The Dana College wrestling Vikings participated in the Midland Invitational Wrestling Tournament (held last Saturday on the Midland College campus) and came back to Blair with the championship trophy.

Dana's 73 team points edged Northeastern (69 1/2) and Midland (60 1/2). Briarcliff finished fourth with 38 points, John F.

Kennedy fifth (21) and Doane sixth (13).

The Vikings took 8 wrestlers of which 7 made the championship finals. In the preliminaries Stan Johnson pinned 2 opponents but then lost to Mike Blake (Midland) 2-0.

Each championship winner was awarded 10 points with 7 going to each second place finisher. One (1) point was awarded for each pin achieved and points were given for

each advancement a man made.

Dana had 4 (Four) first place finishers. They were Gary Gray 134, Ed Grubbe 142, Bill Kruse 167 and Phil Tegeler heavyweight. (By the way it was Phil's 1-0 overtime decision over Wayne Grothke of JFK that won the trophy for the Vikings.)

The Vikings had three (3) second place finishers who were Ron Beaman 150, Mike Todd 158 and Stan Johnson in the 190 weight class.

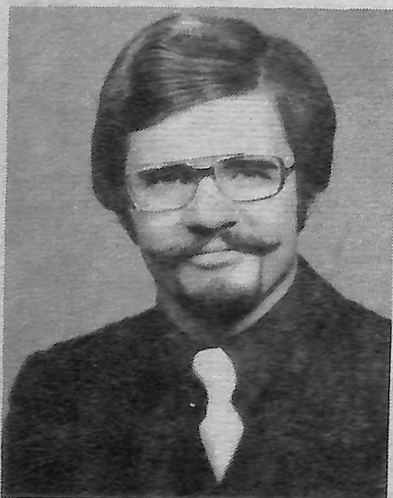
CHOIR GOES WEST

CHURCH COUNCIL REACHES OUT

The Church Council is discussing many new endorsements and plans for this semester. With the help of The Covenant Community, the student body and the administration, these plans may become realities in the very near future.

One of the new plans is that of student counseling. With the help of Pastor Bergstraesser and Dean Jorgensen, this may become a very helpful and useful service of the Church Council. It will apply transactional analysis, a theory used in counseling.

Initiating the "Adopt a Grandparent" program, the Church Council is hoping that many Dana students will take an interest in this unique and challenging program. It involves students spending time (approximately one to two hours a week) with elderly people in homes for the aged in Blair. It must be noted that once a student is in this program, he must

stay in it and plan on visiting at a regular basis; otherwise the program may cause more harm than good.

Other counseling programs planning to be used at Dana are draft counseling and regular visits from Planned Parenthood.

This semester the Church Council also plans on maintaining the "Half Breakfast" program at 9:30 Sunday morning, followed by the regular church service, with the emphasis on "Science and Religion" this semester.

Plans for a Goedesical chapel to be constructed soon are also in the making. Also in the blue prints are plans for better ministry facilities.

With all these plans in the making, the Church Council asks for your support in any way you can make it available. There are many things to be done; and with cooperative effort, all of these plans will become a reality at Dana.

LEGISLATURE PROPOSES

TUITION BILL

Dana students who are residents of Nebraska could get grants of up to \$1000 a year if a bill before the state legislature is passed.

LB 1171 which is sponsored by Senators George Syas of Omaha and E. Thone Johnson of Fremont is a Tuition Grant Program. The bill would grant students, who qualify, the difference between tuition at a state school and the independent college they may want to attend.

At the present time Iowa has such a program and legislators have termed it "the greatest educational bargain in the state."

The Tuition Grant Program will help make the tuition differential between independent and public colleges more equitable. This will enable the independent colleges such as Dana to attract more students. This will help the financial

squeeze on independent colleges brought on by decreasing enrollment. It will help the state because millions in tax dollars will no longer be needed for building and enlarging faculty at state schools. The independent schools such as Dana already have the facilities and staff to take care of many more students.

Students at independent colleges are finding the tuition gap between their school and state schools difficult to handle. Today the independent college student carries a financial burden twice as heavy as his public school counterparts.

Because all Nebraska students could be affected by the bill, they are urged to write to their state senators and ask them to support the Tuition Grant Program.

Dorm Council Rules On Intervisitation

During Interim the College Administration and Men and Women's Dorm Council agreed on an extension of the intervisitation policy. The visitation hours in men's dorms were extended to every Friday, Saturday and Sunday evenings from 8:00 p.m. to 12:00 midnight.

Women's dorms will be open for visitation on Friday and Saturday nights from 8 to 12 midnight.

A new system for visitation was introduced in the women's dorms which will cut down on unwanted visits to the floors by students with no one to specifically visit. An escort system is being tried in which a visitor must sign in at the main desk and then call the person he wishes to visit. The visitor is then escorted to the floor.

