

Hermes Survey Results Show Humanities Approval

The Hermes ran a survey of sophomore students involved in the Humanities program both this year and last. They were asked whether they considered this year's program or last year's better and to comment on the good points and the bad as they saw them. Of the students sampled, 86.7% liked it better this year and 13.3% considered last year's program better. Most of the students would like to see the program continued as it is, with some modifications and improvements. Rev. Nielsen says that the program will be continued next term with some new ideas and innovations which he feels could improve the program even more; he cannot announce any definite plans at this stage.

Some of the comments by students consulted in the survey include: "stimulating, provides the best environment for study, dedicated, interesting, comprehensive, provides a broader basis for grading and more of an opportunity to participate and become involved." There were comments on the negative side including: there are too many events that the students cannot get to, do not like to be required to spend their time at events

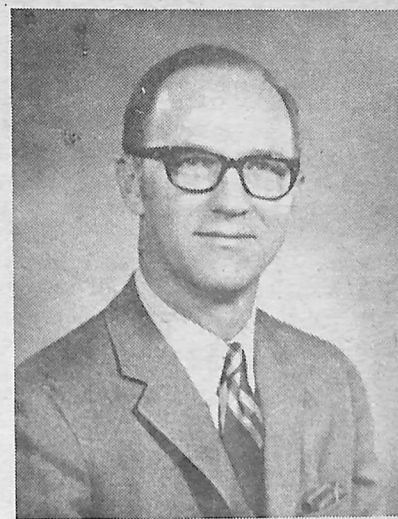
Earl Mezoff Is Dana's New President

At a special meeting of the Dana College Board of Regents, they elected Dr. Earl Mezoff as the twelfth president of Dana College, succeeding Dr. C. C. Madsen, who is retiring after serving on the post since 1956. Dr. Mezoff has been vice-president of Lebanon Valley College at Lebanon, Pennsylvania since 1967 and associated with that school since 1963. Prior to that he served at Thiel College in Greenville, Pennsylvania. Dr. Mezoff graduated from Thiel College and attained further education at Michigan State and Penn State. The president-elect is a McKeesport, Pennsylvania, native; he and his wife Joan have two daughters, Margaret and Pa-

tricia.

In commenting on the future of the church-related college, Dr. Mezoff stated: "The church-related college must present a program which is intellectually stimulating and exciting to all. Its type of education must raise new questions, question old concepts, and create a ferment in the minds of the young people it serves. It must not only raise the questions of who, how, what and where, which all other educational institutions ask, but it must confront its students with the greatest question of why, or the purpose of knowledge and life itself."

Dr. Mezoff will assume office on July 1.

Honors Banquet To Be May 21

Sixteen Dana College seniors will be nominated for inclusion in the national Who's Who Among Students directory at the annual honors banquet May 21. Dr. Madsen will be the speaker at this event that will honor students for scholastic ability, leadership and contribution to campus life.

This year more than forty Dana students will be invited, along with their parents, to receive fourteen scholarships and numerous departmental awards. Two Lutheran Brotherhood scholarships of \$500 each will also be awarded.

The departments of Speech, Art, Drama (Alpha Psi Omega), Business, Biology and Math will be presenting awards. Also to be awarded is the Dana Faculty Women's Club Scholarship which will go to a present Dana junior girl.

Alpha Chi, the national honor society will recognize its new members who are made up of juniors and seniors having maintained a minimum grade point average of 7.25 for three semesters at Dana.

The Sower Awards, which are annual presentations, include the Langland Award for poetry, the Hal Evans Cole Award for contribution to the Arts and the Kaj Munk Award for student translation.

Phi Alpha Theta membership will also be bestowed on junior and senior history majors with an average of 7.0.

Dr. C. C. Madsen, President of Dana College since 1956, will be leaving that position this summer.

President Madsen's association with Dana College actually started when he enrolled as a student in 1927. Then in 1946, he taught at Trinity Theological Seminary and served as head of the Christianity department at Dana until he became the eleventh President of the college in 1956.

His fifteen years in office have been very profitable to the college. He can be called the "Builder President" having advanced from Pioneer Memorial, Old Main, Alumni Memorial Auditorium and Elkhorn and Argo dormitories to the present facilities, averaging one major building per year. Since his tenure in office, Dana receiv-

ed the North Central Creditation in 1960, the percentage of doctorates on the faculty has increased from 12% to 40%, and the student enrollment has more than doubled. This is by no means a complete list, but only a few of his major accomplishments.

Although retiring from the Presidency, Dr. Madsen will still be associated with Dana College as a Special Consultant. This involves public relations and development work.

Finishing 25 years of dedicated service to Dana College, Dr. C. C. Madsen leaves with warmest regards from his administrative colleagues, faculty, students, and all who have been associated with him.

Largest Class To Graduate In Dana's History

On May 30th of this year, there will be graduating from Dana College the largest class since its founding as a separate educational institution in 1899. The class will consist of 204 students.

