Wartburg Castle Singers 'Tell It Like It Is'

"Tell It Like It Is," the Wartburg College Castle Singers' production, which will be staged in Blair, Nebraska April 26, is described as being a musical editorial.

Written and produced by Dr. James E. Fritschel, Singers' director, "Tell It Like It Is" deals with the general problem of communication--between generations between sexes, in worship.

"It is entertaining, but with serious intent," according to Dr. Fritschel.

Tying the production together are news stories of contemporary events, mostly from either the Des Moines "Register" or the Waterloo "Daily Courier."

"Tell It Like It Is" uses a variety of art forms--folk music or music composed in the folk style, dance, the printed word and the cinema.

Featured will be a group of five students, called the Wapsipinicon Singers, who appeared professionally during February and March at the Holiday Inn in Waterloo.

The term "Wapsipinicon" is derived from a dialect of northeast Iowa, the home of Wartburg College.

Also included in "Tell It Like It Is" are a couple of numbers from "What's the Meaning of This?", the musical drama performed by the Castle Singers in Seattle and Dallas last summer for the national Luther League convention and at the Tyrone Guthrie Theatre in Minneapolis during March.

Curtain time for the performance at Alumni Memorial Auditorium, Dana College will be 7:30 P.M.

dramatized, but never loses its appeal.

Finally we invite and urge all of you to forget about world problems for a time and laugh at the timeless humor of Much Ado About Nothing (stage director: Kay Ringhand). Benedick (Joel Hermann) and Beatrice (Kay Ringhand) engage in a not-so-typical battle of the sexes. These scenes are for anyone who enjoys exaggerated situations and quick repartee.

The general atmosphere of the whole evening will be enhanced by authentic costuming, and appropriate music by the Madrigal Singers under Dr. Brandeis' direction, and a series of colorful pictures elucidating scenes from the three plays (created by Julie Larson). 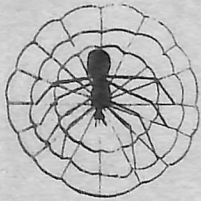
Judy is a student of Dr. Alan Brandes who will assist her on the last number.

Short Recieves Research Grant

Neal Short, junior chemistry major, has received word of his appointment as an Undergraduate Research Program participant at the University of South Dakota for the coming summer.

The nine-week program, sponsored by the National Science Foundation, is designed to provide chemical research experience in a university setting for highly qualified chemistry undergraduates. Short will work with Dr. George Scott of the University's Department of Chemistry on telomerization, a process of polymerization in which emphasis is placed on cross-linking and chain terminating agents and their effects on product properties.

LUTHERAN BROTHERHOOD HONORS CHARLES JOHANSEN

Charles P. Johansen, an art major at Dana College last year has won an exhibition award in the tenth annual National Lutheran Student Art Award Program sponsored by Lutheran Brotherhood, Minneapolis-based fraternal insurance society.

Mr. Johansen's home is San Mateo, Calif. He received a \$25 United States Savings Bond for his clay work entitled "Mary" done in plaster.

The 65 winning art works in the program were selected from 510 entries submitted by students attending 80 schools in the United States and Canada. The society has awarded \$2,762.50 to students and Lutheran schools they attend in this year's program. Included are purchases of 11 entries for Lutheran Brotherhood's permanent traveling art collection.

An exhibit of the winning art works is being featured during Lutheran Brotherhood's tenth annual Fine Arts Festival April 15-May 4 at the society's home office building, 701 Second Avenue So., Minneapolis, Minn.

The Fine Arts Festival is part of Lutheran Brotherhood's extensive fraternal activities program, for which 1.2 million dollars has been budgeted in 1968.
