## Queen Jacque Koehn Reigns "Showboat '71"

### Inauguration Comes As Finale To Homecoming Festivities

Dr. Earl R. Mezoff was officially installed as the twelfth President of Dana College on Sunday, October 24th, at 2:30 p.m. at Alumni Memorial Auditorium. President Mezoff led a colorful procession from Borup Coliseum to A.M.A. which included church dignitaries, delegates from nearly 100 colleges and universities, the Dana College faculty, student representatives, and the Dana College Choir. Rev. Robert Albers of First Lutheran in Blair offered the opening invocation, followed by a rendition of "The Battle Hymn of the Republic"

by the Dana Choir, led by Dr. Paul Neve, who also presided at the organ for the processional and recessional.

Greetings were given by church dignitaries, educational officials, a representative of the City of Blair, and faculty and students of the college. Bishop Kent Knudson of the American Lutheran Church was among the honorables giving salutations.

The crowning point of the ceremony was the inauguration rite, administered to President Mezoff by Mr. Lorentz Thorngren,

Chairman of the Dana College Board of Regents, who presented the presidential medallion to President Mezoff from outgoing President Madsen. President Mezoff then gave the Inaugural Address, in which he stressed the importance of contributions from all involved in the life of Dana College. Bishop Knudson gave the benediction; and the procession, led by the new president, filed out of A.M.A. The impressive ceremony was capped with a reception in the Student Center.

The crowning of Jacque Koehn as 1971 Homecoming Queen sparked the beginning of last week's "Showboat" festivities. After the coronation and presentation of the Queen's Court Friday night, the traditional Viking Revue got under way with an all - star cast of students, faculty, and alumni. The Revue featured sprinklings of song, dance and humor, centering around the Homecoming theme of "Showboat '71'".

Following the show, a reception was held in the decorated campus center, for Queen Jacque and her court, which included Princesses Barb Wolfe, Kathy Christensen, Lois Edmonds, and Gigi Garrett. At 10:45 that same night spirits for Saturday's game were fired up with a bonfire and a pep rally in the lower P.M. parking lot.

Saturday's activities began bright and early with the opening of Alumni Headquarters in the Linden Room at 9:00 a.m. The results of the float contest were posted with Blair Hall emerging victorious and \$75 richer with their "Paddle Boat" display. Two other floats decorated the oval, products of Argo Hall and the Freshman

Class.

The Vikings took the field against their old and bitter rivals from Midland College at 2:00 at the Viking field, and after a two hour battle, found their third win of the season as they trounced the Warriors, 19-0.

That night the Viking Revue returned for its second outstanding performance. Saturday night's presentation featured a performance by 19 members of the 1961 Dana choir which toured Denmark, followed by a few selections from Dana's present choir. The musical review was concluded by an overwhelming performance by the 1971 choir and all Dana alumni.

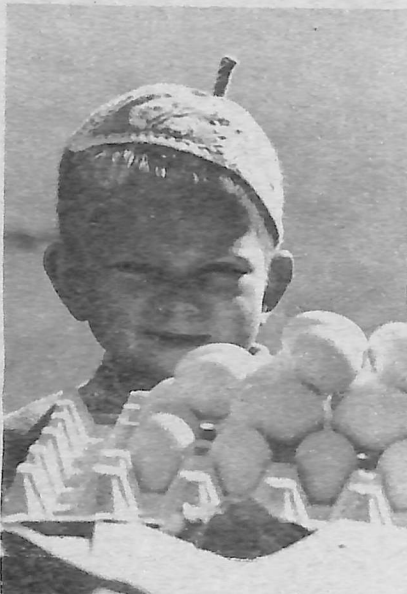
The traditional Homecoming dance followed the Revue, with music provided by "Horse", a band playing out of Omaha. The dance was held in Borup Coliseum.

"Showboat '71" began "cruising out" as festivities slowly came to an end. Sunday's ceremonies began with a Homecoming Worship Service at 10:30 a.m. at AMA. Dr. Mezoff's Presidential Inauguration, at 2:30 that afternoon concluded Dana's annual Homecoming weekend.

