Dr. Erland Nelson, Former Dana President, Dies

Dr. Erland Nelson, President of Dana College from 1929 until 1936, died earlier this week at the home of his son in Baltimore, Maryland. The former president was 76 years old.

Nelson came to Dana in 1926 as the chairman of the commercial department. Following the retirement of President T. M. Hansen in 1929, Nelson was named acting president. He was elected to the full presidency in 1931 and remained in that post until 1936.

Exhibit in Parnassus - Thelma Christensen's work March 18th-March 30th

Have you been wondering what Dana has been doing about preparing its future teachers for work in urban centers? Recognizing the acute need for a teacher with special training in human relations this institution has been involved for the past several semesters with the Cooperative Urban Teacher Education (C.U.T.E.) Program.

C.U.T.E. was specifically designed by the Mid-Continent Regional Laboratory in Kansas City, Mo. with the needs of inner-city children in mind. The program was field tested in Kansas City, Wichita, Kansas and Oklahoma City. The program with which Dana is affiliated is based in Omaha.

C.U.T.E. is an intensive exposure to the total concept of education, including school, community, industry, government, private business, politics, minority groups, churches, home life and many other segments

which reach out and have influence on the life of the individual child in the classroom.

C.U.T.E. involves actual experience in working and living with inner-city people. Rap sessions, home visitation, volunteer work, community projects, micro-teaching and mental health seminars are part of what the C.U.T.E. student actually does. Fulltime student teaching is a carefully selected classroom under the supervision of a proven veteran cooperating teacher for at least eight weeks is the final experience of the program. More Pertinent Questions on Abortion

What are the different kinds of abortion? Nature has one way which is commonly called a miscarriage. There are four types of induced abortion.

(1) Dilation and curettage (D&C) - in this case the surgeon inserts an instrument into the uterus, cuts the placenta and the baby to pieces, and scrapes them out into a basin.

(2) Suction method - this is similar to the D&C except that a hollow plastic tube attached to a powerful suction device is inserted into the uterus. This tears the baby and the placenta to pieces which are sucked out into a bottle.

(3) Hysterotomy - this method is similar to a Caesarian section birth. The mother's abdomen and uterus are opened surgically and the baby is lifted out. This method is commonly used for "late" abortions, some of these babies are born alive!

(4) Saline method - in this case a long needle is inserted into the baby's amniotic sac through which a concentrated salt solution is injected into the fluid surrounding the baby. This immediately poisons the baby who convulses and dies. The mother goes into labor about a day later and delivers a dead baby.

What happens to babies that are aborted alive. Some of them are put on ice and delivered to university laboratories before they are killed.

At least one case is known of a doctor who smothered a live aborted baby with its placenta.

Some of them are allowed to live and are put up for adoption.

Isn't abortion safer than childbirth? No. Studies have shown that abortion, especially in the late stages, is much more dangerous than childbirth and that more mothers dies from legal abortions in the first three months than from childbirth.

Isn't abortion another means of population control? No. Birth control the beginning of a new life. Abortion kills the new life that has already begun.

What of the population explosion? There is no population explosion in the United States. In 1971 the birth rate in this country was lower than the death rate. This is better than zero population; it is negative population growth!