At 10:00 on that Sunday morning, a number of students and their families will gather together in Borup Coliseum, singing traditional hymns and listening to the contemporary language of Dana's pastor, Elwin C. Bergstraesser, as he presents the Baccalaureate address, "Living the Life." The guest speaker on this occasion will be the Rev. Walter K. Schmidt of Elkhorn, Nebraska, father of two of the graduating seniors. Also participating in the service will be the fathers of a number of other graduating seniors: Rev. Clair Geibert, Omaha, Nebraska; Rev. Thorvald Hansen, Audubon, Iowa; Rev. Kurt Mueschke, North Canton, Ohio; and Rev. A. C. Ruetter, St. Paul, Minnesota.

The graduation ceremony itself will take place at 2:00 P.M. on Sunday, May 30, in Borup Coliseum. Although no formal speaker had been invited for the occasion; Dr. C. C. Madsen will be speaking briefly, as will Rev. Reid Neve of Council Bluffs, Iowa, and Rev.

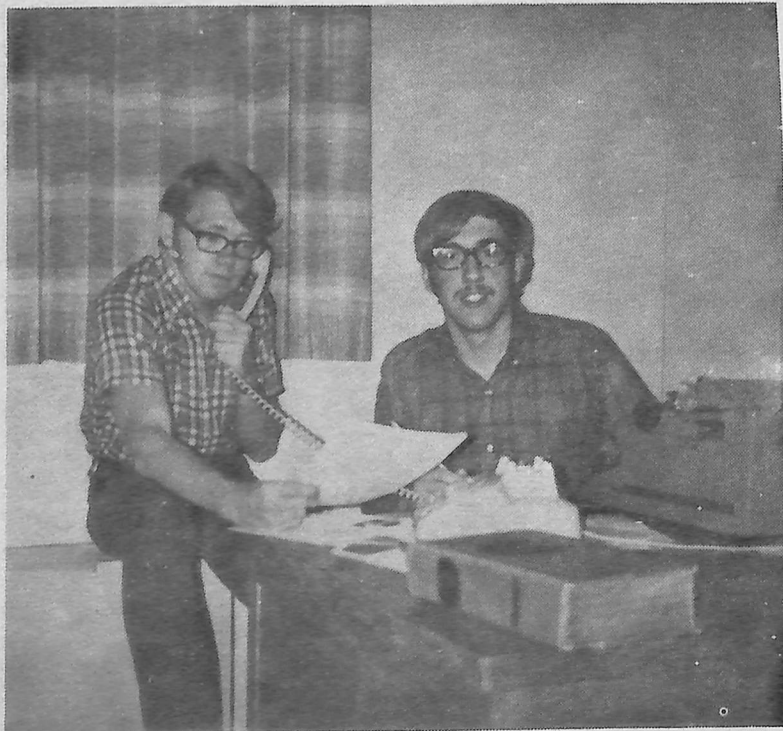
Ray Paulsen of Brush, Colorado. There will be a number of special awards presented along with the general honors, and these include:

Urge Interim Approval

We would like to urge Dean Christiansen to carefully consider the proposal submitted by Student Body President Arno Neben which calls for an interim program next year dealing with admissions. As we all know there is a financial squeeze on due to decreased enrollment. The only way that our present faculty level can be maintained or before we can make improvements in services and course selection, we must increase enrollment. We feel that for a minimal cost a very effective interim program can be worked up with methods of guidance and recruitment as a basis.

Hines Pitches No-Hitter; Dana Takes Two From Doane

In a game played last Wednesday night at Vet's Field Dana took two from Doane College 5-3 and 5-0; to raise their NIAC record to 7-1.

In the 2nd game Steve Hines, turned in probably his best collegiate pitching performance, as he allowed the visiting Tigers no hits and no runs. He struck out 16 and walked 3 and didn't allow a ball to be hit out of the infield.

The Vikes took the opener 5-3 behind Keith Overbeck and excellent relief by Paul Toole. The wins were number four and five in a row bringing Dana's record to 17-10.

Hines had a "smoking" fast ball and a sharp breaking curve. Only 1 runner reached 2nd base on the big lefty, that occurred when he issued 2 of his walks in the same inning. Steve's record is now 5-2; with 73 strikeouts in 45 innings of work.

Lowell Moore started the 2nd game for Doane. Moore wild-pitched Mike Triptow across home plate to give the Vikes a 1-0 lead in the 1st inning. Brian Moerer

singled home another unearned run in the 4th to make it 2-0. The Vikes clinched it in the 6th with three runs on Dan Jackson's single and stolen base, Phil Facendola's sacrifice, Moerer's second single and Steve Woitock's triple. Woitock then came in on still another wild pitch.

In the first game Keith Overbeck started and needed excellent relief from Paul Toole to raise his record to 4-2.

