Campaigning Will Climax With The Election Friday

Dana students will choose next year's student government officers in an election tomorrow between 8 a.m. and 3 p.m.

All of the candidates were introduced on Monday night, and Wednesday a debate between presidential candidates Don Nelson and Glenn Schacht was held.

Wednesday a primary was held to eliminate two of the four candidates running for Vice-President. Abigail Hubbard and Rod Christensen came out on top while Bob Geibert and Larry Forristall were eliminated.

Don Nelson, presidential candidate, is a 20 year old sophomore from Flaxton, North Dakota. He is a pre-med student interested

in electronics and folk singing. This year Don is involved in Radio Club and Chi Rho.

Also running for president is Glenn Schacht, a 20 year old junior from Neligh, Nebraska. He is majoring in chemistry and is a lab assistant. He is on Student Council and enjoys tennis, golf, and billiards.

The vice-presidential race originally included four candidates before the primary. It has now narrowed to a contest between Abby Hubbard and Rod Christensen.

Abby, a Council Bluffs, Iowa girl is a 19 year old sophomore majoring in Social Science and is a member of the Tri-D's. Abby's hobbies are tennis, cooking, sewing, and reading.

Rod is a 20 year old junior from Craig, Nebraska. He is a P. E. major and was a member of the basketball squad. He also participates in intramurals and is president of the Kappa Chi Lambda fraternity.

Vying for the office of treasurer are Eric Peterson and Tim Wiggins. Eric is a 21 year old junior from Council Bluffs, Iowa. He is an art major and carries his major as a hobby in his spare time. Eric is an assistant floor-leader on 3rd South and is a member of the Delta Sigma Omega fraternity.

Tim is a 21 year old junior from Gothenburg, Nebraska who is majoring in sociology. He is on the Church Council, is a member of Chi Rho and is secretary-treasurer of D-Club. Tim is also a member of the track and cross-country teams and bowls in his spare time.

Janet Penke is running unopposed for the office of secretary. She is a 20 year old junior from Ashland, Nebraska. She is a sociology major, secretary of the Campus Court, on the Judicial committee, and is a member of the Kappa Theta Phi sorority. As hobbies Jan lists photography, dancing, music, and people.

Along with student government offices, elections will be held for 5 members to judicial committee and freshman campus court representatives.

Dudley Glass Speaks April 25

On Friday, April 25, 1969 at 8:00 P.M. in Dana Hall Auditorium, the Dana Chapter of the American Scandinavian Foundation will sponsor "Scandinavia On Stage," presented by Dudley Glass.

Mr. Glass will lecture on Scandinavia's Theatre of Fantasy. Ibsen's *Peer Gynt*, which owes much to Edward Greig's music, will be discussed. Another topic will be Marinsnen's great space poem *Aniara* which was made into an opera and was featured in *Life* several years ago. Mr. Glass will use slides and tapes to illustrate his lecture.

Mr. Glass was born in Australia and studied at the University of Melbourne before going to England at the age of 20 to

study under British musicians. He is well known as a composer of light operas. He appears on the British Broadcasting Company regularly, presenting talks and plays. A resident of London, his present tour will take him from Massachusetts and Florida to California and Washington.

Featured will be a portion of the great tragedy "Macbeth" with John Terry and Jean Brehm playing the lead roles. Also to be presented is the comic account of the four lovers in "Midsummer Night's Dream," with Tracy Fischer, Carol Hanson, Joel Hermann, and Jim Weinman playing the leads.

The evening will also include musical selections from the Shakespearean era and sonnets written by the poet.

New Dress Code Awaits Approval

Proposals of dress code revision and a dormitory key system met Women's Dorm Council action at last Monday night's meeting. Both proposals now await administrative approval.

The new dress code eliminates the restriction of women students wearing dresses to meals, except at Sunday dinner and for special occasions. Dresses will still be the required attire for Sunday noon and for banquets and other designated functions. The proposal is based on the responsibility of women students to choose their own attire.

After final approval the new dress code will be officially presented and explained by the floor leaders.

The proposed key system allows keys to be used by juniors, seniors, and / or 21 year-olds. This system would allow the woman student special hours based on the fact that if she were not in college she would probably be on her own and setting her own hours.

If approved by the administration a detailed explanation will be given to all women eligible and an orientation period will be conducted. This system was presented to the Council by the Dorm Council President Cheryl Hall and committee members Mary Weger and Carolyn Scholl.

