

# Mezoff Discusses Dana's Financial Condition

In an all-campus meeting held Wednesday at 10:30, Dr. Mezoff "told it like it was", (to coin an old cliché), and presented substantial financial statistics to squelch spreading rumors concerning tuition raises, faculty cuts, the future of Dana, and the like. The *Hermes* would like to take the time now to summarize Dr. Mezoff's talk and present his statistics for the benefit of those who were unable to attend.

The first point emphasized by Dr. Mezoff was that, contrary to popular rumor, Dana was not making a drastic cut in its faculty and administrative staff. The full-

time faculty for next year should be the same size as the present faculty. The members of the faculty for 1971-72 number 45. This is the projected size for 1972-73. The number may be 44, but only because of the possible retirement of one faculty member. The only decrease as far as specific departments is concerned will be in the speech-communications department.

The second point Dr. Mezoff stressed was that Dana is "NOT going to lock its doors and sell out" as wild talk would have it. This is far from the case. Although the projected enrollment for next

year is only 650, a drop of 70 from this year, Dr. Mezoff considers this a "natural drop" and only a temporary problem. According to him, there will be as many graduating this year as were admitted last fall.

Along this same line, Dr. Mezoff announced the initiation of several new programs, which he claims, would not even be in the offing if the financial condition of Dana was as serious as rumor says it is. Among the new programs will be social work (full time faculty member), special education, recreation education, and broadcast journalism. In addition, equipment for Dana's own FM radio station is almost completely installed, and a computer will begin operation this fall.

The students can draw their own conclusions from the following statistics. Dr. Mezoff considers Dana to be in "fine fiscal shape", despite its temporary problems. Compared to other private Nebraska colleges, Dana is the only institution to have a balanced budget. Other private colleges in Nebraska have been operating in the red for 6 or 7 years now. But to keep this balanced budget, if tuition costs are to be kept minimal, other means of raising money must be found. Dr. Mezoff suggested several. One would be to demand that junior boys live on campus. A second would be to increase the enrollment. One possibility which he strongly recommended is that all students, before going home for Easter, check with the admissions office to see which students are considering Dana from their home town, and then contact these prospective students, encouraging them to come to Dana. He is open to other suggestions, and is willing to discuss any aspect of his presentation with anyone.

## Regents Hold Spring Session

The Dana College Board of Regents will meet on campus beginning on Wednesday, March 22. The meetings will begin with the Student-Faculty-Board Fellowship on Wednesday evening at 8 p.m. in the Dining Room of the Campus Center. All faculty and staff are invited to attend together with their spouses. Times for direct Student-Board consultations have not yet been announced. The Board Meetings will conclude Friday afternoon.

## Dana Debate: "Issues of '72"

The debate of the century is taking shape as the Dana Forum and the Dana College Young Republicans prepare for a joint all-campus event next Thursday evening. "Republicans and Democrat: The Issues of 1972" will be the subject of the debate and discussion Thursday evening at 8 p.m. in the Blue Room of the Campus Center. Steve Tiwald, Nebraska Campus organizer for Senator George McGovern, and Chuck Hagel, an aide to Nebraska Congressman John

McCollister, will present and debate some of the major issues before the American Voter in 1972. All students and faculty are more than welcome to attend and ask questions and voice their opinions about the coming elections, politics or any other pertinent problems. After the presentation the audience will be invited to discuss these issues with the party representatives and those in the audience. Refreshments will be served and Humanities credit will be given.

Letter To The Editors

March 13, 1972

The Editors, THE HERMES  
 Dana College  
 Blair, Nebraska 68008

Gentlemen:

I read a column in your March 10, 1972 issue titled "Letters to Klyde" written by your staff member, Mr. Eric Evans. Mr. Evans's remarks rather surprised me because I have never before written to THE HERMES, nor to or about Mr. Evans nor to my knowledge have I ever said or done anything to him.

Enclosed herewith is documentation which shows:

1. I did not vote for or support George Wallace in the 1968 election (nor have I done so at any time since).

2. I joined the American Party (as it is called in Nebraska) in June, 1969, not to get on the Wallace team but to convert the American Party into a Christian political vehicle, into a Christian political party. I urged this idea in my book, A Christian Political Party - Now!, which has been called a "Christian Political Manifesto".

