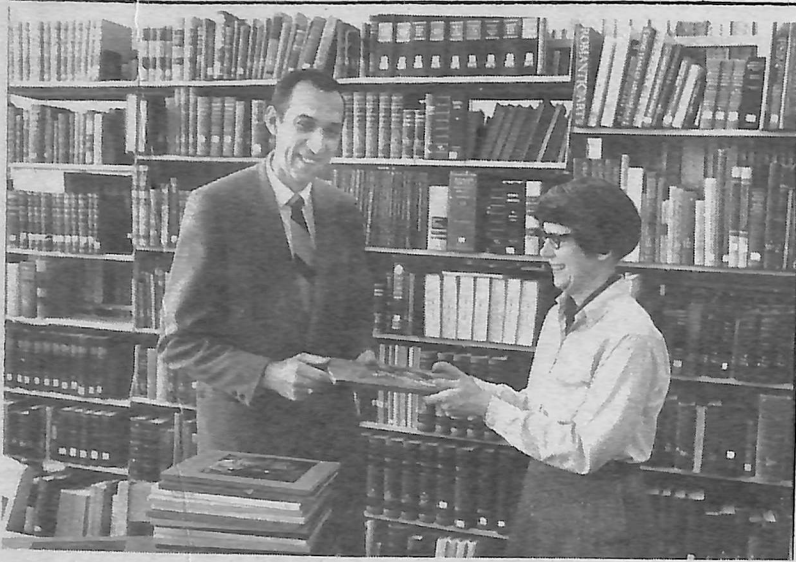

Dana Library Tops 60,000 Mark

Mr. Ron Johnson, Head Librarian, has announced that the total number of volumes in the Dana Library has topped the 60,000 mark.

The new figure was reached with a gift from Miss Luella Nielsen, Associate Professor of English.

Miss Nielsen presented the Library with 35 volumes of *Horizon*, a quarterly humanities publication. She is a charter member of the *Horizon* series and has the entire set dating back to the first issue published in 1958. The 35 volumes presented to the Library completes the College's collection of *Horizon*.

Mr. Johnson reported that a significantly large number of volumes has been added to the Library this year through a campaign for funds among Dana's alumni. Individual gifts, such as that by Miss Nielsen, have also helped reach the current figure.

The 60 thousand volumes now on hand will be moved to the new Library building later this year.

Slow progress on the new Dana Library was revealed in an interview with Mr. Snowbeck. He stated that building is far behind schedule because of the unfavorable weather conditions of the winter. Further delays are expected for the same reason. However, it is anticipated that the building will be completed by the opening of the next school year.

The top floor of the library will have book stacks; the main floor will be used for reference books, periodicals, and library offices. The basement is being saved for further expansion of the library and at present there are no plans for its use.

The exterior of the new library is nearing completion.

The ground floor has been enclosed and is being heated so the concrete floor can be poured. The top two floors will also be enclosed soon since windows are now being installed.

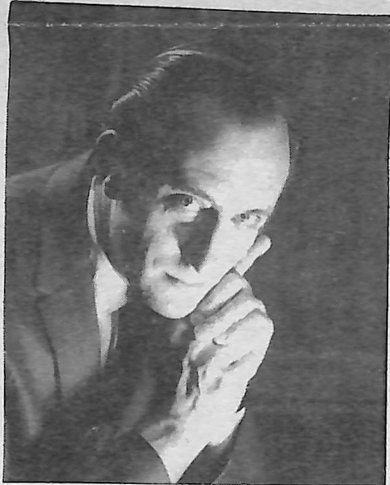

Dana College Home Band Concert Will Be Given In AMA Sunday

The annual Home Concert by the Dana College Band will be presented on Sunday evening, March 16 beginning at 8 p.m. in Alumni Auditorium.

Leading the Band in his twelfth year as director is Dr. Wayne Wise. Dr. Wise is a graduate of Morningside College and Indiana University. He is a former assistant conductor of the 34th Division U. S. Army Band and is highly respected in instrumental circles for his abilities as a conductor.

