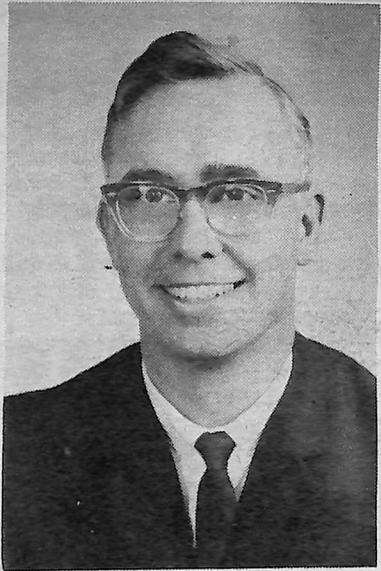

OMAHA JOURNALIST SPEAKS AT CHAPEL ON BLACK REVOLT

The first guest speaker at chapel this year was Mr. Charles Washington, news editor of the North Omaha Star. The Star is the only newspaper in Nebraska edited by and for black Americans.

"Now is the time for a black man to speak out to whites on racism and the demands of blacks for a piece of the action," the speaker declared. He warned that the black rebellion is only the exposed part of an iceberg -- many of the problems and demands of black Americans have not yet surfaced, but they will come to the surface in the days ahead.

Mr. Washington blamed the policy-makers of white society for the darkness, the slums, the unemployment, and other disadvantages which give birth to black resentment and violence. As Martin Luther King observed, black Americans get only half of the good things of white society, and a double portion of the bad.

Americans who are frightened by demands for black power now have lost sight of their own revolutionary tradition, Mr. Washington said. The British were wrong in the 18th century, and white Americans are wrong now if they deny freedom to those who are black. The whites themselves cannot become free of bigotry until the black man is free from it.

The speaker was introduced by Pat Bracken, a Dana student who is now working at the Wesley House in North Omaha. A question and answer session followed the chapel talk.

Education Is Emphasis At Fall Honor's Convo.

Mrs. Calista Cooper Hughes, guest speaker at the Fall Honors Convocation Thursday, is the Nebraska State Senator from the first district. She is very active in the field of education; she is a member of the State Advisory Committee on Section 6 on Education, the E.T.V. Commission, and the Governor's Citizen Study Commission on Mental Retardation.

Mrs. Hughes is very widely traveled, having accompanied her husband on ten of his foreign assignments for the Diplomatic Corps.

Speaking on the topic of "Intellectual Power", Mrs. Hughes feels that it is through education and the use of the intellect and the intellectual that the salvation of the world lies. Having rested on the intellectual capital of the nation's founders and the abundant resources provided by nature

for two hundred years, it is now time to emphasize the education and intellectual capacities of the country to avoid domination by the machinery our technology has produced.

Three elements are required to improve our educational system. First we must be willing to pay

THREE FACULTY MEMBERS ON LEAVE

Three members of the faculty at Dana will be on leave during the 1968-69 year according to Dr. C. A. Christiansen, Academic Dean.

Dr. Donald Lehmer, Professor of Sociology and Anthropology, will be on sabbatical leave doing post-doctoral colloquia and seminars at the University of Minnesota and the Minnesota Historical Society.

Mr. Darrel Dibben, Assistant Professor of Speech, will be on leave to do graduate work at the University of Nebraska. Mr. Dibben will be supported by a National Teaching Fellowship Grant working toward his doctorate in Speech.

Mr. John Nielsen, Associate Professor of Religion, will be on sabbatical leave at Oxford University in England doing graduate study toward his doctorate in Religion. Mr. Nielsen has also been awarded an American Lutheran Church Faculty Growth Award.

for quality at all levels. A major breakthrough here was the acceptance of Federal Aid to education.

Second, there must be more emphasis on individual education. Such things as universal pre-school education, financial support based on ability throughout the educational system, liberal loans, and technical and vocational schools centered on today's and tomorrow's skills should be top priority items.

Her third element in the new Education Policy is an overhauled education Administration. Schools are an expensive investment, used eight hours a day, nine months a year. Efficient Administration could greatly increase the use received for dollars invested. New ideas must be brought to such things as school placement, it must be changed to population factors rather than jurisdictional areas, and new education centers should be placed as "magnets" for population, industry, etc. And students, now individually taught to be reasoning adults, should be treated as such, given the rights of expression and reasonable debate in an orderly American way.

