"A Streetcar Named Desire" will be performed on Saturday night, and the performances of "The Skin of Our Teeth" are scheduled for tonight and Sunday. All plays will be held in A.M.A., with showtime at 8 P.M. Hum credit will be given.

## Senate Sub-Committees To Investigate Dana College Situation

What does the immediate future have in store for Dana College? That question, involving student enrollment, academic freedom and general campus problems, will be tackled by three groups of Dana students. Wednesday evening the Dana Student Senate approved the formation of three committees; one to study academic affairs, one to study the ad-

missions and recruitment situation and a third committee to study student life. The general purpose of each committee is to find answers to problems facing the immediate future of the college. Dissatisfaction with the college, enrollment, apathy and a general atmosphere of stagnation will be analyzed and recommendations made for possible solutions and courses of action. Unlike the Accreditation Com-

mittees last year, these groups will be students only, looking at the college with the idea that they, as a group, must do something. The committees will not only tackle long range problems but will be primarily concerned with the immediate future. The Student Senate felt that the next three semesters could possibly be the most critical that Dana is to face.

## Student Senate To Convert Dragon's Tail Into Pastor's Office

### Pinball Machines Possibly Moved To Dragon's Head

Wednesday the Dana Student Senate, by a majority vote, paved the way for a centrally located and readily accessible base for campus pastoral operations. A motion, introduced by Junior Class Senator James Gardner, was approved. It calls for the room known as the Dragons Tail to be converted into an office and study for the campus pastor. The pinball machines and juke-box, it

was decided, would be moved into the Dragons head.

It was felt by the majority of Senators that the present office for the campus pastor is both inadequate in size and location. As a gesture of Christian concern and involvement the Senate decided to set the stage for an active recognition of the situation on the campus.

Senators and others attending

the meeting expressed the hope that his gesture would both create a more active involvement by students in the Christian college community and serve as a motive to the college administration and alumni of the Dana students concern for personal involvement.

This decision was only one of several major undertakings by the Senate at the Wednesday meeting. Other business by the Senators can be found elsewhere in the *Hermes*.

## History On Tape

Participants in the local history interim interviewed both local Danish-Americans and non Danish-Americans. Some of these were former professors from seminaries, like C.B. Larsen and Paul Nyholm.

The information should be helpful in the writing of the centennial history of Dana College in 1984.

It is hoped that the interviews on cassette tapes will be transcribed to paper and put in the library so they will be more useful.

## PROSPECTS FROM THE EAST

The Admissions Office reports that a group of approximately twenty prospective students from the East coast will visit Blair and the Dana campus from February 8 through the 10th. The visiting students are scheduled to participate in a variety of campus activities and counseling sessions. They represent the first organized group of prospective students to visit the Dana campus as a result of contacts made on the East coast by Dana's admissions representative there, Mr. Michael Jones. It is hoped that additional groups of prospective students from that area will visit the campus later this year.

## "Icebox Freeze Is Off"

After several weeks of planning, meetings between student representatives and administration persons, and correspondence with different companies and colleges, Dean Jorgensen recommended to President Mezoff that Dana policy be changed to allow refrigerators in the dorm rooms of Dana's students. Dr. Mezoff accepted and approved the recommendation, effective February 9.

A contract has been signed with Midwest States Leasing Company from Des Moines, Iowa, and it was planned that refrigerators be on display Thursday and that students could rent appliances at that time. It is important that everyone understand the regulations regarding the use of the refrigerators.

(1) No refrigerators other than those leased from Midwest will be permitted in residence halls. Any use of other refrigerators could lead to electrical overloads and possibly an electrical fire.

(2) Any use of the refrigerator contrary to the rules of the school will result in immediate removal of the unit at no refund. (That's not the school's rule, but is provided in the contract you signed when the refrigerator was rented). In other words, keep your booze out of the refrigerator or you'll be out \$28.

In order that this policy be continued, and possibly expanded next year, it is necessary that everyone co-operate and not abuse this privilege. If we expect further changes in school policy, we must demonstrate the appropriate responsibility now.

## Faculty Retention Deemed Necessary

A resolution calling for the retention of faculty members now under terminal contracts was passed by the Dana Student Senate Wednesday evening. The Senate also went on record in favor of increasing the language program when it becomes economically feasible.

Serious and often heated debate proceeded the nearly unanimous passage of the resolution. It was felt by many of the Senators, headed by Tom Nielsen, Junior Senator and sponsor of the resolution, that the liberal art philosophy of Dana would be in jeopardy if cuts were made. The argument of lack of finances was dismissed, as an excuse on the grounds that without a full faculty, a liberal arts program would fail. It was concluded that even several years of running in the red would be more beneficial than faculty cuts which tend only to

down-grade the academic rating.

This motion led to a lengthy discussion concerning the future of Dana and the role of the senate and student body. This is reported elsewhere in the *Hermes*.

## Former Dana President Dies

The Reverend Theodore M. Hansen, eighth president of Dana, died at Hastings, Nebraska, earlier this week. Funeral services for the former president were held on Wednesday, February 7 in Ruskin, Nebraska.

The Reverend Mr. Hansen was named President of Dana College and Trinity Seminary in 1925 and served in that office until 1929.

