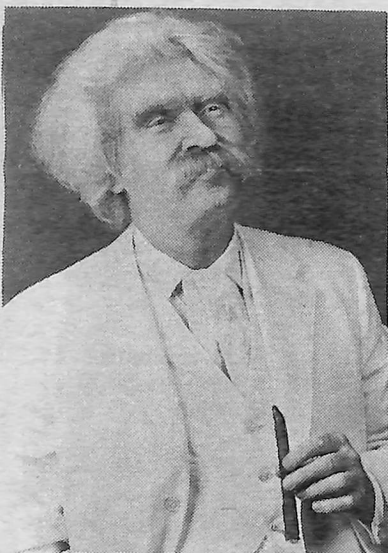

HEALTH BILLS CHALLENGE

Are you willing to have your child without your knowledge or consent examined, given medicine and treatment for venereal disease? . . . or, for "any disease or other medical condition"? . . . by someone not a physician? . . . by someone who would be immune from civil and criminal prosecution if the medicine he prescribes reacts to injure or kill your child?

Two Bills now before the Nebraska Legislature would permit the examination, prescription of medicine and treatment of minor children without their parent's knowledge or consent. One, LB 1096, would permit such medical care in venereal disease cases. The other, LB 1302, would permit such care for "any disease or other medical condition." In certain respects the bills are identical:

1. The examination, prescription of medicine and treatment may be done by a person who is not a physician but merely the "agent" of the State or local director of health;
2. The examination, prescription and treatment may be given without the knowledge or consent of the minor child's parents (or legal guardian); even after the treatment the parent need not be informed;
3. No matter how young, the minor child would be empowered to consent to such examination, medication and treatment; the child's consent need not be in writing, nor witnessed, nor even be an affirmative act; the child's failure to object could be taken as consent under the legal maxim that silence shows consent;
4. No doubt the health authorities would approach school

children to submit themselves to such examination, medication and treatment; no safeguards are provided for children who submit; there is no appeal from the "agent's" decision that a child has venereal disease, nor any way to vindicate the child if the "agent" is wrong, nor any protection for the child's mental health or reputation;

5. If the medicine prescribed reacts adversely to injure or kill the child, no civil or criminal suit can be maintained against the "agent" if the child was carefully questioned about sensitivity to medicine or previous adverse reaction to medicine; the child need not be questioned about the type of medicine he is already taking nor about any other illnesses he has or had; the "agent" is permitted to gamble -- prosecution free -- with the child's health and life.

Present law requires parents to support their children and to provide them with medical care when needed. It is a criminal offense for parents to fail to provide medical care for their minor children. Parents have the right to select who will care medically for their children. Except in a dire emergency no one is permitted to examine, prescribe medicine for or treat a minor child medically without the parent's consent. These rights protect the child and the parents.

What can you do about this? LB 1096 has already been passed by the State Legislature. You can write to Governor Exon asking him to veto that Bill. You can write to any or all of the Representatives in the Nebraska State Legislature urging them to vote against LB 1302. Further information can be obtained from Theresa Walsh.

Schwalbachs To Present Scandinavian Design Lecture

On Friday, March 10 at 8:00 P.M. in DHA, James A. and Mathilda V. Schwalbach will present a joint lecture on Scandinavian Design: 1930 - 1970. The presentations will employ two projectors and screens, as well as audio equipment.

Professor Mathilda Vandenberg Schwalbach is a professor in the Department of Related Art at the

University of Wisconsin. She is a textile designer and has co-authored, with her husband, a book on serigraphy and textile designing.

Professor James A. Schwalbach is a professor in the Department of Art of the University of Wisconsin Center System.

The Schwalbachs have collaborated on many lectures concerning Contemporary Scandinavian Design in the Midwest. The lectures are based on a fourteen month study of Scandinavian design. Museums, schools, industries, craft studios, exhibitions and related organizations were visited and studied.



NIAC Champs Down Vikes

Doane Whips Dana In Season Finale

The Dana College Vikings ended up their season on a rather sour note as they lost their 5th game in a row to leave them with a 3-7 NIAC mark and a 8-18 overall record.

Dana journeyed to Doane to have a rematch with the (already) conference champs, the Doane Tigers. The host Tigers used a phenomenal shooting advantage in the second half to register a 81-62 victory.

The first half was nip-and-tuck with neither team opening up (or being able to hold) a lead. With 12 minutes left in the half the score was tied at 12 all. Doane then opened up a 7 point lead (21-14) before the Vikings tied at 30 all

with 15 seconds left to play. On Alfredo Mayer's basket the Tigers took a 32-30 lead at the intermission.

Doane put the game out of reach for the Vikings in the first 12 minutes of the second half. During this time span the Tigers made 12 of 15 shots from the field to take a commanding 15 point lead; and they were well on their way to victory.

From the field Dana made 24 of 56 for 43% while Doane made 32 of 66 for 49%. At the charity stripe the Vikings made 14 of 20 for 70% while the Tigers made of 17 of 20 for 85%. Surprising as it may seem, the taller Tigers out re-

bounded the Vikings by only one, 38-37.

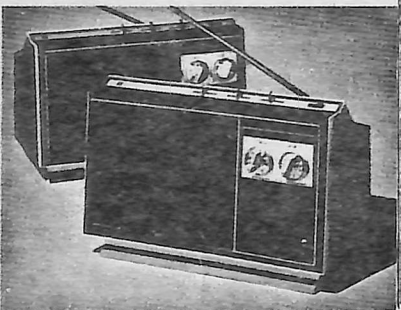

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
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MIDLAND AVENGES DANA DEFEATS

The Dana College Vikings traveled to Fremont last Saturday night with hopes of beating our arch rival the Midland College Warriors for the third time this season; but Midland was red hot in the second half and rolled past the Vikings 89-65. With the loss the Vikings' Nebraska Intercollegiate Athletic Conference record fell to 3-6 and 8-17 overall.

Midland started out by scoring six quick points and with 16:45 left the Vikings called a time out after Denny Riley had scored to make it 6-2 in favor of the Warriors. Dana forged an 8 all tie behind Tom Lauritsen's bucket and Brya... Traylor's bucket and two free throws. The Vikings took what turned out to be their one and only lead of the game when Bill Hansen hit a free throw and Dana led 9-8. Dana kept fighting an uphill battle and forged another tie (at 16 all) with 9:17 left in the first half. Midland quickly broke the tie and with 2:38 left had the Vikings down by 10, 31-21. In the last few minutes of the half Dana outscored the Warriors 8-2 to trail by 4, 33-29 at the half.

In the second half the Warriors behind Kermit Sweeny and Vern

Banks outscored the Vikings by 20 to pin a 24 point loss on the Vikings.

From the field Midland made 38 of 78 for 49% compared to Dana's 21 of 52 for 49%. At the charity stripe the Vikings made 23 of 39 attempts for 59% while the Warriors were cashing in on 13 of 26 attempts for 50%. Midland outrebounded the Vikings 53-47.