SCHOLARSHIPS

Nine students who will receive full-tuition scholarships from the Board of Regents were presented by Mr. Lorentz E. Thorngren, chairman. These students were in the top 5% of their high school graduation class, or were finalists or semi-finalists in the National Merit Scholarship tests. They are Kathie Buss, Kenneth Harvey, Rodney Kastrup, Carol King, Laurence Rasmussen, Kathryn Ryan, Gregory Schou, David Timm, and Vickie Wilkerson.

Eighteen freshmen were presented with half-tuition President's Scholarships by Dr. C. C. Madsen. For this award, they scored 27 or above on the ACT tests, were in the top 10% of their graduating class, or received letters of commendation in the National Merit Scholarship tests. President's Scholarships are renewable each year if the student maintains a 7.0 grade point average.

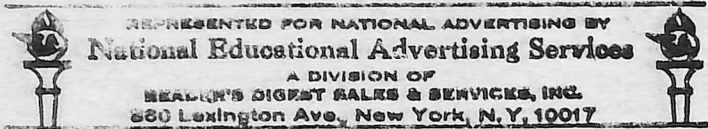

Student Body President Proposes A Challenge

It is customary and fashionable, I suppose, for new and returning students to receive numerous "Welcome to Dana" speeches and letters, until these students may begin to wonder if they are receiving greetings or excuses for nothing better to say. For this reason I choose not to extend to you a greeting, but rather a challenge.

Students rights have come of age. Across this country campuses from Berkeley to Stoney Brook have shown an unaware community that it must attempt to understand what motivates students to feel so strongly or become so dedicated to a cause which seems hopeless in attaining.

Some explain it as the romantic ideals of youth, others comment that it is at least one way for college students to release tension, and there are always the completely remote observers who blame it on hippies, pot puffers, or in general anyone who seems different or not too stable.

It is easy to see how these off-center criticisms arise since such rabble-rousers as Patrick Henry or Martin Luther were considered at least as radical as today's college students in their demands.

If a person isn't aware of the need for student rights he soon becomes so when he takes on the handle "student." No matter what a campus may claim to be it can't be home. (Although some housemother may have told you differently.) But it's not really that cold cruel world you've been preparing to enter either. It must be somewhere in-between and the recent student movements are an attempt to define this vagueness.

The efforts of students government this year will involve student rights - your rights. No longer can we sit back and be strangled by the red tape that prevents change. Before this year is over every student on this campus should be aware of his rights. Until then he cannot expect to use them.

The eighty-fourth academic year at Dana College officially began with the Opening Convocation held on Thursday, September 5.

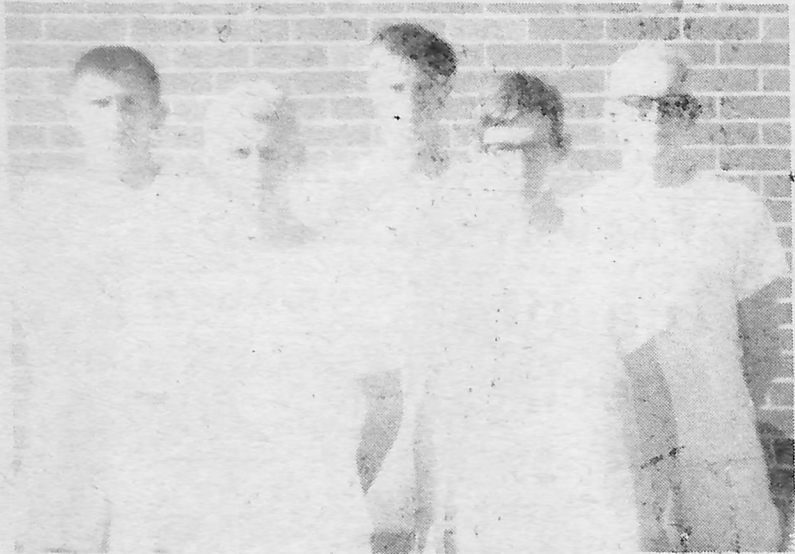
The liturgy was conducted by Pastor Bergstraesser, and Dr. C. C. Madsen, the college President, gave the address.

