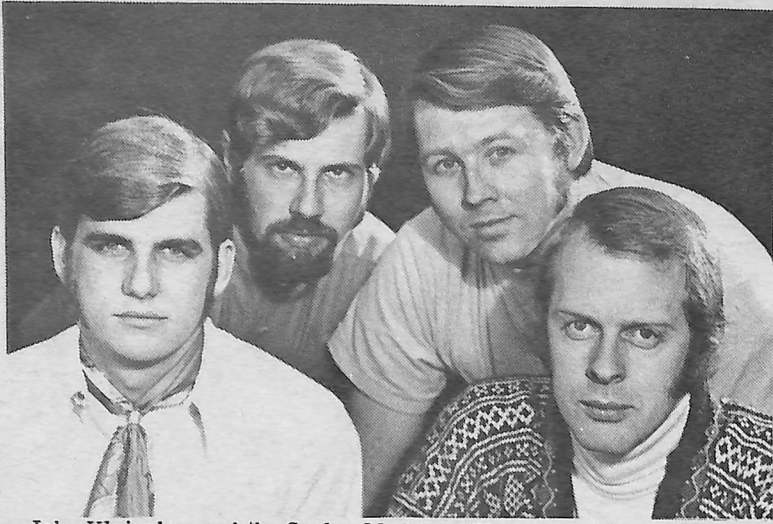


## NOMINATIONS OPEN FOR ELECTIONS

Student Body elections will be held on April 10 to fill several positions for next year. ## WAR GAME, Speakers On Earth Day

A tentative schedule has been set up for the teach-in on Earth Day, April 22, 1970. Four speakers will be here representing several different types of environmental pollution.

Mr. Eugene Solomon from the Blair office of Soil Conservation Service will be here. Speaking with him will be Mr. Dale Williamson, who is the assistant executive secretary of the Nebraska Soil and Water Conservation Commission. Their topic will be soil and water pollution.

Speaking on feedlot pollution will be Mr. James Malkowski. He is the executive director of Fontenelle Forest in Bellevue, Nebraska.

Coming from Creighton University will be Dr. Donald McGee, professor of physiology at the course of medicine. He is interested in the medical aspects of pollution.

Professor Donald Warman from Dana College will be speaking on man's relationship to earth.

During the course of the day a film called *War Game* will be shown. This film deals with atomic war. It will be shown several times, so that everyone who wants will be

able to see it.

A panel discussion has been set up in the evenings so that anyone may bring up any questions they may have. The panel will consist of the speakers for the day.

Previous to the 22nd, several chapel periods have been set aside for short films on the types of pollution surrounding us.

## Eliot's Play On Death Of Becket

T. S. Eliot, one of England's most honored and respected men of letters, give us in *MURDER IN THE CATHEDRAL* the greatest verse drama of our century. Using the historical event of the 12th Century Martyrdom of Thomas a Becket, Mr. Eliot has sensitively written a fresh and exalting morality play of great stature. A striking parallel is drawn between Becket and Christ, detailing the struggles and torments suffered from the Temptation through to the Crucifixion.

The play begins with Becket's return to Canterbury Cathedral after seven years of exile. He is greeted by a chorus of women and the priests of the cathedral who

and murder him, they speak directly to the audience, attempting to justify the murder from a modern point of view. The play ends with the chorus begging for mercy for having created another saint, finally requesting that Thomas pray for them.

Keeping with the Lenten practice of self-examination, this production forces the audience to experience with Becket a self-examination in depth. The Chancel Atmosphere, together with the special music composed for this production, emphasizes the cathartic nature of dramatic worship by leading the audience to the threshold of making a sincere commitment to steadfast trust in God.

## Ekklesia Koinonias Challenges Dana Students

The campus congregation, *Ekklesia Koinonias*, is an active part of life at Dana. To insure that all students, faculty, and administration realize that this is a living congregation dedicated to the love of Christ, we, the members have adopted this Statement of Concerns as our statement or involvement in the life of this campus.

It is the intention of *Ekklesia Koinonias* that the love of Christ be at the heart and core of life on the campus of Dana College. It is our purpose to see that this concern for love is retained where it is evident, and instilled where evidence of it is lacking.

It is our role to be the Church on Dana's Campus. We reject any idea that the members of Dana College might hold that we are only "playing Church". In fulfilling this role, it is our purpose to challenge all members of the Dana Community to be the Church which is concerned with worship of Him whom we acknowledge to be Lord; to be concerned for the well-being of all persons associated with the College; that love be the integrating force of the community; that sharing in all its facets be encouraged; and that all individuals on this campus become a part of the redemptive activity of Christ and become agents of reconciliation.

To this end we shall speak. And as we speak we recommend that the following criteria are integral to our concerns:

1 - The community of Christ does not have all the answers to all the challenges which are evident on our Campus and in our society?

2 - Conflicts are inevitable and are capable of being either a force for creative activity or a force for destruction;

3 - Change must come in the midst of whatever order we live, but at the same time we acknowledge that order must be a part of all change;

4 - When problems or conflicts arise they must be faced openly and honestly, otherwise the community risks a loss of its Christian image and denies its very existence;

5 - There must be openness and honesty between all the members of the community in all relationships, official or personal;

6 - Information must be shared between all levels of the campus in honesty and good faith, so that lines of communication are always open and free of suspicion;

In summary, we the members of *Ekklesia Koinonias* feel that each individual of the community has personal responsibility to the community to see that honest and fair play exist as one of the highest priorities of the campus, and to work in resolving problems where they exist.

