Questionnaire Returns Reach 85%

"Retail Management - A Fresh Approach" was the heading of the Dana Chapter of the Society for the Advancement of Management Seminar held last Tuesday, March 20. Students, professors, and local businessmen were in attendance at the three lectures.

Mr. Craig Rice, Director for the Management Assistance Division of the United States Small Business Administration spoke at 9:00. His lecture was concerned with "Management for Profit Planning". The Program Evaluation Review Technique, P.E.R.T., was emphasized with elimination of causes of failure on new products or services being the main concern. The lecture, in D.H.A., was given from 9 til 11:30 with a fifteen minute break at 10:15.

Prof. Voth added a review of Mr. Rise's talk and gave a small quiz over his lecture.

The afternoon in D.H.A., was split between Mr. Dayton Smith, Credit Manager of Younker-Kilpatrick of Omaha, and Edgar Morsman, Executive Vice-President of the U.S. National Bank in Omaha.

Morsman spoke from 1 until 1:45 on "Cash and Borrowing Controls". In effect, he said banks look for five points in an individual's application for a business loan.

The day ended with Smith speaking from 2:00 to 2:45. His lecture was entitled, "Your Business and Retail Credit".

The president of Dana's chapter of S.A.M., Dan Hutchinson, announced, "I wish to take this opportunity to thank everyone for attending. I would like to extend a special 'thank you' to our speakers for the time and consideration given us. Also my sincere 'thanks' to the members, and our advisor."

LETTERS TO THE EDITORS

Dear Editor:

We feel that anti-abortion people are unwittingly turning their backs on existing sociological problems, related to abortion. The pregnant woman seeking an abortion has a family problem, a social problem, a religious problem, and legal problem, when all she should have is a medical problem. This latter problem exists in the fact that of the approximate one million illegal abortions performed each year in the United States, 500 to 1,000 of these women die, and many more are maimed. We challenge the anti-abortion people to rationalize their support of laws which deny a woman the proper medical care available. Also, we feel that the anti-abortionist's plausibility structure must learn to feel the impact of the sociological fact that the above death toll, due to illegal abortions, is highest among the poor and disadvantaged. In short, the Blacks, Indians, and Puerto Ricans, to mention a few. We feel that society has set up and propagated distinct laws to govern behavior, and have thus separated themselves from the sticky, uncomfortable problems of concern for the individual's rights and feelings.

As historical background, to attain a degree of perspective, we must state that the abortion laws that were on the rolls, were primarily set up in the 1800's to protect the life of the woman, since surgery at that time was dangerous. The fact that 38% of the people operated on in the 1800's died, and the fact that only 3% of the women carrying fetuses to full term died during childbirth, prompted the enactment of these laws. Today the maternal mortality rate for childbirth in the U.S. is 27.4 per 100,000 births, compared to the maternal mortality rate of 3 per 100,000 for legal abortions. Thus, we believe as the American Bar Association does, that these laws were outdated and were in desperate need of revision.

This latter statement is essentially what the Supreme Court has done, in late January, to the

abortion laws. Its majority statement said in effect that every woman in the U.S. has the same right to an abortion during the first 6 months of pregnancy as she has to any other minor surgery. "The abortion decision and its effect must be left to the medical judgement of the pregnant woman's attending physician. . . To demand a panel of doctors to O.K. an abortion, is an unconstitutional complication. Only after the fetus has developed enough to have a chance of survival of its own-around 7 months gestation- may a state regulate. . . abortion for the preservation or health of the mother." Thus, we feel that the abortion issue has been put into the hand of medical jurisprudence. We hope that by using the highest court's ruling, we have not implied that it is the sound moral decision in this case. We also hope that we have not implied that this situation is no longer a moral issue. It is such a problem, for the individual.

We encourage anti-abortion people to examine their views on contraceptives, and take note of the fact that since married women started using contraceptives, and have used them in an informed and responsible manner, the percentage of married women getting abortions, in comparison to unmarried women getting abortions, has dropped from 80% to 50%. Thus, the question of having an abortion for these contraceptive users is a question that is being asked less often. We have to challenge those against abortion to do something about the difficulties in acquiring contraceptives and information in the area of sex education. We do, however, feel that a considerable amount already has been accomplished in the line of social endeavor.

It is regrettable that last week's "Hot Spot" stated that "more mothers die from legal abortions in the first three months than from childbirth." The statistics we have presented, all obtained from *Newsweek*, *Time*, and *Zero Population Growth* newsletters over the past three

years, clearly show the latter quotation to be false. As for the statement, "There is no population explosion in the U.S.", we feel that besides grossly oversimplifying birth vs death rate statistics, that there are ample books on human populations to clearly show that sentence to be false, also.

