Dana Closes Fiscal Year In The Black

Following an extensive audit by the firm of Anderson, Helguson, Lieser & Thorsen, Dana has officially closed its books for 1972-73 and, for the twentieth consecutive year, has produced a balanced budget.

While inflation, increased operating costs and temporary enrollment declines have had devastating effects on similar private, church-related colleges, Dana officials are quick to point out that in addition to maintaining an enviable record of 20 years operation in the black, the College has also produced a small operating surplus for the 1972-73 year.

Dr. Mezoff explained: "While careful budgeting and sound financial management have been utilized at Dana for the past twenty years, the major factor in our ability to operate in the black again this year has been the increased financial support we have received from our alumni and other friends of the College in the Blair-Omaha community, The American Lutheran Church and throughout the country. Without their personal

financial involvement, this could not have happened." He went on to explain that the College realized a total of \$545,282.74 in gifts and grants during 72-73 (including an annual subsidy from The American Lutheran Church which owns Dana College) compared to \$423,319.27 received from the same sources the previous year."

In addition to showing an operating surplus of approximately fifteen-hundred dollars, Mezoff also announced that the College's endowment fund has been increased by \$53,178.23 and its continuing fund for physical expansion by \$80,044.02. The additions to the endowment and expansion funds were made possible by two gifts restricted for those purposes.

Dana officially begins her 89th academic year next week and, provided enrollment expectations are realized and private support continues or exceeds its present level, the College's unmarred record of twenty consecutive years of operating in the black should continue.

Yesterday at 9:00 a.m., opening convocation ceremonies were held in A.M.A. The 89th academic year was officially opened. Ceremonial proceedings which Dana has not used in recent years were initiated.

The major change was the installation of student body officers and senators made by Dr. Earl Mezoff, President of the college. Following the installation, Student Body President Thomas S. Nielsen responded. He assured the college that student government would strive to promote student welfare, academically and personally.

Following Nielsen, the new Dean of the College, Dr. Robert J. Glass was introduced. Dr. Glass then spoke on his reasons for accepting his position at Dana. He emphasized Dana's church relationship.

Maintaining that Dana exhibits the concept of Christian stewardship in campus operation and financial management, Dr. Glass went on to say that the college is seeking a stronger relationship with the church.

Other reasons Dr. Glass mentioned were Dana's smallness, its liberal arts tradition and the fact that the college is unique in itself.

In the main address by the President, Mezoff reviewed the past year and gave insights on Dana's future. He acknowledged Dana's assets - high quality student body, confident dedicated faculty, a physical plant which other colleges similar to Dana do not have, sound business management, and a strong heritage.

Mezoff stated that the church related college should become more Christian in every aspect.

Those colleges who do not, he said, are diminishing. In relation to Dana, he said the future lies with the church.

Dr. Mezoff also announced the creation of a new long range planning committee. Being composed of administration, faculty and students, it will begin operation immediately. Members of the committee include - Dr. Clifford Hanson, Dr. John Northwall, Professor Roger Olsen, and Professor Paul Peterson of the faculty; Dr. Mezoff, Dr. Glass, Dr. Rasmussen, and Mr. Keith Hansen of the administration; Rachel Neve Benbow and Student Body President Tom Nielsen of the student body.

Before closing his address, Dr. Mezoff noted to the college community that the possession, use or sale of drugs or alcohol on campus will be prohibited.

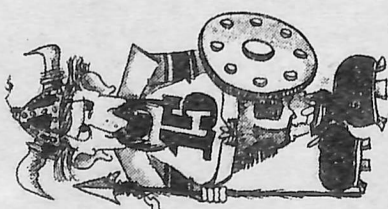

Mr. Hansen, who came to Dana in 1970 as Assistant Business Manager, will assume the post of Business Manager following the retirement of Mr. A.J. Snowbeck on September 1. Prior to coming to Dana Hansen served as Business Manager at John F. Kennedy College in Wahoo.

He will continue as a member of the teaching faculty but his teaching duties will be reduced in order to allow him time to devote to his new office. As Director of Church Relations he will be involved in developing programs of expanded service to the pastors and congregations of the Central

District of the American Lutheran Church. He will also be responsible for developing seminars and programs of continuing education for pastors and laymen of the Central District and Western Iowa.

