

# Rainforth To Leave Dana

Jerry Rainforth, head basketball coach and assistant football and track coach at Dana, has resigned. His resignation will become effective at the end of this semester.

President Earl Mezoff was questioned later. No replacement will be hired to fill this position, said Mezoff. Instead, the present faculty and staff members of the physical education department will teach classes formerly taught by Rainforth.

Rainforth has taken a coaching position at Central City High School. There, he will assume the responsibilities of head basketball coach and assistant football and golf coach.

Thursday morning, Rainforth spoke to this reporter. When asked if he felt he was forced to resign, he said, "Of course." Because he was given a terminal contract to sign, Rainforth felt he should begin looking for another position immediately. Feeling that coaching positions in good schools are very hard to find, he indicated that he was very glad to have the opportunity to coach at Central City High.

Rainforth said that he was given no concrete answer as to why he was cut from the staff. He expressed that it is unfortunate that he has to leave and that he will cherish his career at Dana as an experience.

He feels that before returning to college coaching, he will heavily consider the "many frustrations" involved in the campus community.

"I hate to leave, but I can understand that this is a necessary thing," so said, Coach Rainforth, who has been at Dana since 1968.

Rainforth has been noticed for his fine Christian concept of athletics. The emotions he showed while his basketball teams have been on the court are

representative of his involvement with sports.

President Earl Mezoff stated that the loss of Rainforth will be deeply felt by the college. He said that the reason Rainforth was chosen to be placed on a terminal contract was a result of a re-evaluation of faculty in the light of decreasing enrollment. Mr. Rainforth could be replaced without cutting the P.E. department course offering or inter-collegiate athletics programs. This was assured by both Rainforth and Mezoff.

As of yet, none of the physical education staff have been picked as basketball coach for 1973-74. Rainforth expressed his anxiety on this point, for other colleges are recruiting high school basketball players at this time of year. He feels it is necessary for Dana to begin recruiting immediately.

Prior to joining the Dana staff, Rainforth coached and taught for ten years in the Blair Public School System. He is a native of Tekamah and a graduate of Nebraska Wesleyan University and Wayne State College.

#### JIM LARSON: "Leadership By Example"

The office of Student Body President is more than just a political position. It is a position of leadership, concerns and communication. Leadership is carried out by being an example to his fellow students. It is a position of concerns in that the President must be concerned with the student body as a whole and to each person which constitutes the complete student body. Too often, I feel the concern stops with the student body as a whole, and fails in concerns toward the individuals of the dorms, the married students, the off campus students and part-time students. In fact, the Presidential position is a position of communication. This segment of the President's role is often neglected or not carried out to completeness. I feel the President should make an honest effort to make himself available and approachable. He should serve as a link between students and faculty, students and administration, and if the need is present, between students and students.

I have also decided that a platform is not the key to running for an office. This by itself is an outrageous sentence, but when one considers what goes into a platform and the results are not seen the following year (the year in which the elected student serves his term), then the statement loses some of its outrageousness. #### TOM NIELSEN: "New Directions Through Organization"



1. The AAC shall hear all motions pertaining to the academic sphere of the college. It shall research and revise all motions before their formal presentation before the Senate. The Committee Chairman shall hold a post in the Cabinet, but shall not be a member of the Senate. The Committee shall consist of no less than six members of the Senate.

2. The SLC shall hear all motions pertaining to the general life at Dana. They shall be subject to the same rules and operate on the same conditions as stated in section 1.

3. The PRC shall hear all motions pertaining to recruitment of students and projection of a positive image in regards to the Student Body. This Committee shall be subject to the same rules and operate on the same conditions as stated in section 1. A new Cabinet Post will be necessary.

B. The Student Senate shall meet on the second and fourth Wednesday of each month. Additional meetings will be scheduled if necessary. The Committees of the Senate will meet on the first and third Wednesday of each month.