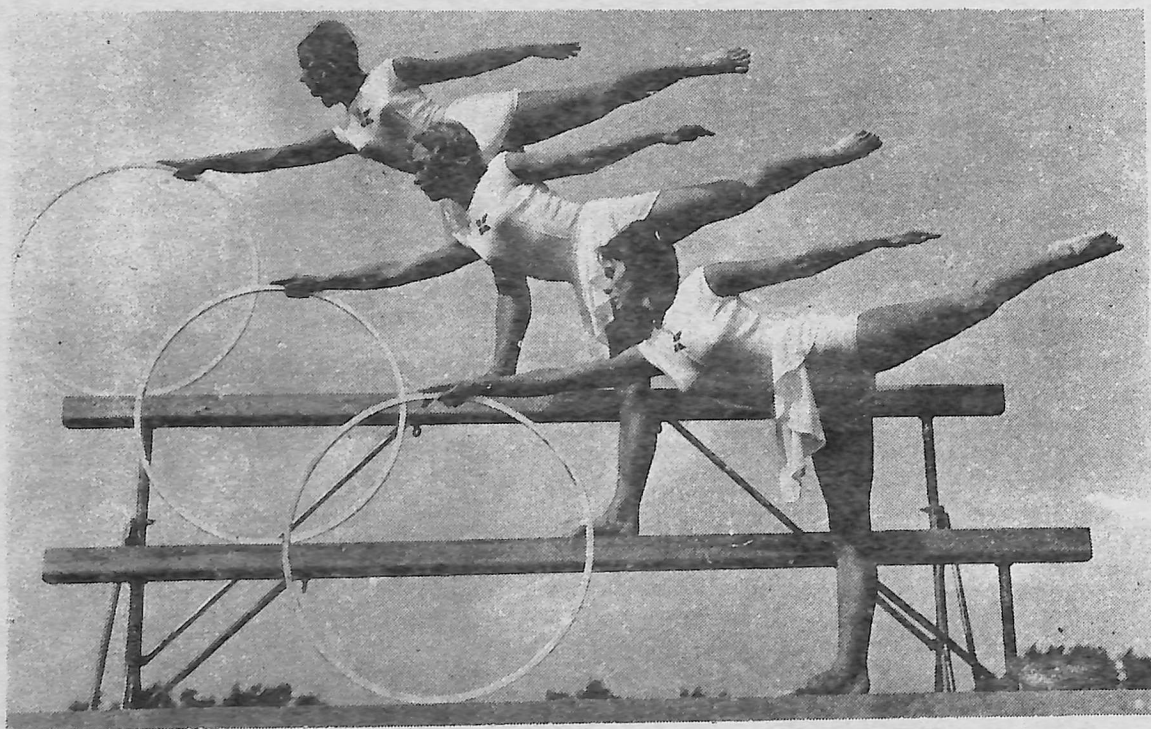


Boy and eggs in Oslo's Market Place

### ENVIRONMENTAL SEMINAR

(Zero Population Growth) displayed tables of literature and posters pertaining to population control. A panel of five members presented the social, religious, medical and environmental aspects of overpopulation. They also gave some basic solutions for curbing the rate of growth of human population. After the presentation by the panel, the audience participated in a question and answer period.

The Danish Gym Team will visit Dana Tuesday evening, November 2, at 8 p.m. in Borup Coliseum. Tickets for the exhibition will be available at the door. Dana students - 50¢ and adults - \$1.00.

The team consists of thirteen men and thirteen women all from Denmark, and is conducted by Erik Flensted-Jensen. Their Tuesday evening performance at Dana will include a variety of

rhythmical gymnastics, vaulting, tumbling and folk dancing. The program will be accompanied by music, classical and modern, and the folk dances will be performed in authentic Danish costume.

### Republicans Open Political Discussion

On Monday evening, October 25, more than fifty students, faculty, and townspeople assembled to listen to John Y. McCollister. Congressman McCollister is the Republican Representative for the Second District of Nebraska. This gathering was hosted by the Dana Young Republicans Club.