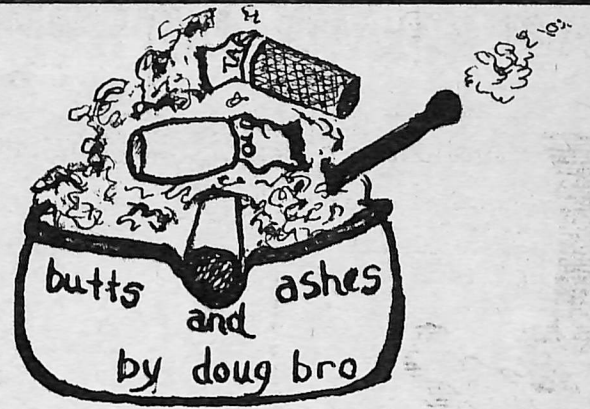

City center redevelopment, new road-building programs and rapidly changing land use are threatening the disappearance of prehistoric graves, Iron-age settlements, Roman villas, fascinating relics of mediaeval towns, all over Britain.  
American students free from mid-May, and with previous archaeological experience, are invited to join an international team on a dig of the important Anglo-Saxon site at Spong Hill where the 1973 excavation hopes to find new evidence of the early pagan settlements. Experienced helpers will receive free board for helping in this important work. Similar help is also

required on work on a mediaeval manor near Chester.  
Other students without experience are invited to join the British Archaeology Seminar at Lincoln College, Oxford, organized by the Association for Cultural Exchange. Six academic credits can be earned from participating in this low-cost program which ends by three weeks' participation on digs in different parts of England and Scotland.  
These include the Association's own mesolithic dig on the island of Oronsay in the Hebrides which last summer was visited by Queen Elizabeth, Prince Charles and Princess Anne. Cost, inclusive of Trans-Atlantic travel by scheduled jet, is \$790.

## Mid-Season '73

The Dana College cagers, sporting an overall 5-10 record of a 0-4 conference mark have completed nearly two-thirds of their 23 game 1972-73 basketball schedule to date. All but two of the remaining eight games are conference contests, and the Viking squad is expected to improve markedly on its thus far winless conference record.

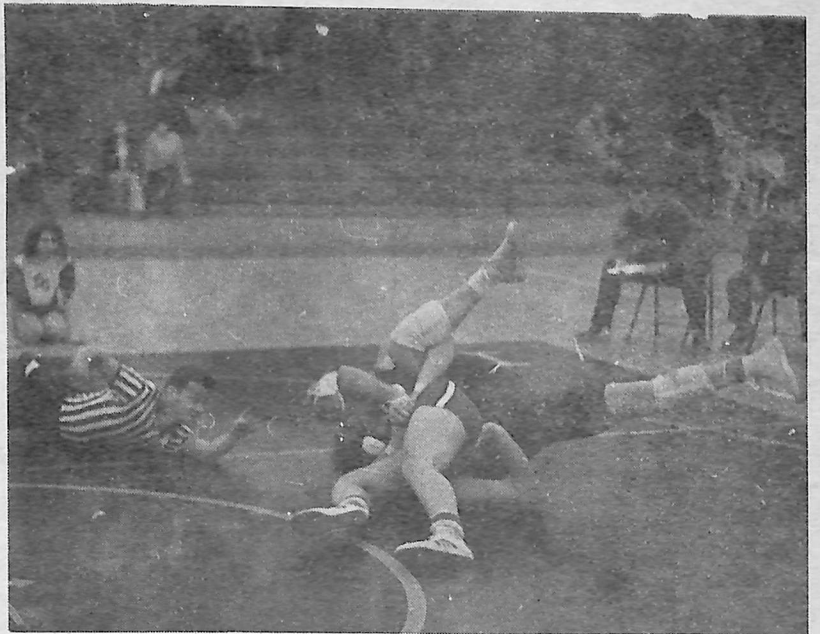
The Vikings have displayed a much improved well rounded offensive attack this season, and continue to hound their opponents with traditional relentless defense. Strong points per-

sonnel wise have proven to be greatly improved efforts from 6'6" sophomore center Jin Huseman from Alta, Iowa, and a more consistent scoring attack from 6'6" senior Terry Miner from Cedar Rapids, Iowa, who is second in total points scored with 247 through 15 games. Perennial point leader Bryan Traylor, a 6'2" junior forward-guard from Council Bluffs, has pitched in 296 points to lead the team average wise by scoring at a 19.2 point per game clip. Leading a strong rebounding team this season is 6'6" senior

Gary Bott, from Millard, Nebraska. Gary has grabbed 175 errant shots and has compiled an 11 per game average through 15 games.

Perhaps the most disappointing aspect thus far this season for the Vikings has been that the majority of their losses have been by rather small point spreads, due mainly to somewhat poor shooting from the free-throw line, and an inability to put an opponent away once a lead is established.

Coach Jerry Rainforth has expressed his confidence in his Viking squad however, and expects them to perform well in the home stretch this season. Hastings College should prove to be the Vikings toughest opponent yet this year, but a show the Vikings are capable of producing should make things interesting the remainder of the season.

Dana's wrestlers have been busy during the interim period, traveling to Briar Cliff, Westmar, and Concordia. In addition, there was one home dual against Midland College. After a slow start in dual meets the team has pulled together, bouncing back for two consecutive victories over Doane and Concordia.

In a meet held February 6, at Crete, against rival Doane College, the team put together its strongest showing of the season, bouncing the opponents 33-9. Lee Kerndt, who has had a good year thus far, ended the regular season with a solid victory, pinning his man six and a half minutes into his match. At 158 pounds, Jim Waters pinned Dave

Schnell from Doane. Having had a somewhat disappointing season, Jim showed on Tuesday night that he is ready for the upcoming conference tournament. Probably Bill Kruse has had the best year of the team's wrestlers and he finished in typical fashion, pinning the Doane grappler after two minutes.

Talking to a couple of the team's members, there is an air of optimism about the conference championship. All the members are expected to do well. If they are mentally prepared and ready to wrestle, Dana could make a strong showing. We hope that the team can win the championship they only narrowly lost last season.

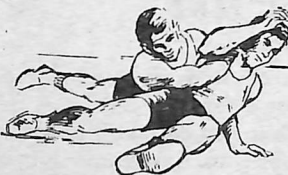