One policy that many wished to change was the ruling that doors remain open to rooms in which members of the opposite sex were visiting. Though many felt the rul-

ing was not needed, it will remain in effect. The College has defined "open" as a 45 degree angle or more.

Dana Sweeps Westmar Tourney

The Dana College Vikings for the first time this year "put it all together" and came away with the Westmar (College) Invitational Basketball Tournament championship.

In first round action Dana pulled away from the Dakota State Trojans in the second half; and recorded a 69-48 decision. In the championship game Dana blitzed the host Eagles in the second half and raced to a relatively easy 82-66 victory.

The 82-66 win over Westmar in their own invitational tournament (championship) ended a long Dana dry spell in tourney competition.

The Dana College Vikings put on a phenominal shooting exhibition in the 2nd half and blitzed the host Westmar College Eagles 82-66. In the second half Dana shot 68% from the field (making 15 of 22 attempts) and did an equally good job from the charity stripe cashing in on 20 of 25 attempts good for 80%.

Ed Johnson got the opening tip and fed Bryan Traylor and the Vikings led 2-0. Bryan then cashed in two free throws and Dana quickly led 4-2. Dana's last lead of the first half was at the 15:00 minute mark with the Vikings holding on to a slim 9-8 lead.

Westmar in the first half had the Vikings down twice by five points and once by six. The Vikings were assessed with two technical fouls,

one each on Tom Lauritsen and Coach Rainforth. Dana came back on 5 points by Dennis Riley near the end of the half and trailed the hosts by 1, 33-32.

In the second half Westmar jumped out to a quick 42-36 lead before the Vikings made their move. On a Tom Lauritsen basket the Vikings forged a 46 all tie. With 13:00 minutes left to play Gary Bott sank a free throw to give Dana a 47-46 lead, one which they never relinquished for the rest of the game.

Dana kept pulling away and they had their biggest lead of the game by 19, 77-58, with 2:16 left to play. The Vikings then laid back and settled for their 16 point victory margin.

Dana Loses Thriller To Hastings In Overtime, 81-78

Last Saturday night the Dana College Vikings lost a Nebraska Intercollegiate Athletic Conference game to the visiting Hastings College Broncos in overtime 81-78. The Vikings played a completely different game against Hastings (a team which they lost to 102-62 earlier in the season).

Dana's apparent success was their ability to take away Hastings fast break, which they could not do in their earlier meeting.

On Denny Riley's bucket the Vikings were able to forge a 2 all tie early in the game. From there on Dana looked as if they would blow the Broncos right out of Blair as they jumped to a quick 15-6 lead. The Broncos kept pegging away and forged a 20 all tie. On Bryan Traylor's 2 free throws and a basket the Vikings were back on top 25-22. Hastings once again made a spirited comeback and forced the Vikings into a 36-34 lead at the half.

After the intermission Hastings quickly had the Vikings down by 7,

49-42. Dana did not give up as they kept working and at the 5:56 mark forged a 62 all deadlock. Hastings then took a 1 point lead before Dana came back and at one time led 68-64 with 3:37 left in regulation time. Hastings once again came back and forged a 70 all tie at the 2:46 mark. The Broncos called time with 1:34 left and went into a stall. Dana's defense arose to the occasion and didn't allow the Broncos a shot before going into the 5 minute overtime session tied at 70 all.

In the overtime it was all Hastings as they outscored the Vikings 11-8. Dana in the overtime period was paced by Bryan Traylor's 6 points. A technical on the Dana bench with 2 seconds to go really put the game out of reach for the Vikings.

After that, Stan Johnson wrestled an excellent match at 177. He pinned his man with 1:38 gone in the second period. Dean Ness followed by winning a well-fought match 11-4. Dean was in complete control throughout the match. Phil Tegeler finished up the victorious night for the Vikings by beating his man 4-0. That made the final score 33-15 in favor of the Vikings.

WESLEYAN ROARS PAST
DANA 78-55

The Dana College Vikings traveled to Lincoln, Nebraska last Tuesday to play a game against the NIAC conference leaders - the Nebraska Wesleyan University Plainsmen. Wesleyan literally ran right past the Vikings and defeated us 78-55.

Dana was defeated in the first 7:36 of the contest. Wesleyan in that time scored 16 points while holding the Vikings scoreless. Finally Tom Lauritsen hit a jumper that put Dana on the scoreboard. Dana warmed up considerably and trailed the Plainsmen 36-24 at the half.

The second half was no better for the Vikings as Wesleyan just

kept running and scoring. With 12:17 left to play the Plainsmen had a 20 point lead, 56-36. Dana, handicapped by their cold shooting and ball handling errors, just could not put it all together.

For the game Dana made 20 of 59 field goal attempts for 34% while Wesleyan made 33 of 69 for 48%. From the charity stripe the Vikings made 15 of 21 attempts for 71% while Wesleyan made 12 of 20 good for 60%. Dana was badly beaten on the boards by the Plainsmen 50-39.