McCollister talked about the workings and responsibilities of

committees in the House as well as about some of the current activities in the House. These included such topics as House reorganization, revenue sharing, and presentation of bills. The Congressman then opened the floor for questions. This question-and-answer session lasted for half an hour with questions covering a wide variety of subjects.

### Walk For Development Projects

The Projects Committee of the Dana Walk for Development has announced that the proceeds of the walk will go to 'Save a Family Plan' and the Omaha Indian Reservation on a 42 1/2%-42 1/2% basis.

'Save a Family Plan' is a world-hunger relief project designed to make selected families in India self-sufficient. Based at St. Thomas University, Fredericton, New Brunswick, Canada, it uses each sixty dollar donation to buy a milk cow for a needy family. This plan not only aims at relieving immediate hunger, but also aims at alleviating future hunger problems. Acknowledgement will be sent by the family direct to the benefactor each time money is received.

The project at the Omaha Reservation is a scholarship fund, with awards going to Indian youths attending off-reservation high schools. Attendance at these boarding schools is compulsory, and many students are sent there without any money to live on, and we all know what a drag that is! A small amount of spending money will greatly enhance the scope of their high school education. The distribution of the funds will be handled by the Omaha Tribal Council.

The remainder of the funds (15%) will go to the Walk's sponsor organization, the American Freedom from Hunger Foundation. The Foundation will use the funds to develop more walks and projects.

## FAST FOR PAKISTANIS

On Wednesday, November 3rd, a nation-wide effort aimed at helping nine million East Pakistani refugees in India will take place. Dana College will participate in "The November 3rd Fast to Save a People", sponsored locally on campus by Covenant Community, Dana's Student congregation. Nationally, the project is sponsored by Oxfam-America, Inc., and Project Relief, Inc. Students participating in the project are urged to skip one or all of the day's meals, and donate the money thus saved to the relief operation.

Checks payable to "The November 3rd Fast", or cash, or questions about the Fast, may be brought to the Information Desk in the Campus Center on November 3rd. Just a dollar from one student participating can provide a month's supply of supplementary high-nutrient foods, multivitamins, medicine, powdered milk, basic clothing and shelter for one refugee. Help save the lives of thousands of East Pakistanis. If you can't walk November 6th, then give November 3rd.

# DANA BLITZES MIDLAND IN HOMECOMING BATTLE 19-0

The Dana College Vikings won their homecoming game, before a jam packed crowd at Viking Field, by downing the Midland College Warriors 19-0.

With the shutout, the Vikes raised their season record to 3 wins and 4 losses. Dana needs just one more victory to have their most wins in a single season since 1962. They entertain Sioux Falls College this Saturday, October the 30th and then end up the season with an away game against Doane College on November 13.

Midland kicked to open the game and Rod Ramsey received for the Vikings. On the run back Rod fumbled and the Warriors recovered on the Viking 34.

Dana held and forced Midland to punt. The Vikes picked up two more first downs but Kirk McLaughlin's fourth down pass was deflected.

Neither team could muster much of a threat and the first quarter ended in a scoreless tie.

After a Viking punt to start the second quarter Midland had it first and ten at their own 19; but they failed to make the necessary yardage and were forced to punt.

The Vikings now began their first scoring drive of the after-

noon, when they received the Warriors' punt on their own 32. Ron Schneider caught a key pass to give Dana a first down at the Midland 35; and Gary Amole snared another pass at the Warrior 14. With 4th down and 2 yards to go for a touchdown, Kirk McLaughlin scored on a 2 yard run to give Dana a 6-0 lead with 9:04 left in the second quarter. The try for the extra point was blocked.

Dana recovered a Warrior fumble at the Viking 40 yard line. From here the Vikes picked up a first down at the Midland 48 (and were aided by a Warrior personal foul). Another personal foul and a Dana first down at the Warrior 11 yard line set up Dana's second score. With 3rd down, Kirk McLaughlin hit Ron Schneider with a 11 yard touchdown pass to give the Vikings a 12-0 lead at half-time.

