Musical numbers will be presented by the Dana College Choir and the Choir from St. John's Seminary.

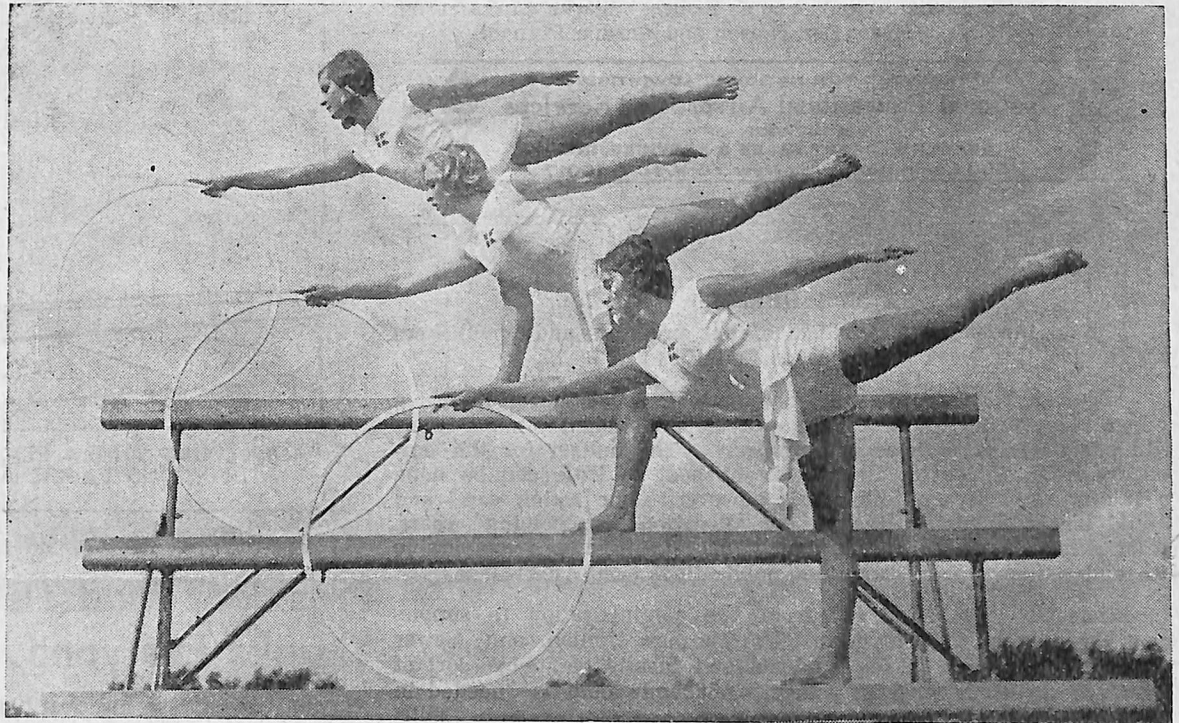


Dr. Michael Novak

The guest speaker for the event is Dr. Michael Novak who will speak on the topic, "Always To Be Reformed." Mr. Novak is professor of Philosophy and Theology in the humanities program at Stanford University. His best-known books are *A New Generation* and *The Open Church* which have won him an international reputation.

Dr. Novak will deal with the idea of reform as being essential to the ideal of the Christian Church. He will discuss the present ecumenical moment and its yielding to each of the Christian churches a chance to learn from each of the other Christian churches.

DANISH GYMNASTS VISIT DANA NOV. 15



The Danish Gymnastic Team will perform in Borup Coliseum the evening of November 15.

The team consists of 12 girls and 12 boys selected from the most skillful gymnasts in Denmark. Most of them are around 20 years old or less. Some of them are students, and the others represent a number of different careers.

Their demonstrations include a variety of modern

Danish gymnastics for girls and boys, and a selection of Danish folk dances in colorful native costumes. The team is directed by Erik Flensted-Jensen.

Tim Andrews' Art Shown On Campus Freshmen Headed By Dennis Schmidt

On October 23, Omaha Artist Tim Andrews will show his work at Dana College here in Blair. The one-man show will be from October 23 to November 5th at the student center. The theme of the show is "Adventures in Euphoria", the various paintings and sculptures return the individual to a pleasant awareness of inner calm.

Tim Andrews is a junior at the University of Omaha with a double major in philosophy, and psychology. His art work is done at the Creighton Fine Arts Center at 14th and Davenport, where he has a studio. Tim has chosen a dominant philosophic theme for his work. This theme is a satisfaction in the race of man, rejecting ideas of social protest or con-

temporary messages, Tim merely concentrates on beauty for its own sake. It is his contention that beauty exists for the sake of human enjoyment, so rather than puzzle the observer and lead him to ask what the painting means, Tim's work shows a sense of subtle enjoyment and pacification not to be found in many of the fine arts today.

