Danish "Futures" Expert To Lecture

Mr. Arne Sorensen, founder and president of the Danish Society for Research on Futures, will be visiting the campus today, October 12. He will present a public lecture entitled "Denmark -- A Green Metropolis" beginning at 3 p.m. this afternoon in Parnassus.

In his presentation at Dana, Sorensen will explain how Denmark is creating and practicing a new philosophy of urbanization and country and regional planning. This new philosophy represents a revolt against the major Danish policies of previous decades which were generally aimed at dividing Denmark into two countries -- one of growing industrial concentration and one emptied as much as possible of

human activity in order to become recreative areas for people from the large cities. The new plan calls for an open kind of urbanization for the entire country. According to Sorensen, this is the only way to obliterate the industrial scars on the landscape.

Sorensen is a Social Anthropologist who, for the past twenty years, has turned to special studies of societies exposed to changes. From 1970 to 1972 he served as Secretary General of the World Futures Research Conferences. Recently he has been appointed President of Denmark's new College of the Future which is scheduled to open on September 1, 1974.

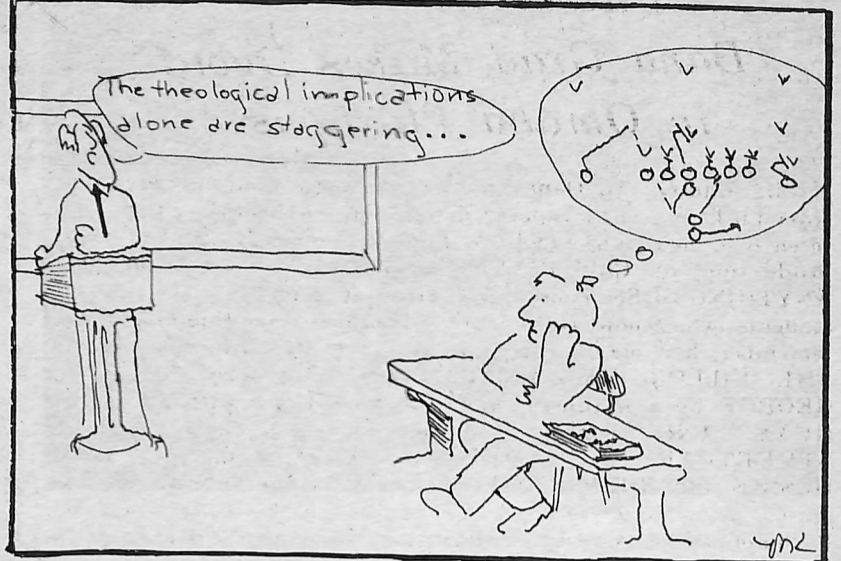
NCATE Reaffirms Accreditation

LETTERS TO THE EDITORS

1973 at 8 a.m. through October 17, 1973. (Motion failed.)

2) I move that the Student Senate in recognizing the authoritarian aspect of justice call for the abolishment of the judicial system of Dana College. (Motion tabled.)

3) I move that the Student Senate call a Student Body Meeting to protest the mishandling of the judicial system of Dana College for 10 P.M. on October 10, 1973 in the oval of the campus center. (Motion failed.)

As Nielsen's motions grew increasingly absurd, the senate exercised their votes to check what appeared to be dictatorial powers wanted for the Presidency. Since the Student Senate chose not to sanction Nielsen's meeting and change it from the status of "Meeting of the Student Body" to "Student Body Meeting", his attitude the entire evening was one of personal abuse, ill treatment, misuse and rejection by the Student Senate. All this was because Nielsen was not given permission to satisfy his own whims. So with the classic "everybody - is - out - to - get - me --- won't you out there help me" approach, Nielsen urged his title as President and "authority" vested in that office to publicly state his own opinions. (I wonder what would happen if someone who disagrees with Tom posted signs, set up speakers, and chaired a mass rally for the other side?)

Among some of Nielsen's illustrious statements of the evening were something on the order of: . . .

...the purpose of this meeting was to oppose mishandling of the judicial process at Dana (I didn't recall any statement that the

judicial process HAD been mishandled!)

...that the student body was not in favor of defending the rights of the students.

...the entire administration was irresponsible.

...the Judicial system had been flagrantly ignored.

...He had told Dean Jorgensen he could attend the meeting, but that he wouldn't be invited.

...and the Granddaddy of them all... (QUOTE) "Spread your legs and get kicked in the balls." (which we all agree was a totally relevant and poetic statement!)

Generally, I deeply admire the person who will stand up and state real convictions, but Brian Anderson only found a chance to make a big name for Brian. He really proved only two things:

1) He doesn't know proper microphone technique, and 2) he should try out for cheerleading.

John Jacobsen did make one of the few same contributions of the evening. Most of us would agree that we don't want to deny

ANY person the right to go to school. If an individual believes he is willing to be punished in any way decided short of suspension, and is fighting this hard, this far, he deserves a drop of compassion. However, I would hate to see his efforts spoiled because of any results of the lopsided meeting last Wednesday.

Nielsen's closing remark was "I'm sorry the student government failed you!"

No matter how "disillusioned and disheartened" the president is, he has no authority to disregard the decisions of the student government. Their actions are theoretically the representative wishes of the electorate. If people feel they are not being represented truthfully, then the students who DO CARE will contact their representatives and make their feelings known, attend meetings (they're always open, you know), and make an attempt to know all sides of the issues.