The Saga Story Cafeteria Changes Come To Dana

Beginning this year, Dana's Food Service is under new management, that being Saga Food Service whose national headquarters are centered at Menlo Park, California. A leader in college food service, Saga now operates in over 300 colleges nationally and in Canada. They are also known for their services in hospitals, restaurants and pizza firms. Since it is easier for colleges to feed their students by a contract feeding method, Dana has secured this means of feeding their students.

"Saga" is under the direction of Art Waters, 24, who comes to Dana from Earlhan College in Richmond, Indiana and Mt. Vernon Nazarene College in Mt. Vernon, Ohio. Waters secured his B.S. in Restaurant Management from Ohio State.

Run under an "All you can eat" policy, Saga proposes to give

adequate portions the first-time through, and if a desire for more food occurs, 'seconds' are permitted, as are 'thirds' for that matter. This method minimizes wasting of food.

Some of the standards 'Saga' will stick to will include a choice of four desserts per meal, five salads, 3 main entrees (except for the weekends) and 13 beverages.

The menus this year will be on a thirteen week cycle, which means that we may have the same food, but in different combinations. This schedule is set up by computer, but adjustments will be made, according to Mr. Waters, to cater to the students likes or dislikes.

Also in the planning are a total of nine special meals, such as Thanksgiving, Homecoming, Christmas and the like. To aid in efficient service, Mr. Waters

Dana Loses Three Staff Members

A.J. Snowbeck, Calvin Jorgensen and Mrs. Cochran leave staff

When the 89th year opens at Dana this week, three long time members of the staff will not be present due to retirement and resignations.

Scheduled to retire after 27 years of service to the College is Mr. A. J. Snowbeck, Business Manager. Snowbeck came to Dana in 1946 as a member of the teaching staff in the department

of Business Administration. Eight years later, in 1954, he accepted the position of Business Manager for the College and has remained in that post until now. He is scheduled to retire from active service on September 1.

The Dana catalog for the year 1954-55, Mr. Snowbeck's first full year as Business Manager, indicates there were a total of 317 students enrolled in the College and Seminary. The cost for a year at Dana in those days was listed at \$800.00 and the physical campus in 1954 con-

sisted of 20 acres and five permanent buildings. Dana was also with other problems including financial difficulties and the preparation for a third examination for accreditation by the North Central Association.

In the years that followed, Dana's enrollment began to climb, accreditation by North Central was received, the campus was expanded by more than 200 acres and nine new buildings representing approximately \$6 million in construction were completed. With these external changes came even more, but less noticeable, internal changes—curriculum was upgraded, teaching and administrative staffs were expanded and improved, sound management principles were introduced and, as a result, the College operated on a sound financial basis producing a balanced budget each year since 1954.

While improvements and expansion at Dana during the past twenty years cannot be directly attributed to the efforts of any single individual, Mr. A. J. Snowbeck has undoubtedly played a vital and highly influential role in achieving such important milestones for Dana as:

---receiving accreditation by the North Central Association.

---implementing sound management techniques and streamlining the operation and effectiveness of the College's auxiliary enterprises and investment programs.

---increasing student enrollment, student services and student financial aid.

---advising and directing architects and engineers in a program of expansion the size of which had never before been

realized at Dana. These are only a few of the major involvements and contributions of a man who has unselfishly given of his time and abilities to help shape the progress and future of Dana College. Now, after 27 years of total personal dedication, Mr. Snowbeck has retired!

Mr. and Mrs. Snowbeck were guests of honor at the President's Dinner for faculty and staff held at the Hilltop House in Omaha on Friday evening, August 31. During the course of the evening Dana President Earl Mezoff paid tribute to Mr. Snowbeck's ability and dedication and expressed thanks and appreciation to him on behalf of the Dana administration, faculty, students and alumni. As a memento of years at Dana President Mezoff also presented him with a gold watch appropriately engraved with a message of thanks and good wishes.

Eight New Faces On Staff This Fall

Eight new appointments to the staff at Dana Collège have been confirmed by Dr. Mezoff.

The only new appointment to the full-time teaching staff at Dana this year is Mr. Lawrence Lewis who will serve as an Instructor in Business Administration. Mr. Lewis is a graduate of the University of Missouri and comes to Dana from a teaching position at Avila College. Part-time members of the faculty added this Fall include Mrs. Beverly A. Krueger in French, Mrs. Genevieve Munson in French and Mrs. Judy Pittack in Art.

