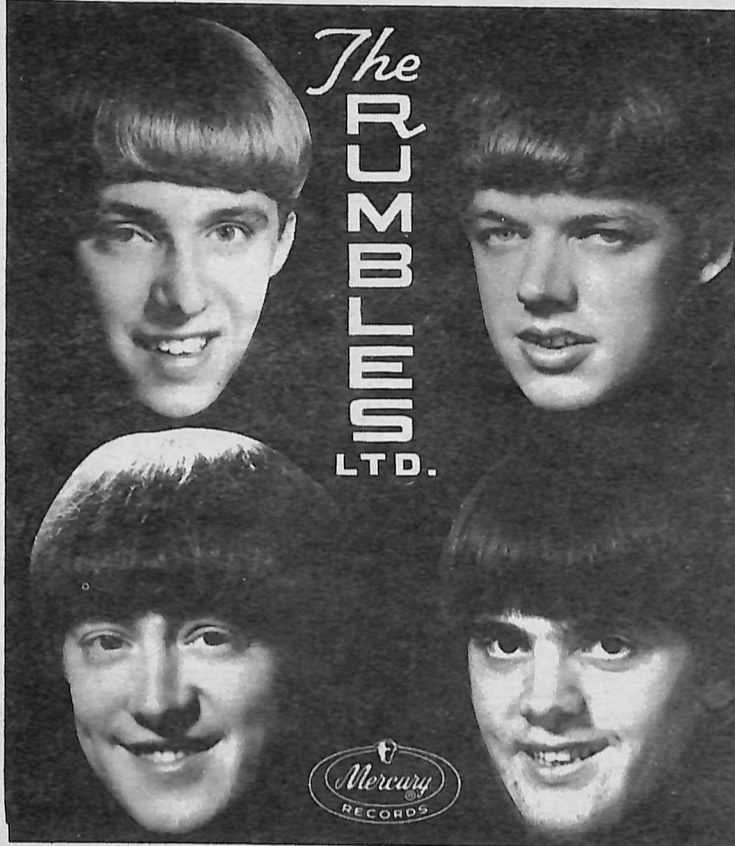

Black Man Speaks

The idea of black students entering small white private colleges is one of great concern today; not only to the Black students involved, but to the white student body and to the administration.

We here at Dana have seen a reduced version of the problems that can arise out of this integration. So we ask ourselves, why, who, and what. Why does the problem exist? Who is to blame? and, What shall we do about it? The problem exists because the Black student wants to get a good education. He also knows that these same schools provide the type he desires.

He feels that since he is out for the same goals that the other white students are out for, he should have the right to live and participate in the same social atmosphere and aspects of his fellow white students without bars because of his color. White students fail to realize that these Black students are no different than they are and that the acceptance of the different cultural backgrounds is part of their living together and being contented. They also fail to realize that denial of these rights and narrowmindedness towards the subject on their part constitutes ill feelings and one of rejection. What right do they have to object, reject or deny? In return the Black students' rebuttle is protest. Does the problem exist? Who would you blame if you were in my shoes? Look in the mirror. Yes, you are white and all powerful, but you are also narrow minded. And your narrowmindedness causes the problem.

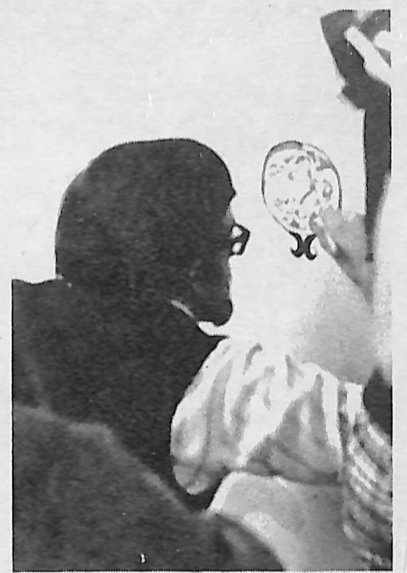
Jon Christiansen, Martha Pugh, Jan Thomas and John Prouty did the major artwork. Many others also lent their time and assistance.

Dana may not have won many conference games, but they do keep the fans entertained. The Viking basketball team has one asset that stands out, They Don't Give Up. Against Northwestern they were down 11 points with two minutes left, they lost by only a point. Tuesday night the only time the Vikings led in the ball game was with 1 second left, they won. Dana may be losing but they don't give up until the buzzer sounds. If the team fights so hard then it's up to the fans to turn out to see them.

Saturday the Viking cagers face Midland. Mr. Rainforth believes we can win. Last time they played Midland beat Dana by only a couple of points. If Dana beats Sioux Falls tonight then the Vikings will go into Saturday's game with two wins plus the home court. This will give Dana an edge over Midland for Saturday's game.