We therefore call upon the Dana community to engage in a united effort to seek ways and means to improve relationships and understanding among all of its members.

Arrangements have been made for an informal meeting with the Board of Regents in the Linden Room on Monday, March 16 from 12:30 to 1:30 p.m.

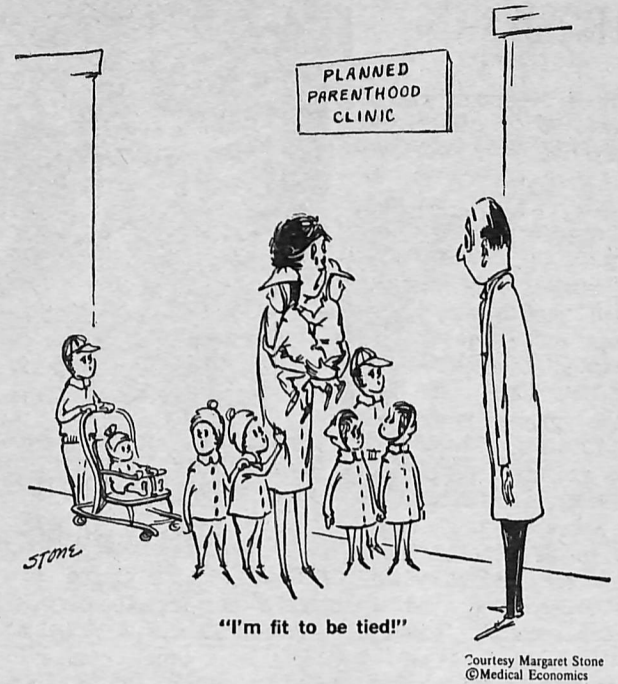

The people at Earth First feel that students have emerged as the true leaders of the '70s, and student commitment to the environment may be the only thing that will save the earth.

Already, students are taking positive action by sampling waters, reporting industrial infractions of anti-pollution laws, and by organizing "teach-ins." Positive action in another direction must coincide with current efforts, however, if student concern is to change into a national cause.

program for environmental recycling and control is to become a reality. Man's mess is going to cost a great deal to clean up -- both in money and in individual cooperation and effort.

Bonds must be voted.. communities must join together to make sure anti-pollution measures are followed ... you and I and every other U. S. citizen must take the initiative for mankind. IF THIS WHOLE SUBJECT OF ECOLOGY SEEMS OBVIOUS TO YOU.....

... try a do-it-yourself survey. Ask some off-campus types what "ecology" is. You'll be surprised at the lack of answers. And the lack of commitment.

And yet, only by saving the environment today can man save

himself for tomorrow! Man's survival -- and the condition of that survival -- are at stake.

We live in a visual age. Because of this, the Earth First organization feels that national awareness might best be effected through a visual commitment. "Earth First" buttons, stickers, arm bands and posters say it all to anyone who can see. Every "Earth First" and "Ecology Now" visual says "do it now!" Each provokes and transforms mankind's mandate into positive action.

If you do your part in helping to spread "Earth First" across the country, everyone might still not know the definition of "ecology". But everyone will know the definition of "survival".

### Church Challenged

Many people see the proof of God's existence in nature. As man pollutes his environment and destroys nature, so is religion losing its influence on man. In a Gallup Poll conducted in Mid-January 75% of the people interviewed stated that they believed religion to be losing its influence. Accompanying this is a decline in church attendance in the last decade from 49% of adults in 1959 to 42% in 1969.

The specific question asked in the Gallup Poll was "at the present time, do you think religion as a whole is increasing its influence on American life, or losing its influence?"

To show the dramatic difference; in 1957 14% of the people interviewed said the church was losing influence, 69% said it was gaining, in 1970 75% said the church was losing influence, 14% said it was gaining.

Reasons given were (1) the church is "outdated" (2) "it is not relevant in today's world" (3) "Morals are breaking down," and (4) "people are becoming more materialistic."

The first place these statistics are evident is in Dana's Student Congregation Church, *Ekklesia Koinonias*. The Statement of Concerns adopted by the congregation came possibly at a time in correspondence to man's increasing concern for environment; almost too late. With these concerns as a basis for action, the church must start with itself and build something that is not outdated, that is relevant, moral, and not materialistic. The church has to evaluate its very foundation for some motivation for those who believe the Church here and now is not for them. *Ekklesia Koinonias* must act now.

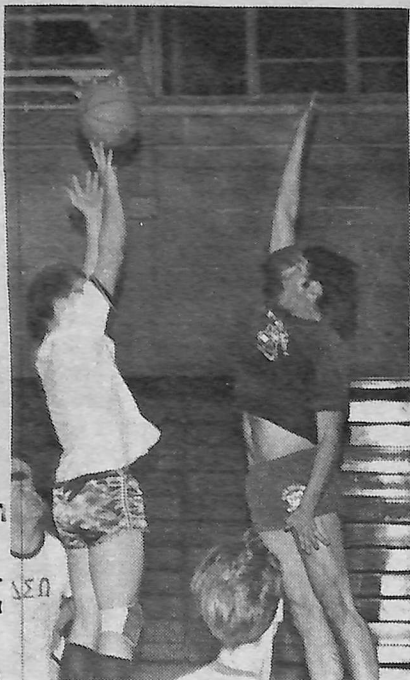
In an earlier volleyball engagement Kappa Theta Phi Sorority won two from Tau Gamma Rho, 15-6 and 15-13.