At the Desert Museum, a natural history institution 14 miles west of Tucson, the ecology class of eight on a field trip from Nebraska was able to study living exhibits

of the flora and fauna of the great Sonoran Desert. In addition to the Desert Museum, the Nebraskans traveled to Organ Pipe National Monument in southwest Arizona south of Ajo and then crossed over into California, where they also visited the Anza Borrego Desert State Park south of Indio and the Joshua Tree National Monument near Twenty-nine Palms. In addition, they also took in the Imperial National Wildlife Refuge, which straddles the Colorado river north of Yuma on both the Arizona and California sides.

Although founded as an capella choir, the Dana Choir will use special accompaniment with several numbers in Sunday's concert. Three guitars will be used in the groups interpretation of "Lonely People" by Jean Berger; a brass ensemble will be featured in "At the Lamb's High Feast" by Walter Pelz; and Dr. Alan Brandes of the Dana Music Department will provide organ accompaniment for several numbers including the "Epiphany Alleluias" by John Weaver.

Two familiar spirituals have been

selected for the February 6 concert including "Got a Home in that Rock" and "Ev'ry Time I Feel de Spirit".

The February 6 home concert at Dana is the only locally scheduled appearance by the group. The choir recently returned to Blair from a 4-week concert tour to the West coast. Dana Leads NIAC In Free Throw Accuracy

The Dana College Vikings are leading the Nebraska Intercollegiate Athletic Conference with a team free throw percentage of .668 (making 304 of 455) in the recently released stats from headquarters in Lincoln. Closely following the Vikings are: Concordia with a .667 mark and Hastings with .662.

Bryan Traylor was third in individual scoring with 245 total points good for 17.5 points per game. Bryan trails Sweeny of Midland (who is the individual leader) by three tenths of a points.

Traylor is in fifth place shooting 500 making 81 of 163 attempts from the floor. As a team the Vikings are third in the field goal percentage race making 386 of 905 attempts for a .429 percent average.

As a team the Vikings are third in the rebounding tussle. After 14 games they have pulled down 743 good for a 53.1 average per game.

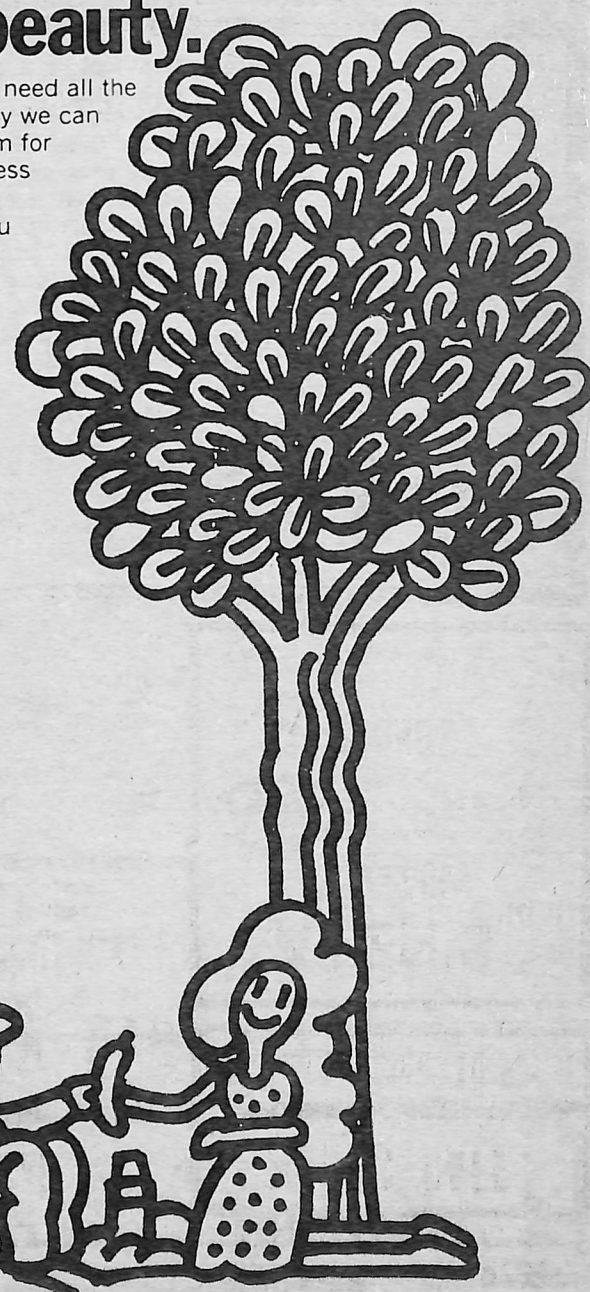