Tim has been painting for many years, he has had one-man shows at the College of Saint Mary and the First Unitarian Church in Omaha, Nebraska. His paintings can be seen in many private collections throughout Omaha. The media used is reflectively new, using plastic and fluorescent colors to good advantage for a total effect of depth and Eastern simplicity.

Dennis Schmidt of Elkhorn, Nebraska was chosen freshman class president at their first meeting, October 12. He will be assisted by Donald Nelson, Flaxton, North Dakota, vice president; Karen Evenson, Omaha, Nebraska, secretary; and Linda Haas, Racine, Wisconsin, treasurer.

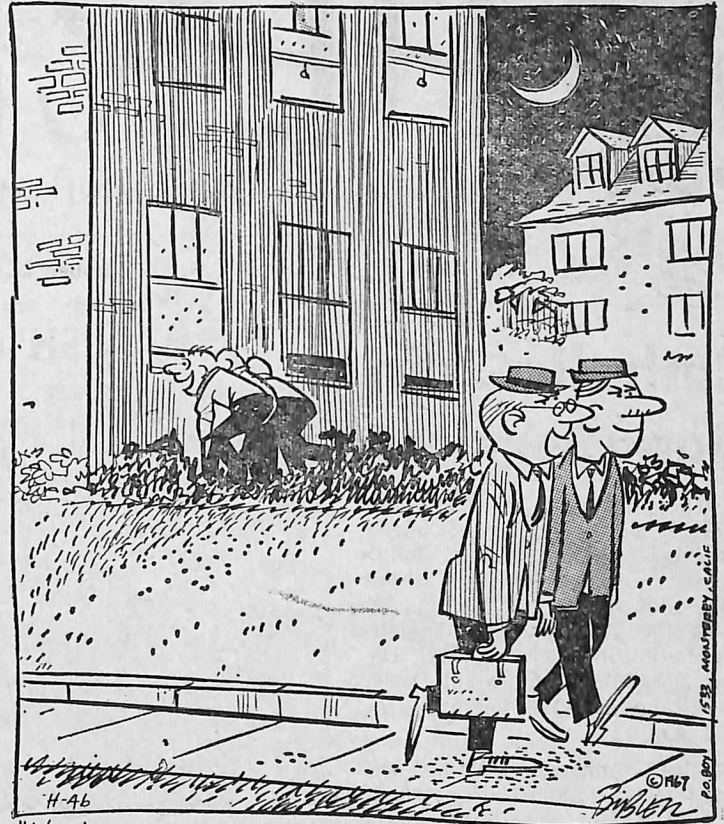
Well, anyway, thanks for your interest Jess baby.

Yankton Beats Vikes

The Dana Vikings went down in defeat for the third time this season in the hands of the Yankton Greyhounds 20-6.

The competent Viking defense momentarily lost poise during the closing minutes of the second quarter when Yankton scored three times in seven minutes.

The first Yankton drive started on their own 25 yard line. LaPoint completed 3 of 4 passes totaling 49 yards. With the ball on the Dana 19, LaPoint dropped back for another pass. Finding no one open and the middle of the field clear, LaPoint sprinted the 19 yards untouched and scored Yankton's first touchdown. Bob Tereshinski added the extra point.

The Dana offense, unable to move the ball after the kick-off, punted the ball back to the Greyhounds. Seven plays later Larry Ireland cracked the goal line stand gaining the one yard for the touchdown. Tereshinski's conversion kick failed when Brent Peterson came from his right end position and made a beautiful diving block.

Dana again was unable to move the ball and punted back to Yankton. Ireland returned the ball 20 yards and a Dana personal foul placed the ball at the Viking 20 yard line. Bob Heartt received a 20 yard pass from Jim LaPoint and the Greyhounds were on the scoreboard again. Tereshinski added the extra point and the score at half time was 20-0.

Late in the fourth quarter the Vikings put a drive together and fullback Bill Sorensen, who led the Dana rushing attack with 64 yards in 16 carries, plunged two yards for Dana's lone touchdown. The conversion failed and the game soon ended 20-6.