In an earlier statement Mezoff announced the appointment of Dr. Robert J. Glass as the new Dean of the College. Dr. Glass arrived in Blair during mid-July and has since been at work preparing for the opening of the 1973-74 year. He is a graduate

of Yale University, George Washington University and the University of Maryland. Prior to coming to Dana he served as Dean of Cottey College in Missouri.

Returning to the staff following four years of service with the Air Force is Mr. Kenneth C. Lizer. Lizer, who served as an Admissions Counselor at Dana in 1968-69, has assumed the position of Assistant Director of Admissions and Director of Financial Aid. He replaces Mr. Calvin Jorgensen who resigned that post as of September 1.

Changes in the secretarial staff include Mrs. Roger Grosnickle, secretary to the President.

FEATURING TEACHERING

Mr. Richard Jorgensen received his doctorate in philosophy (Ph.D.) in history this summer from Duke University at Durham, North Carolina. His doctoral dissertation is "The Kingship of William III, 1689-1697." Dr. Jorgensen, in 1967-68, did research in England, and started writing in the fall of 1969-70.

DORM LEADERS ATTEND WORKSHOP

On Wednesday, September 5 in the Gold Room of the campus center all dormitory personnel took part in "How Can I Help?", a workshop for resident assistants, housemothers and Dean Jorgensen. The purpose of the meeting was to introduce, in a meaningful way, Dana College Residence Hall personnel to the staff members of the Blair Mental Health Clinic and also to increase the helping skills of those involved in student welfare through the dormitories of Dana College.

By using the method of experiential learning of helping techniques and information use, Polly Kipp, co-coordinator of the workshop, from Immanuel Community Mental Health Center in Omaha presented materials in an interesting and useful manner.

The workshop centered on establishing meaningful and helpful human relations and on the most part, these techniques were successfully achieved.

Other problems discussed during the course of the day included such areas as Homesickness, Depression, Human sexuality and Anxiety.

As the day progressed, representatives from the Clergy Consultation Service's for Problem Pregnancies informed floor leaders, as well as others of the options one can take when confronted with problems concerning sex.

Before the end of the afternoon was done, a staff member from the Blair Mental Health Clinic gave advice concerning problems dealing with drugs and mental anxieties, in general.

The workshop, it was felt by most members present, was a success. Another meeting along the same lines will be conducted in late October.

