LARP Lecture By Dr. Matthews

Dr. Clifford N. Matthews, senior research chemist at Monsanto Chemical Company, will speak on "Protons to Proteins, The Origin of Life" on February 27 at 9:00 a.m. for a Liberal Arts lecture.

He will also lecture at 8:00 p.m., February 26, in DHA on some technical aspects of his work at Monsanto. Science students are particularly encouraged to attend, but everyone is invited.

An information sheet will be distributed to students through campus mail and will be handed in, one per person, at the door of AMA on Thursday morning, in place of a quiz. Attendance will be taken in this way.

During the day a group of students will be putting on a demonstration of primordial biogenesis in the Campus Center. On Thursday afternoon, Dr. Matthews will speak to the churchmen who will be at Dana that day. At 8:00 p.m. he will be available in the Presidents' Room of the Campus Center to take part in discussions with individuals and small groups.

Dr. Matthews is an expert in his field, having worked for industrial firms abroad and in this country since 1946.

Mr. Thomas D. Palmerton, a free-lance artist from Omaha is displaying his works in the Linden Room until February 28. Mr. Olsen of the Art Department hopes to have a reception for Mr. Palmerton at the end of the exhibit so students can get to know him and ask questions.

Malik To Speak Here In March

Dr. Charles Malik, former President of the UN General Assembly and ex-Foreign Minister of Lebanon will speak at a Special Events Lecture on Sunday, March 2, at 8 p.m. in Alumni Memorial Auditorium. His topic will be "The World in Revolution".

Now Distinguished Professor of Philosophy at the University of Beirut in Lebanon, he is well-known all over the world for his discussions of mankind's struggle to achieve peace. Dr. Malik has been awarded honorary degrees by many colleges.

He served as the Chairman of the United Nations Commission on Human Rights for two years, succeeding the late Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt. He has been active in the UN since its founding at San Francisco in 1945.

Dr. Malik helped, with Mrs. Roosevelt and Professor Cassin of France in drafting the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, and in sponsoring it through the various stages until it was proclaimed by the General Assembly of UN in Paris in 1948.

The lecture is free to Dana students.

Elementary Education students need a five point overall average and a grade placement of at least 12.5 in all areas on the California Achievement Test, Advanced Form.

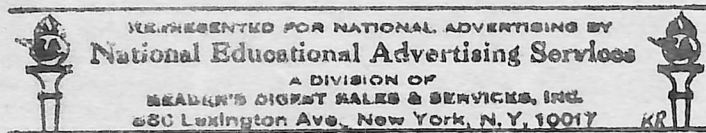

'What's Happening Around Here?' A Lot If You Are Very Interested

In past years many special events have been brought to Dana's campus especially for the benefit and enjoyment of her students. Two years ago the Christy Minstrels were here to entertain in song, Sam Levenson, one of America's best loved comedians, and Henry L. Scott, the great piano humorist, entertained the Homecoming audience, Colin Jackson, British Member of Parliament, returned for the fourth time to lecture on world politics, a Danish agriculturalist spoke on farming in Denmark, and the Oak Ridge Institute of Nuclear Studies brought an 18-ton Mobile Radioisotope Laboratory to be viewed by those interested.

Last year Edwin L. Baron, the famous hypnotist, was the major attraction of the Homecoming program, the Danish Gymnastic Team performed on campus, Dr. Martin Marty, leading U.S. theologian, spoke on "The Reshuffling of Religious Forces in America," news analyst David Shoeburn presented his views on the Vietnam problem; Agnes Moorehead, the Mitchell Trio, and Murray Brown were here along with many others to share their special talents for those interested.

"For those interested." These are the key words. How many of us are really interested? How many take the time out from precious study hours (or canteen or T.V. hours) to see what's really happening? This is the real world. So what if you don't get your Hum, read for tomorrow or you don't see "Laugh-In" tonight? Is it worth missing a gab-session for something different once in a while? Think about it.

Committee Tells Survey Results

The Committee on Race for the Student Government found the results of the survey on racial discrimination on Dana's campus showed that a sizable majority of students felt there was no racial discrimination on campus, but that any prejudice or discrimination which has been shown has been the result of incidents involving personal discrimination and/or personality conflicts. The college as a whole (on the basis of the questionnaire) does not seem to discriminate against Negro students. In fact, there seems to be a reverse of prejudice, that is, Dana Negroes are given extra consideration.

The students felt there should be an increase of Negro students but that such an increase should not be forced but should be natural, in that, students who qualify should be accepted regardless of color.

Approximately 2 out of 3 students felt that more dialogue would be beneficial in promoting better understanding.

Since a majority of the students feel more dialogue is needed, the committee proposes this resolution: First, that the Student Council establish a committee to organize programs in which there can be increased dialogue of all types. Second, that the LARP committee select more books dealing with the racial issue in order to promote greater understanding.

Third, that a faculty-student committee should propose curriculum additions and/or changes which would include more aspects of Negro heritage.

Vikings Host Conf. Meet

Tri-state conference wrestling teams will converge at Dana College on Saturday, February 22, to determine the 1969 conference champion.

Three sessions are scheduled during the day with the first round beginning in Borup Coliseum at 9:30 a.m. The second round commences at 1:30 p.m. with the consolation round immediately following. Consolation finals begin the evening session at 6:30 p.m. and the finals and awards presentations following.