In the second half Midland came out running and threw a serious scare at the Vikings. The Warriors received the second half kickoff on their own 16 yard line. Midland with key end sweeps and a crucial pass had it first and ten on the Dana 11 yard line. Dana finally stopped the Warriors on the Viking 2 yard line.

The third quarter ended with Dana still holding on to a 12-0 lead.

Midland came out throwing to start the fourth quarter, when they started a drive on their own 11 yard line. The Warriors with a long pass to Randy Wilson had it first and ten at the Dana 35. With first down at the Viking 21 and 11 yard lines the Warrior threat was finally ended when Dana took over on downs on our own 32.

Dan Smith got the Vikings underway to their third touchdown drive when he intercepted a Midland pass at the Viking 45. With an aid of a personal foul and Mike Thompson's running Dana had it first and ten at the Warrior 18. Then with 4:57 left to play, Rod Ramsey scampered 15 yards for a touchdown and with Luther Heller's successful boot Dana now led Midland by the final score of 19-0.

Next Saturday, October the 30th Dana plays host to the Sioux Falls College Braves in a 2 p.m. encounter at Viking Field.

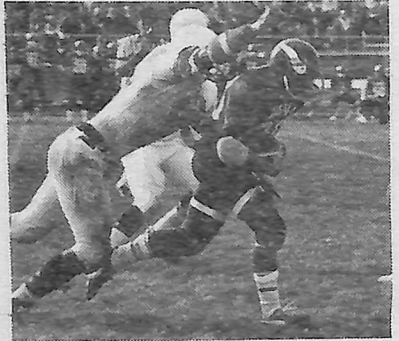
Everytime I go to take a shower, either the water is cold to start with or after you get all soaped up, it turns cold. Any solutions?

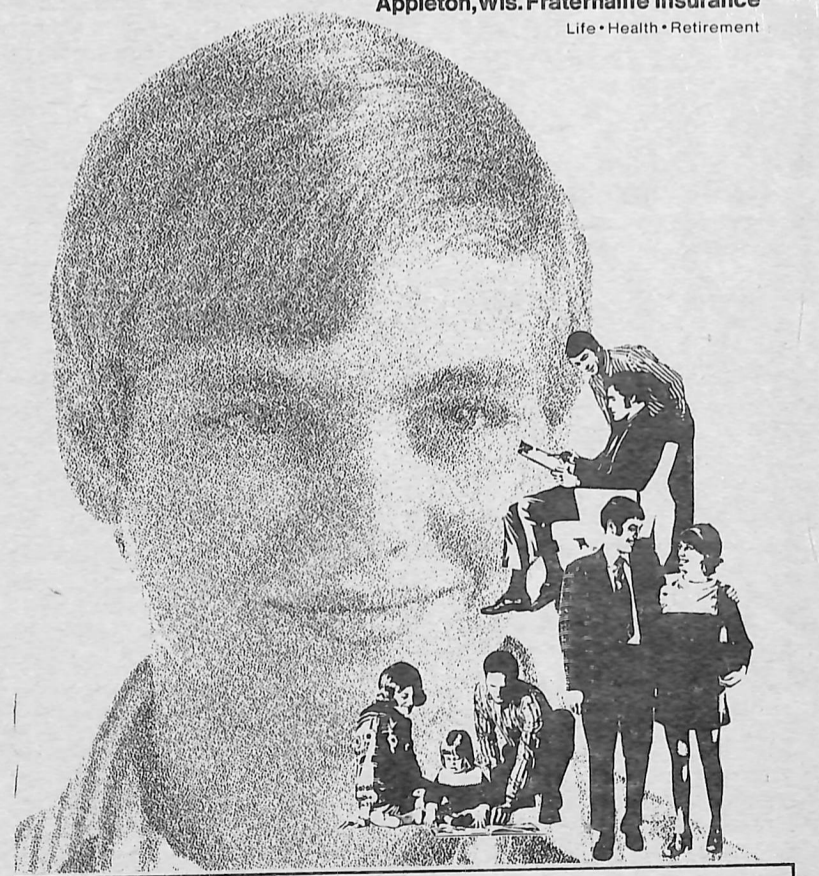