Movie and Tests Offered At Dana By Peace Corps

A Peace Corps recruiter who served two years in El Salvador will be on the Dana campus, April 21-23. She is Ellen Shippy, a mathematics graduate from the University of New Mexico at Albuquerque.

On Monday evening, a Peace Corps film made in Biafra will be shown in OM 110. It is entitled, "Give Me A Riddle," and describes Peace Corps work there before the recent civil war in that country.

Miss Shippy will be the Chapel speaker on Tuesday morning.

The Peace Corps language aptitude tests can be taken by any interested student on Wednesday, 10:30 a.m., in OM 110. This is the only mental test required of college students who want to apply for Peace Corps service.

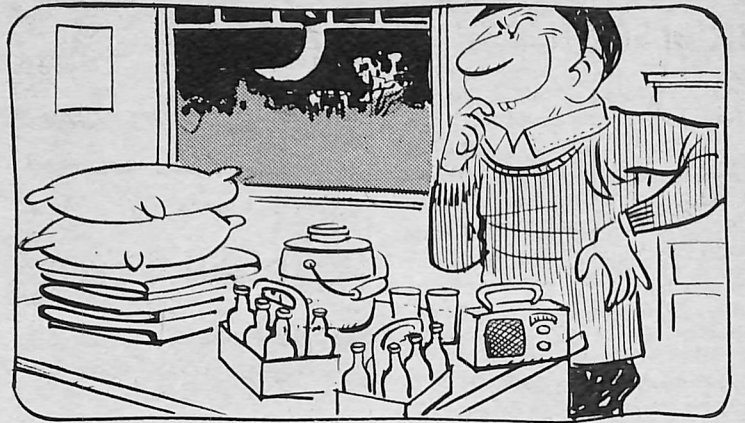
The Student Council proposed calendar change was accepted, in principle, at the recent meeting of the Board of Regents.

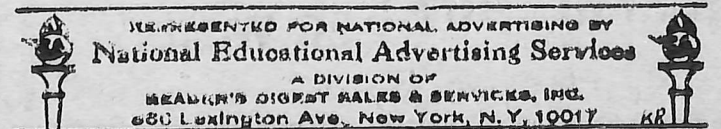

The Vikings dropped a tennis meet to Midland 5-2.

