## "TIVOLI II" Theme For Homecoming

Highlighting Homecoming Week-end October 13th-15th this year will be Dana's second version of Tivoli Gardens imported from colorful Copenhagen. All weekend music, food, games and entertainment will be furnished by the organizations on Dana's campus.

"Tivoli II" will open Friday night at 8:00 p.m. The Coronation of the 1967 Homecoming Queen will take place at 9:30 p.m. in the main pavilion of Tivoli II. The park will close at 12:00 p.m. with a pep rally.

Saturday activity begins again at 1:30 p.m. with the parade of royalty in Viking Field. The football game will get underway at 2 p.m. with Dana versus Sioux Falls. The new stadium seating will be dedicated during a brief ceremony at half-time.

The annual Homecoming dinner will be served Saturday evening from 5:30 to 7:30 at the Campus Center. At 8:00 p.m. in Alumni Memorial Auditorium by the internationally known hypnotist Mr. Ed Baron will be this year's entertainment. At 10:00 p.m. Tivoli II re-opens for the second night of running and the Homecoming Dance begins also in the first level in the Campus Center. At 1:00 a.m. Tivoli II closes.

At the Homecoming Worship Service on Sunday special emphasis will be placed on the 450th anniversary of the Reformation.

Dr. William Hordun, President of Lutheran Theological Seminary at Saskatoon, Saskatchewan, will be the guest speaker. He is one of the top religious leaders in North America. Among other accomplishments, Dr. Hordun has written several books and articles for about 50 journals.

### Graphics Show To Be On Campus

Original graphics by Picasso, Chagall, Renoir, Cezanne, Dali, Miro and Vasarely are among the 400 works of art that will go on exhibition in the Lounge Room of Mickelsen Hall.

The exhibition will run one day only, October 4, 1967, from 10:30 a.m. to 7:30 p.m.

The collection, on a tour of college and university campuses, is presented by London Grafica Arts, which is affiliated with major galleries in London, New York and Detroit.

The collection includes lithographs, etchings, woodcuts, drypoints, aquatints, silkscreens and posters by more than 75 modern masters and younger contemporaries.

All are on sale at prices ranging from \$10.00 to \$3,000.00.

The collection has been assembled by the Lincoln Grafica Arts director, Eugene Ivan Schuster, art historian and visiting lecturer at Wayne State University, Detroit. Schuster feels "it is necessary to understand what is meant by the rather unsatisfactory term of 'an original print.' Various techniques of printmaking enable an artist to make a number of identical images of his work. The normal practice is to make an 'edition' of between 25 and 125 numbered and signed copies of any one work before destroying the plate from which it has been printed. Thus, although a print is not as unique an item as a painting, it nevertheless has a degree of exclusiveness."

Artists like Rembrandt, Toulouse-Lautrec or Picasso have expressed themselves as thoroughly in their graphics as in their oils by exploiting the potentials of the print medium, but their graphics are available at a much more reasonable sum because they are multiple originals and yet possess all the aesthetic qualities of a great oil.

the sponsorship of the Special Events Lyceum programs.

On September 20th James W. Mosely recognized expert on the unidentified Flying Objects and editor of the magazine SAUCER NEWS, presented a verbal and visual picture of "Flying Saucers through the Ages."

## Vikings Beat Concordia To Remain Undefeated

The Dana Vikings remain undefeated after beating Concordia, 13-2 last Saturday. The game was well attended, by both Dana students and Blair citizens, who witnessed a tough, hard-nosed game.

The Vikes' clearly out-classed Concordia, with 262 yards gained and 13 first downs to the Bulldogs 153 yards and 9 first downs. The Redheads concentrated on a winning ground game with Max Boustead leading the pack at 78 yards in 13 carries. The Dana defense was much improved over last week and contributed much to this week's win.

Unfortunately Dana also led in penalties and fumbling, with 11 penalties and Concordia accepting 60 of the 75 yards. The three Dana fumbles were all recovered by Dana.

Both teams came to play football and they seemed equal until well into the second quarter. Then the Dana defense toughened up and twice in a row forced the Bulldogs to punt after only 3 downs. The Vikes ran the second punt back to their own 40 and then the offense began to move. A crucial first down scamper by Bill Sorenson, with third down and long yardage, and a pass to Bob Woods, brought down on the two yard line of Concordia, kept the Viking Drive rolling.