3. I fought the Wallace elements in the American Party.

4. While I was running for Governor of Nebraska in 1970 as the American Party candidate, George Wallace was running for Governor of Alabama as the Democratic candidate.

5. In 1970 I predicted that George Wallace would abandon the American Party and would run to get the Democratic Party's nomination for Vice-President in 1972.

6. I ran a responsible campaign. I invited Blacks to join the American Party. I made constructive legislative proposals which are receiving favorable consideration today.

7. In 1971 I re-registered as an Independent (although the American Party survived the election of 1970 in the county where I live). I am still working on Christian political action.

In all fairness I request that this letter and my 1970 campaign statement be published in their entirety in the next issue of THE HERMES. Also, I ask that the enclosed documentation be made available to interested readers at your editorial offices.

Those who believe that Jesus Christ is God also believe that the future belongs to Christ, and that a Christian social order and a Christian Renaissance will come in America. We are working for that day.

America was once a great Christian nation. But we Americans came to exclude Jesus Christ from her public life, and then we came to exclude God altogether. Today America is a pagan nation. Pagan America has lost the vision of what the life of man should be. Pagans have no faith, and men without faith have no vision, and without vision the people perish. America has been paganized over the past 70 years by the decisions of her Democratic and Republican politicians: the decision of her judges, legislators and public executives. If America is to regain her national health, her moral courage, her goodness, her greatness, her vision, America must become Christian again. "Without Me," says Jesus Christ, "you can do nothing." If she is to become Christian again, America must have judges, legislators and public executives who will make political decisions favorable to, not against Christianity.

The time has come to restore Jesus Christ to the center of American life, public and private. Unless America returns to Jesus Christ she will surely die, and goodness and greatness on this continent will die with her.

The great destiny of the American Party is to be a Christian political party. It is the great opportunity of the American Party in Nebraska to show the way in this. The American Party of Nebraska dedicates itself to the task of beginning the process of re-Christianizing America, of righting the relationships which have become confused in America because God and His Revelation have been ignored, of saving America by helping her to return to Jesus Christ Who alone can save her.

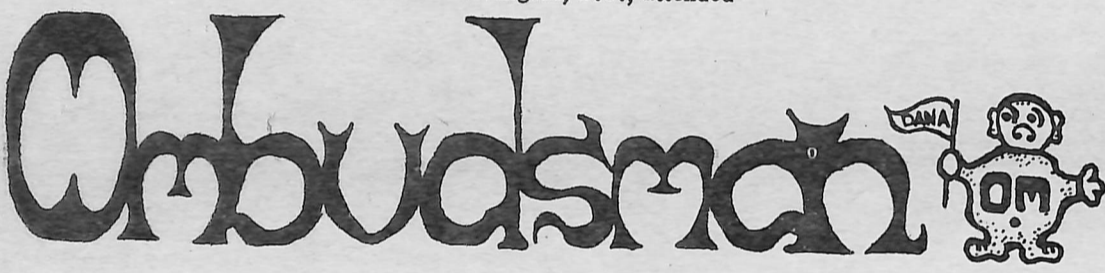

"We'd love to be bothered" commented Mr. Richard Showers recently as he discussed the re-orientation of admissions policy and operations which has come about since he joined the Dana staff two months ago. Mr. Showers was referring to his belief that the best admissions personnel that a college can have are the students that are presently attending it. Dana is facing the same situation that every other college is competing against. That is the decline in enrollment due to students enrolling in technical schools, junior colleges, entering the service, etc. With the increased admissions personnel and an expanded admissions program the future enrollment trends for Dana give reason for optimism. Buy one way to insure this optimism and help increase enrollment and thus bring benefits to all of the students has not been

tried. At the present time the admissions office has the names of literally hundreds of prospective students from all over the country. All students are urged to stop in the admissions office before they return home for Easter vacation and pick up the names of prospective students near their home towns. During vacation students could call these people and discuss Dana with them and answer any questions the prospective student might have. With current applications running about 15% behind last year the few minutes students devote to contacting potential students could easily carry the college over its goal of approximately 300 new students next year. The Athletic Department at Dana College has released the Baseball schedule for this coming spring. The 1972 edition presents another severe undertaking as it shows 33 scheduled games against some very outstanding teams. Once again the Vikings will swing south in late March and early April to get some seasoning against 4 different teams in Oklahoma and 2 in Kansas. Some area non-conference games and of course the Nebraska Intercollegiate Athletic Conference games add to the interest of the schedule.

