KDCV is on the air, broadcasting daily from the stack of Pioneer Memorial. Dana's F.M. station is located at 91.1 on your dial. The new educational station will serve as the broadcast voice for Dana and Blair.

Station Engineer, Arvin Hernes; Program Director, Darrell Dibben; and Station manager John

Northwall have spent the summer building the station, installing and testing equipment and readying it for broadcast.

All equipment is Ampex which is top quality. The studio has several tape players, two turn tables and two microphones. Mr. Hernes, station engineer, notes that the station has a range of more than 10 miles which encompasses much of Wash-

ington County.

At the present time KDCV is broadcasting two hours per day. It is hoped that by October broadcasting can begin on a full time basis. Still needed, to make full time broadcasting possible, are news reporters and disc jockeys. Anyone interested in working at the station should contact Station Manager Dibben.

Six new staff members have been added to Dana's teaching staff this fall. The new appointees include: Mr. Donald V. Pearson, Instructor in social work; Mr. Jack Beal, assistant professor of mathematics; Mrs. Marie Christian, part-time instructor in art; Mr. and Mrs. Olav Ballisager, instructors in physical education and the Reverend Lothar Pietz, campus pastor.

Mr. Donald Pearson comes to Dana from the Office of Lutheran Social Services in Kansas and Oklahoma. He is a graduate of Augustana College, Rock Island, Illinois and Washington University St. Louis. He is married and the father of three children.

Returning to the campus this fall following a 3-year leave is Mr. Jack Beal, assistant profes-

sor of mathematics. Mr. Beal has completed the requirements for the Ph. D. degree and will receive his doctorate in secondary education and mathematics from the University of Nebraska later this month.

Mrs. Marie Christian, well known Omaha-area artist, will join the Dana art department as a part-time instructor. She will teach

Mrs. Christian, in addition to being a freelance commercial artist, has taught courses at Joslyn Art Museum and has been associated with Galley Advertising Agency and the Mangamele Interiors, both of Omaha. She attended the University of Nebraska at Omaha.

A 1972 graduate of Dana, Larry Knudsen of Northfield, Minnesota has joined the staff as an Admissions Counselor. Knudsen will

Neihardt... "The Creative Flame"

Nebraska's poet laureate, John G. Neihardt, will visit Dana on Thursday, October 5, to participate in a totally different kind of program -- one which has never before been presented.

Entitled "Neihardt: The Creative Flame," the program is scheduled for 8 p.m. in Borup and will feature readings and commentary by Neihardt; illustrations of his work created by F.W. Thomsen of the Art Department and original mood music composed and performed by Dr. Alan Brandes.

Neihardt will read and comment from two of his writings, "Black Elk Speaks" and "Twilight of the Sioux." Coincidentally, his new book, "All Is But Beginning" will be released at the same time and copies of this new edition will be on sale in Borup that night. The book is the first volume of Neihardt's autobiography with an introduction by the well known television personality, Dick Cavett. Dr. Neihardt has agreed to autograph all copies of this new publication purchased on that evening.

Accompanying Neihardt's reading and commentary will be color illustrations of the text created by our own F.W. Thomsen. The illustrations will be projected onto a large screen in Borup and synchronized with the reading and commentary. The program culminates months of work by Professor Thomsen in capturing the symbolic spirit of the writings of Nei-

hardt and is the first time the illustrations have been shown publicly.

To further add to the uniqueness of the evening, Dr. Brandes has created and will perform brief musical interludes which are designed to create the proper atmosphere for the art work and readings. Special lighting effects are being prepared by Mr. Hennenman of the Drama Department.

His speech is entitled, "The Literary Scene in Contemporary Denmark."

The Rev. H.C. Holm will give a speech entitled "The Scandinavian Church in the Seventies" on October 4, and Dr. Carlo Christensen will lecture about Kaj Munk on October 9.

There is free admission to all the lectures.