The Vikes scored four unearned runs in the first game as the Tiger defense committed 6 errors. Mike Triptow got the only run batted in on a bloop single. Three more wild pitches and a passed ball helped the Vikes who were held to just 7 singles.

SHUTOUT ONE OF TWO VICTORIES IN DOUBLEHEADER

The Dana College Vikings won a big Tri-State doubleheader from Westmar. Dan Jackson got the Vikes off to a good start with a 1-0 verdict in the opener as he allowed one infield hit for his second shutout in a row. The Vikings wasted little time in the second game in taking a 10-3 win to earn the sweep.

Jackson struck out 7 Eagle batters, but he walked 6 and hit 1, as they left 8 men on base. The hit came in the fourth inning when the batter swung at a bad ball, broke his bat and sent a little looper over Jackson's head which could not be fielded in time.

The Vikings won the game on an error off a ball hit by Jackson. Craig Moran singled with one out in the sixth, went to second on a wild pitch and after the second out came all the way home as Jackson's ground ball went through the legs of the Eagle first baseman. Dana only got 3 hits themselves, and 2 of them were doubles by Phil Facendola.

The Vikes decided the second game early as they scored 4 times in the first inning. Kirk McLaughlin led off with a single, stole second and went to third on Moran's sacrifice. Then 4 straight hits plated 4 men. Keith Overbeck singled and the next three men doubled - Dan Jackson, Facendola, and Brian Moerer. The Vikes added single runs in the third, fourth, and fifth innings, 2 of them by Westmar errors. They took a 10-0 in the top of the sixth with 3 more runs.

Jeff Maddocks, the Viking pitcher, went all the way and had things under control with a 3 hitter through the first 5 innings. Westmar got 5 hits in a 3 run sixth, however, with 3 infield hits being the Vikes' biggest problem.

Maddocks has a 4-1 record now and Jackson, who won his fourth in a row, is 4-2. Dana's league record is now 3-3.

Gethman Dana Honor Athlete Of The Year

Six Dana athletes were given special recognition at the annual All-Sports Banquet held on April 28th.

The honor athlete award went to Denny Gethman. The stipulations were that he be a junior or senior with at least a 5.0 GPA.

The Nelson Brothers award was given to Dane Meuske. Dane got the award for doing an outstanding job both academically and athletically.

"D" Club members voted and awarded the sportsmanship trophy to Brian Moerer.

A trophy in memory of the late Rufus Olson (a Dana coach for ten years) was awarded to Paul Toole on a vote by the Dana coaches.

Ralph Glock was given the scholar athlete award. The restriction for the award was that the recipient be a letterman and have the highest grade point average of all the participants. Ralph's GPA for the last semester was 8.6.

A number of other athletes also received honors and special recognition at the banquet.

DANA SPLITS WIN WITH UNO

After dropping the first game to UNO 6-2, lefty Steve Hines and his teammates came back to take a 3-1 win for a split.

Hines chalked up his fourth victory against two losses as he used his fast ball effectively. He fanned 13 Indians, walked three and allowed only three singles.

The Vikings scored enough to win in the second inning as Phil Facendola walked, Brian Moerer singled, and Mike Triptow singled, the latter knocking in the first two. The Vikes got an insurance run in the 5th on back to back doubles by Triptow and Bryan Traylor.

Dana lost the opener as UNO mounted a 13 hit attack against starter Paul Toole and Gary Bott. Toole was charged with the defeat, making his record two and three. Both teams scored one run in the first with Dana getting theirs on singles by Traylor and Dan Jackson, and a double by Keith Overbeck. Jackson was thrown out at the plate on a fine relay throw from the UNO shortstop. A single run in the 5th and 3 runs in the 6th sewed up the game for UNO. Dana got its second run on a walk, Facendola's single and an error.

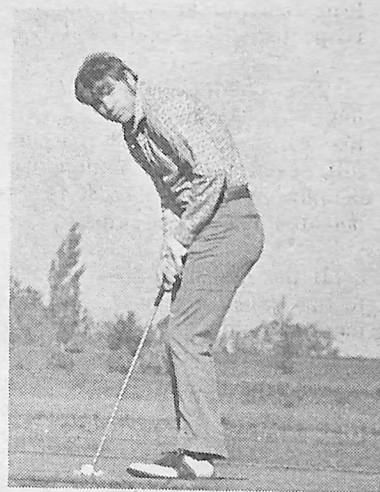

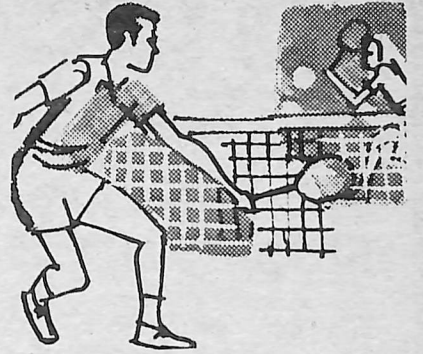