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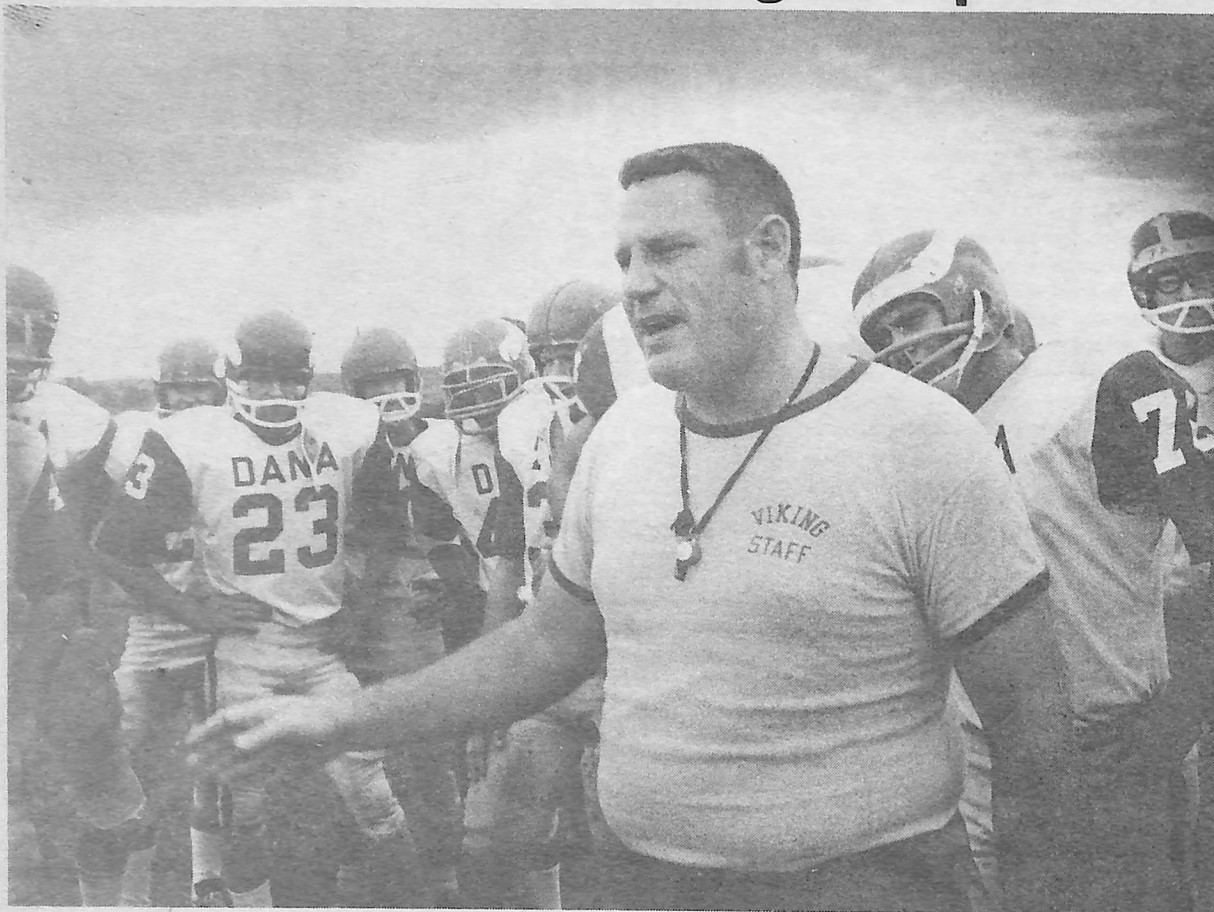

First Week Of Training Completed



Head football coach for the Dana Vikings, Bob Simpson, and members of the '73 squad, have been at work on Viking Field since Monday, August 27. With the first week of practice and work-outs behind them, things are beginning to "look-up" for the Vikings.

Equipment has been issued to forty-three candidates for the '73 Viking football squad at Dana. Practice sessions began on Monday, August 27.

According to head coach Bob Simpson, fourteen Viking lettermen have reported for practice in addition to a number of top freshmen prospects. Together with assistant Paul Peterson and trainers Dale Lemon and Brad Larson, Coach Simpson has been at work throughout with the team stressing conditioning training and defensive coordination.

Lack of size and experience seems to be major areas of concern for the '73 Vikings and, according to the coaches, this will definitely be a "rebuilding" year for Dana football. Simpson was quick to point out, however, that the Vikings do have considerable strength in the offensive and

defensive backfield because of the return of key lettermen. The squad will also enjoy unusual depth at the quarterback spot.

Included in the list of top new prospects are:

LINEBACKERS: Mike Herbert, freshman from North Wales, Pennsylvania; and Mike Todd, freshman from Murdock, Nebraska.

QUARTERBACKS: Bill Cunard, freshman from Missouri Valley, Iowa; Mark Kershaw, a '73 graduate of Omaha Westside; George Bryant, a freshman from Omaha North.

LINEMEN: Kevin Weng, freshman from Parlin, New Jersey; Darien Haeffner, freshman from Lyons, Nebraska; Eddie Greer, freshman from Oxford, Pennsylvania; Bart Near, fresh-

man from Etrick, Wisconsin; Fred McBath, freshman from Missouri Valley, Ia., Jeff Thompson, Freshman from Dunlap, Iowa; and Lowell Petersen, freshman from Denison, Iowa.

BACKS: Marshall Baker, freshman from Denver, Colorado; Ed Spicer, freshman from Lambertville, New Jersey; Curt Maschman, freshman from Daykin, Nebraska; John Ruffcorn, freshman from Council Bluffs; Mike Phipps, freshman from Ute, Iowa and Tim Talmadge, freshman from Omaha Northwest.

Schneider To Again Be Anchor For Dana

The first scrimmage of the '73 season by the Vikings took place on Saturday, September 2. Following five days of two-a-day practices in August, Coaches Bob Simpson and Paul Peterson used the opportunity to closely scrutinize the talents of the freshmen players and to analyze team unity and strength as a whole.