The Band's Sunday concert marks the conclusion of the annual Spring Touring Season by the Band. It will feature a variety of music ranging from Bach to Sousa. Included will be such numbers as "Second Suite in F" by Gustav Holst, "American Folk Rhapsody" by Clare Grundman, "Bugler's Holiday" by Leroy Anderson, and a unique arrangement of "Battle Hymn of the Republic" featuring Band and Choraliers. A selection of tradition Marches will also be included.

A special member of the Band in the French Horn section will be Mrs. Wise. She is director of the instrumental music program for the elementary schools in Blair and was on leave from the Blair system for the Band tour.

'J.B.' Will Tour As Lenten Play

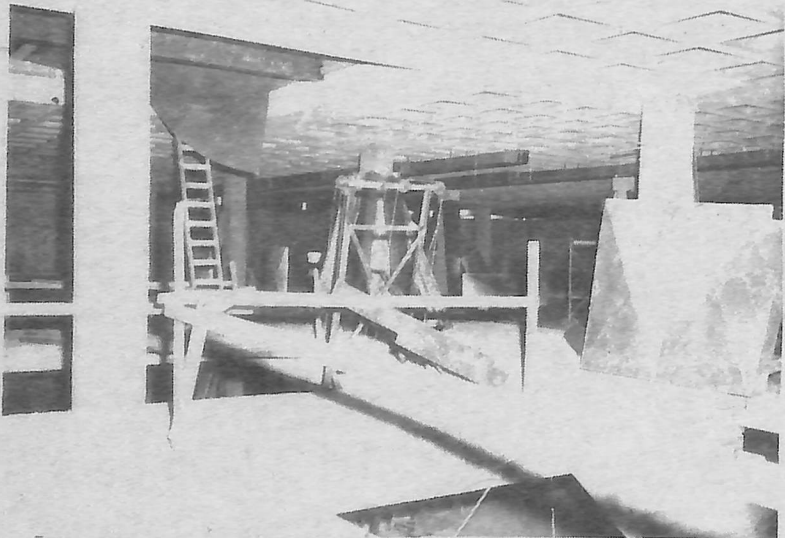
This year's Lenten Chancel Drama play will be the Pulitzer Prize winner "J. B." by Archibald MacLeish. It deals with the theme and story line of the Book of Job.

A total of nine performances has been scheduled for the eight-day tour through Iowa, Minnesota and South Dakota, March 28 - April 4.

The play will also be presented in Chapel, Wednesday, March 26, and at the Blair Methodist Church on March 23.

In "J. B." Mr. MacLeish has painted in modern terms a moving portrait of human suffering and an unshakable faith in God. The story involves two circus peddlers who undertake the roles of God and the Devil, J. B., a modern businessman rich with blessings, is Mr. MacLeish's counterpart of the immortal Job.

Bob Bair will play J. B.; Ruth Jacobsen will be his wife, Sarah; Lowell Thomsen will be Zuss (God), and John Leitell will play Nickles (The Devil). Twenty other students complete the cast.

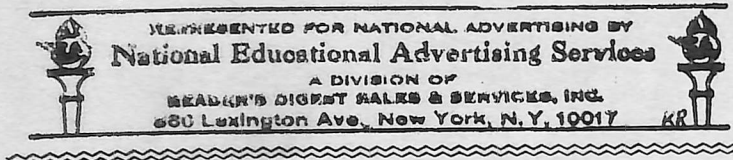

Proposed Calendar Through Channels

It seems that some points of clarification are needed on the Student Council proposed calendar change. Many students have asked me if this will go into effect next year. It is not likely.

They are, however, a part of the democratic system and when a proposed idea finally does burrow its way through this system, we can rest assured that it has been thoroughly hashed and rehearsed by the administration, faculty, and a few student representatives. Until then, the students can do much more than bide their time. They must continue to generate their enthusiasm and interest by talking to these "channels". By continually seeking information of development they force the sluggishness from the machine.

A calendar change is not a new idea. It has been talked about before, but Student Council, feeling that doing is more productive than talking, decided to re-activate the proposal. We are fortunate to have a faculty that feels the same way. They have been doing research on various calendars. In fact, they have chosen "Calendar Changes" as their topic to be presented to the Regents this Sunday evening.