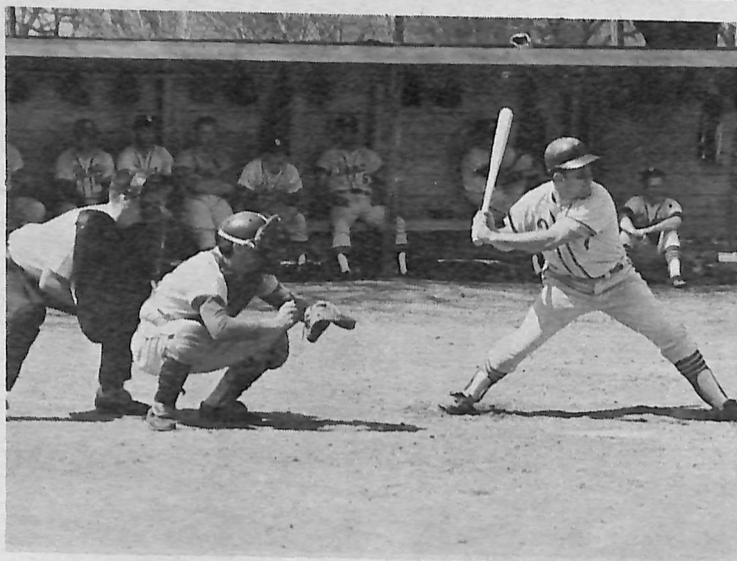

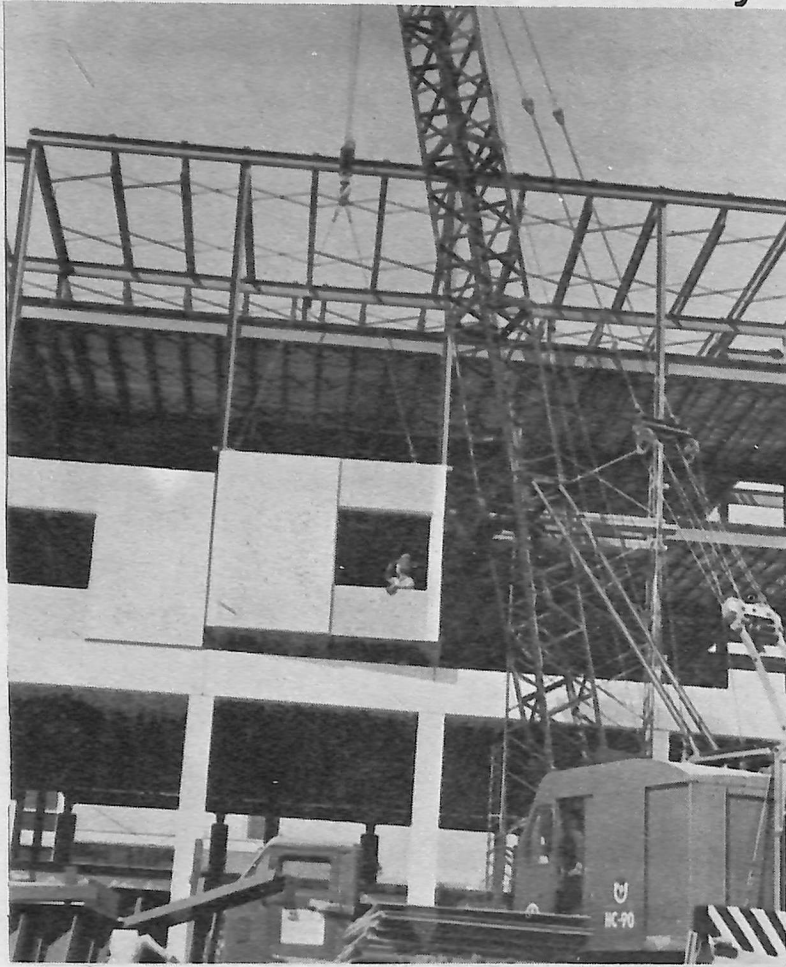
Western Electric is part of the Bell Telephone System and is the manufacturer of 95% of the telephones in use.

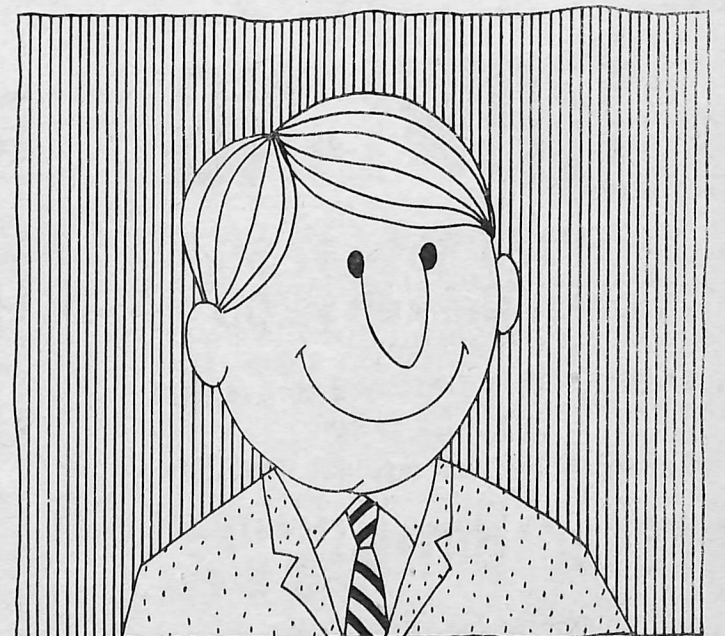

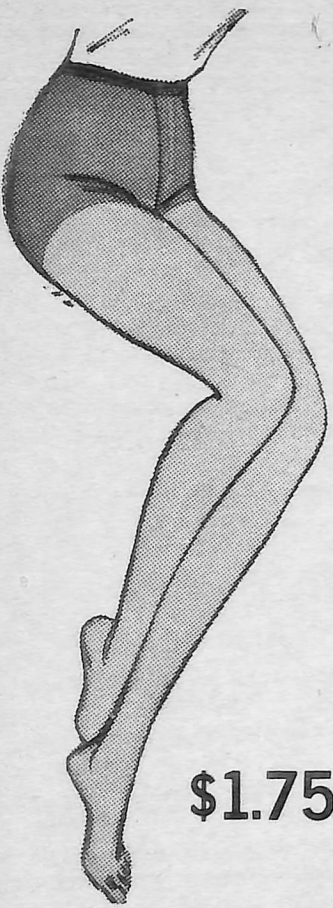
