SENATE BLAMED FOR RESIGNATIONS

Tjomsland, Hagen Resign

With the close of Wednesday's Senate meeting came the filing of resignations by John Tjomsland and Ken Hagen.

Tjomsland serves as chairman of the Student life Committee. Hagen is the campus Ombudsman. Both positions are filled by presidential appointment.

Parliamentary procedure had fluctuated from a weak state to non-existence during much of the meeting. Immediately after the last budget item was voted on, Nielsen was given the floor. As he moved to adjourn, Tjomsland yelled from the back of the room. Saying 'you can't do that. You can't do that, I've still got some business.' Pointing to Zimmerman, vice-president, he continued, "He has to ask if their is any more business."

So, Zimmerman tried to ask if there was any more business. But, Nielsen stated since his motion had been recognized it had to be seconded and voted upon. Then, Zimmerman recognized a second and asked for a vote. The motion to adjourn was defeated.

Finally, Zimmerman asked if there was any more new business. He recognized Tjomsland.

Tjomsland then read his resignation from his tablet and gave the floor to Ken Hagen.

Hagen waited to be recognized and also read his resignation. Both resigned on grounds stemming from the Student Senate's refusal to fund Spiritual Emphasis. Hagen stated that he could not "work with this type of 'Christian' government 'in good

conscience.' Tjomsland said that it would be a 'compromise of his individual beliefs and faith' to remain a member of Student Government.

Seconds after submitting his resignation, Tjomsland stomped to the back of the room. He then launched into an oratory climaxing a senatorial holocaust.

"I've been in Student Senate for 3 years now and each year the Senate passes motions and then feels sorry about it later. If you can't get your heads out of your ass now I don't want a part of it anymore."

Tjomsland turned and walked out the door.

The Senate then adjourned.

Both men are still in office. Nielsen refused to accept either resignation.

Make Europe Your Interim Destination

European travel, once only for the wealthy, is now possible for almost anyone with a keen interest in becoming better acquainted with foreign cultures.

One of the better ways to travel abroad is by registering for a foreign study interim. ANIC, the Association of Nebraska Interim Colleges consisting of Dana, Doane, Concordia, Hastings, and Midland, is offering six interims involving foreign travel. The deadline for registering for these interims has been moved up to Monday, October 1, with a down payment of \$75 required.

Dana's interim is "The World and Thought of Albert Camus and Jean Paul Sartre," which is scheduled for France, Spain and North Africa. Mr. John Nielsen and Dr. Penick will conduct the interim. The group will read works by both Albert Camus and Jean Paul Sartre and discuss them enroute, with special emphasis upon the literary, cultural and philosophical aspects. Tentative arrangements include a rail journey with stops in Italy and Sicily, a Mediterranean crossing by boat, a journey with courier across Tunisia, Algeria, and Morocco, a crossing of the Straits of Gibraltar and rail travel stops in Spain and France before a long stay in Paris and a return to Frankfurt. Each student will be required to keep a journal from which excerpts will be submitted as an interim

paper. There is possible credit in French, literature and philosophy.

The estimated cost of Dana's interim is \$850. This includes flight to and from Europe, continental travel by Eurail, ferry and/or plane to Africa, African land travel by rail, hotel accommodations, breakfast and one meal per day, tipping at the hotel and at restaurants when the meal is provided and entrance fee to all required museums or events. The charge does not include the third meal, spending money, health or accident insurance, travel to the point of European departure or the return travel at the end of charter flight to the home or college. On certain occasions it will be necessary to travel all night in first class compartments or couchettes.

Other ANIC foreign study interims include the following: Concordia College - The Near East (\$750), Midland - Italy (\$980), Midland - Spain (\$650), Doane - Rome, Athens and Istanbul (\$1,400), Concordia - The Soviet Union, Czechoslovakia, Poland and Germany (\$850).

Foreign travel has been the dreams of most people, and now it is becoming increasingly common. One of the best chances many students will ever have to travel is through an interim abroad. If you are interested in any of the foreign interims, please see Mr. Nielsen soon.

Budget Gets Senate Approval

Last Wednesday night the Student Senate approved President Tom Nielsen's budget after nearly three hours of legislation.

On a motion by Mary Staby, sophomore senator, each item of the budget was voted on separately.

Because of a smaller enrollment this year, several areas received cuts in appropriations.

Despite the drop, the income for first semester this year was slightly above that of last year's fall term. First semester of 1972-73 was budgeted on an income of \$12,000. The reason for this added income was explained as being a carry-over from second semester last year, amounting to \$2,048.86.

Nielsen presented the salaries for approval, first. The President's and Vice-President's were approved without debate.