#### II. THE EXECUTIVE COUNCIL

A. The Executive Council shall meet on the second and fourth Thursday of each month. It shall serve as the administrative branch of Student Government. The primary responsibility of the Council will be to see that all motions passed by the Senate go into effect and at as early a date as possible. The Executive Council will be chaired by the President of the Student Body.

#### III. THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY

A. The Constitution specifies that the General Assembly shall meet twice a month. Due to the basic purpose of the Assembly the time for such meetings must remain flexible. The primary motive for the General Assembly is to provide a means of communication between Student Government and the Student Body. Due to the very nature of the General Assembly, it provides the constitutional means for rallies, if issues arise that warrant this form of action.

#### IV. FACULTY COMMITTEES

A. All Student Representatives on Faculty Committees shall be responsible to Student Government. They shall present reports to their respective Senate Committee Chairman no less than once every month. The Executive Council shall issue directives to the Representatives whenever the Senate passes motions relating to their particular area.

#### V. THE PRESIDENT OF THE STUDENT BODY

A. The President is directly responsible to the Student Body and their representatives in the Senate. It is the responsibility of this office to see that all motions passed by the Senate are presented to the Executive Council. The President shall be the overall administrator of Government. It shall be his primary concern to see that all motions passed by the Senate are brought into effect and directed through the proper channels of Government. The President shall chair the Executive Council and the General Assembly. It shall be his responsibility to see that Student Government operates as an efficient unit.

These organizational changes are all constitutionally valid. One minor amendment will be needed to provide for a Public Relations Chairman. To operate efficiently as a Government we must at all times stay within the boundaries of the Constitution.

Communication between the Student Government and the Student Body as a whole will improve in a number of ways. General Assembly meetings will provide a forum for students to communicate their ideas to the

Student Government as a whole. The establishment of the Senate Committees provides students the chance for direct communication with the group who will be making the motions.

Our Government will be a creative and vital force; responsive to the needs of all students and the future of Dana. To insure a successful future, Dana needs Tom Nielsen and New Directions Through Organization.

## Freshman Girls Get Equal Time

One of the results of last week's Board of Regents Meeting was a decision to extend the hours for freshman girls. Effective This Monday night, April 2nd, the hours for Mickelsen Hall will be the same as the other two girls' dorms. The hours system for the freshman girls will be identical to that currently in use in Blair Hall. The doors will be locked at 12:00 midnight on weeknights and 2:00 a.m. on weekends. A night hostess will then be required to "sit up" from 12:00 to 2:00 a.m. on weeknights and from 2:00 to 4:00 a.m. on weekends to let those girls in who have signed out until those times. The girls will be given the option as to whether they wish to take on the responsibilities of sitting up or not. Those that want to take advantage of the extended hours will be required to sit up. Those that do not wish to play the role of "night hostess" will not be able to take advantage of the 2

hour extension. They will, however, be given an hour extension on their present hours, that is, their new hours will be 1:00 a.m. on weeknights and 2:00 a.m. on weekends.

## Student Photo Exhibit In Parnassus

A one-week exhibit of photographs by three Dana students are scheduled to open in Parnassus on Sunday, April 1. The exhibit features photographs by Drew Sorenson, a junior from Jefferson, Iowa; Kent Day, a freshman from Sioux Falls, South Dakota and Bob Oleson, a senior from Rapid City, South Dakota.

All three students are experienced and accomplished

Peder Mickelsen, one of Dana's most loyal friends and the man for whom Mickelsen Hall is named, is dead. Mr. Mickelsen died at his home in Florida late last week at the age of 83. He is survived by his widow Christine, a daughter Mrs. Emma Fronk, two grandchildren, one great grandchild and a brother in Denmark. President E.R. Mezoff and Board of Regents Secretary Ben Krantz attended the services for Mr. Mickelsen held in Holmes Beach, Florida on March 26.

Peder Mickelsen's association with Dana goes back many years. As a member of the Church Council of the former UELC, he played an important role in Dana's overall development. He was elected to the Dana Board of Trustees in 1951 and served in that position faithfully and proudly until 1962 when age forced his retirement as an active member. He remained an honorary member of the Board until the time of his death.