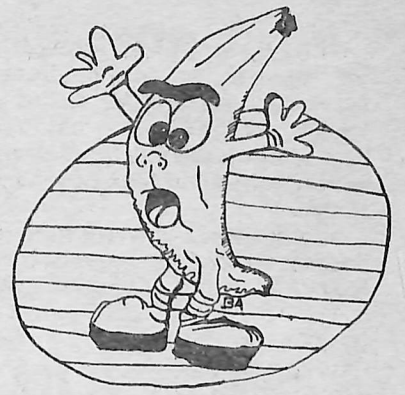
Young Democrats Organize

Nips Dana

Sioux Falls College scored its only touchdown in the fourth quarter to down the Dana College football team 10-6, last Saturday in Sioux Falls, South Dakota.

Coach Bob Simpson's Vikings had taken a 6-0 lead when Junior Steve Woitock ran thirty yards for the first score of the game in the second period. However, Sioux Falls scored on a thirty-one yard field goal by Rick Danmeier in the third quarter and on a sixty-yard pass reception by Ron Stone in the final period.

The Vikings actually gained 257 yards to the 247 yards of Sioux Falls, but committed twice as many turnovers, losing the ball on two interceptions and two fumbles while the victors lost the ball through mistakes only two times total.

The Dana Vikings will play their first home football game of the 1972 season on Saturday, September 23 against Westmar College at 2 p.m. on Viking Field on the Dana College Campus. The team will be trying for its first win in its effort to better last year's record of five wins and four losses (2-3 in the league.)

Mr. Frank Hengeveld of the Chemistry dept. has been awarded a Health, Education and Welfare Department grant in the amount of \$9,777.00.

The grant, awarded by the Environmental Protection Agency of H.E.W. is for the study of data points in a quartersulfate sulfite

system. The project will develop data necessary in the start-up phase of a TVA ammonia scrubber pilot plant for the removal of sulfur dioxide from stock gasses. Hengeveld has spent a considerable portion of the summer working on the project.

19 Lettermen Return

Nova 1220 Computes

A new instructional computer, the "Nova 1220", known as a "mini-computer," was put into operation at Dana with the beginning of this semester. Dr. Emmerich of the English department is now also serving as Director of our Computer Center. According to Dr. Emmerich, the Nova 1220 is most easily used for computation of the kind done in science, math, and the social sciences.

The computer will be also used by several departments to stimulate conditions and situations which are too expensive or too dangerous to conduct. For example, the Business Administration Department has already completed a program which will stimulate a super market and through the use of the computer, students will be able to determine such things as how much money is spent on advertising, etc. With this information, they will be able to gain experience in making managerial decisions. Another application of the computer will be in the area of biology where students will be able to gather the same information as would be received by conducting lengthy experiments in the laboratory.

The computer was made possible through a grant to Dana College from Lutheran Brotherhood Insurance of Minneapolis and is located in DH 210. If you haven't used it yet, try it. You'll like it.