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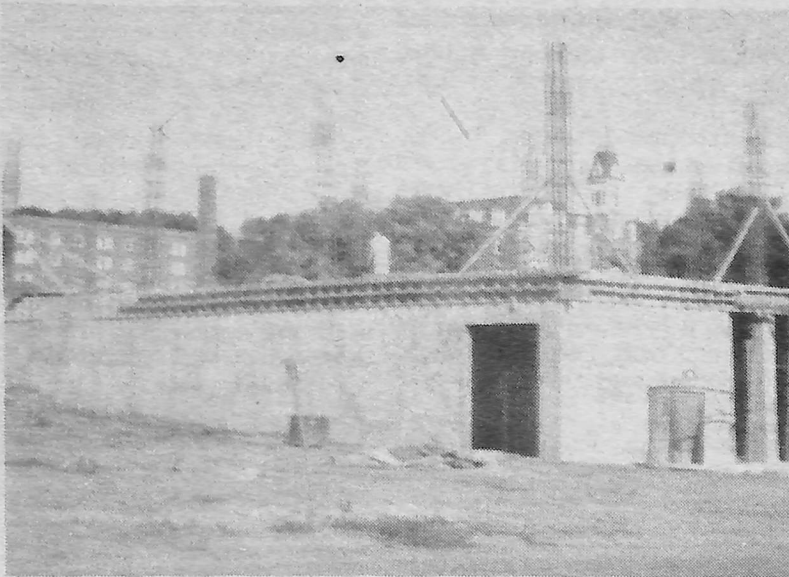

Dana's New Improvements Make A Better Campus

According to Mr. Snowbeck, Business Manager, Dana has undertaken and completed several noteworthy projects during the summer.

The new library under construction is the most obvious change on campus. The building is scheduled to be finished by late spring. It is hoped that furniture and books can be moved in before the close of this school year and that the building can be in use by the time summer school begins.

A big improvement has been made in the parking areas at Pioneer Memorial. The driveway and parking lot north of Pioneer Memorial have been paved and the parking lot accommodates 26 cars, East

of Pioneer Memorial another rock parking lot was created to accommodate about the same number of cars. The entire east area of PM has been graded and some landscaping has been done.

Miscellaneous painting has been going on all over the campus. Notable examples of this can be seen in the recent painting of the fire escapes on Old Main and in the exterior painting of the windows of Argo and Elkhorn.

The installation of a 48 inch storm drain between AMA east to 27th Street allows water to be carried off underground instead of on top of the ground. In Old Main some of the electrical wiring has been corrected and larger panels installed.

In the boiler house area, between Old Main and Argo, existing utilities tunnels have been checked and additional tunnels added. The primary electrical lines feeding Argo and Old Main have been buried, and the power poles southwest of Argo and south of the boiler house have been removed. A transformer vault has been built south of Old Main.

The domestic hot water heaters for Elk Horn and Argo housed in the boiler house have been removed and pipes now connect these dorms to the water heating system in the Campus Center. The boiler house and stack will be removed completely this winter.

Plans Revised For Intramurals

Ron Bernier, intramural co-ordinator, and Coach Jerry Rainforth, have co-operated in forming a new approach to intramural football games for the 1968 season. The plan includes dividing the fifteen teams into four divisions of four teams each with one division being filled with a bye.

Each division plays a round robin to determine its own champion. Then each team is classified class I, AA, AAA, AAAA and plays every other team in his classification. The winners in Class AAA and AAAA pay each other for intramural championship. The purposes of this method are "to allow teams of equal strength to compete against each other 'and' to eliminate as many forfeitures as possible."

Another aspect of this new approach that was also accepted by the intramural directors is collecting 25¢ from each man on campus to purchase individual trophies for the champions in each intramural activity.

A major change in intramural football policy is the switching of games from Sunday afternoons to Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday evenings at 4:30. This move has been made in hopes that more students will participate in the sports. A new rule allowing 25 minute halves and a five minute halftime will hold game time down to one hour.

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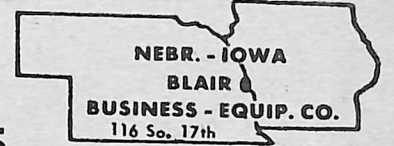
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
