ALC Convo Discusses Social, Political Issues

Reflecting a posture of youthful vigor and determination the fourth biennial convention of The American Lutheran Church adjourned Tuesday (Oct. 22) after completing action on a crowded agenda ranging from reorganization of internal structure to consideration of a "spiritual ministry for the decade of the '70s."

The convention devoted a large budget of time to "issues of social concern" and devoted an extended evening session to questions of military service and the Vietnam war.

The voice of youth was respected as the 1200 delegates not only discussed specific areas of youth's concern, but gave the whole convention a feeling of youthfulness. This mood was climaxed when at the close of the Monday evening session an officer of the Youth Department presented the newly elected ALC president with a string of love beads. This gesture was enthusiastically applauded by the convention delegates.

By numerous resolutions and actions the convention took a progressive stand in social issues. Racism was condemned as un-Christian, funds were voted to meet inner city crisis conditions, investment policies were revised out of consideration for "disadvantaged segments of society."

The longest and most vigorous deliberations dealt with a proposal asking for approval of "selective conscientious objection," as a principle. Under this resolution, which was referred back for further study, Congress would be asked to provide alternate service for those who object to particular wars as being unjust.

A statement on the Vietnam war expressed "growing anxiety over our country's loss of prestige and moral leadership due to war," and said that "use of military power

must be guided by an emphasis on human rights and values."

"The tragic ambiguity of any military action is that it tends to ruin the created order, to subordinate other values to military necessity, and to destroy a nation's population and social order," the statement said.

Lutheran unity was advanced by the convention in the approval of pulpit and altar fellowship resolutions with the Lutheran Church in America, the Lutheran Church -- Missouri Synod, and the Synod of Evangelical Lutheran Churches.

Regents To Visit Dana Oct. 30-31

Next Wednesday, Oct. 30, the Dana Board of Regents, will convene for the fall session. On the agenda are the annual election of officers and appointments to the Executive, Finance, Education, and Building and Grounds committees. New faculty appointments will also be approved.

Bids on the new women's dorm will open Wednesday at 2:00 p.m. Also in new business, there will be a discussion of preliminary plans for construction of an auditorium and fine arts building.

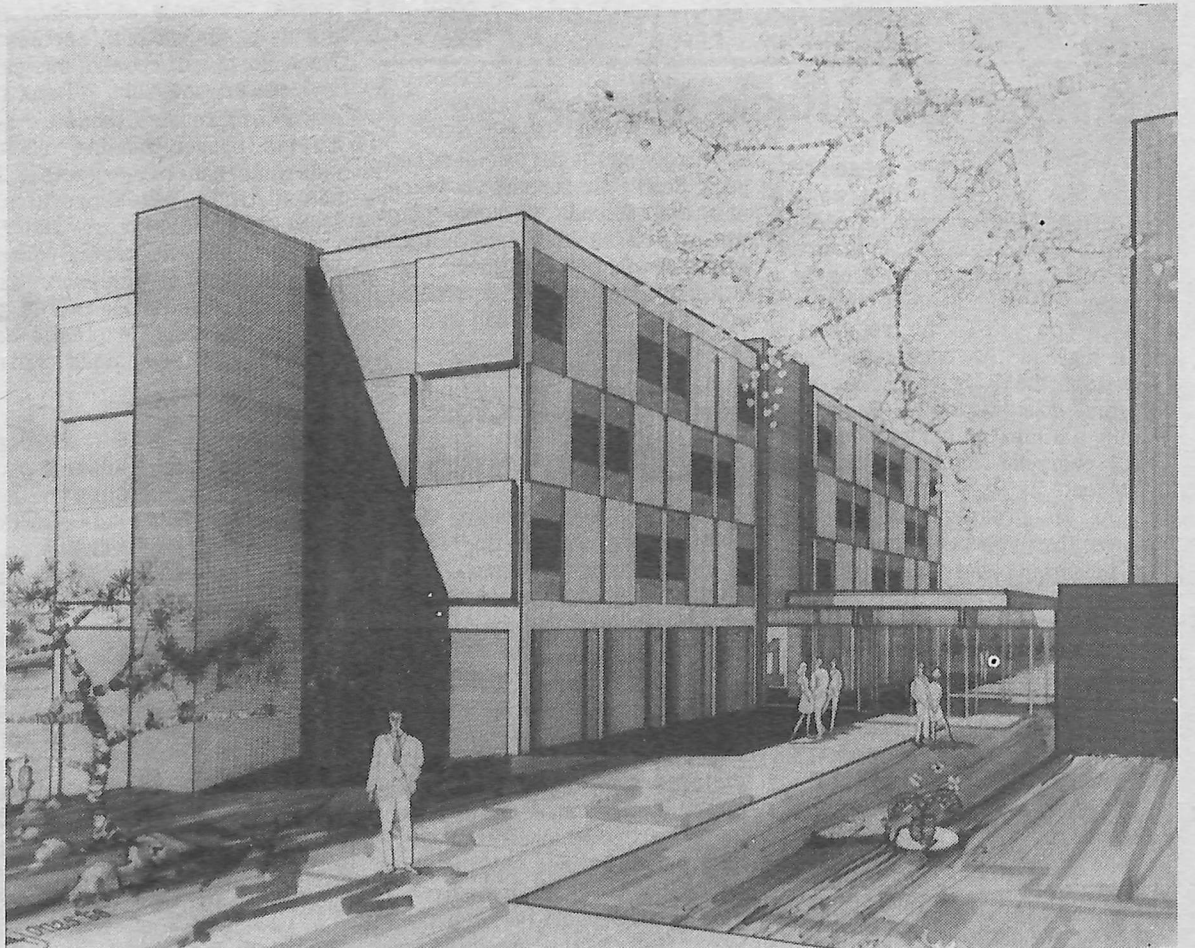
Mr. Tony Tiemann, a brother of Governor Norbert Tiemann, will be welcomed as a new Board Member from Greeley, Colorado.