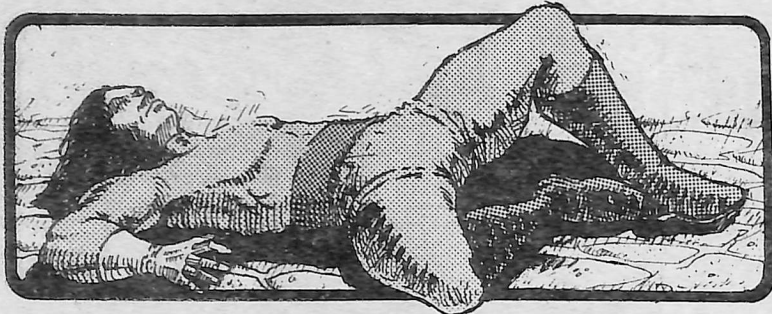

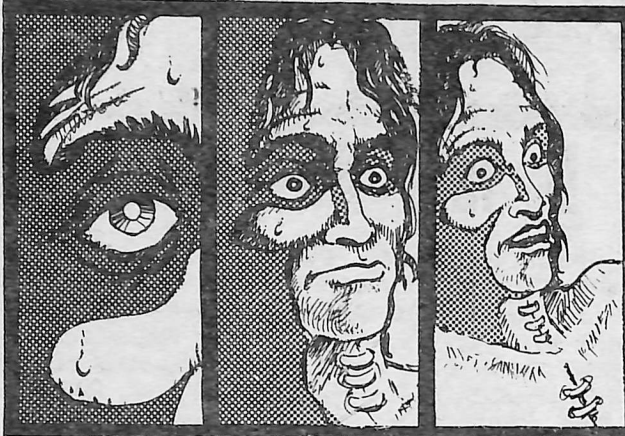

13 Lettermen Lead Dana's Baseball Squad

Dana College lists 13 lettermen on a pared down squad of 23 players for 1973. Among these lettermen are four returning pitchers and a total of six seniors. These factors, along with 3 juniors who have had plenty of experience, gives the Viking team plenty of maturity. Pitching and maturity are the strong points for this spring.

Major losses off last year's team include captain and most valuable player Kirk McLaughlin. The left fielder and sometimes pitcher hit .355 and was a real leader. Tom Lauritsen transferred to Creighton University's Law School after hitting .286 and leading in runs batted in while playing first base. Relief pitcher Ken Peterson graduated after posting a 3-1 record including two relief wins over UNO in 1972.

The pitching lettermen include three seniors, Steve Hines, Mike Brady and Gary Bott, who have worked and earned letters in their previous 3 years at Dana. Hines and Brady, 2 of 4 strong left handers on the squad, were all-conference choices a year ago (Hines for two consecutive years). Bott (4-0 and 4.034 ERA) will probably play third base, pitch if needed, and will also serve as captain this year. Sophomore lefty Paul Haack, who had an earned run average of 1.946 in 19 innings last year, is being counted on for more duty this year. A 1972 squad member Rick Waite should be in the competition for pitching rights if he overcomes some scholastic problems in time. Brady had a 5-3 record and a ERA of 1.783 in 60 innings last year. Hines' record slipped to 3-5 and a ERA of 3.167, but he struck out 76 in 54 innings. These latter two will probably be the work-horses again this year.

The best looking freshman pitcher, before the season opens, appears to be 6 foot 4 inch left hander Dave Vallinch from Council Bluffs Thomas Jefferson H.S. Another 6-4 athlete, Barry Olson of Minnetonka, Minnesota, may add real depth to the mound corps, he's a right hander.

Catching could be solid with senior Dan Diefenderfer returning and a good looking freshman candidate Mike Giovanni showing up well. Both are from Pennsylvania. The

biggest question mark with these 2 is "can they hit"?

Returning infielders are Bott, Junior shortstop Bryan Traylor, senior Ron Scholz at first base and 4 second basemen. Bott hit .253 but fielded very well at third; Traylor batted .267, down from his freshman average of .321, but he stole 13 bases and can get on base; Scholz hit .196 with 3 homers (Traylor had 3 also) in a reserve role; and the second baseman last year could not hit consistently. Joel Eskelsen, Eric Reynolds, Terry Jensen and Terry Jobman will battle again for second base rights. Eskelsen is a senior, the others are sophomores. The top newcomer appears to be Mike Urdahl, a first baseman from Pennsylvania who can also catch or play in the outfield.

The Vikings open at Creighton on March 26 if the weather cooperates. The next three dates are at home, March 30 against Mayville, No. Dakota, March 31 against Bellevue and April 2 against Mayville again.

Two regular outfielders return, both juniors. Steve Woitock, a solid center fielder, hit .318 in '72. Woitock incidently, was a fifth player to try second base last year. He set a record last year with 107 times at bat—he had 34 hits. Jerry Wilson played right field last spring and carried a .260 average. He needs to be more consistent at the plate, being a streak hitter thus far in his career. Scholz, Urdahl, Eskelsen, Jobman or some unforeseen newcomer could fill up the empty spot in the outfield.

Dana's record in 1972 was 15-10 in regular season play, 4-1 in the conference. Midland was given the championship with a 8-2 mark. Rain was the Dana conqueror last spring. The Vikings were 2nd in the NAIA district play-off, behind Wayne State. UNO and Kearney were eliminated in that play-off by the Vikings.
