Dana's Christmas Open House

In keeping with the Danish theme currently being promoted throughout the area by the Blair Chamber of Commerce, a "Danish Christmas Open House" will be held on campus this weekend.

Events of the "Open House" begin at 4 p.m. on Sunday afternoon, December 10 with a concert by the Dana Band, directed by Dr. Wise. The one-hour concert by the 45-piece ensemble will be held in AMA.

Following the Band concert, all campus buildings will be open and guests will have opportunity to view the various building decorations. Also on display during the afternoon hours will be the College's collection of Bing and Grondahl and Royal Copenhagen Christmas Plates in the Heritage Room of the Library. An exhibit of Danish Christmas Seals will also be available in the Library Reading Room.

At 5 p.m., Mrs. Burt Faltys of Blair will exhibit her personal collection of Madonnas in Parnassus. According to Mrs. Faltys, approximately 40 figurines representing various interpretations of the Madonna collected from all over the world will be included. The exhibit will remain in Parnassus through Monday, December 11.

At 5:30 and again at 6:30 p.m., the beautiful Santa Lucia ceremony will be presented around the Danish Christmas tree in Parnassus. This traditional ceremony of lights feature a group of 16 girls dressed in white along with several Santa Lucia brides complete with crowns of evergreens

and candles. The Santa Lucia ceremony has become a tradition at Dana and is under the direction of Mrs. Bodil Johnson, instructor in Danish.

The Dana Folk Dancers will present a program of Danish folk dances beginning at 7 p.m., also in Parnassus. The dancers, dressed in authentic Danish costumes, have become one of the most popular Danish attractions at Dana. This appearance is the first public appearance for the 1972-1973 troupe.

Dr. Paul Neve will direct the 100 voices of the Choir in a concert of Christmas vocal music beginning at 7:30 p.m. in AMA. The Concert, which is also limited to one hour in length, will include several well known Christmas hymns and carols; several international carols including the Danish number "Oh How Beautiful the Sky," an all-time Christmas favorite, "O Holy Night," a short "Christmas Can-

Dean C. A. Christiansen Resigns

Dr. Mezoff has announced the resignation of Dr. C. Arthur Christiansen as Academic Dean.

Dr. Christiansen's resignation becomes effective on May 31, 1973.

In his announcement President Mezoff said: "While we regret the thought of Dean Christiansen leaving Dana, the Board of Regents and I have agreed to respect his request to be relieved of the responsibilities of the Dean's office by accepting his resignation. We recognize with appreciation that Dr. Christiansen has spent his entire professional life at Dana and has made numerous significant contributions to the development of Dana's academic program. He has not announced definite plans for the future but the entire College community wishes him the very best in whatever pursuits he follows.

Christiansen came to Dana as a student in 1946, joined the teaching faculty of the College in

1951 and was appointed to the position of Dean of the College in 1960. During this twelve years in that office he has introduced a variety of changes in the internal operations of the institution and has taken leadership in the development and implementation of numerous new programs at Dana including a new academic calendar which incorporates the Interim, Dana's new programs in Humanities, Environmental Studies, Commercial Art, Broadcasting, Law Enforcement Education, Social Work and the addition of Danish Gymnastics to the Physical Education Program.

President Mezoff also announced that an Advisory Committee would be appointed, composed of students and faculty members, to assist in the selection of a new Academic Dean.

Religious Programs Broadcast

A variety of religious programs are scheduled for broadcast over KDCV-FM, the voice of Dana, according to Mr. Dibben, Program Director (KDCV-FM is located at 91.1 on the FM dial).

Tuesday at 8:00 p.m. and Sunday at 5:30 p.m.

"Music on High", a program featuring choral music performed by outstanding choirs and choral groups.

Wednesday:
8:00 p.m. "Protestant Hour", now in its 27th year, this program features speakers and choirs from four great protestant denominations—Episcopal, United Methodist, Lutheran and Presbyterian.

Friday:
8:00 p.m. "Auditorium Organ", featuring music from the great organ of the Auditorium, Independence, Missouri.

Sunday:

6:30 p.m. "Laymen's Hour", produced by the Baptist Church and featuring Art Gilmore, well known commercial announcer, narrator and speaker.

Sunday:
4:30 p.m. Rebroadcast of worship services from First Lutheran Church in Blair.

Sunday:
6:00 p.m. "Church World News", produced by The American Lutheran Church and features significant news of all denominations.

