Covered were such areas as the war, atomic tests, overpopulation, etc. Here are some of the things Senator Curtis says with reference to:

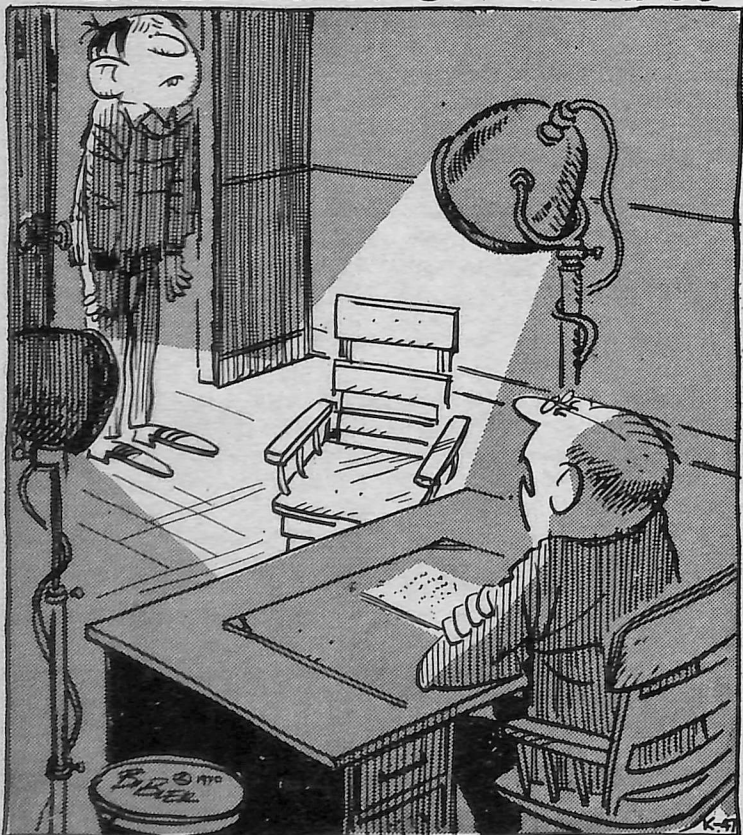
- WAR - "War is not nice"

Maharishi's Meditation

A crowd of nearly 90 persons, most of whom were Dana students or faculty, attended an introductory lecture on the practice of Transcendental Meditation Tuesday evening at Parnassus, Miss Denise Denniston, currently a faculty member of Creighton University in Omaha, described the procedures and effects of TM, as it is commonly referred to. Miss Denniston represented the Students' International Meditation Society, which teaches the art of TM on over 600 American campuses and 80 foreign countries. Transcendental Meditation was taught to Miss Denniston personally by Maharishi Mahesh Yogi, famed teacher of such people as Mia Farrow and the Beatles. The practice is thousands of years old, but only recently has it come into the light of the Western world. Miss Denniston will hopefully make a repeat trip to Dana on the dates of December 11, 12, 13 and 14 for personal instruction to interested Dana students and faculty and Blair area citizens.

NEBPIRG

On November 9, Dr. Joe Hyland spoke about Action for Change and on Ralph Nader. He brought to the students who were there, the idea of starting a student organization in the state of Nebraska. Such an organization was started in several states, including Minnesota.

NEBPIRG, as it is called (Nebraska Public Interest Research Group), will be student financed and controlled. The State Board will hire experts, e.g. lawyers, community organizers, and research personnel. These experts will be paid for by the students and will be under their control. Each person who is a member is considered an investigator.

The organization will research problem areas, in conjunction with the community. Such areas include false advertising, shortage of box cars, agricultural problems and so on.

Each campus has its own organization and they will carry out research, etc. in the community. The reason for basing these local organizations at the campuses is because the colleges have the facilities for research and the time.

Wednesday there was a Dana chapter meeting in D.H.A. at 10:30. Lloyd Neve was elected co-ordinator here at Dana. Several interested students showed up.

"And that's what I'm here to talk about. It has come to my attention that the cutting down of all trees and shrubs (not just dying elms, which can be replaced by hardier trees and shrubs) to make way for a parking lot is not just an empty rumor, but an absolute fact. Defense Helps Dana Upset Doane

The Dana College Vikings traveled to Crete, Nebraska last Saturday, where they upped their season record to 5-4, by stopping the NIAC champions, the Doane College Tigers. With the upset, Dana had her best season ever since 1962, under their new head coach, Mr. Bob Simpson.

The alert Viking defense picked off 4 Tiger aeriels and caused Doane to loose 5 fumbles on real hard hitting.

Offensively the Vikings were just as great. Dana produced 175 yards rushing against a Doan team that had been allowing only 111.3 yards a game on the ground. Of the 175 rushing yards Mike Thompson (from Blair) rushed for 110 yards on 22 carries and touchdowns on a 55 yard run and a seven yard pass from Kirk McLaughlin.

Doane elected to kick and have the wind at their back in the first quarter. They stopped the Vikings cold on their first set of downs.

After an exchange of punts Doane scored their first touchdown of the game. Doane had the ball 1st and 10 at midfield. In 3 carries Guillory rushed for 18 yards, Day in 2 carries netted 6 yards, and Moore rushed for 3 more. Then with 6:25 left in the 1st quarter Comeau caught a 23 yard touchdown pass from King and with Guillory's kick, Doane led 7-0.

