### Speech/Theater Announce New Courses

Several new courses have been presented to the Educational Plans and Policies Committee during the last month for consideration for addition to the curriculum. The Speech and Theater Department suggested several changes and additions to their selection of classes.

Two new courses approved and to be offered in the coming semester are "Audio-Visual Workshop" and "Radio and T.V. Announcing". The Audio-Visual Workshop will be a two hour course with Mr. Anders as instructor. This is a course designed to provide the student and/or prospective teacher with the skills and necessary knowledge for effective audio-visual materials utilization. Students interested in the broad-

casting field will receive instruction in the use of radio and television equipment.

Radio and T. V. Announcing is a three hour course taught by Mr. Dibbon. Emphasis will be on voice and diction, foreign pronunciation, technical facilities in broadcasting, FCC rules and regulations, and the different types of broadcasting. The student will receive announcing experience in most phases of announcing, such as commercial announcements, disc jockey, sports, news, and T. V. narration and interviews.

Several other additional courses will be offered for the first time next fall. Courses on broadcasting and one on broadcast journalism will be offered.

At the present time much of the new equipment for the station has arrived. It will be several months before the studio is completed and all the equipment arrives, however. As yet no official word has been received concerning the call letters for the new station.

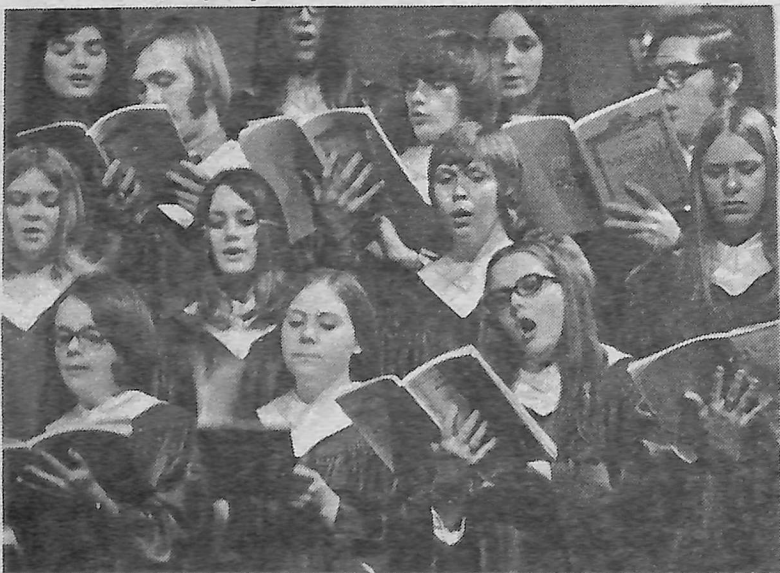
### Poll Reflects Dana Life

Last week, Dana College blew its cool when the Infamous Questionnaire appeared in the students' mailboxes. This survey concerns the current attitudes of Dana students. The questionnaire was put out by a task group in Fundamentals of Speech 111. The members are Rana Chapman, Ed Law, Lois Hansen, Shauna Spilde, Tim Johnson and Akira Onada. Seven-hundred questionnaires were sent out and three-hundred and fifty-two were returned. Here are the results on a percentage basis. Each of you can draw your own conclusions from them. (Note: Out of the 352 which answered the survey, 59.3% were females and 40.7% were males.)

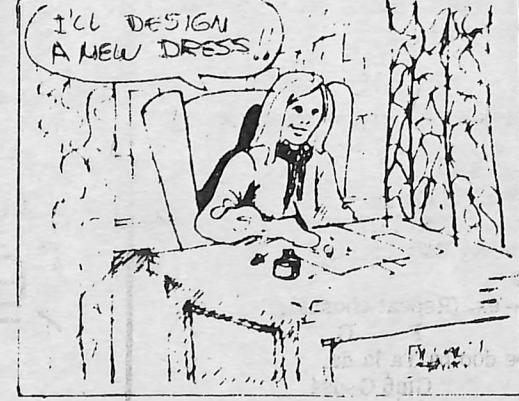
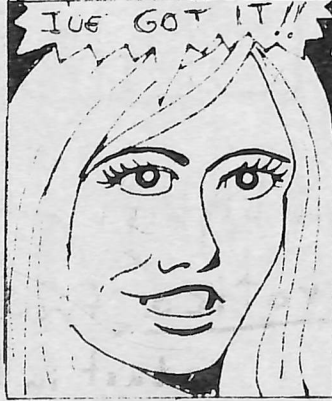
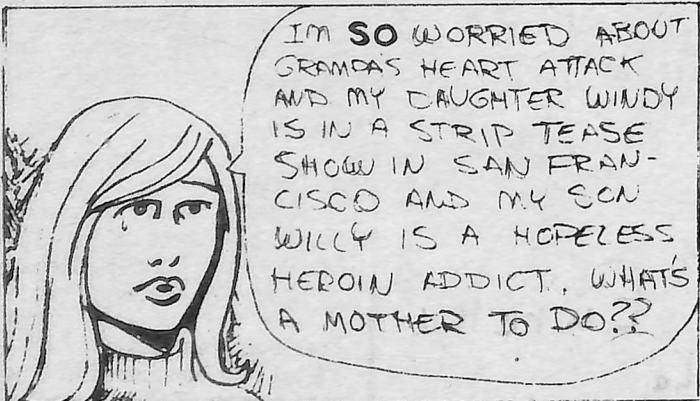