Westmar Tops Dana 74-67

The Westmar Eagles took a slim lead early and held on to win a Tri-State Conference game over the Dana Vikings at Borup Coliseum Saturday night. The final score was 74-67, the half-time lead of the Eagles was 46-38. It was a little too much of Roger Moller, 6-10 pivot, plus over-all rebounding and free throwing of Westmar. Moller, a senior from LeMars, Iowa, collected 20 points and 14 rebounds. More important was his clogging of the middle on defense -- no one could shoot over him when he was near -- he either blocked the shot or the fear of his presence was too much.

The Eagles as a team rebounded 51 times to the Vikings 37 for a decided edge. Westmar did not foul very much either, thus Dana shot only 9 gift tosses while the visitors shot 25 times. Dana made 7, Westmar 16. Dana had 20 fouls, Westmar had 10.

Both Dana and Westmar hit near 50% the first half (Dana 49%, Westmar 54%) but both cooled off the 2nd 20 minutes. Final percentages were 41% for Dana on 30 of 73 shots and 46% for Westmar on 29 of 63 shots. Peterson led all scorers with 23 points, Biddle had 16. Vince Erdman added 19 to the Westmar cause.

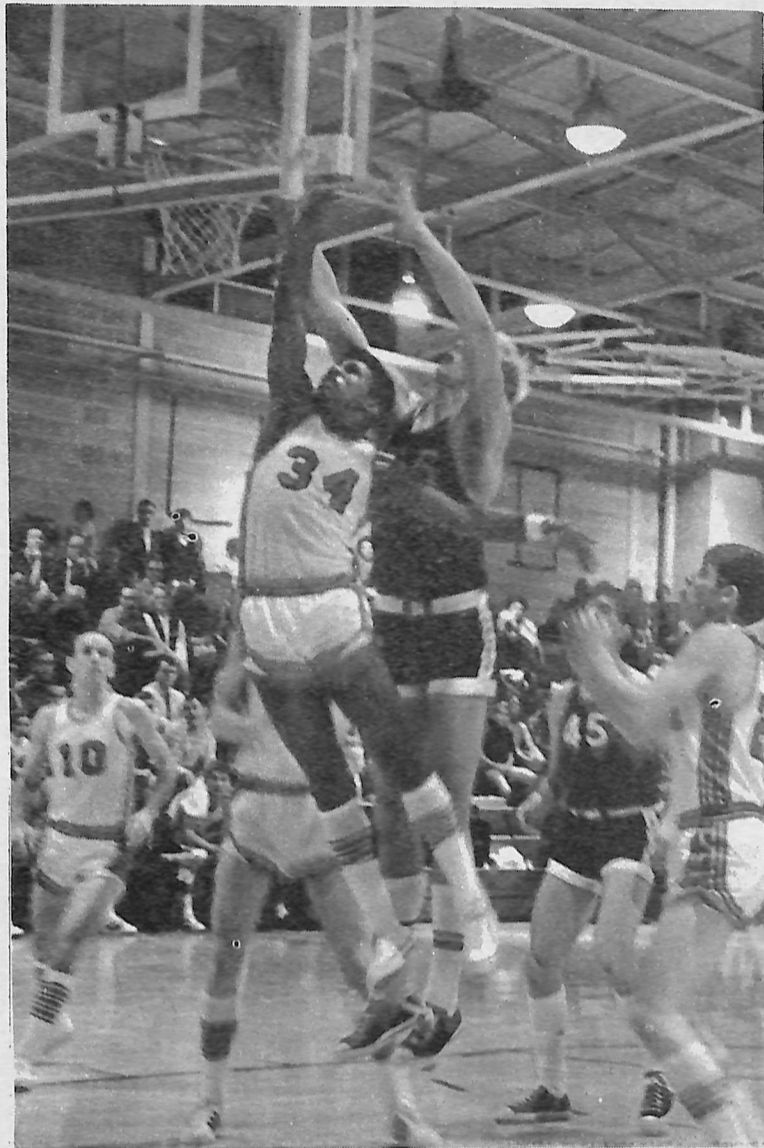

Dana Wins 67-66 Contest With Final Second's Basket

The Dana Vikings, trailing for 36 minutes, won a Tri-State Conference game from Concordia 67-66 in the last second of play Tuesday night at Borup Coliseum on Lions Club night. Rick Jahnke supplied the heroics when he grabbed an off target shot by John Biddle and put in a 5 foot jump shot with one second remaining. It was Jahnke who did the exact same thing against the same Bulldogs in an earlier one point win (70-69) in the Midwest College Tourney at Nebraska Wesleyan in December. Concordia, who appeared to be making their first victory in 17 starts this winter, held the lead throughout and once had a 12 point edge with 11:40 to go, 51-39. The Bulldogs missed several opportunities to ice the game in the final seconds. With 14 seconds left Brian Naber missed a 1 and 1 free throw shot when the visitors had a 66-65 lead. It was Naber's fourth 1 and 1 miss in the second half. With 9 seconds left, Tom Raabe missed his 1 and 1 attempt. It was at this point where Biddle grabbed the rebound, dribbled the length of the court, made a wild shot which Jahnke grabbed and put back in for the Dana win.