We feel that this article is probably covertly implying that we are right and the anti-abortionists adherents are wrong. This is unfortunate, but understandable in light of the fact that we have used statistics and sociological observations to base our statements on. These facts do challenge, however, the ideas and beliefs of certain aspects of the anti-abortion faction's arguments, and have shown some to be wholly without credibility. This article may take on the tinge of a personal attack to some readers. This was not our intention, since we respect the anti-abortion persons freedom of choice. This article is left open-ended, even as we feel our minds should remain open on this, and other issues.

To the Editors:

My letter is in reply to the following erroneous statement in last week's "Hot Spot" (Miss Theresa Walsh's column on abortion): "What of the population explosion? There is no population explosion in the United States. In 1971 the birth rate in this country was lower than the death rate. This is better than zero population; it is negative population growth."

Firstly, the birth rate for the year ending April 30, 1971, was 18.2 births per thousand people. The death rate was 9.4 deaths per thousand people. These leave an increase of 8.8 births per thousand people. (From Paul and Anne Ehrlich's *Population/Resources/Environment*.)

The idea of zero population growth (equal births, net immigration, and deaths) also seems to mystify Miss Walsh and

PERTINENT QUESTIONS ON ABORTION

Isn't abortion necessary sometimes to preserve the mental health of the mother?

The "mental health of the mother" has become a catch-all phrase for anyone who wants to get an abortion; it's the old standby excuse. As a matter of fact, very few women get an abortion for psychiatric reasons.

If a pregnant woman truly does have psychiatric problems, she can be helped through her pregnancy by counseling. Very few pregnant women go so far as to commit suicide. Suicide is far more common among those women who have had an abortion and are suffering guilt from it.

It is known that women, with psychiatric problems are more likely to suffer further mental harm by having an abortion than normal women.

What about defective children?

Should a human life be exterminated because it doesn't measure up to the standards of physical or mental perfection established by society? If life before birth can be destroyed because it is "imperfect" or "defective", because it will not be fruitful or productive, or because it will be a burden on the parents; doesn't it also logically follow that any "defective" person, born or unborn, should be eliminated (murdered).

It is an unfounded assumption, in the first place, to presume that handicapped people do not enjoy life as much as "normal" people, or that they do not contribute as much to society as "normal" people do. Not only that, this value judgement which permits humans to live only because they are useful and not a burden to society is barbaric. Once human life has a price tag on it, once live is no longer an absolute right, then all of life is endangered and is worth only the current price tag put on it by society.

What about unwanted children?

We would truly be living in an ideal world if everyone in it was "wanted". We will always have the unwanted with us. But what will our solution to the problem be? Will we help them and care for them, or will we kill them?

Most unwanted pregnancies turn into wanted children just as

her reference, Wilkes' Handbook on Abortion. When the average family size drops to the level which eventually will lead to zero population growth, the population doesn't stop growing immediately. One example:

The President's Commission on Population Growth and the American Future concluded that if U.S. families have an average of two children (and immigration remains at the current level), in 100 years our population would grow from the current level of 210 million to 350 million.

many wanted pregnancies become unwanted children. Just because the pregnancy is unwanted, does not mean the child will be abused and mistreated either.

If a child is still unwanted after it is born, it can be put up for adoption. There is a crying demand for babies to adopt at the present time in this country.

Is pregnancy from rape common?

No. It is very rare. Pregnancy from rape, therefore, is an unjustifiable reason for legalizing abortion.

What does the Christian Law Institute have to say about the Supreme Court's pro-abortion decision?

In a public letter to Chief Justice Warren E. Burger, the Christian Law Institute has this to say:

"No pro-abortion legislation has passed the Legislatures of the States since about 1970. The electorate in two states, Michigan and North Dakota, voted down pro-abortion legislation last November. The Legislatures of New York and Pennsylvania recently voted to repeal pro-abortion legislation, and today neither would have pro-abortion laws but for the vetoes of their Governors. Thus the decision of the Court comes at a time when the implications of abortion are beginning to be understood by the American people.

"This decision endangers the right to live of every person in the United States. There is no life so helpless nor innocent as that of an unborn child. If not even the innocent and helpless are protected by law, what of the rest of us? The Court announced in its decision that it does now know when human life begins. Why then if the Court respects human life would the Court permit human features to be killed at any stage of development? Yet the Court rules that an unborn child can be aborted - killed - for little or no reason. The Court's decision will result in a massacre of innocents never before seen in history.