### Students Pop Off

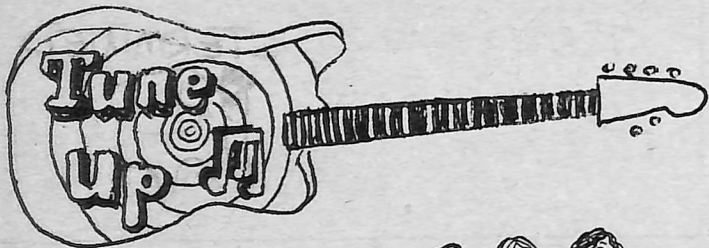

### Football Stats

Statistics released by the Nebraska Intercollegiate Athletic Conference showed that the Dana College Vikings were number one in total defense giving up a total of 1,795 yards -- an average of 199.4 yards a game. Dana was also number one in passing defense giving up 845 yards -- an average of 93.9 yards a game. Dana was second to Nebraska Wesleyan in rushing defense giving up 950 yards -- an average of 105.6 yards per game. Dana was also second only to Hastings in rushing offense.

On the NAIA District 11 (made up of all small colleges in Nebraska except for Nebraska Wesleyan and Fairbury Junior College) all conference first teams Dana had Phil Tegeler an offensive guard and Dan Smith a defensive halfback selected. The honorable mention team had four Vikings name to it. The four Vikings selected were: Kirk McLaughlin, Ron Schneider, Steve Hines, and Gary McMullin.

In the NAIA District 11 Dana was first in both pass and total defense, and second in rushing defense.

The Vikings strong defensive unit was ranked 28th in the nation by the NAIA.

### Lettermen Announced

Head football coach, Mr. Bob Simpson has awarded 34 football letters to outstanding Dana athletes after completing their most successful football campaign in nine years.

Of the 34 lettermen, 10 were seniors, 8 juniors; 8 sophomores, and 8 were freshmen.

Seniors obtaining letters were: Kirk McLaughlin, Bill Sorenson, Jim Uchtman, Gary McMullin, Luther Heller, Ralph Mayer, Rick Nash, Phil Tegeler, Mike Todd, and Mike Krivokucha.

Juniors receiving letters were: Mike Brady, Dan Smith, Mike Thompson, Steve Hardiman, Dave Jones, Bob Mawhiney, Steve Hines, and Hal Collett.

Sophomores letter winners were: Steve Woitock, Rick Mewhirter, Ron Schneider, Tom Otto, Don Heuring, Lew Houser, John Escher, and Gary Amole.

Receiving letters in this their freshmen year at Dana are: Terry Jensen, Rod Ramsey, Bryan Peterson, Ron Miller, Dave Larson, Bruce Wright, John Wakefield, and Terry Jobman.

### Vikes Set Marks

During the successful 1971 football season, the Dana College Vikings broke three football records on their way to a 5-4 season. Quarterback Kirk McLaughlin threw six touchdown passes breaking Ron Andersen's record of five set back in 1964.

Ron Schneider rushed for a 154 yards against Westmar College (October 2, 1971), breaking Greg Hayes' record of 131 yards also against Westmar (on September 27, 1969).

The Vikings have one record

which they wish they had not broken! The new record is the most penalty yards enforced against Dana in one game -- 94 yards against Nebraska Wesleyan on 10 penalties (September 11, 1971) breaking the old record of 91 set against Concordia on October 4, 1969.

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### ARS MEDICA

Dana College is proud to have Ars Medica Dana College's medical arts club, as one of its active organizations. Having been organized in the fall semester of 1970, Ars Medica's activities have been many.

The most recent activity occurred Friday, November 12th, when the organization visited the Clarkson Hospital. Some of the highlights were the touring of the cardiology ward, seeing the dialysis (artificial kidney) machine, the radiology treatment facilities and their extensive laboratory.