With first and goal on the two, Bill Sorenson went over the goal-line, only to be called back by a Viking penalty. A blocked pass, another Viking violation, and cancelled penalties by both teams made it third and goal at the 12. Quarterback Mayer then passed to Jerry Voll for the first Viking touchdown. Phil Vasby converted the extra point attempt to make it 7-0.

Late in the half Concordia began to move deep into Viking territory, but Phil Vasby intercepted a pass to stop the threatening Bulldogs.

After half-time the Vikings ran the kick-off to their own 36 and started a 64 yard march for their second TD, that culminated with Bob Woods going in from the 9. The point after attempt was missed to make the score 13-0.

Concordia moved the ball to mid-field and, forced to punt, left the Vikes on their own 1 yard line. Dana kicked its way out of

the hole and the Bulldogs punted them right back into it. The Vikings fumbled the ball on a play and it was recovered by Ralph Mayer, but he was downed behind the goal line for a Concordia safety and only score of the game.

An interception by Ron Bernier on the Dana 30 stopped a Concordia drive and a Concordia fumble, recovered by Dennis Sellon, ended the third quarter.

Half-way through the fourth quarter Concordia once again had the ball deep in Dana territory. Intercepting a Viking pass on the Dana 35 and moving it to the 20. Several plays later the Bulldogs had a first down on the Viking four yard line. But the Vikings goal-line stand held.

Ralph Mayer then ran the quarterback sneak for 12 yards to take the pressure off the Vikes. After an exchange of punts time ran out and Dana won 13-2.

(The J.V. lost to Concordia Monday night 27-0.)

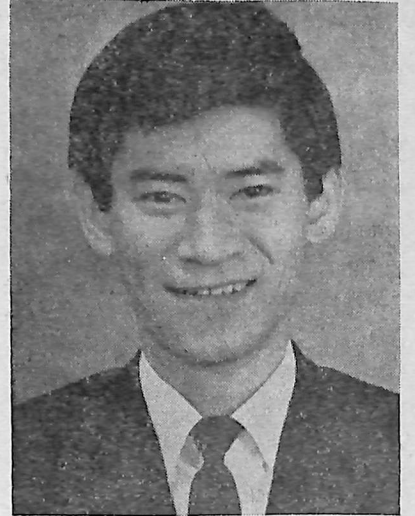

## Library Increases Its New Services

Microfilm readers are among the newer additions to the library's many services.

Two readers are presently in use with a catalogue of 379 periodical film reels available to students and faculty. The microfilm machine operates similar to a film strip projector with the printed image appearing before the reader on a screen.

The reader provides a vast store of periodical information for quick convenient reference.

The library has also gone electronic this year with its new I.D. check out system.