"...There is a Law which not even the United States Supreme Court can repeal: Thou shalt not kill. The Court's decision has in effect said, let no law hamper the killing. The implications of its decision are indeed very grave for the Court, the United States and the American people.

"We of the Christian Law Institute urge the Court to rehear abortion cases and reverse its decision of January 22, 1973".

Next week, petitions for an anti-abortion amendment to the United States Constitution will be circulated. Please sign a petition. The petitions will be collected at the end of the week and sent to the Christian Law Institute for immediate action.

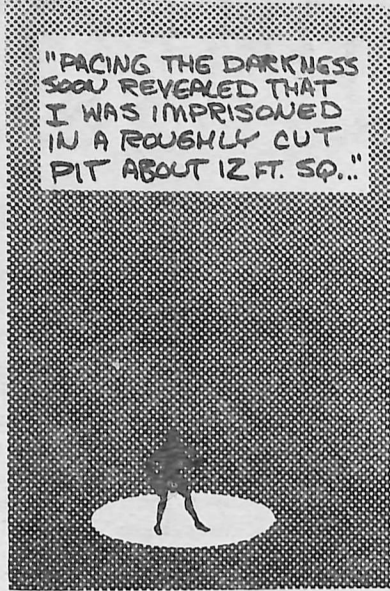

Student Senate Parliamentarian, Al Brodbeck. The following is his answer.

"The Student Senate meets at least twice a month. According to the Constitution it must meet at least twice although it usually meets more than this. Meetings are posted on the "This week on Campus" Board in the Center. They are open to the public. Any non-member of the Senate may voice his opinion and in fact, relevant comments are welcome if not needed. The Dean of Students acting as resource person and advisor attends all meetings of the Senate.

Officers of the Student Body are Brent Siegrist, President; Ron Brown, Vice-President; Carin Christensen, Secretary; Bob Mawhiney, Treasurer. Senators are as follows, Senior Class: Barb Wolf, Katie Hines, Carol Wood, Candy Wild, Steve Hahn; Junior Class: Tom Nielsen, John Tjomsland, Jim Gardner, Pat Tripp, Lloyd Neve. Sophomore Class: John Benz, Connie Kerr, Jill Andersen, Bob Coffey, Layne Johnson; Freshman Class: Ricci Thompson, Mike Stewart, Steve Forney, John Kuehl, Dwight Tange.

The Student Senate has several committees. One is studying the educational life, the social life and other aspects of Dana. To list the names of the students on the committees would take up too much space. They are senators, although they need not be. Proposals are being investigated concerning increasing our number of areas of study, alcohol on campus, ways to increase enrollment, etc.

Looks like the male chauvinists have it, 17 men and 7 women. Elections for next years Student Senate are scheduled for the Friday following the third Monday in April but this will be moved one week (probably to the fourth week) because of Easter break.

Ask an officer or the parliamentarian, Alan Brodbeck, for a Constitution.

The Senate's defined powers are spelled out in the Constitution. It is designed to work with the faculty and administration to act as a go between for the student. How can you go here an entire year without knowing who you voted into Senate offices since results of all elections are made public? Why didn't you try to come to a Senate meeting to see if it was open and you could talk? (Remember, notice is

posted) Why did you wait from one to four years to read the Constitution or at least ask about? Why weren't you concerned before? Why don't you care? It's not all the Student Senate's fault, you helped. I hope I see you run for office or at least write for the newspaper. If you still are ignorant, remember, Truth conquers. (Veritas Vincit)."



The Dana Vikings open the 1973 baseball season with a doubleheader at Creighton University on Monday. Game time is 1:30 p.m., with the games to be played on the new diamond in Papillion, Nebraska.

Coach Dale Lemon has indicated only a partial starting line-up as of this date. Being unable to get any outdoor work has made it tough to find out who can win starting berths. Last year's performances are the

only real bases from which to choose so far. Steve Hines and Mike Brady, a pair of 3 year lettermen are to get the starting calls on the mound. There are three opponents which were conference champions in 1972, one opponent which was NAIA district champion in '72, plus other teams

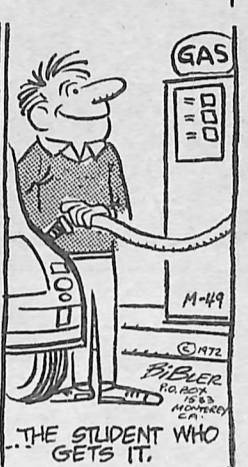