### Chapel Survey

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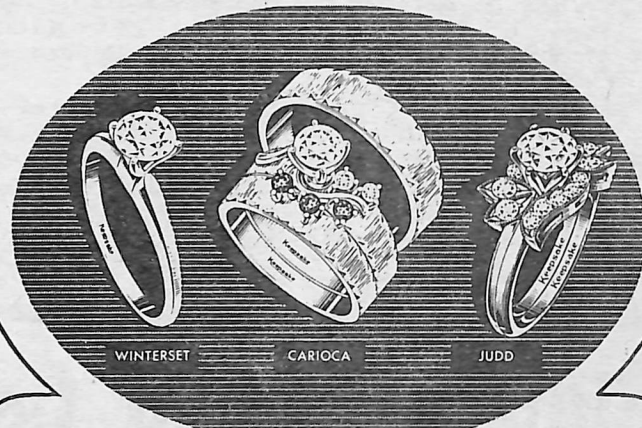
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# Dana Clouts Dordt 92-64

In their season opener last Tuesday night the Dana College Viking basketballers entertained Dordt College (from Sioux Center, Iowa) in a non-conference game. The Vikings beat the cold shooting Dordt squad by 24 points.

Coach Jerry Rainforth started Gary Bott at center; Gary Kratina and Terry Miner at the forward positions; and Tom Lauritsen and Bryan Traylor as the guards.

Dana started out red hot scoring the first three points of the contest before Dordt could get on the scoreboard. Traylor hit a free throw and Gary Bott hit a jump shot to account for the Vikings first three points.

With 15:20 left to play in the first half, Dordt called a time out with the Vikings holding a 14-5 lead. Whatever the Dordt coach said paid off because in the next 5 minutes Dordt held the Vikes to just 5 points while they poured 12 thru the hoop to make the score 19-17 in favor of the Vikings. During this stretch the Vikings weren't getting any rebounds and were

constantly rushing their shots.

At the 5:47 mark Dana held a slim 6 point lead 29-23. All of a sudden the Vikings caught fire and took a commanding 42-29 lead into the locker room.

Bryan Traylor got the Vikings off and running in the second half by scoring the first 4 points of the half. During the second half Dana steadily poured it on and at one time led Dordt by as many as 34 points but had to settle for a 28 point margin at the buzzer.

Dana made 36 of 76 attempts for a 47.3 shooting percent while Dordt made 29 of 99 attempts for 29%. The Vikings were just as effective at the free throw line cashing in on 20 out of 37 for 54%; while Dordt made 6 of 18 for 33%. Dordt did not rebound the Vikings 67-63.

The Vikings had three men in double figures: Terry Miner 19, Bryan Traylor 15, and Gary Kratina had 12. Dana scorers were: Mark Davis 4 points, Ed Johnson 4, Tom Lauritsen 6, Jerry Wilson 8, Gary Amole 4, Bill Hansen 6, Jim Huseman 8, Gary Bott 5, and Rick Plugge 1 point.

## Sports Shorts

The Dana College wrestling team opened the season on a victorious note, as they defeated the Doane Tigers 26-13 on December 1st.

The Vikings, led by Gary Gray, showed aggressiveness on the mat and really took it to the Tigers. Gray recorded the only Dana pin, as he pinned his man with 2:08 gone in the 2nd period, to give the Vikes a 12-0 lead. Ed Grube, a freshman, won his first collegiate match next, by destroying his man 18-4. Mike Todd ended up in a draw and Bill Kruse outclassed his man in winning 6-2. Nebraska Wesleyan trounced Midland to avoid finishing last in the three day tournament.

HASTINGS 102 DANA 62

In first round action last Thursday, December 2, Dana met a strong and quick Hastings College team and were defeated 102-62. The Broncos were very fast and well balanced as they jumped out to a 10-1 lead and were never headed again. Hastings shot a blistering 51% from the field (making 40 of 79) while Dana was frigid hitting 29% (23 of 79). Terry Miner and Brian Traylor led the Vikings with 10 points apiece.

DANA 91 MIDLAND 86

On Friday Dana played the Midland College Warriors in a consolation game, where they rallied twice from two deficits to down the Warriors 91-86. Under a barrage of 7 straight baskets by Warrior

guard, Herschel Hannah, Midland had a comfortable 16 point margin in the first 14 minutes of the contest.

With Midland leading 44-28, the Vikings made their first move. It was the work of Bill Hansen and Tom Lauritsen, that sent Dana into the locker room with a 48-44 lead. Midland had gone 5:43 without a point in 14 trips down the court. Dana scored 20 straight during the streak.

