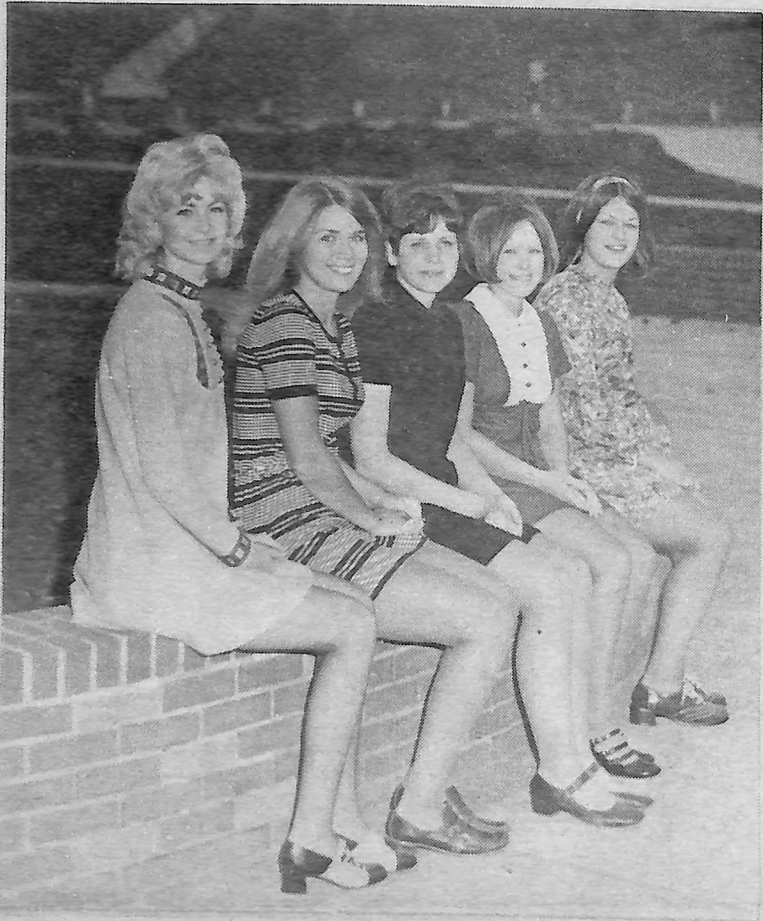

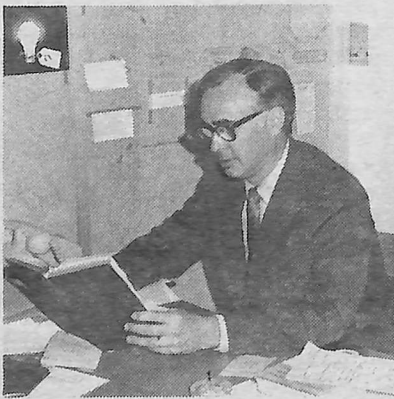
FACULTY INSIGHTS

A Glow Is Emitted From The Dark Recesses Of The Library Basement

Doctor, theologian, professor, father, scoutmaster -- these are among the many titles which John H. Northwall, of Dana's Speech department, holds with great distinction and esteem. He is a man of many talents, and has developed all of these talents to a high level of achievement and satisfaction. He seems almost hidden in the dark recesses of his office in the library basement; nevertheless, his faith and knowledge and ideals assert him far beyond those four stone walls. This assertion has placed him in a position deserving of great respect and honor from every member of Dana's campus.

Born in Kansas City, Missouri, to a farm family, he spent his childhood years attending a small, one - room schoolhouse. He graduated from high school in Essex, Iowa, with only 12 others in his graduating class. Later, he attended the University of Iowa, where he majored in chemistry. It was in the summer of his senior year there that he decided on becoming

a member of the ministry. His calling took him to Wartburg seminary, and he received his Bach-

elor of Divinity Degree there in 1951.