A calendar change means that adjustments have to be made by students, faculty, and administration and this takes advanced planning. I sincerely hope that we can get away from the dualism characteristic of our tradition, and instead of having a right and wrong side working toward a compromise somewhere in the middle, we can all begin on common ground and work toward a mutual goal.

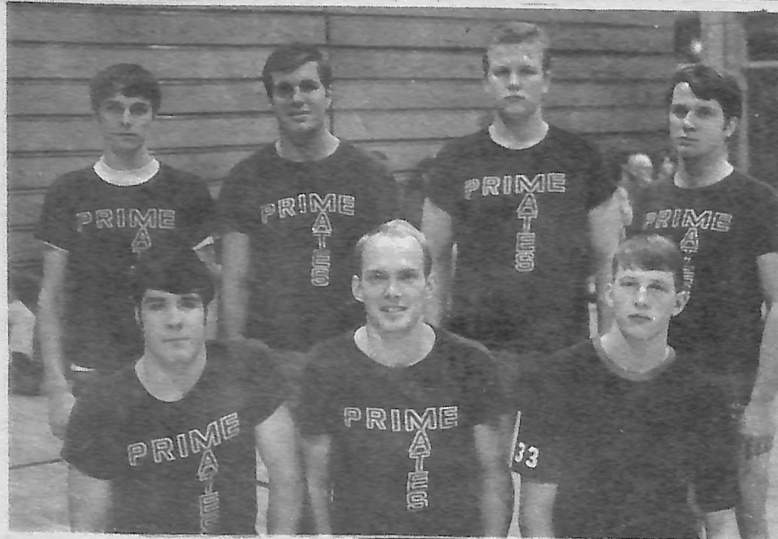

Baseball Starts Next Week If Old Man Winter Leaves

The Dana College Baseball squad has begun work indoors despite the unlikely looking baseball weather outside. Viking pitching and catching candidates have had a month of throwing and conditioning activities while the remainder of the squad started a week ago.

The Vikings are preparing for a very attractive schedule which is supposed to start March 22 against Doane College at Veteran's Field. While this starting date appears doubtful today, there are 36 games scheduled, 18 doubleheaders. Highlighting the schedule are a 3 day trip into Kansas for 3 doubleheaders, back to back doubleheaders in March with touring Minnesota teams, and the usual strong baseball opponents outside the Tri-State Conference such as Omaha U, Wayne State and Creighton.

Twelve lettermen were on hand greeting Coach Dale Lemon with only two of them on the pitching staff. The Vikings lost sophomore Jeff Maddocks due to scholastic difficulties, but return senior Jerry Larsen and sophomore Dan Jackson. Counting these two, however, there are a total of twelve pitching candidates so it's hopeful an adequate pitching corps can be developed. Many will be needed with the largest schedule in Dana history as the Vikings will be attempting to regain the Tri-State title they shared two seasons ago. They furnished second last spring with a 7-3 mark. The season record was the 9-18, the worst in Coach Lemon's 4 seasons at Dana, the slip being blamed primarily on the pitching staff.

Senior lettermen include first baseman Ron Belmier with a 3 year batting average of .308. Larsen, who plays third base as well

as pitching and has a 3 year average of .323, shortstop Brent Peterson, .278 for 3 years and .306 last year, Jan Haugen, an outfielder-pitcher in his second year since transferring as did Steve Miller. Haugen hit .243 and Miller .152, with the latter fielding 1,000 as a catcher.

Junior Lettermen are centerfielder Mike Moore, .305 over 2 years, Jon Boustead, a catcher with a .333 average last year and utility infielder Paul Dietrich. Sophomore lettermen are Jackson, outfielder Brian Moerer, second baseman Gordy Putnam and catcher Phil Facendola. Facendola hit .300 last year, Putnam .280, Moerer .217 and Jackson was 1 and 2 as a pitcher.

Following the Doane opener, will be St. Cloud, Minn. March 28 and Concordia of St. Paul, Minn. on March 29 both at Veteran's Field.

Many Intramural Sports Offered