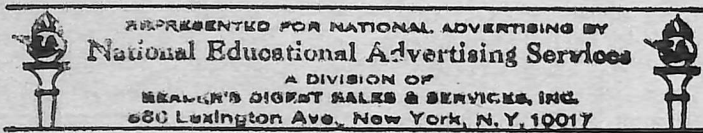

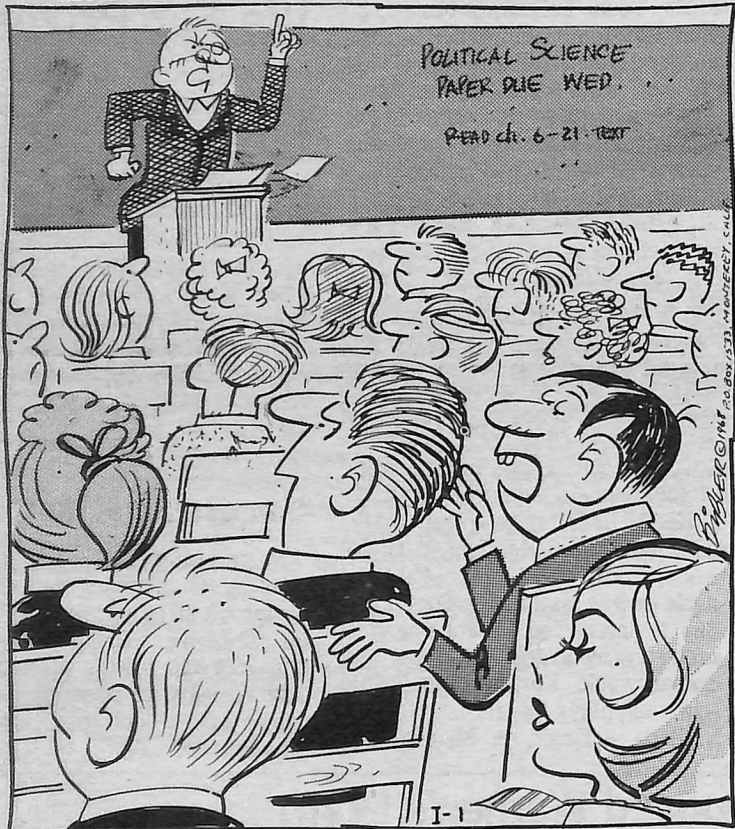

Married Men vs. FDR's

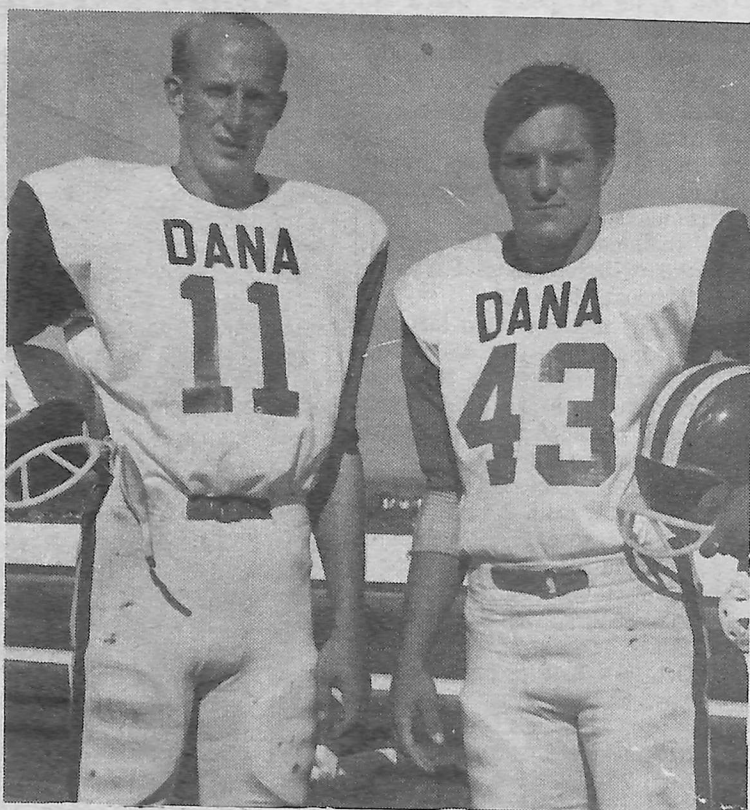

GORDY SAYS:

Dana Will Beat Sioux Falls 20-7

"Whoever gets the breaks will be the winner in the next three games." This is what Coach Walls told me. He rates the Vikings as strong as the other teams we play. I would say we have a better than equal chance to win at least the first two.

The reason for my optimism is explained thus. Kirk McLaughlin will start at quarterback. Kirk is quick, he hands the ball off well, and fakes well. He also has a good strong arm and if he completes his passes he will be hard to stop. Tony Howe has shown that he is tough. With Tony going up the middle of the line the Vikings will be a threat with their running game. The offensive line has to be given credit for its work. They have been improving every game and the last two games they have given the backs plenty of room to run. The defense has not been mentioned much but it will be just as tough as it has been in the past. For these reasons I give Dana a 20-7 win over Sioux Falls.

Basketball finished its second week of practice. Mr. Rainforth would not say who is looking good. He has, however, run the team hard. One thing I can say is the team will be in good shape. It's going to be a tough team this year and an early prediction is a winning season.

Dana Victorious For First Time

Kirk McLaughlin's three-yard run and Dan Jackson's extra point kick in the second period ended a five-game losing streak as Dana scored three "firsts" by tipping Nebraska Wesleyan, 7-6, in a non-conference football game October 11.

It was Dana's first victory of the season and initial win over Wesleyan in nine meetings. The touchdown was also the Vikings' first of the season, having been shut-out in four of its last five games and managing only a field goal in four games this season.

Tony Howe rushed for 104 yards in 27 carries for Dana and Dan Hooper added 64 yards in 19 tries.

Dana intercepted 3 passes with Brent Peterson getting two of them. (Brent was also a standout, named to the World Herald's team of the week).

Wesleyan's score came on an eight-yard pass from quarterback Steve McKelvey to Keith Maurer.

Vikings Shoot Warriors Down

Dana played Homecoming spoiler for the second week in a row as Ralph Mayer and company came alive in the waning minutes of the game to defeat the Midland Warriors, 7-6.