Right after halftime Midland quickly found the range and led by 9, 64-55. The Warriors once again went cold and the Vikings rushed back on top with only 6 minutes left in the game. Dana led by as many as 8 points and then coasted home.

Terry Miner once again led the Vikings in scoring with 18 points followed by Tom Lauritsen and Bill Hansen who scored 15 apiece.

LUTHER 97 DANA 88

In a battle for 5th place last Saturday afternoon Luther College (from Decorah, Iowa) rallied from a 13 point halftime deficit to defeat the Vikings 97-88.

In the first half Luther played a very deliberate game--going only for the open or "percentage shot". With 15:40 left in the first half and the score tied at 6 all, Dana slowly pulled away until they led 24-14 with 10:20 left in the half. Dana continued to get on the boards and with timely scoring led at the half 53-40.

Luther came out "shooting" in the second half - scoring the first 11 points of the half. In Luther's first 14 times down the court they had scored 25 points. The Norsemen shot a blistering 74% in the second half to down the Vikings. Luther used their height to out-rebound the Vikings 51-35.

High scorer in a losing effort for the Vikings was Tom Lauritsen with 22 points followed by Terry Miner and Bryan Traylor who each scored 18.

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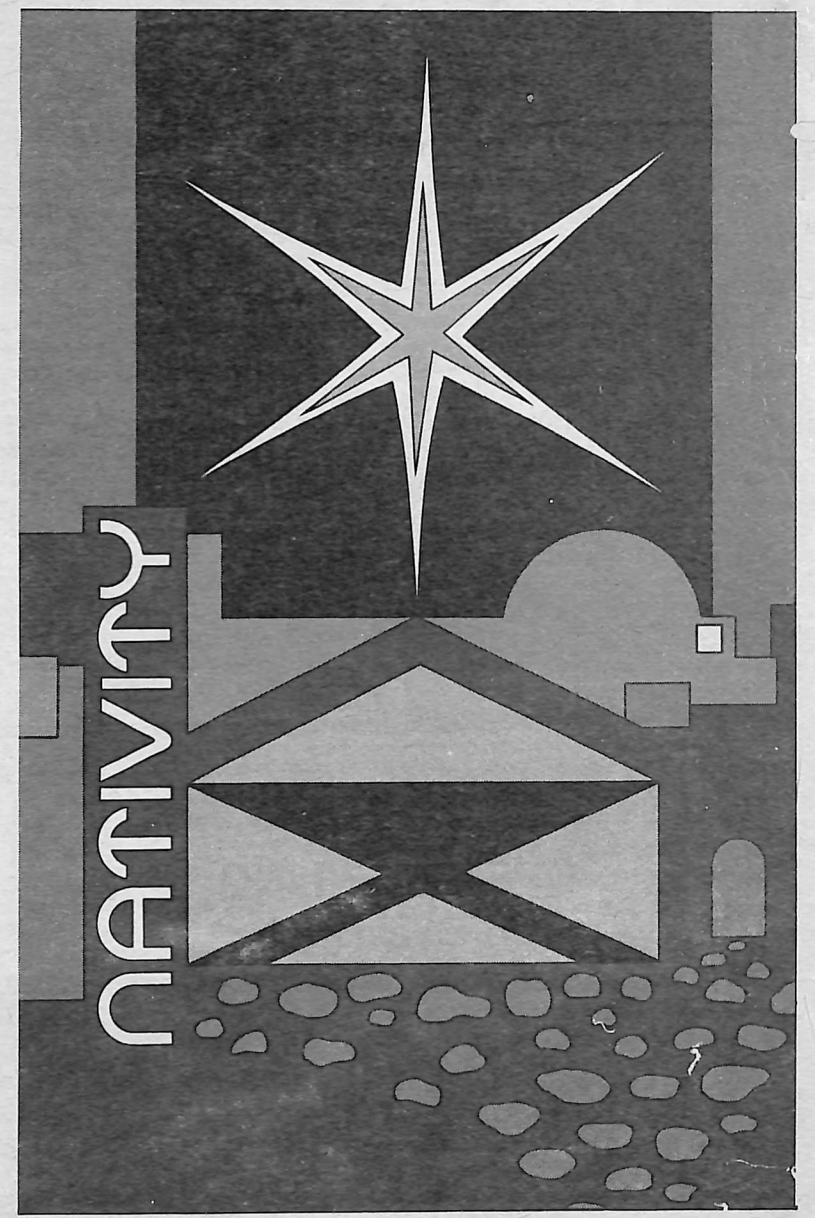
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