From Warburg he moved on to become involved in parish activity. After serving 2 years at a parish in Elizabeth, Illinois, he moved on to a parish at Smithfield, Ne-

ber of its staff for 3 years.

As associate professor of speech, Dr. Northwall feels that there are 2 basic theses to the concept of speech. The first is that "speech is basically an interaction of one human mind with another." The second idea regards speech as "a communication study of human misunderstanding". His real joy with reference to communications, is that the speech field is not limited; rather, he says, "it uses many areas; it's a combination of everything."

With speech a required course at Dana, Dr. Northwall estimates that he hears about 2,000 speeches a year, and despite this large number, he can still recall many of them. He says he "looks forward to every speech," and his greatest pleasure is "watching the student gain more confidence in himself with each speech."

Pat Tripp, Co-Editor of the Hermes, has announced his resignation effective as soon as a replacement can be found. Due to personal reasons, he has decided to resign as Co-Editor, though he will continue as Layout Editor for the Hermes.

At the present time the Board of Publications is accepting applications for the position which is open to all Dana students. Bulldogs Give Vikings The Bite

Last Saturday the Dana College Vikings traveled to Seward, Nebraska where they lost to the host Concordia Bulldogs. The Bulldogs dominated every aspect of the game.

The opening few minutes of the game were very error prone. Concordia won the coin flip and elected to receive. Hines kicked off and with only 30 seconds gone the Bulldogs fumbled and the Vikings recovered. 35 seconds later the Bulldogs recovered a Dana fumble. Gary McMullin then proceeded to intercept a Concordia aerial on their own 48, with 13:01 left in the first quarter. Kirk McLaughlin then passed to John Escher and the Vikes had it 1st and 10 at the Concordia 15. But the Vikings fumbled and the Bulldogs once again recovered, but this time on their own 15.

Concordia now settled down and put together their first scoring drive of the afternoon. The Bulldogs picked up a first down at their own 15. Then on a 3rd and 5 they threw for a 50 yard completion down to the Dana 15. The Vikings were guilty of being offside and with 6:31 left in the first quarter, Bill Kauffmann scored from the 1 yard line and with Clare Wiltse's kick the score was 7-0 in favor of Concordia.

In the second quarter Concordia had 1st and 10 on their own 37. The Bulldogs fumbled and Dana recovered. The Vikings then lost the ball on an interception but gained it right back when Jim Uchtman intercepted. Dana then proceeded to pick up a first down at the Concordia 13. The Vikings had it 4th and 3 at the Bulldog 4, but Concordia held.

After an exchange of punts, Dana was forced to punt. On a bad pass from center, Ron Miller was forced to run and was tackled in the end zone for 2 points and Concordia led 9-0 at the half.

Concordia kicked to open the second half and promptly held the Vikings. Ralph Mayer, now doing the punting for Dana, punts, and Concordia received it on their own 33. With 10:22 left, quarterback Tim Taube hit Rod Frieling with a 26 yard touchdown pass and with Wiltse's kick, Concordia led 16-0 at the end of the 3rd quarter.

With 6:35 left to play Randy Pospishill scored for the Bulldogs on a 2 yard run and with Wiltse's kick it was Concordia 23-0.

The Vikings' only scoring threat began with the entrance of Mike Brady as the new quarterback. Mike connected on 5 straight passes for a total of 59 yards and a first and ten on the Bulldog 8 yard line with 5:00 left in the game. But three running plays didn't net a first down and Concordia took over on downs. Concordia then just ran out the clock to win their homecoming game over the Vikings.

This Saturday, October 16th, Dana plays host to the Hastings College Broncos; game time is 2 P.M. at Viking field.

Also in last Saturday's game against Westmar, Ron Schneider broke the school rushing record for 1 game by carrying for 154 yards in 21 carries. This broke the two year record of Greg Hayes by 23 yards.

Dana Harriers Drop Two More

The Dana College cross country team dropped their fourth and fifth straight losses to Dordt and Midland Colleges respectively.

