

# McCollister Here Monday

Congressman John Y. McCollister, Republican representing the Second District of Nebraska, will speak here at Dana on October 25. Republican McCollister is being hosted by the Dana Young Republicans in the Campus Center Presidents' Room at 7:30 p.m. on the 25th.

The Congressman, whose constituency includes the Greater Omaha area, is a native of Johnson County, Iowa, and is an alumnus of the University of Iowa. He has been a resident of Omaha since 1953, where he was engaged with his father in the manufacturing and marketing of lubricants. McCollister's political activities began with local party functions and culminated in his election to the House

of Representatives in 1970, after serving since 1964 as a Douglas County Commissioner. His other contributions include serving as chairman of the Regional Boy Scout Council, director for the Omaha Chamber of Commerce, Greater Omaha Association for Retarded Children and Greater Omaha Community Action.

# Inaugural Ceremonies To Conclude Homecoming Weekend

This Sunday afternoon Earl R. Mezoff will be inaugurated as the twelfth president of Dana College. The inaugural program will begin at 2:30 P.M. in the AMA, and will come as the closing event of this Homecoming weekend. It is open to all Dana students, as well as to the general public.

The ceremony will begin with a processional made up of members

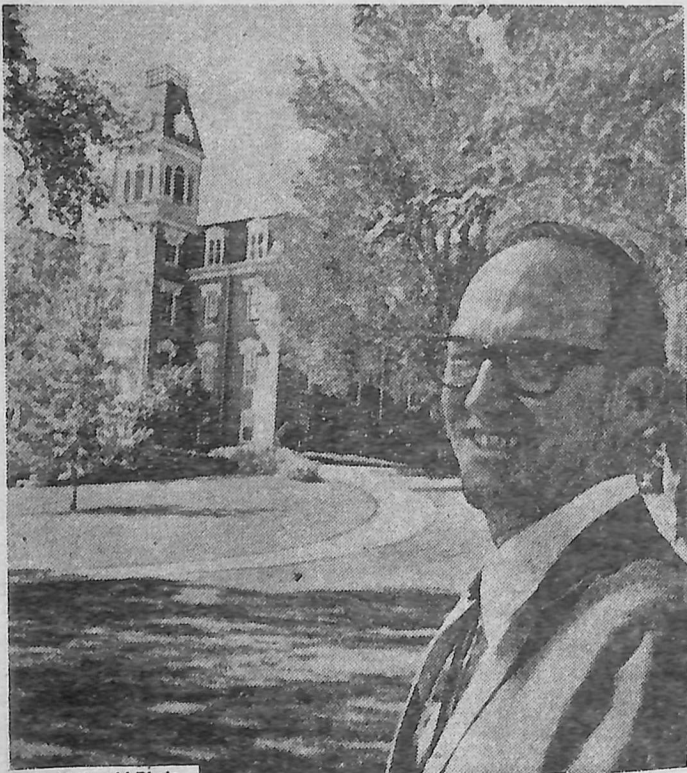
of the Dana faculty, some 100 delegates of various sister colleges and universities, alumni representatives, the student body, board of regents, The Blair community, and the Dana Choir. The processional will make its way from Borup Coliseum to AMA. Dana's faculty and the delegates from other colleges will be dressed in the long traditional academic robes

with hoods of different colors signifying the colors of their alma mater and their field of study.

Pastor Robert Albers of the First Lutheran Church will offer the opening invocation. Greetings to the President will be given by Bishop Kent Knutsen, President of the American Lutheran Church; Mr. Norman Fintel, Director of the Board of College Education of the ALC; Reverend Robert Berthelsen, Secretary of the Central District of the ALC; Arno Neben, President of the student body; Mr. Harvey Simpson, Mayor of Blair and Professor Luella Nielsen, speaking for Dana faculty.

Following the preliminary opening greetings, Mr. Lorentz Thorngren, Chairman of the Dana Board of Regents, will administer the formal inaugural rite. Dr. C. C. Madsen, retiring president, will then present the official Presidential Medallion to Mezoff. The medallion is a replica of the college seal engraved with the name of the president, and will be worn by President Mezoff on academic occasions.

The body of the program will consist of an address by the new president. It will be followed with a Benediction by Pastor Bergstrasser. After the ceremony, students and guests are invited to attend an informal reception in the campus center.

State, and a two year tour of duty in the armed forces, he went into teaching and coaching. Among the schools he taught at are Cambridge, Nebraska; Rockford, Iowa; Wymore, Nebraska and Harlan, Iowa. In 1963 Coach Simpson received his Masters Degree from the University of Nebraska.