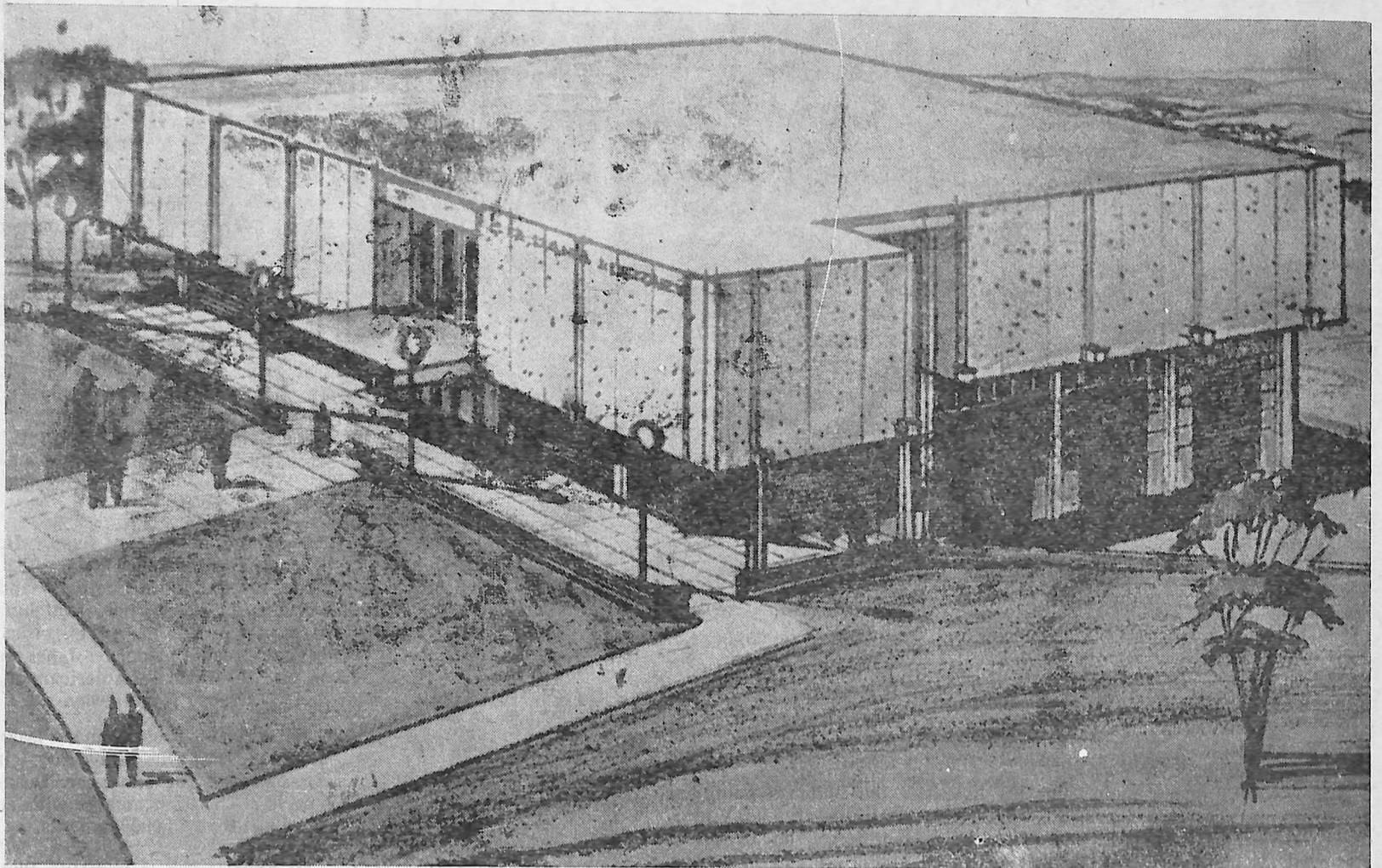
The new process works in the same manner as a credit card. Only those individuals with embossed IDs are permitted to check out library materials.

If the I.D. does not correspond to the holder the card will be held and the rightful owner can claim it at the Business Office. This policy, according to Mr. Johnson, is to eliminate signing out books in another person's name.

Part time students will have special I.D.'s on reserve in the library since they do not obtain them at registration.

All students are urged to use the microfilm reader and are reminded to carry their I.D.'s

## Record Enrollment of 826 On Campus This Fall

A record total of 828 students enrolled at Dana this fall, despite a large drop in the freshman class. The net gain of 17 students over last year is due to the return of more upperclassmen than usual.

There are 260 freshmen this year compared to 319 last year. Perhaps because of the war in Vietnam, the number of men enrolled as freshmen is 146, compared to 193 a year ago.

There are 146 seniors this year—only nine less than were juniors a year ago. The present junior class numbers 168. There are 226 sophomores compared to only 187 last year.

Thirty-three states are represented. Nebraska with 307 and Iowa with 279 account for three-quarters of the students. Other leaders are Wisconsin, 39; Minnesota, 33; Colorado, 22; Ohio, 19; Illinois, 16; California, Maine, and Kansas, 12 apiece.

A dozen students are from overseas or foreign countries. Four apiece come from Canada and Nigeria, and one each from American Samoa, Japan, Trinidad, and the Virgin Islands.

Lutherans outnumber all other denominations, with 437 from the American Lutheran Church and 85 other Lutherans. Methodists are second with 121. Other groups are Catholics, 32; Presbyterians, 29; Congregational, 23; United Church of Christ, 14; Baptist, 13;

First Christian, 13, and Episcopal, 11. There is one Moslem student.