On September the 29th Dordt College (of Sioux Center, Iowa) traveled to Blair and defeated the Vikings 15-48. Dordt had the first five finishers who were: Lynn Blerker, Hank VanDeKraants, Ron Loutis, Frank VanDerGriend, and Doug Grither. The Dana finishers were: Tom VanSteenhoven, Bob Coffey, Fred Erdman, Pete Schur, Arden Rakosky as they finished 6th, 9th, 10th, 11th and 12th respectively.

Then on October the 5th Dana traveled to Fremont where they were defeated by Midland 24-31. Dana only had four men go as injuries took their toll. The Viking finishers were: Bob Coffey, Tom VanSteenhoven, Red Erdman and Pete Schur who finished 3rd, 5th, 6th and 7th respectively.

1st and 2nd Places Fail To Give Win Over Creighton

At this date the Dana College cross country team had posted a disappointing 0-4 record so far. The team has traveled to Tarkio, Missouri and Ankeney, Iowa, while hosting and losing to both Creighton University and Dordt College.

Their first meet was held September 18 at Tarkio, Missouri against Tarkio, School of the Ozarks, Creighton and Dana. The School of the Ozarks finished with 4 out of the first 5 runners. The first Dana runners to finish were: Tom Van Steenhoven and Bob Coffey in 18th and 19th respectively. Places 21-24 were filled by Fred Erdman, Roger Vaad, Pete Scheer and Arden Rakosky.

On September the 24th the harriers traveled to Ankeney, Iowa where they raced against Faith and William Penn. Wm. Penn had 29 points, Faith 34, and Dana had 57. Bob Coffey was the first Viking finisher as he finished 7th and Tom Van Steenhoven was a 9th place finisher.

Creighton University then traveled to Blair and defeated the Vikings 25-30 on points. The Vikings lost even though they had the first and second place finishers in: Tom Van Steenhoven 12:44 and Bob Coffey 17:37. But Creighton finished off the Vikings by getting the next finishers.



On Nigerian Etiquette

This article does not pretend to be philosophical nor affect to be of scholarly depth, but rather to be enlightening in an entertaining way - to the man with humour. It is an extract taken from How to be a Nigerian by Peter Enahoro, a Nigerian writer.

The richness of Nigerian etiquette is embedded in the romance of speech. Politeness is expressed, not performed. Dropping in on friends unexpectedly is the formal thing. Therefore, when a Nigerian prepares his meal, it is in excess, in participation of uninvited stomachs which may drop by. It is a very bad etiquette to prepare a meal sufficient just for yourself

and family alone, even if you are not expecting guests.

Occasionally, there are accidents when there is not enough for the visitor to join in; but your embarrassed host would never dream of asking you, as the Europeans want to do, to 'take a chair and have a drink', while he eats on. Good breeding demands that he prefers invitation. But--- You Are Not Invited if your Host says:

We are just washing our hands. Will you have something to eat? Have you already fed?

Join us, although I doubt if you will like this brooth.

You are Invited if your Host says:

Please sit with us and let us give thanks to God.

Your steps have guided you right.

Your prayers are answered.

Even then, it is insufferably impolite to accept the invitation upon the first offer, or the second, or the third. Keep stalling until your host loses patience, then accept wearily. You have got to show your host that you too have food in your home and you are doing him a favour by accepting at all. When you are offered a drink, refuse it right away even if you need one desperately - a vigorous shake of the head is the indication. It is polite to lie into his face by telling him you have just had a drink. Your host then presses on. You resist waiting for the right moment to surrender. When your host says 'Well, it's always like that. You never drink in my house' and affects to be injured, you then say: 'Oh well, I certainly don't remember----'. You then beg him to give you a beer.

Be cautious, however to choose the right moment. Therefore, use your power of observation and be keen on your host's sensitivity and credulity or you may deprive yourself of a hearty meal or drink and think all Nigerians are rude people.
