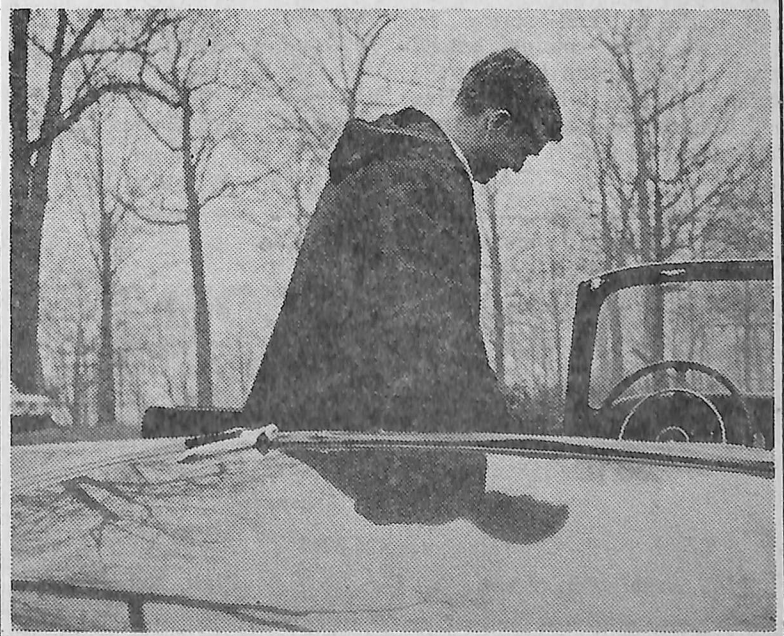
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Russian and Latin American History Will Be Taught In Future Years

Russian and Latin American history courses are among the new offerings which will be available at Dana starting next year. There will also be new courses on the American frontier, historical research and writing, and historiography.

In order to make room for these changes, the survey courses in United States, European, and Non-Western history have been reduced from 4 hours to 3 hours credit a semester. The history seminar and one of the readings courses have been dropped from the 1967-68 catalog.

Mr. Warman will teach History 411, Imperial Russia, next fall, and 412, Soviet Russia, in the spring. He taught Russian history several times when it was previously offered at Dana.

Latin American history will be double-listed as History and Spanish 313-314, and can be taken for credit toward either major beginning 1968-69. It is to be taught by Mr. Williams, who was a Ph.D. candidate in Latin American history at the University of Florida before he came to Dana two years ago.

History 305, the Frontier in United States history, will also be offered beginning in 1968-69.

History 451-452, Research and Historiography, are intended for majors who want to go to graduate school.

BOTH YEARS OF DANISH TO BE OFFERED IN FALL

Both Elementary Danish and Intermediate Danish will be offered in the fall and spring semesters of the coming school year, even though an error in the catalog indicates otherwise. Mrs. Bodil Johnson will teach all Danish language classes.

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Thomsen Judges Valentine Show

Rev Thomsen of the Dana Art Department traveled to Valentine, Nebraska to judge an art show given by both professional and amateur artists. He commented that there were some very interesting exhibits which showed much talent. One was a sculpture made of welded iron called "Snowbound" which was made by an amateur artist who is a rancher in Nebraska. Rev. Thomsen invited him to have a showing of his work at Dana which he may do either this Spring or next Fall.

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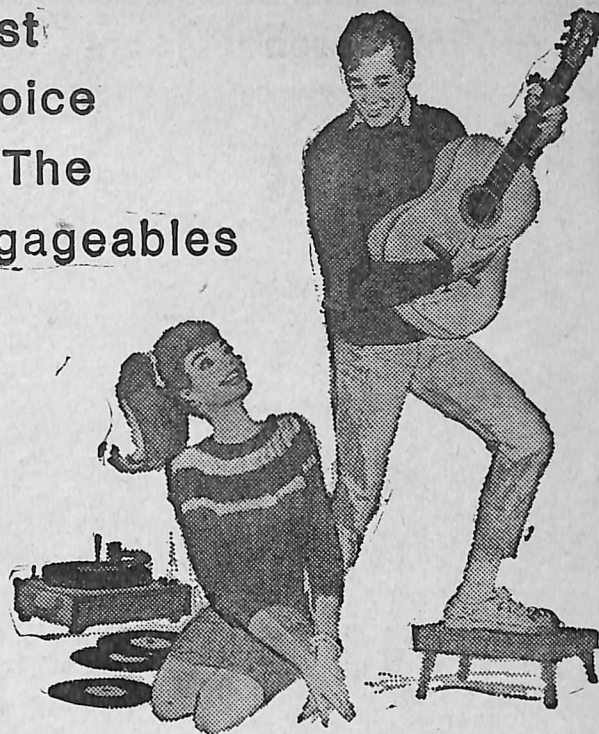