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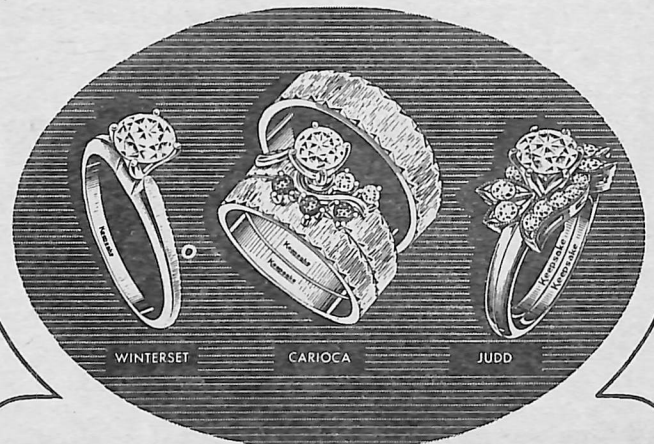
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## Dana Hopes Bright As Baseball Opens

Baseball practice at Dana College is well underway despite cold weather outdoors with pitching and hitting getting all the attention. The Vikings have facilities indoors appropriate for plenty of hitting and pitching, inside a long batting net, and they will continue with this kind of workout until the weather breaks. Conditioning gets a priority call too.

Dana comes off a very fine 1971 season in which they won their 3rd straight conference championship, the Tri-State in 1969 and the new Nebraska Intercollegiate the past 2 years. The Vikings won 22 and lost 11 regular season games, 9 and 1 in the NIAC. Eleven lettermen and several promising newcomers give strong hopes for another good year despite some key losses from graduation. All-conference choices Phil Facendola (c), Brian Moerer (3b) and Jeff Maddocks (p) as well as Dan Jackson (p-rf), Paul Toole (p) and Craig Moran (2b) leave big questions. Facendola was also an all-district #11 NAIA pick. A fourth pitcher, and centerfielder, Keith Overbeck, dropped out of school along with shortstop Mike Trip-tow, and reserve outfielder Dane Meuschke graduated. Overbeck was drafted by the Cincinnati Reds in the January draft.

Things pick up, however, at the mention of all-conference and all-district #11 pitcher Steve Rines, the comeback of injured Mike Brady (p), several new hurlers, and the expected hitting potential of the squad. Juniors Hines and Brady, both southpaws, will prob-

### VIKINGS ON N.I.A.C. TEAM

The Nebraska Intercollegiate Athletic All-conference first and second teams were released from conference headquarters in Lincoln earlier this week.

Dana placed two starters on the all-conference second team. Sophomore, Bryan Traylor and junior, Tom Lauritsen were both named to that elite team.

Bryan was second (only to Midland's Kermitt Sweeny 18.1) in individual scoring in the conference this season, he pumped in 459 points (a school record) for a 17.7 average. He was fourth in field goal percentage shooting where on the year he made 149 of 292 attempts for a .511 average.

For the year Tom scored 393 points, averaging 15.1 a game. Tom shot a respectable 37.8% from the field making 136 of 360 attempts. From the charity stripe he shot a blistering 71.6%; making 121 of 169 attempts.

ably head the pitching corps. Hines was 6 and 3 last year and had 87 strikeouts in 57 innings plus one no-hitter. The big (6-3, 215 lbs) lefty from Cedar Rapids, Iowa is being closely watched by professional scouts. Pitching pluses are expected to come from freshmen Paul Haack, another lefty, Walt Schacht, Terry Jensen and Rick Waite. Senior Kirk McLaughlin, a full time outfielder, is also impressive on the mound, and Junior Gary Bott should add depth there as well. Sophomore outfielder Jerry Wilson may also help out.

Hitting punch for the Vikes should come from shortstop Bryan

Traylor, first baseman Tom Lauritsen, McLaughlin, Wilson, Bott, outfielder-second baseman Steve Woitock and two or three freshmen.