Paul Toole stopped Midland's quarterback short of first down yardage and the Vikings took over on their own 30 yard line with 3:34 left. A running play gained small yardage but a pass interference gave Dana a first down on their own 42. A nine-yard pass to Brent Peterson was nullified when Mayer was thrown for a nine-yard loss on the succeeding play. He got his next pass away and Bob Woods hauled it in for a first down on Midland's 45. Two plays later found Dana in a third down and three yards to go situation. Mayer dropped back and lofted a pass complete to Max Boustead at the 4 yard line. On the next play Mayer ran up the middle and scored standing up. Phil Vasby kicked the extra point with 1:13 showing on the clock. Dana's defense held the Warriors out of scoring range as the gun sounded.

Midland's score came on an 80 yard drive in the first quarter. The Warriors' fumble on the extra point attempt proved to be the difference in the game.

Junior Vikes Lose To Peru Bobcats

Dana's Junior Vikes scored twice in a losing effort to the Peru State Bobcats. Peru scored four touchdowns and a field goal. The field goal was booted from the 20 yard line. The place kicker is a soccer style from Peru, South America.

Dana scored on a pass play from Arno Neben to John Hausserman behind the line of scrimmage who then passed 20 yards on to Dick Tobin for the TD. The Vikings' second six-points came on a screen pass that went for 67 yards. Both extra points were made by Mike Beech. The final score 31-14.

Cross Country Loses Dual Meet

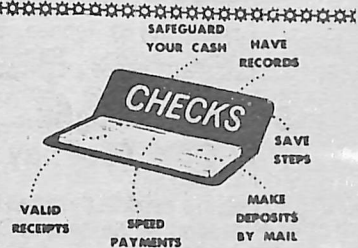

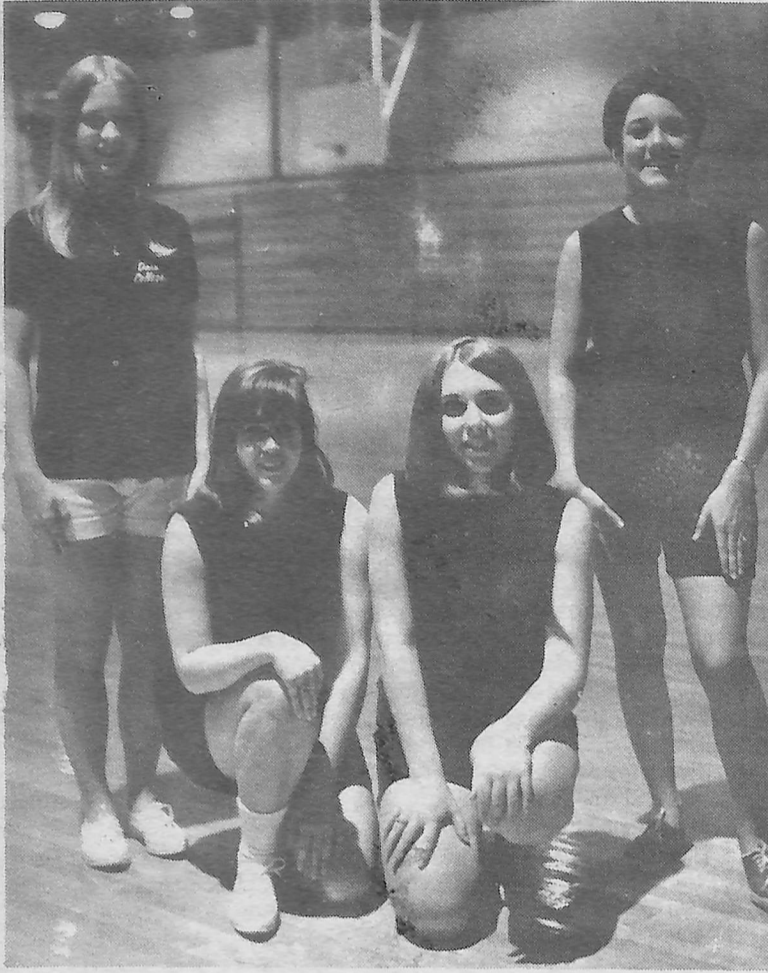