Dana Grad Makes Debut In Omaha Playhouse

Gale Madsen, '73 Dana grad from Luck, Wisconsin, appeared recently in the Omaha Playhouse production of Cole Porter's ANYTHING GOES. Those Dana students who know Gale may remember her major roles in THE KILLING OF SISTER GEORGE as a freshman, and GUYS AND DOLLS, A STREETCAR NAMED DESIRE, and THE MISER, her senior year. Gale received a Bachelor of Arts' Degree in Music from Dana, and minored in Speech and Theatre. She now works in the loan department of Omaha's Commercial Federal Savings and Loan.

Gale describes ANYTHING GOES as a "typical 1930's musical," in which she played the part of Hope Harcourt, around whom the play revolves. The director said he wanted the part "sweet and innocent" but the development of a believable character was up to Gale. Gale describes Hope as a "thankless role with not funny lines" which was hard to get into, but says she liked Hope, or wouldn't have been able to get into the part at all.

The 35 other cast members ranged in age from 14 to 60. Gale was surprised during the three nights of tryouts at the mediocrity or lack of talent, having prepared herself to expect much more. Rehearsals began the end of July, and Gale felt that by September 14 they had spent too much time rehearsing. Of the 21 nights of performance, she comments that "none were bad, but every night something

went wrong." Each audience was different, so timing of lines could not be planned, and it was challenging to keep the excitement going.

Gale described this experience as "totally different from college." The Playhouse stage was much larger, with more wing and loft space. She commented that others of the cast were either very good or rather poor, whereas in the college setting most talents are on the same level. The blocking was very sketchy, being done in two nights, with the director giving only general directions. Gale felt the director, who was himself a professional actor, left more up to the cast and expected more of them than, say, on the college level, leaving character development almost entirely up to the individual. They also worked from the script much longer than Gale was used to in her previous experience. Giving twenty one performances made Gale feel this experience was certainly more worthwhile, although she said it was hard to go each night to the Playhouse, and make up for so many nights.

Of the roles she has played so far, Gale says Adelaide in GUYS AND DOLLS is definitely her favorite. She views her theatre experience as a great way to meet many different and exciting people. As for her "big dreams" of the future, Gale hopes to keep on going, possibly studying musical theatre in graduate school, meanwhile acting and singing as much as she can.

Plainsmen Over Vikes, 21-0

In a hotly contested battle, Nebraska Wesleyan was able to mount three scoring drives to defeat Dana in their second home appearance. Even though plagued by penalties, the Plainsmen were able to make the key plays to halt the Viking attack and to keep their own offense alive. The Wesleyan defensive line played a great game as they all but shut off the rushing game of Dana. A much-improved Dana defense was able to hold off attacks for most of the game, but a few injuries and hard blocks by Wesleyan's line weakened the defense for a big drive. kicker penalty gave Dana the ball in good position. Stan Hicks entered as quarterback when Nevius was shaken up on the play. Hicks sneaked to convert a 4th and one. An interference call and a pass to Hibbing gave Dana a 1st and 10 on the 10 yard line. Mike Urdahl made a spectacular catch to get the ball on the 2 yard line. But the threat ended when a 4th and inches was halted inside the one yard line. Third quarter: Wesleyan 14, Dana 0

Wesleyan mounted another time-consuming scoring drive. They got the touchdown going over from the five on a rushing play as they pounded the same hole constantly. Hicks could not

get the offense going again and Dana was forced to give the ball over. After Wesleyan missed a field goal, Hicks took to the air but couldn't connect with his receivers. A Wesleyan fumble gave Dana the ball at the close of the quarter.

Consecutive passes to Corbin and Hibbing, of 22 and 5 yards, respectively, threatened the Plainsman defense. But they pulled together again to halt the Vikes. Wesleyan was again able to get their offense moving and mount a third drive for the final score.

Westmar to only one against Wesleyan.

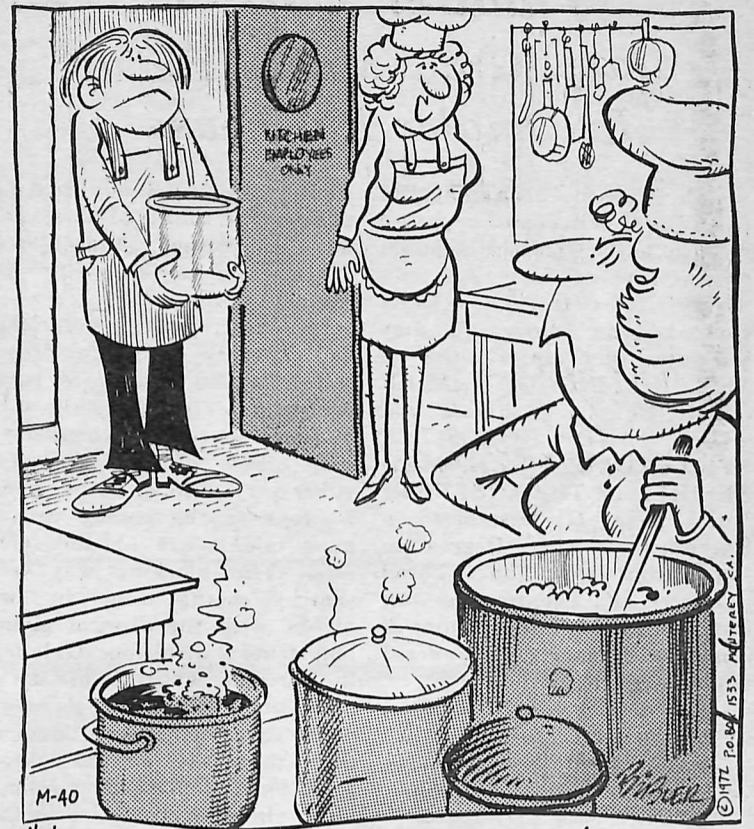