Last year's champion, Westmar, is expected to repeat its performance with Yankton again in second place. Midland and Concordia both have strong teams returning. Dana, last place finisher last year, has a very good possibility of pulling some surprises after its improved finish in the Midland Invitational.

Seven of the eleven weight classes have the 1968 champion returning. George Garret (115), Jim Fisher (137), and Ron Crooks (145) of Westmar; Dane Mathews (130)

and Gary Mims (160) of Yankton; Rudy Ross (177) of Midland; and Gary Ebendick (123) of Concordia all are returning for another chance at the first place awards.

Squaring off against these grapplers for the Vikings will be Gary Gray (115), Jack Knouse (130), Larry Forristal (137), Carl Fredrickson (145), Mike Todd (152), Ron Briggs (160), Ed Martin (167), Ron Johnson (177), Phil Tegeler (191), and Walt Duda (Hwt.).

Admission to the morning session is free. Students must pay fifty cents in the afternoon and evening. Adults will be charged fifty cents in the afternoon and a dollar in the evening.

Dana wrestlers travel to Yankton this Saturday, February 15, to compete in a rescheduled double dual meet with Yankton and Sioux Falls. Matches get underway at 2:00 p.m. On Tuesday, February 18th, the Vikings meet Midland in a warm up meet for conference action on the following Saturday. The meet at Fremont starts at 7:00 p.m.

Second Half Effort Wins In 65-64 Cliff-Hanger

The Dana College Vikings came from behind Saturday night at Borup Coliseum to pull out another 1 point victory, over arch rival Midland College, 65-64. It was the Vikings' 3rd one point victory of the season, they've dropped one 1-pointer. The Vikings have also split overtime games showing a flair for excitement in 68-69.

Dana trailed throughout the first half due to some 52% field goal shooting on the part of the Warriors. Each team shot 33 times the first half, Midland hitting 16 and Dana only 11 (33%), as the score read 40-29 for the Visitors.

Dana used the press at the outset of the game but soon ran into foul trouble and had to scrap it. Midland played a deliberate game trying to crack the Dana match-up zone while the Vikings rarely took longer than 15 seconds for a shot.

The second half was a complete reversal for both teams

though Dana didn't quite hit from the field like Midland. Midland's percentage tailed off to 25% as they were limited to only 7 field goals in 28 attempts. Coach Jerry Rainforth gave his defense much credit for these statistics in the 2nd half.

Free throws appeared to be a deciding factor as Dana hit 17 of 21 while Midland hit 18 of 28. The Vikings had 24 field goals with 38% shooting for the game and the Warriors had 23 field goals on 39% shooting. Both teams had eleven turnovers and Dana had a slim 48-47 edge in rebounds, all stats showing the true closeness of the game.

Dana Drops Sioux Falls 80-73 In Tri-State Game

The Dana College Vikings provided the home crowd with another thrilling ball game Saturday night, emerging victorious over the Sioux Falls College Braves 80-73. Of eight home games thus far, Dana has won five. One win was in overtime, two others by one point and another by seven. One of the 3 losses was by one point and the other two by seven. This latest victory also marked the first time Dana has gone above 70 points since they lost to Northwestern seven games ago, 76-77. In the last 10 games now they've only topped 70 points twice.

The Vikings led for 4 1/2 minutes Saturday, then Sioux Falls took the lead and held it until 16 minutes remained in the second half, though the score was tied 3 times in between. The half time score was 38-36 in favor of Sioux Falls. Dana: Jahnke 24, Beatty 12, Biddle 11, Peterson 10, Mahlman and a rebound edge of 10 by Dana 9, Krueger 7, Larsen 4, and Busse kept the score close in the first half.

Rick Jahnke, Viking sophomore, 16, Papineau 13, Bak 12, Frieze was the Viking man of the hour, 10, Ziemba 2.

His jumper gave Dana a 44-43 lead with 16:00 left in the game. He continued to have a hot hand and hit 6 more field goals to lead the home team down the stretch. All told, Jahnke hit 12 of 19 shots from the field, and didn't have any free throw chances, to lead all scorers.

Dana maintained a 1-3 point lead, after gaining the lead, for 10 minutes until Brent Peterson's driving lay-up and Rex Mahlman's fast break score upped the count to 63-56 with 6:10 left. Bob Kregg and Herb Buckner scored four points to whittle it down to 3; 76-73 with 1 minute left, but 2 free throws apiece by Dean Krueger and Peterson sealed the victory.

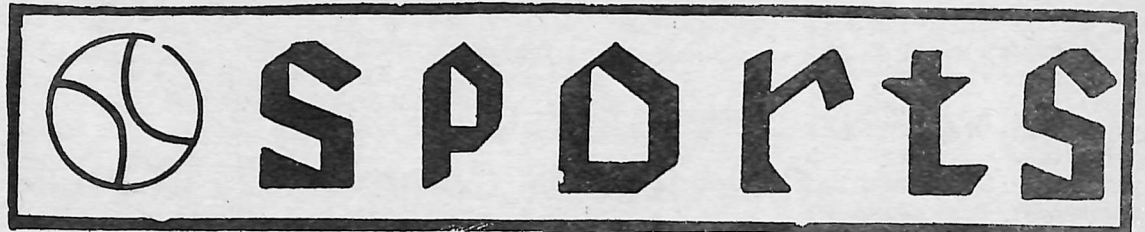
Basketball Intramurals are now into their 3rd week. It's still not too late to join your team for the remainder of the games.
