Pastor Trout--Spiritual Emphasis Week Speaker

The Reverend Nelson W. Trout, bama, a member of the staff of the Evangelism Department of the American Lutheran Church, will be on campus Oct. 12-15 as the featured speaker during the fall Spiritual Emphasis Week.

Pastor Trout is a graduate of Capital University, A.B. degree (1948), the Evangelical Theological Seminary (1952), Columbus, Ohio. He also attended Wilberforce University, Zenia, Ohio (1939), and the University of Southern California, Los Angeles, California (1960).

In his ministry he has shown a particular interest in the evangelism field and is a favorite speaker for many youth groups.

In addition to his active ministry, his military record indicates outstanding leadership abilities. In 1960, he was promoted to Captain in the Chaplain's Corps and at the present time holds a reserve commission in the Army.

Pastor Trout has just returned from Upsala where he represented The American Lutheran Church as a delegate to the World Council of Churches.

Cambridge Prof. Speaks At Dana

Dr. Elias Bredsdorff, head of the department of Scandinavian Studies at Cambridge University, will speak on "Words, Images and Pictures in a Contemporary Danish Playwright," on Monday, October 21.

Since Kjeld Abell, the playwright with whom the lecture deals, was an artist and scenic innovator, the lecture will be illustrated with slides.

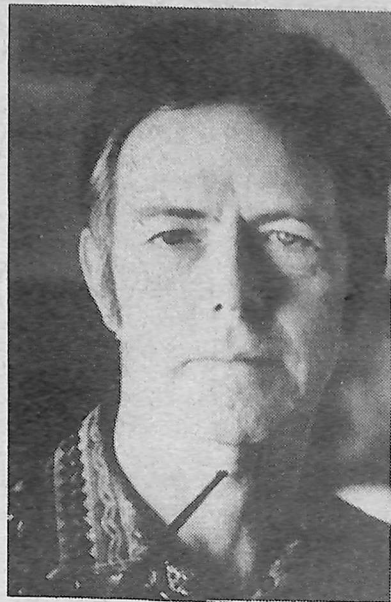
Dr. Bredsdorff, among whose many books is one on Abell, is editor of Scandinavica, an international scholarly journal, and contributor to a number of American and British literary encyclopedias. Since 1949 he has been a member of the faculty at Cambridge and has appeared as guest lecturer at points as far distant as the Universities of Oslo and Peking.

The current lecture tour by Dr. Bredsdorff will take him to seventeen campuses from the Universities of Washington, Oregon and California to Columbia, Harvard and Princeton. He will also appear at the University of Nebraska in Lincoln.

The October 21 lecture will be held in D.H.A. beginning at 8 p.m. and is open to the public at no admission charge.

"Challenge Of The East" Subject Of Symposium

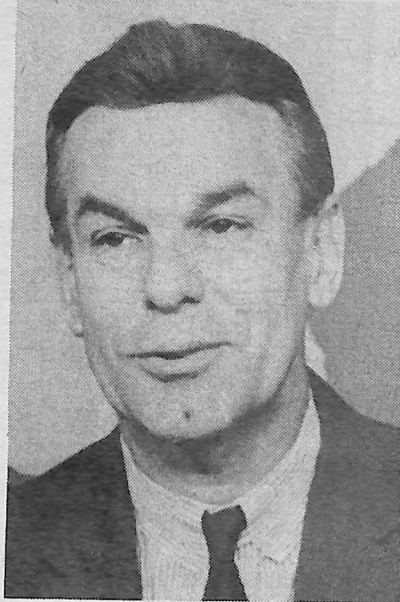

Dr. Watts is now serving as President of the Society for Comparative Philosophy and a visiting professor at San Jose State College, California.

Madame Lydia Na Ranong is an expert in unraveling the tangled skein of Southeast Asian Affairs. Born in China, the daughter of a distinguished Cantonese family and educated in the United States, she received her M.A. in Government from Radcliffe and her Ph. D. in Political Science from Harvard.

Mr. Hlavacek, who will present the keynote address in this series and moderate the closing discussion, hosts the Hlavacek Report seen each week-night on Omaha television channel 3. Mr. Hlavacek has just returned from an extensive tour of the Far East and brings with him an up to date view of the situation in Asia.

Dr. Harold Stern, Acting Director of the Freer Gallery of Art at the Smithsonian Institute in Washington, D. C., is a recognized authority on Oriental Art and creativity. He has been associated with the Freer Gallery since 1951 and during that period has

served as a consultant and advisor on Japanese and Korean Loan exhibitions. He received his B.A., M.A. and Ph. D. from the University of Michigan where he specialized in Japanese studies and Japanese Art History.

Through his books and lectures, Allen Watts has become known in United States and abroad as one of the most stimulating and unconventional philosophers of our time. His special interest is the interpretation of Eastern thought to the West, particularly of Zen Buddhism. He is a prolific writer having written his first book, "The Spirit of Zen", at the age of 20. He also wrote "The Way of Zen" which is now being read in the Liberal Arts Reading Program.