When the Vikings trailed by 12, they began to press all over the court and soon scored 6 quick points as a result of it. After this the score crept up to the Bulldogs and finally overtook them. Also big aids in this comeback were two steals and lay-ups late in the game by Biddle and Jahnke. Jahnke, a starter who was on the bench most of the second half,

came in and scored six of Dana's last 8 points. Concordia was unable to score the last 2 minutes and 40 seconds.

The Bulldogs took the lead with only 4 minutes gone in the first half and held it until the end of the game. They led by as much as 10 and had a 37-29 half time edge. Dana aided Concordia in this half by committing 13 turnovers although they out rebounded the visitors 25-13. The Vikings improved in the 2nd half, giving up the ball only 2 times on errors. For the game Dana clearly controlled the boards 56-33 with John Biddle getting a season high of 19. His board play in the 2nd half had a lot to do with the outcome. Jeff Beatty added 9 for Dana.

In scoring, Biddle led the Vikes with 17, Beatty added 13 and Jerry Larsen came off the bench for 10 points, all in the first half. Dana played without the services of Dean Krueger who was out with the flu.

Dana hit 27 of 64 field goal attempts for a 42% mark, while Concordia shot only 53 times, nitting 26 and 49%. Free throws were bad for each team -- Dana hit 13 of 24, Concordia 14 of 25.

Midland has been playing fine basketball as of late and will expect to supply plenty of opposition for the Jerry Rainforth-men. They downed Dana 67-61 in an earlier game over on the Fremont court. The Vikings are 5-8 for the season and 1-3 in Tri-State Conference play.

The Vikings will travel to Sioux Falls Thursday for a Tri-State scrap. Monday they'll be at home against a very strong Wayne State club.

Viking Wrestlers To Fremont

The Dana College wrestlers will be in the Midland College Invitational Wrestling meet on Saturday. The meet is an all day affair held on the college campus. Three sessions are on tap, starting at 9:00 A. M. Other sessions begin at 1:00 and 7:00 (finals). Nine Colleges will participate with such wrestling powers as Westmar, Yankton and Doane scheduled to compete.

Dana's next outing will be Tuesday for a 4:30 dual meet at Kearney State College. The Vikings squad will have wrestlers at every weight classification for dual meets and will enjoy the services of transfer Carl Frederickson for the first time. He became eligible after one semester of residence and will fill the 145 pound class.

Concordia Bests Dana Matmen

Dana wrestlers finished a close second to Concordia in a dual meet which wasn't decided until the final match. Concordia held a slim 14-12 lead as the heavyweight match got under way, but the Bulldogs' George Vasilouskas, runner-up in the 191 pound division in the Tri-state conference last year, decisioned Walt Duda 10-2 to cinch the victory.

Gary Gray was defeated 11-2 by last year's conference champ, Gary Ebendick, in the 123 pound class. Jack Knouse, after holding an early lead, fell victim to Paul Bickel's escape as the Bulldogs went on to win, 12-9. Ron Coy upset Doane Invitational winner Tim Ebendick, 11-14 in the 137 pound class. Mike Todd, Ron Johnson, and Ed Martin also turned in victories as the Vikings contested Concordia until the final event.

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All-Lutheran Team Chooses Vikings

Dan Jackson, end; Brent Peterson, halfback; and Dennis Sellon, linebacker, won honorable mention on the 1968 all-Lutheran College football team.

Citing the intense competition to claim a place again among the "glittering stars of 1968," Bud Thies of the St. Louis Globe-Democrat sports staff said the selections this year proved to be the toughest he has experienced in 20 years of picking all-star teams.

Thies selected the team in an article appearing in the January issue of *The Bond*, monthly magazine of Lutheran Brotherhood, a fraternal insurance society. This is the fifth year *The Bond* has sponsored the all-Lutheran football squad selection.

"This was the year of the pro offense -- the tight and split ends, the flankers, wing backs, running backs and slot backs -- and, in particular," he wrote, "the emphasis on the passing game."
