## Nebraskans For Peace

The work of the Nebraskans for Peace organization was explained by one of its directors, Frank Tapy, in a meeting Monday evening in the Campus Center, sponsored by the Dana Forum. Mr. Tapy said that the society had its roots in the campaign for Senator McCarthy in 1968. It promotes many of the policies espoused by the McCarthy forces, but its program is, of course, non-partisan. As an "educational" group, it seeks to convince Americans that excessive military expenditures and continued fighting in Vietnam divert resources from essential programs that would improve the quality of American life and restore confidence in some of our human ideals.

Of particular interest, he described the draft-counselling offered by Nebraskans for Peace. This has become a full-time job for the counsellor in Omaha. It involves explaining the laws pertaining to the draft, including those provisions that deal with conscientious objection and alternate service.

Organized peace movements have rarely had large followings. Similarly, Nebraskans for Peace survives on the donations of a relative few, for their position is not a popular one. But it is safe to say that Mr. Tapy is convinced that this kind of organization has important services to offer. To suggest two, it helps sensitive our social conscience, and it helps keep alive an anti-militant option in a society that to be free must offer such options. The Nebraskans for Peace believe that their organization is helping eliminate ignorance which prevents deep consideration of all aspects of war, moral and economical.

Mr. Tapy extended his organization's services to the Dana College community. Anyone wishing counselling with respect to the selective service can find assistance at the Brandeis Student Center on the Creighton campus.

## SELECTION OFFICER TO VISIT DANA

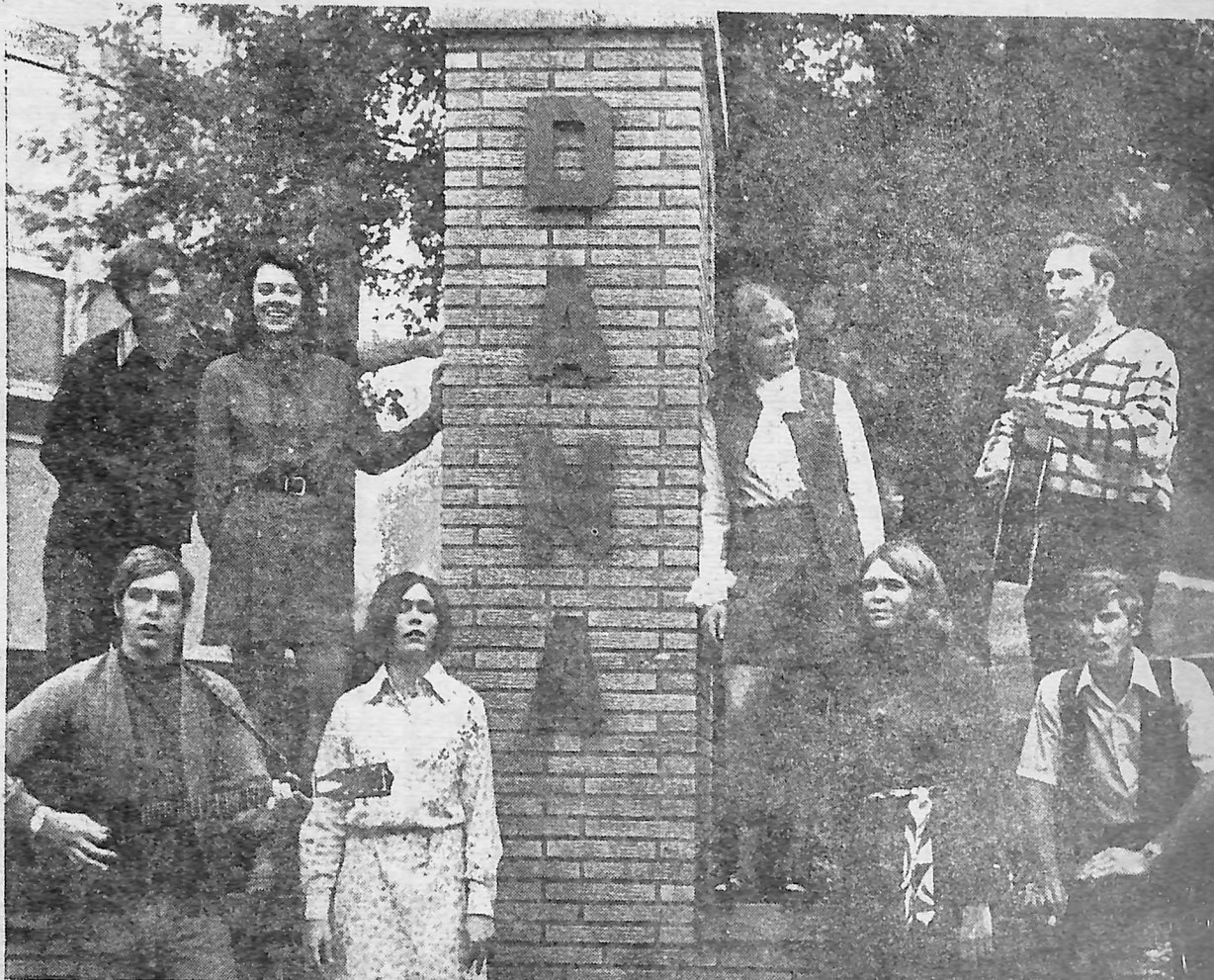

## Hawks And Doves Share Views

"Violence is as American as cherry pie," is one statement debated in the interim class, A History of Violence and Pacifism, under the direction of Mr. Neil Johnson. The history and influence of violence and peace movements has led the class from the study of an early lynching in Blair in August, 1890, of a man accused of murder to a discussion of the domestic turmoil in modern America. The class has taken field trips and has had a guest speaker, Mr. Bob Martin, a Blair attorney, spoke to the class Friday and discussed the role that prejudice plays in acts of violence.