On the ensuing kickoff the Vikes fumbled on a pitchout and the Tigers recovered on the Dana 37. The alert Dana defense stole the ball and the Vikings once again had it 1st and 10 on our own 39.

After an exchange of punts, Dana had a first and ten at our own 45 yard line. On the very first play Mike Thompson found an opening and rambled 55 yards for Dana's first score with 25 seconds left in the first quarter. The run for the extra point failed and the first quarter ended with Doane out in front by a slim point, 7-6.

On the Dana kickoff Doane fumbled and Dana recovered at the Tiger 31 yard line. On 3rd down Kirk McLaughlin's pass sailed over Gary Amole's head and Dana was forced to punt.

Doane received and had a first

down at their own 20. On a 3rd down they had a pass that covered 37 yards to the Dana 43. Their drive stalled on the Dana 7 when they lost the ball on downs. The Tigers lined up for a field goal attempt but instead tried to run the ball and was stopped short of the first down.

The Tigers after stopping Dana had it 1st and 10 at the Viking 40 yard line. On a crucial 3rd down pass the Tigers picked up a first down on the Dana 6 with 3:18 left in the first half. Guillory scored on a 1 yard run and with his own kick Doane took a 14-6 lead at the half.

Steve Hines kicked off for Dana to start the second half. Doane down on their own 15 fumbled and Dana had it 1st and 10 from there. Rod Ramsey took a pitch good for 2 yards down to the 13. With 12:48 left in the quarter, Kirk McLaughlin hit end, John Escher with a 13 yard touchdown pass. The attempted twopoint conversion failed and Doane had a shaky 14-12 lead.

Both teams had an exchange of punts. Ralph Mayer intercepted a Tiger aerial on the Dana 46 and ran it back to the Doane 25. Dana picked up a crucial first down at the Doane 12 yard line to keep this drive alive. With the scoreboard clock showing only 22 seconds left in the 3rd quarter, Mike Thompson caught a 7 yard touchdown pass to give the Vikings a 18-14 lead as the kick was wide.

Once again Steve Hines kicked off and Doane had a first down at their own 30 yard line. On the last play of the third quarter Rick Mewhirter made a fantastic interception to give Dana a first and ten at the Tiger 37. John Escher caught a pass for a first down at the 22 yard line. With 4th down and 5 yards to go, Kirk McLaughlin lofted a pass (against the wind) for Escher that he snared at the Doane 1 yard line. McLaughlin on a quarterback sneak scored to give the Vikings a 24-14 lead with 12 minutes left in the football game.

The score ended 24-14 in favor of Dana as the Vikings' defensive unit time after time came up with the big fumble of interception to stall any Doane drive.

With the victory the Vikings ended the season with a three game winning streak. This also marked the second straight year that Dana has been able to upset the highly favored Tigers.

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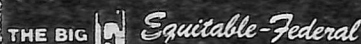
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Ten Seniors Play Last Game For Dana

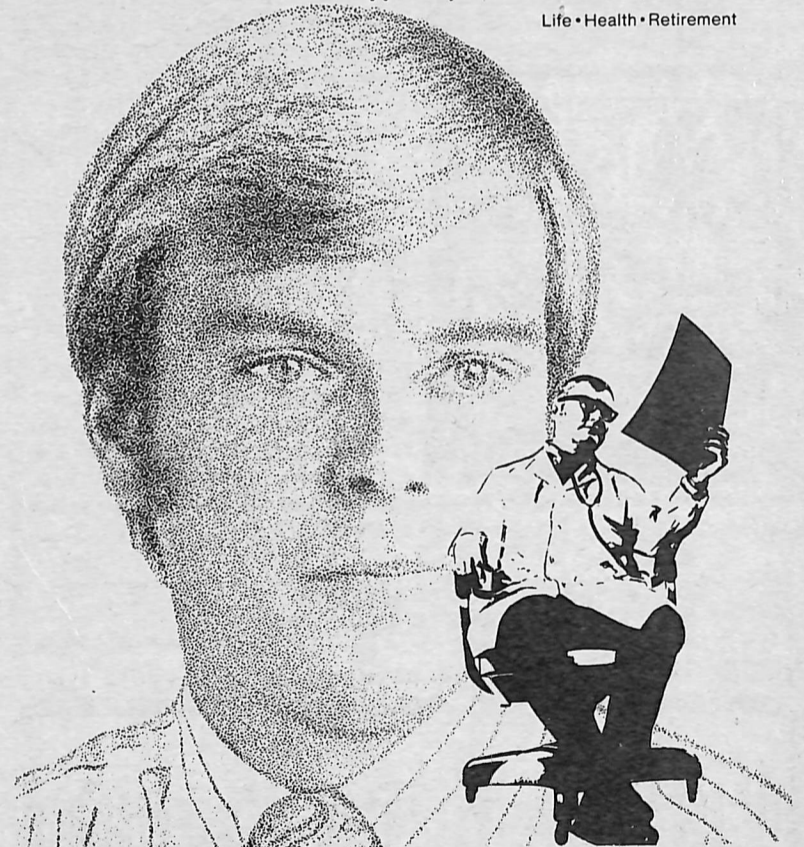