Sunday:
6:15 p.m. "Children's Chapel", a program for children ages 4 - 12 with Bible stories and hymns.

Periodically throughout the week, KDCV-FM will broadcast short programs and spots ranging in length from 30 seconds to four minutes. Some of these programs include "Be Still and Know" produced by the Presbyterian Church and "Can You Spare a Minute" produced by the American Bible Society.

Interim '73 Approaches

The following statistics are on the 1973 Interim at Dana.

There are 48 courses offered this year of which "The Stockmarket and Investment" and "Dana Reportory Theatre" are the most popular with 41 and 34 students signed up respectively. There are 50 students registered for independent study of which 6 are Team Ministry and 4 in pre-law internship. Other off-campus courses are "Accounting Internship" - 7; "Beginning Skiing" -

24; "Business Internship" - 14; "Kansas City Royals Baseball" - 8; "Sanibel Island" - 5.

Twelve students are going to other campus' this year in "Inter-Campus Exchange." Other colleges being attended by Dana students are: St. Olaf, Texas Lutheran, Westmar, and Augustana. Eleven students are coming to Dana from other schools. These schools include: Doane, Luther, St. Olaf, Midland, and Capitol University.

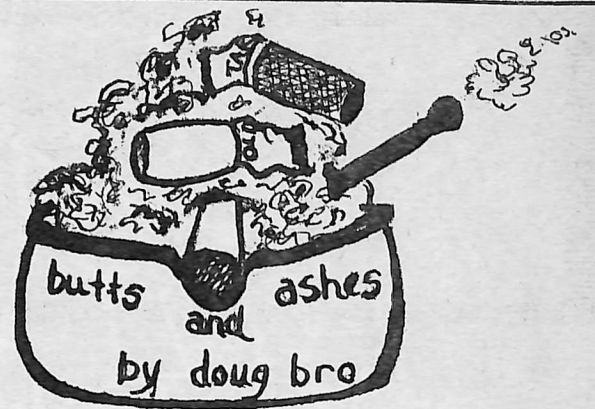


Music Is...Dr. Alan Brandes

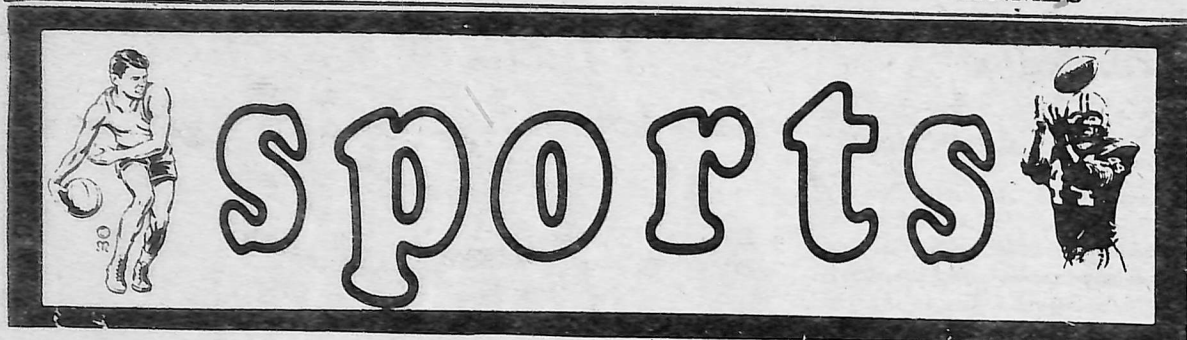

NW Missouri Spoils Dana Cage Opener

The Northwest Missouri State Bearcats were outplayed by a fired up Dana Viking squad throughout the entire contest, but the large number of fouls on the part of the Vikes proved to be the margin of victory as the Bearcats pulled out a 63-58 win in Marysville last Saturday night.

Viking coach Jerry Rainforth expressed his enthusiasm regarding his teams play as Dana totally outshot and out-rebounded Missouri, but seemed despondent over the fact that the Vikes out fouled their opponent 27-9, thereby providing them with a win from the charity line. Bryan Traylor led all scorers

for Dana with 20 points, while Gary Bott pitched in 12 and grabbed 18 rebounds to lead in that category.

Danas next home game will be Thursday, December 7, as the Vikes take on Concordia in their first match-up of the 1972 annual NAIC basketball tourney. Game time is scheduled for 8:45 in Borup Coliseum.