Returning lettermen Rick Mewhirter of Atlantic, Iowa and Ron Schneider of Blair, Nebraska will anchor the Dana offensive backfield and Coach Simpson indicated that both have shown good strength.

On the strong offensive line will be returnees Jerry Wilke of Omaha, Nebraska, Don Huerling of Bellevue, Ohio and Bob Jones of Mineola, Iowa and Dave Larsen of Primghar, Iowa along with freshman Kevin Weng of Parlin, New Jersey.

Veteran Mike Urdahl of Schnecksville, Pennsylvania has proved to be a bright spot at the tight-end this year displaying good receiving along with excellent blocking.

The quarterback position is well supplied this season with the talents of veteran Don Nevius of Corning, Iowa along with second year man Stan Hicks of Irwin, Ohio and freshmen George Bryant of Omaha and Bill Cunard of Missouri Valley, Iowa.

Coach Simpson pointed out that the only weaknesses offensively were a rather weak passing attack and overall timing.

The defensive line will be anchored by returnee Dan Dye of Cedar Rapids, Iowa. Freshmen who will probably be given a spot on the defensive front include Ed Greer of Oxford, Pennsylvania,

Jeff Thompson of Dunlap, Iowa; Darien Haeffner of Decatur, Iowa and Bart Near of Etrick, Wisconsin.

At the linebacking position this season will be veterans Rick Waite of Woodbine, Iowa and Tebbe Ginger of Shenandoah, Iowa, along with newcomers Mike Todd of Murdock, Nebraska; Mike Herbert of

North Wales, Pennsylvania and Marty Baker of Denver, Colorado.

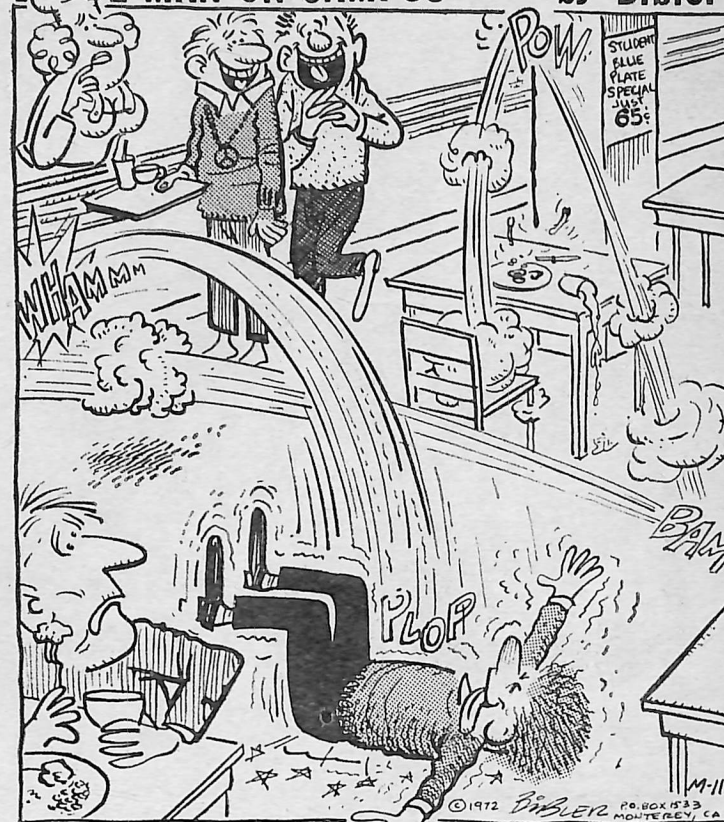
A strong pass defense can be expected from the Vikings this year with freshman Mike Phipps of Charter Oak, Iowa and returning veterans Terry Jensen of Schaller, Iowa, Craig Parkinson of Spencer, Iowa and Rod Jasa of St. Edward, Nebraska filling the positions in the defensive backfield.

As of September 2, two-a-day practices have been discontinued while weight training, running and one-a-day sessions continue.

Several key positions have yet to be filled but Coach Simpson stated he felt all spots would be successfully filled in time for the opening game of the season when the Vikings meet Sioux Falls at home on September 15.
