## 762 Enrolled 2nd Semester

Second semester enrollment at Dana is 762 students, of whom 444 are men and 318 women. The total is a net loss of 66 compared to last semester, but a gain of 23 compared to last year at this time.

Twenty seniors completed their degree requirements in the fall and therefore did not re-enroll. In addition, nine post-graduate students were in the education block and finished their studies. One student is taking her spring semester in Denmark.

There were 75 students who did not re-register for the second semester, and seven who dropped out during the first semester. The largest declines were among freshmen (down 29) and sophomores (30).

On the positive side, 46 new students came to Dana this term. Enrollment as of February 6, 1968, follows:

## Murray Brown Presents Modern Danish Poems

Dana Chapter of the American-Scandinavian Foundation is presenting on February 13, in DHA at 8 p.m. "The Poetry of Denmark," a recital by Murray Brown open to all students, faculty, and guests with free admission. There will be a coffee hour following in the President's Room.

Murray Brown, a poet, translator, and one-man theater artist, will recite his own translations of more than 200 classic and modern Danish poems. This particular program premiered in Copenhagen in September, and was favorably reviewed by critics and the public. One Copenhagen newspaper, the "Berlingske Tidende," described Murray Brown as "A thrilling personality, with intensity in the powerful and passionate, but fortunately also with a sense for the comic, as expressed in the

works of H. C. Anderson and Wessel."

Murray Brown has performed in such places as New York City Town Hall, Brooklyn Academy of Music off Broadway theater, ABC television, the Little Theater Club in London, and numerous theaters, colleges, clubs and societies in the U. S. and Europe. After his presentation, he will lecture also at the University of Nebraska.

## Controversial Films Coming To Dana

Ingmar Bergman is the most fascinating personality in modern Swedish film and one of the most talked-about film directors anywhere in the world.

As an artist, he has interested himself in the struggle between good and evil in the lives of people today; he has given voice to the desperate and affection-hungry younger generation of the post-war years and often his films show a tense idealism and the search for a way of life. Bergman uses film as a means of personal expression; with few exceptions he scripts the films he directs and throughout these films his own personality and outlook on life is reflected.

The trilogy consisting of "Through a Glass Darkly," "Winter Light" and "The Silence" represent the most important theological exploration to have been made anywhere in modern film. Bergman's first collaboration with Alf Sjöberg in 1943 helped to make their film, "Torment," achieve "classic" status throughout the world. Since then Bergman has won many international awards at such places as Cannes, Venice and the United States.

Twenty-six feature films in less than twenty years, all of them provocative, many of them highly controversial, some of them daring in the extreme--no other career in modern cinema can match it. Nor is any so rewarding to view as a single repertory--as

one profoundly gifted cinematic imagination consistently at work, in a dazzling variety of styles, to create a personal vision of life. Watch the Hermes for reviews of individual films prior to their release on campus.

Other students who would like to attend this weekend conference at the University of South Dakota, Vermillion, should contact Prof. Donald G. Warman, PM 316.

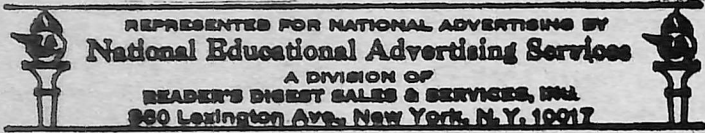

## Congregation Elects Three

Elections were held Sunday, February 4, following the morning worship service of "Ekklesia Koinonias" to fill the positions of three councilmen whose terms of office have expired. Dennis Schmidt, Gary Miller, and Eleanor Jensen will replace retiring councilmen Dan Busse, Clair Johnson and Gladys Olsen. The term of office ending in May, 1969, lasts for three semesters. The newly elected councilmen will be installed at the worship service, Sunday, February 18.

The congregation also approved the second semester budget for \$900.00. This budget is identical to the first semester budget with the exception of an allocation of \$100.00 for a Homecoming speaker.

## Pres. Madsen Announces Tuition Higher Next Year

This is to announce officially the costs of tuition and fees which have been established by the Administration for the 1968-69 school year.

Tuition charges will be increased \$55.00 per semester, and the general fee will be increased by \$5.00 per semester, bringing tuition to a total of \$465.00 and general fee to \$80.00 per semester. Charges for board, room and student body dues (assessed by the student body) will remain the same as this year.

At its fall meeting the Board of Regents authorized the Administration to increase charges up to a total of \$150.00 for the school year to meet rising costs, to provide funds for faculty and staff increases and to finance desirable improvements in the academic program. The total increase for the school year indicated above amounts to \$120.00.

We regret the necessity for these increases, but they reflect the inflation which is affecting all of us. They are minimal by comparison to colleges and universities of Dana's type. Our costs are still among the lowest compared to our sister colleges of The American Lutheran Church and to other Nebraska private colleges. The increases are motivated by our objectives: to retain and attract a faculty of high quality and dedication and constantly to strengthen and enrich our academic program.