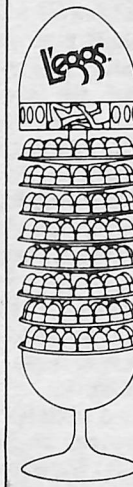

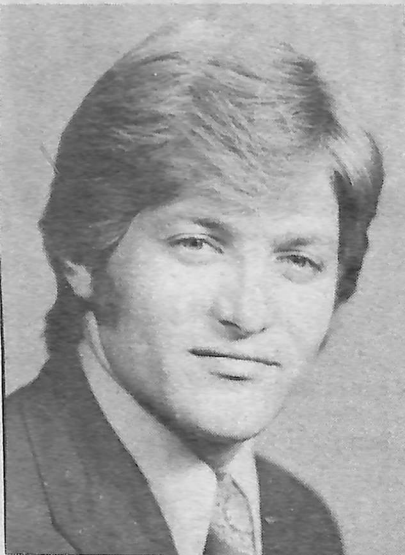
Free Movies in October

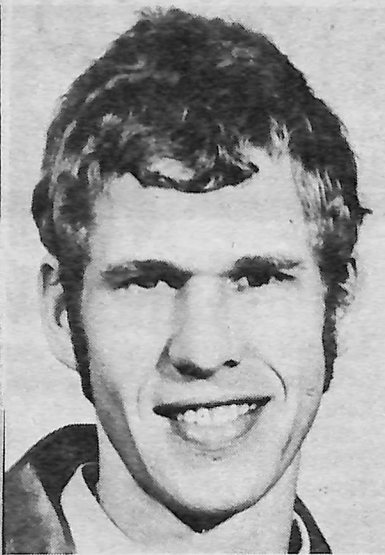
Dana will receive the six Pioneers of Modern Painting films on loan, free of charge, from the National Gallery of Art in Washington, under a program offered through the Gallery's Extension Service.

The distribution of Pioneers of Modern Painting has been made possible by a grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities. This service follows the pattern of the Extension Service's distribution of Civilization, Lord Clark's previous highly acclaimed film series, which has now been viewed on more than 600 campuses and their communities.

The new series covers the life and works of six leading artists of the late 19th and early 20th centuries: Edouard Manet, Paul Cezanne, Claude Monet, Georges Seurat, Henri Rousseau, and Edward Munch. A 45-minute color film has been devoted to each of the six artists who Lord Clark considers to be "the pioneers of what we still call modern painting."

Danforth Fellowships Announced By Prof. Jorgensen

Inquiries about the Danforth Fellowships, to be awarded in March 1973, are invited, according to Prof. Richard Jorgensen by September 29

His office is room 315a Pioneer Memorial.

The Fellowships, offered by the Danforth Foundation of St. Louis, Missouri, are open to men and women who are seniors or recent graduates of accredited colleges in the United States, who have serious interest in college teaching as a career, and who plan to study for a Ph. D. in a field of study common to the American undergraduate liberal arts curriculum. Applicants may be single or married, must be under thirty years of age, and may not have begun any graduate or professional study beyond the baccalaureate at the time application papers are filed.

Approximately 100 fellowships will be awarded in March 1973. Candidates must be nominated by Liaison Officers of their undergraduate institutions by November 1, 1972. The Foundation does not accept direct applications for the Fellowships.

Danforth Fellows are eligible for four years of financial assistance, with a maximum annual living stipend of \$2,700 for single Fellows and \$2,950 for married Fellows, plus tuition and fees. Dependency allowances are available. Financial need is not a condition for consideration.

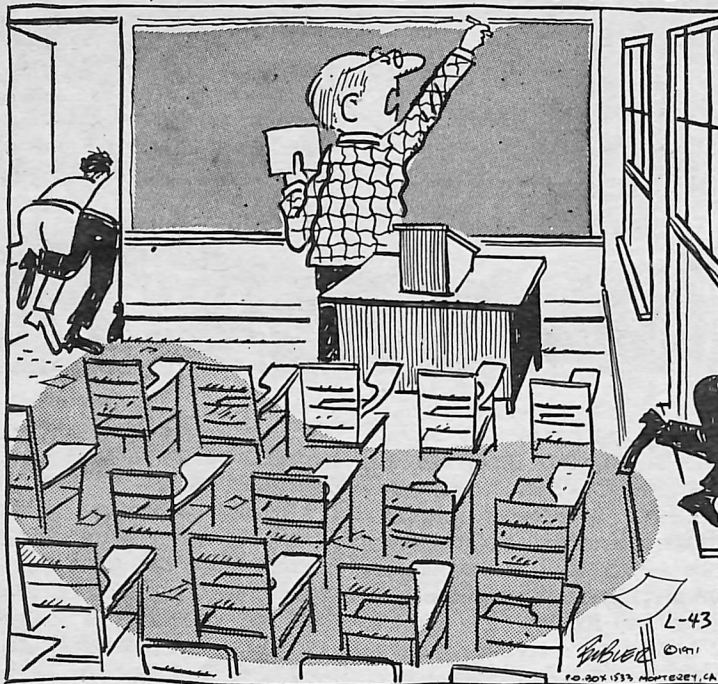
Also, many numerous gifts of flowers, food and other items have been contributed by many people.