Peru Pins Loss On Dana

In their opening match of the season, Dana's wrestlers gave a spirited crowd high hopes for the year. Although losing 27 - 16, (most of that margin the result of a forfeit at 126 pounds) the team did well in competition against a larger, non-conference, Peru State Team.

Sophomore Bob Coffey (134) provided the first win of the match by defeating his opponent 13 - 2. Returning Letterman Bill Kruse opened his season with a pin in the 167 pound match. Don Neuman, a transfer from Waldorf Junior College in Minnesota, decisioned his Peru State opponent 7 - 4. Excitement increased noticeably for the heavy-weight match, where Lew Houser managed a 3 - 2 victory over his 261 pound challenger. However, Lew re-injured a bad knee in the final two seconds of the match and will not compete again until after Christmas.

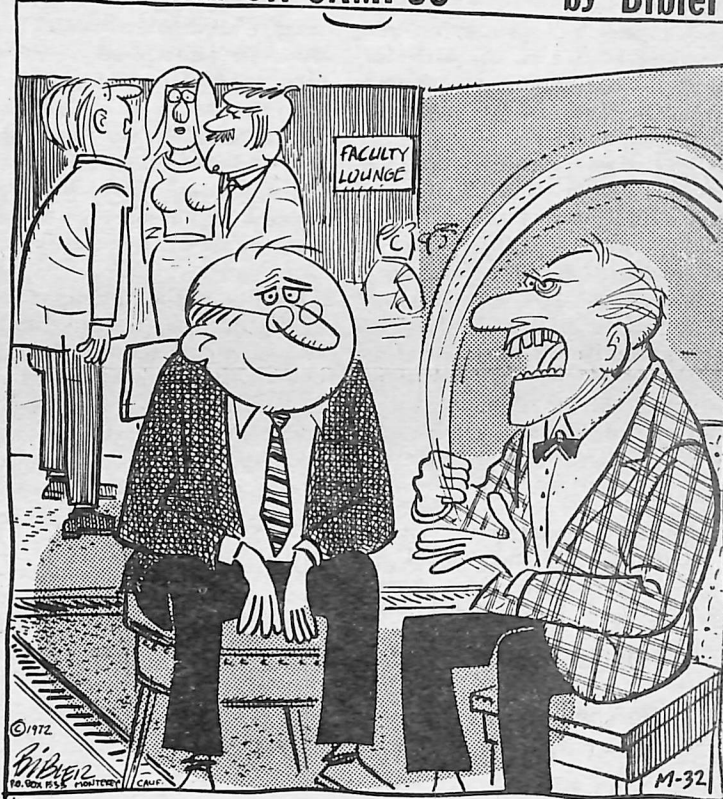
The purpose of handing out literature was to make the public

A fifteen foot Christmas tree, completely decorated with imported, handmade ornaments from Denmark, is now on display in Parnassus.

The tree, donated to the College by Mr. Bob Harrison of the Christenson Lumber Co. in Blair, was scheduled to be removed from Mr. Harrison's property and he generously made it available to the College for this special purpose.

The ornaments on the tree include a variety of paper cones, hearts, angels, and cupids; intricate designs of birds, animals,

stars, Christmas trees and hearts done in straw, red velvet and pine cones as well as yards and yards of red and white Danish flag-garlands. The only non-Danish decorations on the tree are the more than 300 multi-colored lights. The decorations were imported especially for the Dana tree.

Adding to the Christmas flavor in Parnassus is an exhibit of Christmas art prints which will be on display through December 20. A variety of antique brass and silver candlesticks are also on display.

Student Involved In Hearing

Two people from Dana are involved with the hearing to decide if the Fort Calhoun Nuclear Powerplant gets an operating license.

Professor George Grube, head of the Environmental Studies Department, has written testimony about the amount of water that the reactor will use for cooling. Dennis Nelson,

biology and environmental studies student, will make a limited appearance concerning the radiation that will be emitted.

The hearing, at the Holiday Inn in Omaha, will begin on Monday, December 1, at 1:30 p.m. Presiding will be the Atomic Safety and Licensing Board of the United States Atomic Energy Commission (AEC).

"Admissions Associates"

According to Richard V. Showers, Director of Admissions, a task force of 40 student volunteers has been organized to assist the Admissions Office in locating and interviewing prospective Dana students. The volunteers are known as "Admissions Associates" and will spend a portion of their vacation periods contacting high school students about enrolling at Dana.