In 1967 he came to Dana College as an assistant professor of physical education, head wrestling coach and assistant football coach. This season he has taken over as head football coach.

As an instructor he can see the importance of physical education in the curriculum from grade school through college.

With that in mind it is important to prepare physical education teachers and coaches, and instill in them the importance of their positions. During the past four years there has been a larger

number of teachers and coaches graduate from colleges, and a shortage in the number of jobs available. This situation has brought about a change in the attitude of both students and staff, in that both are becoming more serious and pushing for better grades in order to have a shot at the jobs.

One of Coach Simpson's strongest educational beliefs is that a good coach can do as much for the development of the individual as the individual himself. In the process of doing this, a relationship is developed that can be found no where else in the teaching profession.

Perhaps the most satisfying aspect of his job is seeing men who were former students or athletes under him out in the field teaching and coaching.

He married his wife, Shirley, when he was a junior in college. She is presently a resource li-

## HASTINGS ROARS AT DANA

In a game played last Saturday on a windy Viking Field, the Hastings College Broncos roared back from a 6-3 halftime deficit to down the Vikings 16-6. The real downfall for the Vikings was four pass interceptions by the Broncos and the entire fourth quarter. In the disastrous fourth, the Vikings ran only two offensive plays for a total of thirty seconds, and stood by helplessly as Hastings ran over the injured Viking defensive unit.

Hastings kicked to open the game and made the Vikings drive south into the teeth of a very strong wind. On the Vikings first set of downs, Dana tried all running plays, which didn't net them the necessary yardage and was forced to punt. Ralph Mayer punted and the Broncos had its first and ten at the Dana 38.

The Broncos picked up a first down at the Viking 23. On the next set of downs Dana held and Hastings was faced with a fourth and seven situation. With 10:33 left in the first quarter, Hastings' John Morehouse kicked a 37-yard field goal to take a 3-0 lead. After an exchange of punts and numerous stalled drives the first quarter ended 3-0 in favor of the Broncos.

In the second quarter with the wind at their backs the Vikings looked as if they would blow Hastings right off the field. The Vikings had one serious drive halted by a Bronco interception and Hastings had the ball first and ten at their own 25. But Hastings fumbled and

Dana recovered at the Bronco 38. With fourth and two, Hastings was guilty of offsidess to give Dana a first and ten. With 7:42 left in the half Dana had the ball fourth down and one foot to go for a Viking touchdown. Dana was offside and Hastings took over on their own half-yard line.

The Vikings intercepted another

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Bronco aerial and ran it back to their 25. Kirk McLaughlin then got off a long run to give Dana a first and ten at the Bronco nine with 4:14 left. Kirk then came through again with a pass down to their two yard line. On fourth and one, McLaughlin ran a left end sweep for the only Dana score of the afternoon. The kick was short and Dana took a 6-3 lead at the half.

In the early stages of the third quarter both defensive units came up with the big plays to force the other team into a punting situation. Hastings put together their second scoring drive of the afternoon starting on their own 38-yard line. A big surprise came when the Broncos' quarterback, Gary Bendinger, threw a 46-yard touchdown pass to George Watson. John Morehouse kicked the extra point with 2:16 left in the third quarter to give the Broncos a 10-6 lead at the end of the third quarter.

The whole fourth quarter was all Hastings. Dana had the ball for only thirty seconds, good enough for two offensive plays. With 8:24 left to play, Gary Bendinger scored on a two yard run. The kick was wide, and the Broncos ended up winning the game 16-6.

## Work-Travel Program In Germany

Since a number of students would already like to get some information about working in Germany, Professor George gave the following advice: The summer work program in Germany has been carried on now for three years with usually about six Dana students participating. Students who would like to work in Germany for either two or three months during the summer vacation of 1972, should contact Professor George by the end of December to fill out the required forms. Work will be available in resort towns, tourist industry, light industry,

children's and old people's homes. By March-April 1972, students who had applied will receive a contract stating type of work, salary, location, room and board, etc., and it is then up to the student to accept this contract by signing and returning it. The program has been quite successful, because work is secured through the German Federal Employment Office, and because it is possible to get charter rate tickets to Germany. Taido, unlike Karate and Judo, uses the concept of body axis movement to stop an opponent. It was a long-forgotten art that was reborn during World War II.

Mitsunohu Uchida, this country's only instructor, is well qualified to teach taido, having studied taido for seven years. He was a Japanese National Taido Champion.