Girls' Intramurals

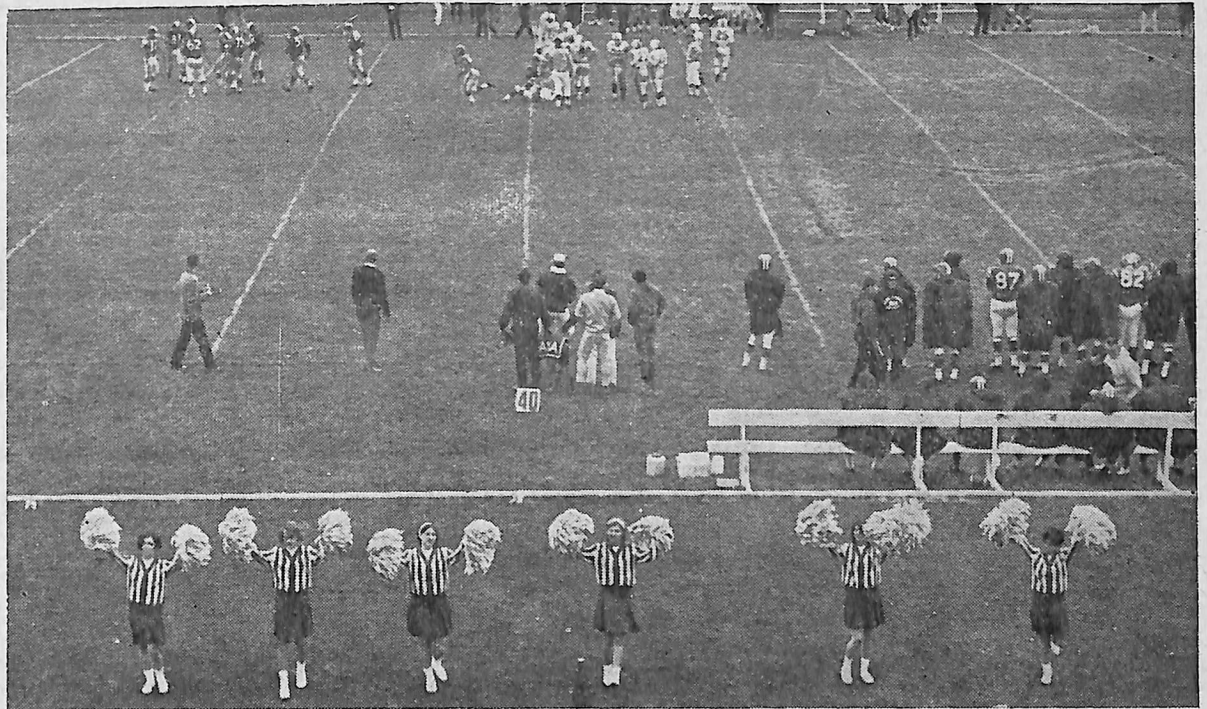
The final round of the women's intramurals took place on a very windy field Sunday afternoon.

Hunger, Peace To Be Theme Of Thanksgiving Conf.

Every year since 1960, twelve colleges, four seminaries, and one school of nursing have sent delegates to the Lutheran Student Conference sponsored by the American Lutheran Church. This program originated at Dana, but is held at a different institution each year. Augsburg College in Minneapolis, Minnesota will be the conference location this year.

The topic of the conference this year is "Hunger as an Obstacle to World Peace," and what we as Americans and Christians are doing about this growing problem.

This year the conference will take place from November 23 to November 26. Dr. Schiotz, President of the American Lutheran Church, and Dr. Herman Habel, Concordia Seminary Professor, will be guest speakers for the event.

Each school has a co-ordinator of plans and a select committee chosen by the co-ordinator. Charles Gilmore fills the post of co-

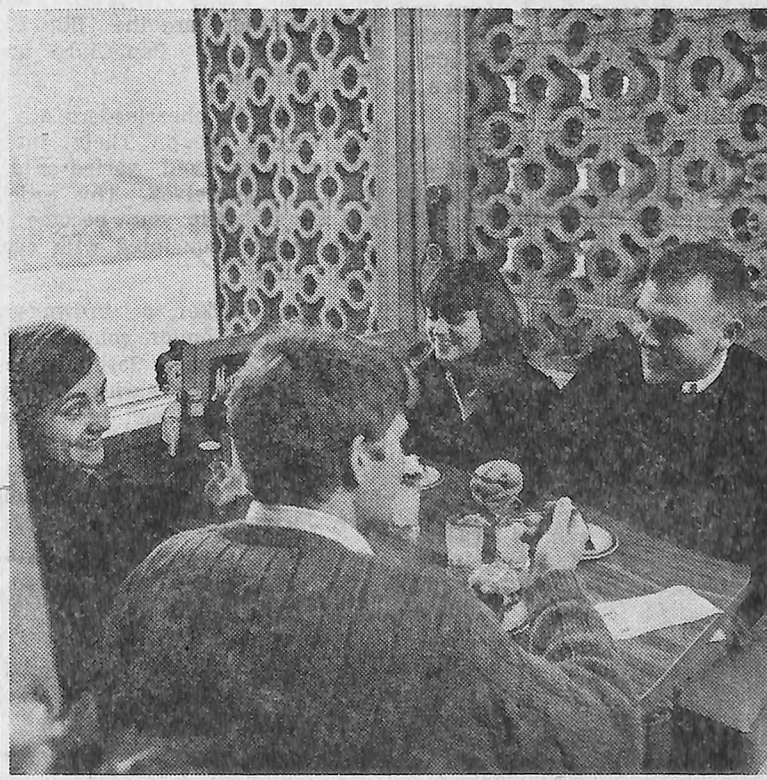