Women's Dormitory Is New Campus Project

The next building project, the new women's dormitory, is to be built just east of Mickelsen Hall and will run north and south, or at a right angle to Mickelsen. The building is designed to house one hundred fifty girls. It is to be five stories high, the top four to have all dorm rooms, and the first floor half dorm rooms, half storage space and utility rooms. There will be thirty-four girls to a floor.

The top floor will be on a level with fourth floor Mickelsen and the exterior of the new dorm will match Mickelsen's. Pre-cast concrete panels on the top three floors of the new dorm will parallel Mickelsen's top three floors, and the bottom two floors of the new dorm are to be sheathed in brick to match the first floor of Mickelsen. Joining the two dorms, a glass-enclosed walkway extends from the second floor of the new dorm to a doorway to be built in Mickelsen between the housemother's apartment and the infirmary room.

Although the exteriors match, the interior is different from Mickelsen. An emergency stairway is at each end, and the main stair case is in the exact middle of the building. There are two parallel corridors on each half of the floor separated by the washrooms. Rooms for the floor counselors are located just off the main stairway. The ground floor, though, will vary from this pattern as each room

will have private bath facilities.

An apartment for the housemother and a chapel are, of course, included, as well as small floor lounges. The new dorm will have ample laundry, ironing, and sewing facilities, and a large trunk storage area.

This dorm will have loose furniture, as does Mickelsen and Argo, that may be arranged to suit the individual, and her roommate.

The estimated cost of the building is \$600,000 with furniture and furnishings to add up to \$50,000. The college has a \$450,000 government loan, and the balance is to be raised by gifts.

Plans and specifications are essentially complete. Bids are going to be accepted and contracts let on October 30, during the fall meeting of the Board of Regents.

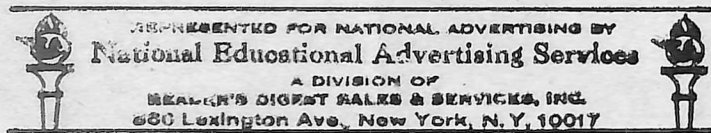

"Dialogue In Black And White" Was Topic Of Last Week's Kiva

Kiva, Dana's unique coffee house, opened Oct. 4, as a part of a series entitled "Dialogue in Black and White".

A panel headed by Mr. Charles Washington, editor of the Omaha Star and considered by some to be a Black militant, opened with a brief statement of position. Langston Bradley and John Biddle then opened the floor for discussion and questions.

The discussion that followed was often heated, but generally informative. Mr. Washington was quick to point out that Negroes in America have reached a point where they have ceased to care what the White community thinks or feels. The Black community, according to Mr. Washington, asks only that the Whites be made to obey the present laws and that more laws be passed to assure the Negro his rights, with greater enforcement imposed upon the

Whites community.

The two hour discussion was punctuated by several sharp exchanges in which Steve Wade and Rich Tenney questioned the validity of the methods used by Negroes and other minority groups to attain these rights.

Several member of the Black community of Omaha moved through the audience to give each person the chance to confront them personally after the formal panel ended. Several interesting and informative seminars were formed by the end of the night.

Mr. Washington ended the evening with a statement that the White community should start to open to the Negroes while the Whites have a chance. The Black community will not talk, but will burn to attain equality.

Kiva continued to uphold its reputation of free speech, and will do so again this Saturday night beginning at 10:00. Kiva is the place to go at Dana.

Urban Crisis To Be Major Topic At Omaha Lutheran Convention

The urban crisis and better educational and economic opportunities for minority groups will be top-priority discussion items at the biennial convention of the American Lutheran Church in Omaha, October 16-22.

One thousand delegates, half clergy and half lay people, will attend with 260 advisory staff members, official visitors, and observers. Sessions will be in the Music Hall of the Omaha Civic Auditorium.

Dana has been asked to provide entertainment for one hour each night for 7 days. Jean Whitney is in charge of entertainment and Karen Bansen and Mike Jones are providing decorations for the coffee house. John Ylvisaker will be present in the coffee house where these Dana students will perform:

Lynn Johnson, DeLane Wright - Glass Menagerie. Nancy Snipes, Chip Black - poetry reading. Dick Zion, Lee Norgaard - guitar and songs. Dennis Schmidt, Ace Olsen - combo, mood music.

If Dana students are interested in attending this coffee house, they are asked to contact these students for arrangements and transportation.

In addition to dealing with current problems and considering a self-study of the church, delegates will elect a vice-president for a 2-year term and a seminary president.

The convention will consider altar and pulpit fellowship with the two other major Lutheran bodies in the U.S. -- The Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod and the Lutheran Church in America. Such fellowship would enable pastors of one church body to officiate in churches of the other, and members of the churches to participate interchangeably in communion services.