## Gay Dana Blades Prove They Are Able "Cut-ups"

During the past three weeks two Dana freshmen have successfully completed two surgical operations. Their patient, a buff and white laboratory rat named Gracie, is not only doing well, but the surgeons, Don Nelson and Phil Gotsch, are reported in satisfactory condition also.

The first operation was performed on January 23, when Gotsch and Nelson removed Gracie's left kidney. I asked Nelson about the purpose of the operation.

"Well, the primary purpose of the operation was to study methods of surgery rather than to study kidney functions. Actually that operation and the subsequent one on February 6 were only part of a more extensive biology research project. We are attempting to identify and alleviate the hazards as-

sociated with surgery when it is attempted in a laboratory under less than perfect conditions. We chose to remove a kidney because that operation involves several different operating procedures and because the loss of one kidney would not endanger Gracie's chances of recovery by impairing her body functions."

"We were well satisfied and even a little surprised at the speed of Gracie's recovery. For a time we suspected that the wound might have become infected. When we operated again on Tuesday we were looking for signs of infection from the previous surgery, but happily we found none."

Each tutor will be responsible for only one child and he may tutor either elementary or high school students. The important thing is that we must have you students, both tutors and tutor-drivers.

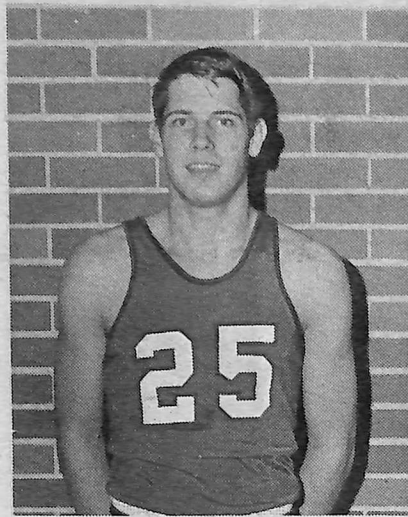

The Dana Vikings will be at home Friday and Saturday nights trying to notch their first Tri-State Conference victory(s). The Vikings have their work cut out for them as they draw some very tough opponents in these two encounters. On Friday, the 4th place Northwestern Red Raiders will be on the Bortup Coliseum floor at 7:30. Saturday night at the same time the 2nd place Yankton Greyhounds will visit.

Northwestern features an all-conference forward in Rick Vanderberg who is averaging around 23 points per game. 6'4" Gene Denherder and 6'6" Darwin De Vries are the rebound controllers and Terry Arends assists Vanderberg in the scoring.

Yankton is led by 6'8" Kansas University transfer Chuck Lloyd and all-conference returnees Geoffry Porter and Bob Pitts. Porter was an all-american junior college performer in Chicago. Yankton has 7 men 6'5" or over on their 12 man squad.

Dana will attempt to counter with the picked up scoring pace of juniors Rex Mahlman and Dean Krueger. Krueger has improved his scoring somewhat of late and will also have to hold the rebound edge if Dana is to have any success. Mahlman is averaging 14 points per game, Krueger 12.5 and Gary Shuck 11.4. Krueger and Shuck have averaged 11 and 9.5 rebounds per game. Brent Peterson is leading in assists and free throw shooting. The latter mark being 80% on 40 of 50 tosses.

Freshmen games are scheduled both nights beginning at 5:30. The Blair High School faculty men will play on Friday and the Sloan Iowa High School faculty plays on Saturday.

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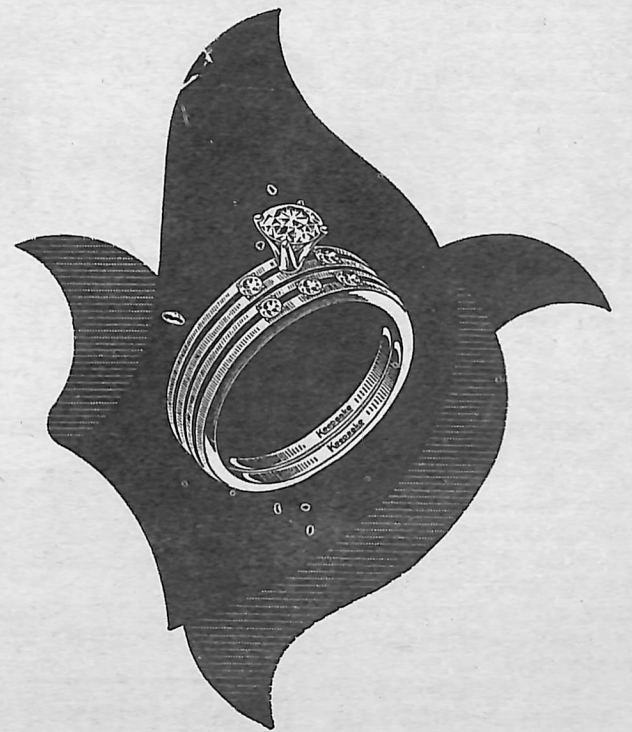
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
