The music department of Dana College, according to Doctor Neve and Doctor Wise, has started with some of the largest and strongest organizations this year.

The band, 41 members strong, will be busy with various activities throughout the year. One of the first will be the Convocation, October 19. Later, they will be presenting concerts at the Blair High School, at the two retirement homes, Crowell and the Good Shepherd, and will participate in the Parents' Day activities. The Christmas Concert has been scheduled for December 5. This spring, the band will tour Kansas, Nebraska and Colorado with Denver the hub of their activity. They will be touring from March 17-22 and after their return will present a home concert

March 26. Doctor Wise is highly enthusiastic about the group. He feels the band has a strong nucleus and the instrumentation is balanced and full. In the near future he would like to augment and strengthen the present numbers. Both he and the band are looking forward to a successful year.

Doctor Neve is very pleased with the choir too, which, this year, boasts a membership of 105. Work has started in earnest toward the Christmas Concert, scheduled December 5, and the interim tour which will include concerts in Colorado, Oregon, California, Arizona, Texas and Oklahoma. This will include not only the concerts but educational visits to areas of cultural interest. The choir is especially looking forward to the European tour scheduled for the first part of this summer. Doctor Neve is very impressed with the group's enthusiasm and their efficiency in picking up the music so quickly. He finds it very encouraging and feels they are off to a good start.

Doctor Brandes has a total of 27 piano students this semester, some of which are preparing recitals to be presented later on during the term. Doctor Brandes will be appearing in a duo piano recital this Sunday, September 26 at Simpson College in Indianola, Iowa. Ray Songayllo, who is on the staff of Simpson College will be appearing with him.

This plaque, located on the northwest corner of the first floor of the Dana Life Library, signifies one of the most impressive rooms on campus. Although it is used primarily as a Public Relations show-room, it contains a storehouse of worldwide artifacts ranging from pottery to volumes of books--all of which pertain to Dana's heritage.

The most noticeable display is the collection of Danish Christmas plates. This display was begun by George P. Christiansen in honor of his father, but now the plates are donated to the college by interested alumni and friends. The plates originate from two Danish companies: The Royal Copenhagen Porcelain Company which began in 1908 and Bing and Grondahl Porcelain which began in 1895. The Dana collection lacks forty plates to complete the two sets. Each plate has a different hand-painted design which cannot be reproduced. The molds are cracked after a certain quota so the plates are used entirely as collector items.

There is also a large collection of books which express our heritage. They range from paperback LARP books (which was a program originated at Dana) to a book of Latin Sermons which was printed in 1487. The most valuable book of the collection is a Christian IV Bible printed in 1632. It was the first Bible in Scandinavia after Catholicism.

Those students who would like to browse through the Heritage Room should stop at the Circulation desk for admittance. The door is locked due to the valuable items in it but will be opened upon request.

Ecology Campaign Picks Up

Interested in doing something to help clean up Dana and the rest of the world? Approximately thirty ecology people gathered September 16 to discuss the aims and goals of Ecology Campaign. First of all, Dana must be directly involved and affected. replanting in the park back of Argo Hall. Longer range projects include Earth Day activities next spring.

Mr. George Grube of the Biology Department gave a talk on what the Dana student could do (or not do) to help his own immediate environment here at Dana. The talk centered mainly on the use of pollutants such as automobiles, detergent, sewage, etc.

UNEMPLOYMENT HIGH IN EDUCATION

This is a time when there is a great deal of thought about job opportunities. With the unemployment rate as high as it is, many college students are considering their future job possibilities. The education majors are not exempt of this worry.

A great deal of discussion concerning the oversupply of teachers is currently under way. Because of this, Ray Weckmuller of the Office of Teacher Placement has compiled some statistics based on the 1971 graduates of the Dana College education department.

There were 61 graduates from the

education department last year. Of these 30 were secondary education majors and 31 were elementary education majors. It is interesting to note that of the 30 secondary teachers, only 19 were placed, while 28 of the 31 elementary teachers were placed.

On the basis of these figures, it would seem that chances are better for the placement of elementary teachers. Several factors should be considered before making this decision, however. These are: willingness to stay in the teaching profession, the ability to move from place to place, and other interferences (military service, homemaking, attending graduate school, etc.).

Of the 14 students not placed, two fell into the first category. They either refused openings offered them or went into a better paying field of work. Eight more can be placed in the second category. These individuals were confined to a specific geographic area and could not go where the jobs were available. The remaining four students fall into the final category of having other interferences with the teaching profession.

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Dana Falls At Yankton

Last Saturday night Dana played a non-conference football game in Yankton, South Dakota against the Yankton College Greyhounds; and came back to Blair with a 30-6 defeat administered by the Greyhounds.

For the second straight game Dana has outgained her opponent in total offensive yards 161-156; but costly fumbles or interceptions have led to the Vikings downfall.

As was Dana's downfall against Nebraska Wesleyan the same held true against Yankton. The Vikings lost five fumbles and had one pass intercepted. At the same time Yankton played a relatively error free game as they had only two passes intercepted by the Vikings and they had no fumbles.

Dana's only score came in the third quarter as quarterback, Mike Brady hit Gary Amole with a 46 yard touchdown pass and Luther Heller came in to kick the extra point.

Leading the Greyhounds were Butch Gray and Les Goodman. Gray, their place kicker, kicked 3 extra points and added three field goals from 19, 34 and 23 yards out to account for 12 of Yankton's 30 points. Then it was Les Goodman's turn as he rushed for a net of 115 yards in 31 carries and scored one touchdown on a 22 yard pass play. Ironic as it may seem is the rest of Goodman's teammates could only rush for a -3 yards rushing while he had 115.

Dana Students Get Humanities Credit

When the Preservation Hall Jazz Band arrives at the Music Hall in Omaha for their concert Friday, October 1 at 8:00 they will play New Orleans Jazz. The Music is the root of all that we now know as jazz, plus the sound that changed the orchestras and the playing styles for all of our popular music, and has influenced many classical composers.

New Orleans Jazz is not slick and arranged on paper to be played the same each time. It is not Dixieland and it is not the vaudeville and night club brand of vaudeville music. It is not straw hats and funny jackets and cheap tricks.

When you finally reach New Orleans Music, it is five or seven or sometimes a few more men who are playing a tradition, and still reaching into a deep well of creative genius to improvise. The trumpet plays the melody, the clarinet plays the counter melody, the trombone plays the harmony, the piano plays the chords on which

it is all based, and the rhythm section keeps everyone inside the limits of the tempo. Suddenly the melody moves to a different instrument, and as your spirits soar along with the music and the happy or sad sounds, you know you are listening to New Orleans Music.

Whatever New Orleans Jazz is, it will be on stage in Omaha next Friday, October 1. Tickets are available at the Music Hall at a special one dollar discount to Dana students with I.D. cards.