TALC Meets In San Antonio

The urban crisis will be emphasized at the 1968 TALC Student Conference to be held in San Antonio, Texas, on November 28-30. Applications for delegates from Dana to this conference are now being considered by TALC coordinator, Charles Gilmore. Anyone interested in attending this conference should submit their name to him immediately. Dana is limited to between 5 and 10 delegates.

Under the theme "The University of the Streets", the conference will be devoted to an in-depth study of San Antonio as a model for student confrontation with urban problems.

Student Body President Carolyn Scholl and Margaret Haszard attended a conference on the campus of Augsburg College in Minneapolis, Minnesota, last week-end. The main purpose of this meeting was to make plans for the TALC Student Conference to be held in San Antonio. The Dana College delegation to the conference in San Antonio will be working with the delegation from Pacific Lutheran College of Tacoma, Washington, on a resolution declaring the need for autonomy in student government. This resolution is to be presented at the Student Conference in November.

Play Scheduled In Mid October

B Team Loses

Dana's B Team dropped two games on successive Mondays to Doane and Tarkio respectively.

Doane's Tigers used a third quarter surge to overcome a Viking 7-6 half-time lead. Dana's stiff defense forced Doane to fumble on their 15-yard line as Bob Lawhead recovered the loose ball and moved it to the 12. On the fourth down at the 4-yard line, Dana's field goal attempt was to the right of the goal posts. On the fourth down with four minutes left in the first half, Kirk McLaughlin connected with Terry Brown on an 18-yard scoring pass and Mike Beech booted the extra point to give Dana a 7-0 lead. Three minutes later the Tigers scored on a 12-yard run and the half came to a close. Second half play was dominated by Doane as they scored twice in the third period, ending the game with a 19-7 victory.

A 75-yard punt return for a touchdown in the first quarter set up a 26-0 win for the Tarkio Owls at Tarkio last Monday. Tarkio scored once in each of the successive quarters as their defense held Dana scoreless. Bright spots in the game for Dana were: Tony Howe who gained over 100 yards from his halfback position, Kirk McLaughlin who ran and threw superbly from the quarterback spot, and Terry Brown and Gary McMullen who did an excellent job in keeping the score from becoming any larger.

Dana Football Team Edged In Two Games

Dana scored for the first time this season. On September 28th against the Westmar Eagles, Phil Vasby kicked a 45-yard field goal to break Dana's scoring drought.

The three points came in the first quarter after a 28-yard pass completion to Dan Jackson and vaulted Dana into the lead. Westmar scored in the second quarter on a seven-yard run by the quarterback. Dana moved the ball well and had numerous scoring threats during the second half but couldn't punch the ball over the goal line as the game ended in a 7-3 loss for the Vikings.

Dana lost a disappointing game in the rain last Saturday to a tough Concordia team. The Bulldogs broke the scoreless dead-lock with two minutes remaining in the game with a TD pass from Rod Geiselmann to Reed Sander.

Dana's defense came through with another excellent showing. Denny Sellon upped his conference tackle total to 50 by getting 20 against the Bulldogs. Ed Martin, Steve Cook, and Brent Peterson ended with 21, 15, and 14 tackles respectively.

The offense netted only 133 yards to Concordia's 220. The Vikings could complete only 2 of 15 passes attempted. Penalties hurt the home team as the Vikes were charged with 50 yards for refractions.

Tonight at 7:30 Dana meets the Nebraska Wesleyan Plainsmen in Lincoln's Magee Stadium on the Wesleyan campus. The Plainsmen are on a losing streak like Dana this year, so both will be fighting hard to better their records. Dana will also be looking for their first 7 points.

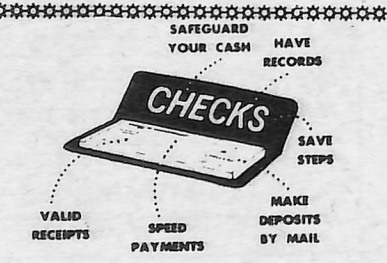

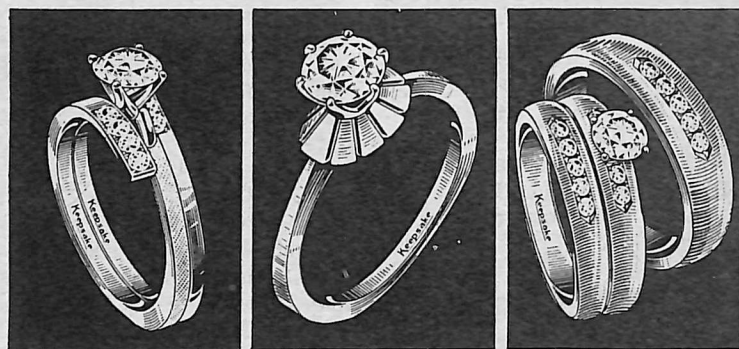