Mr. Mickelsen and his wife Christine have been extremely generous in their financial support of Dana. In the early 1940's, the President of Dana received a letter from Peder Mickelsen suggesting the College should consider purchasing several homes along College

Drive to be used as faculty residences. Typical of Mickelsen, he included a check for \$500. with his suggestion.

In June of 1958 as Dana was involved in her first major fund raising campaign, the Mickelsen's presented a gift to the college which amounted to approximately \$75,000.00 the largest single gift received by the College to that date. Then, when the first building in the Diamond Jubilee Development Program was planned, the Regents named it Mickelsen Hall in tribute to Peder and Christine Mickelsen.

The name Mickelsen is familiar to hundreds of Dana students who have enjoyed the comfortable living quarters provided in Mickelsen Hall. The furniture in the Lounge of Mickelsen, which is still in use today some fourteen years after the building was completed, was a special gift to the girls in the dorm from Mrs. Mickelsen. Other Dana students are familiar with the Mickelsens having received financial assistance for their college education through a scholarship established by them in memory of their son Lt. Henry Mickelsen who was killed during World War II. Excluding the scholarship, the Mickelsens are credited with gifts to Dana of more than \$175,000.00

## Students Disappointed With Regents Meeting

Thursday evening, March 22, the Board of Regents hosted a meeting of the Student Government faculty, and administration. This year was the Board's turn to provide the program and report. After a joke session, the audience was called upon to make suggestions for im-

provements at Dana, the Board not having anything prepared to present. Senators were frustrated at the apparent lack of seriousness shown by the Regents in their extremely brief comments and jokes about the suggestions turned in. Finally, Dr. Juel rose and asked the Board to take matters seriously and give respectful answers to the questions.

Some of the suggestions turned in were for an increase in enrollment, continuation of the liberal arts, and keeping a better Christian community. To these suggestions usually came a one-line comment of agreement with no plans of implementation or reports of their discussions on the matters.

Social life for students was a major topic of discussion. The Board stated that they did not want to impose rules for our social life, that should be up to us. But few of them were in favor of allowing alcohol on campus. About girls' hours one Board member asked, "Are we supposed to give you everything you ask for?" And to alcohol, one Regent asked if we would drink in a private home if it was not allowed here. They quickly passed to another suggestion when a senator asked if this was our college or their private college.

A few things were stated by the Board as being plans for the future.

1. publicity would be oriented to youth appeal
2. funds are being accumulated for a fine arts building
3. the liberal arts tradition will be continued.

Frustrations mounted as the Board members showed a reluctance to discuss controversial issues fully, such as co-ed dorms. Faculty and students were given the run-around and the Regents seemed to talk in circles. The faculty wished to know where funds from a Follis program had gone. Persistent reminders of the funds dedicated for a new Old

Main entrance seemed to be lost to the Board. Students invited to the meeting came as mature adults, to take the meeting seriously and listen to the Board's proposals, of which there were none. In speaking of financial losses, one Board member stated it was we "kids" who are to blame. It was hard to believe that, with coming faculty cuts, the Board said they are not willing to cut PEOPLE to get THINGS.

Some said the meeting was like talking to Jumpin' Jim for an hour. We were no better informed than before we came. No facts, figures, or proposals were given as was expected by those attending. It seems the students will have to take a lot of initiative if the present Board continues in this direction.

## Hunger Walk For CROP

On May 12, Covenant Community is sponsoring a Hunger Walk for CROP. CROP is the public community hunger appeal of Church World Service. CROP resources are channeled through this interdenominational relief agency to fight causes of hunger in 33 overseas countries.

Volunteer participants in the Hunger Walk will be from Dana and the Blair area. Each walker will enlist donors to pay an agreed amount of money per mile walked on the 20 mile route located in the area between Blair and Fort Calhoun. The walkers will leave A.M.A. at 7:30 to 8:00 a.m. Saturday, and will be furnished with car check points and rest areas along the route. The money raised from the Hunger Walk will be collected by May 18.