One of the alternatives of violence is pacifism, which has a history running back to the Revolutionary War when Quakers and Mennonites were first voicing their opinions. Means of changing so-

ciety as an alternate to violence were discussed with emphasis on Social activists who change society by non-violence. The political violence in the United States has been much less when compared to other nations. It was also pointed out that the United States has much more turmoil and less violence than some countries. Different areas of the U. S. also have noticeable trends such as the homicide rate in the South is twice that of the rest of the country. The class showed a degree of acceptance towards violence, though many levels of tolerance were present. They also felt that violent revolution, as many predict, is not very likely. This is due partially to the fact that even though the U. S. has a history of violence, non-violence has been just as prevalent.

# EDITORIALS

## Constitutional Amendments

In a short time the students at Dana will be asked to vote on a number of amendments to the Student Body Constitution. Though no radical changes or additions are to be made, the fact that constitutional changes are advocated should be of concern to the entire student body.

With respect to previous voting trends at Dana, we find a rather sad and sometimes frightening record. Not too long ago the student body was asked to consider an activities dues increase of 400%. When this proposal was put to a vote it was approved by a minority of Dana College students. 155 APPROVED THE RAISE, 103 OPPOSED it, and another 550 were too apathetic to even bother to vote. Yet those who failed to exercise their right to voice their opinion had more power than those voting. They were the ones who prevented a defeat of the proposal and at the same time disrupted a democratic vote by allowing a minority to pass the increase in dues.

Now we come to the vote on the amendments and the effect of the voters' apathy. Luckily, the amendments proposed are for clarification purposes which can easily be understood and will most certainly be ratified by those who show initiative enough to consider the amendments intelligently.

But what if the amendments were such that ratification by a minority, as in the last balloting, was not in the best interest of the student body and their college? We can not point the finger of blame at those who voted for or against; the apathetic non-voting students should receive the condemnation.

**JOURNALIST VISITS DANA CAMPUS**

Last weekend, January 29 and 30, Mr. Gunner Mellberg, a Swedish Journalist was on the Dana campus. Mr. Mellberg has for the last few years been the Near East correspondent for the Goteborg Post.

His stop at Dana was for the purpose of obtaining research material for a number of articles he is writing dealing with Scandinavian colleges in the United States. Mr. Mellberg was given a tour of the Dana campus by several faculty members. A tour of Joslyn Art Museum in Omaha was also taken. The Swedish guest found the exhibits concerning the American Indians an impressive and interesting experience.

Because of his journalism duties for the last 12 years in Athens, Mr. Mellberg carried a different outlook with regard to tensions in that part of the world. His views and the political events of the last few years were discussed with a group of faculty members before he left the campus.

**VIKES LOSE TO HASTINGS**

The Vikings lost the game in the first half as the host school rolled to a 53-37 lead. 18 turnovers by the Vikes in that half alone chilled their chances. Dana made a real fine effort the second 20 minutes as Hastings only outscored them 54-50 in a real offensive battle. Dana once again held a rebound edge as they picked off 54 to Hastings' 41. Gary Kratina was the game's high rebounder with 12. Fellow-Viking Jeff Beatty had 9. Hastings hit a nifty 48% of their field goals attempts, getting 39 of 81. Dana was not far off with 45% on 31 of 68 attempts. In free throw shooting Hastings was 29 of 43 (67%) while Dana was 25 of 35 (72%). The Vikings totaled 29 turnovers to Hastings' 17.

Kratina led Dana scorers with 13 points. Rick Jahnke and Beatty added 12 apiece. Eleven of the twelve Vikings who saw action scored, as Coach Rainforth let all men play a little more than usual.

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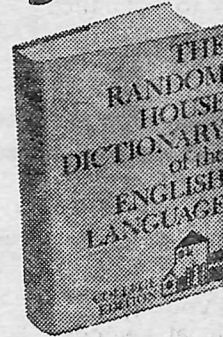

## Hastings Defeats Dana Twice

A very strong and deep Hastings team raced past Dana by an 88-61 count.

Quickness, one of the Broncos' very apparent strengths, paid off for them early in the game. This, coupled with some cold shooting by Dana, gave the visitors a 16-5 lead. The sticky man for man defense forced many turnovers early by Dana, the Vikings had 31 all night. A few fast breaks and some circus shots underneath by Dan Yost and Bill Johnson kept Hastings in front 28-15.