After presenting the Senate the salary of the secretary, Nielsen was questioned what the salary for the secretarial position had been last fall. He answered that, although it had been \$37.50, this was unconstitutional. According to a by-law in the minutes of the 1970-71 Senate, the salaries of the Executive Committee were permanently fixed. According to the bill passed in 70-71 legislation the executive committee for 72-73 was underpaid \$75 for first semester. This revelation came as a surprise to most senators who then continued to approve all salaries with little or no discussion.

We Are Looking Good

This year marks the first year in at least the past four years that Dana's number of incoming freshmen has not decreased. The Admissions Department has instead helped to slow down the yearly drop of incoming freshmen. Last year about 150 freshmen enrolled in classes first semester. This year that number remains the same. Perhaps even more important than these figures are the figures that show a return of 82% of last year's freshmen, which is an increase of approximately 15% from the preceding year.

These two factors, according to Dr. Mezzoff, are the main factors for his optimistic view of our present enrollment. As Dr. Mezzoff stated earlier this week, "I'm generally pleased, although naturally I'd be pleased if the enrollment were larger."

In a release from the Office of the Registrar on September 14, 1973, the enrollment is as follows:

Senate Throttles Spiritual Emphasis

In one of the hotter Student Senate meetings of recent years, the Spiritual Emphasis group was denied direct allocation by the Senate for the fall term.

Flaring tempers, personal confessions, profanity, and angry voices, shook the bastions of Old Main III last Wednesday night.

After approving the salaries for various student body officers, the Senate listened to a statement and request by Religious Director Steve Berke.

Berke's statement contained Article V, Section 7, of the constitution of the student body and a quotation from its preamble. Stressing that the student congregation, **Ekklesia Koinonias** needed the funds for the purpose of Sunday pastoral supply and worship materials for the fall term, Berke read his statement and questioned Nielsen on why he did not figure Spiritual Emphasis into the budget.

Nielsen answered that Spiritual Emphasis had formerly been a period in the semester when a special stress was placed

on spirituality. He continued that since S.E. no longer performed this function, it no longer needed the funds.

Berke countered that the Student Congregation had decided to emphasize spirituality all semester and that they no longer had contact with the sources for a S.E. period on the calendar.

Despite this reaction, funds were not allocated. Further discussion questioned whether S.E. was indeed, a student extra-curricular 'organization'. This led to a parallel of S.E. with the Boy Scouts of America.

Somewhere near this point in the meeting, parliamentary procedure was lost.

When order had been somewhat restored, Student Senate refused funds for Spiritual Emphasis, specifically.

The Student Congregation, although no longer funded through Spiritual Emphasis, may still obtain funds from Human Rights and Concerns or by a gift from the Student Senate Miscellaneous Fund.

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Youthful Team Gets Baptism

The young and small Dana Vikings met a much larger Sioux Falls team last Saturday. The Braves used a strong ground attack to pound out a 10 - 0 victory. Dana's inexperience showed in an inconsistent offense and mistakes accounted for many losses. The Vikings were led offensively by senior Rick Mewhirter who rushed for a total of 50 yards and defensively by freshman linebacker Mike Herbert. The Braves were paced by senior Roger Guge's 200 yard rushing total.

1st quarter -

Craig Parkinson pulled down a runner from behind after a long gain down to the 25 yard line. Later the Braves put the ball over on an effective sweep. Dana's offense failed to get a first down in this quarter. Viking Dan Dye stopped the Sioux Falls attack on a fourth down play in a later Brave scoring drive inside the 25 yard line.

2nd quarter -

In the second quarter the Dana offense made a serious scoring threat following a Mike Herbert interception. A few plays later, Rick Mewhirter moved the ball into Sioux Falls territory as the offensive line pulled together to open some holes. However, the drive was halted on downs. Terry Jensen made an interception and moved the ball 30 yards down to the 25 for the Vikings. A

penalty moved the ball closer but the hard-rushing Brave defense pushed the Vikings out of scoring range as time ran out.

3rd quarter -

The Braves' kicking game kept the Vikings in a hole all afternoon as their first punt of the quarter put the Vikings on their own 3 yard line. Then the Vikings pulled off some razzle-dazzle as Rick Mewhirter

lateraled to Ron Schneider, who in turn passed to quarterback Don Nevius on the other side of the field. Nevius then weaved his

way down to Sioux Falls territory. But an interception on the 1 yard line ended that drive. Dana was across midfield once more on a 15 yard punt return by freshman Curt Maschman but could not break the Braves' defense.

4th quarter -

The Braves increased their lead on a 45 yard field goal kicked into the wind. Another of their scoring drives was halted when Dana received a fumble on the 10 yard line. Hard tackling by Mike Herbert slowed the Sioux Falls attack most of the day. Viking quarterback Don Nevius was injured in the closing minutes and freshman Bill Cunard took over. He showed promise as the Vikings crossed midfield once more. But mistakes again stalled the team on their drive.