A brief Dana flurry brought the Vikes up to 31-22. But some more rapid fast breaks by Hastings enabled them to outscore Dana 10-2 in the next 2 minutes. The half-time score stopped at 45-36 with Dana still in the game.

The first 10 minutes of the second half was a defensive contest. Both teams, especially Dana's match up zone, really looked like they were great defensive giants. Despite Dana's work at this point they still fell further behind, 56-42. The Broncos were forced to work longer for shots and actually both teams took considerably fewer shots. Dana's game is usually run-and-shoot and this was different for them.

The Vikings led by one in rebounding, 47-46. Rebounding was spread out on both sides with Miner's total of 8 being the game

high. Hastings hit 38-82 in field goal shooting for 46%. Dana was 22 of only 55 shots for 40%. Free throws were 12-22 for Hastings and 17-33 for the Vikings.

The score was 28-12 and was spiced by four pins on the part of Viking wrestlers. Dana was also the victim of one pin and one forfeiture, as they made it their second win over Doane this season.

Early in the meet, Dana trailed 10-3 as they had to forfeit the 126 pound class and watched Bob Garrison get pinned with just 34 seconds remaining in his class. Gary Gray picked up the three Viking points as he continued his winning ways. Gray did just about all he could do without getting a pin as he scored seven points in the 3rd period. He won a 11-4 decision.

Mike Todd, Jim Waters, and Bill Kruse won the next three clashes to get Dana on top 16-10. After Tom Campbell and Doane's Dave Bals fought to a draw Lew Houser and Phil Tegeler ended Doane, scoring by pinning their opponents.

## Wrestling Results

Dana College participated in a four school wrestling meet in Sioux Falls, S. Dakota and wound up in a split of two dual matches. Dana wrestled with Sioux Falls, winning 24-8 and they lost to Augustana 25-11. The split keeps the Vikings on top in their dual meet record for the season, 3-2.

Gary Gray, Jim Waters and Mike Todd continued to be Dana's outstanding wrestlers. Gray (134) won two decisions handily by scores of 10-3 and 8-4. Gray now has a season mark of 7-1, being undefeated in all of his dual meet matches. Waters came from a 0-1 deficit in the third period to pin Craig Bird of Sioux Falls with 45 seconds remaining. He had given up a penalty point to fall behind, then got a reversal and a pin to sew it up. Jim also had a close 3-2 decision win against Augustana. The winning point came on riding time, determined after the match was over with a 2-2 score on the scoreboard.

Mike Todd was a winner over Sioux Falls' Aaron Hanson as he, too, came from behind. Behind 1-0 in the third period, Todd worked for a reversal and a near fall to score 5 points and win 5-1. Todd was held to a 3-3 draw by his Augustana opponent. The tables were reversed on Mike this time as this opponent scored all three points in the third period to forge the tie.

Todd's season record in all matches is 4 wins, 2 losses, and 1 tie. Waters is 5-3 so far.

Tom Campbell was a winner in both of his matches, though, one was a forfeit. Bill Kruse was the only other real winner as he split in two decisions. Campbell and Kruse engineered shut-out wins, 2-0 and 4-0 respectively. Tegeler also claimed one forfeit win before defaulting the second time.

three matches to Dana's four that were actually wrestled, they still came out on top.

Mike Todd, Bill Kruse, Louis Houser, and Phil Tegeler all won for Dana but none could get a win through a pin. Todd and Tegeler both came close as they were all set to pin their man once when the horn sounded to end the second period in both cases. If either had 5 more seconds they would have scored a pin with very little doubt. Each got a 3 point near fall for their efforts at the time but had to settle for wins by decisions. Todd won his match by a shut-out, 12-0. Kruse showed some real scientific movements in registering an 8-2 decision. He toyed with his man throughout and wrestled a crowd-pleasing match with his maneuvers but he also could not get the pin Dana needed so badly.

Northwestern, only in their third year of wrestling, looked very good for a young team. Two of their men had shutouts, John Trotter was 6-0 over Dana's Bob Garrison and Denny Dykstra won 2-0 over the Vikings' Tom Campbell. Larry Meendering scored a pin over Dana's Jim Waters which was highly unexpected. The fall came in the second period after Waters had himself registered a near fall.

Dana's top scorer for the season Gary Gray, won by a forfeit to make his record 9-1.

Glock did not play in the first half and Traylor only briefly, but they led the press which affected Northwestern for awhile. The score after a flurry was 45-42, a 15-5 margin for Dana in the first 3 1/2 minutes. A few missed free throws could have put Dana on top at this time as well.

The Red Raiders cashed in on 36 of 45 free throws (80%) as opposed to Dana's 14 of 32 (44%). The Raiders hit 57% of their field goals, 30 of 53. Dana hit 24 of 71 for 34%. Turnovers were numerous, too, as the visitors had 29, Dana 24.

6'6" Jim Wouldstra was a big factor in the second half for Northwestern as he hit from underneath at will and also had 11 rebounds. As a freshman, he is a fine ball player. He led all scorers with 29 points.

Dana's best gun was Terry Miner with 19 points. He also was the game's high rebounder with 13. Northwestern topped Dana in rebounds 52-42.
