

# VEL- KOMMEN ALUMNI TO HOMECOMING '73

Homecoming at Dana, emphasizing a general "return to the river" theme, is scheduled for this weekend, October 26, 27 and 28 on the campus. A series of special attractions relating to the current interest in the Riverfront Development Project are planned in addition to the usual Homecoming events. Some of the special attractions include excursions on the Missouri aboard the "Belle of Brownville," performances of an American melodrama reminiscent of the river-boat era, displays of Riverfront Development projects in the Campus Center including the proposed Black Elk-Neihardt Sanctuary, and a special Homecoming buffet dinner with a riverboat menu in the Campus Center.

Homecoming Headquarters is scheduled to open in the Linden Room of the Campus Center at 2 p.m. on Friday afternoon. Reservations and tickets for all events of the weekend will be available here.

Homecoming Headquarters reopens at 9 a.m. on Saturday morning in the Campus Center. Also beginning at 9 a.m., alumni and other campus guests will attend an informal reception hosted by members of the faculty and staff in the Parnassus Room.

Members of the classes of 1948, 1963 and 1968 will be observing their 25th, 10th and 5th anniversaries of graduation during the Homecoming weekend. They will be honored at the Alumni Luncheon scheduled for 11:30 a.m. on Saturday at the Fiesta Grade in Blair. The Luncheon will be served continuously from 11:30 a.m. thereby making it possible for persons on the riverboat excursion to take advantage of the luncheon immediately upon their return.

The Homecoming Buffet dinner will be served at two separate hours on Saturday evening, 5:30 p.m. and 6:30 p.m. in the main dining room of the Campus Center. A special riverboat menu has been planned for the dinner. Members of the anniversary classes, 1948, 1963 and 1968, will hold individual reunion dinners at 6:30 p.m. in the main dining room. Former

members of the Dana Choir are also encouraged to eat during the 6:30 hour, and provided enough alumni attend, an informal choir reunion will be held at that time.

Something new, especially for alumni, has been added to the 1973 Homecoming weekend lineup. The facilities of the Fiesta Grande will be reserved exclusively for Dana alums and their spouses or dates from approximately 10:30 p.m. on Saturday evening until ????

Homecoming activities continue on Sunday morning at 10:30 a.m. with a Festival Worship Service in Alumni Memorial Auditorium. Music for the Sunday service will be provided by the Dana College Choir.

## President Interviewed On Prospects Of Black Elk Park

One of the central figures in the planning of the proposed Black Elk-Neihardt Park is Dr. Earl Mezoff. He is serving as treasurer of a board appointed by Blair's mayor to study plans for the monument and also as president of Dana College he is responsible for helping to establish Dana's role in the planning of the monument.

When talking with Dr. Mezoff, I felt he was very enthusiastic and committed to the project. He felt the monument was important because it recognized a significant segment of America -- the Indians -- and that the monument's inspiration came from the words of a white man very acceptable to the Indians -- John Neihardt. Dr. Mezoff further noted the excellent location for the monument -- he believed the hill to be the highest point in Washington County and the monument could thus be seen for a considerable distance.

According to Dr. Mezoff, financing is the chief concern right now. Roughly one half million dollars is needed. Money would hopefully come from foundations, individuals, the Riverfront Development Commission, and state and federal government agencies. Public funds are generally tightly restricted. However, Dr. Mezoff believed public money would be available for designing the monument. The designing might encompass up to ten percent of the total budget.

Dr. Mezoff noted a great deal of enthusiasm from church leaders, civic organizations, and government agencies and finds this encouraging.

When will the project begin? Dr. Mezoff did not care to speculate on this. However, he did emphasize the importance of planning, so that when the project is done, it will be done right and there will be no abortive attempt.

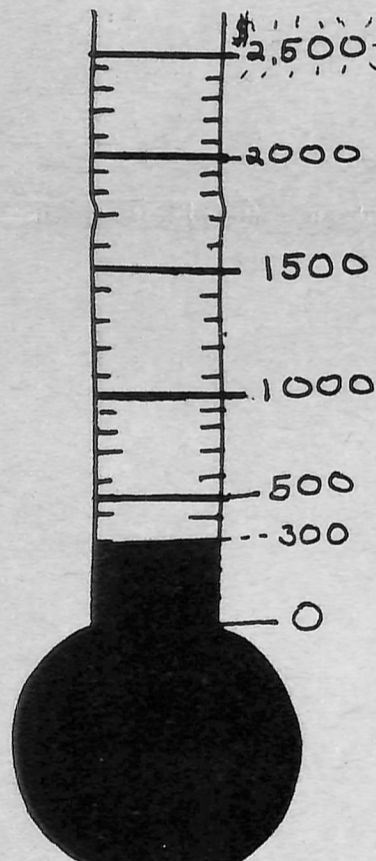

## Crucifix Fund Gets Big Boost



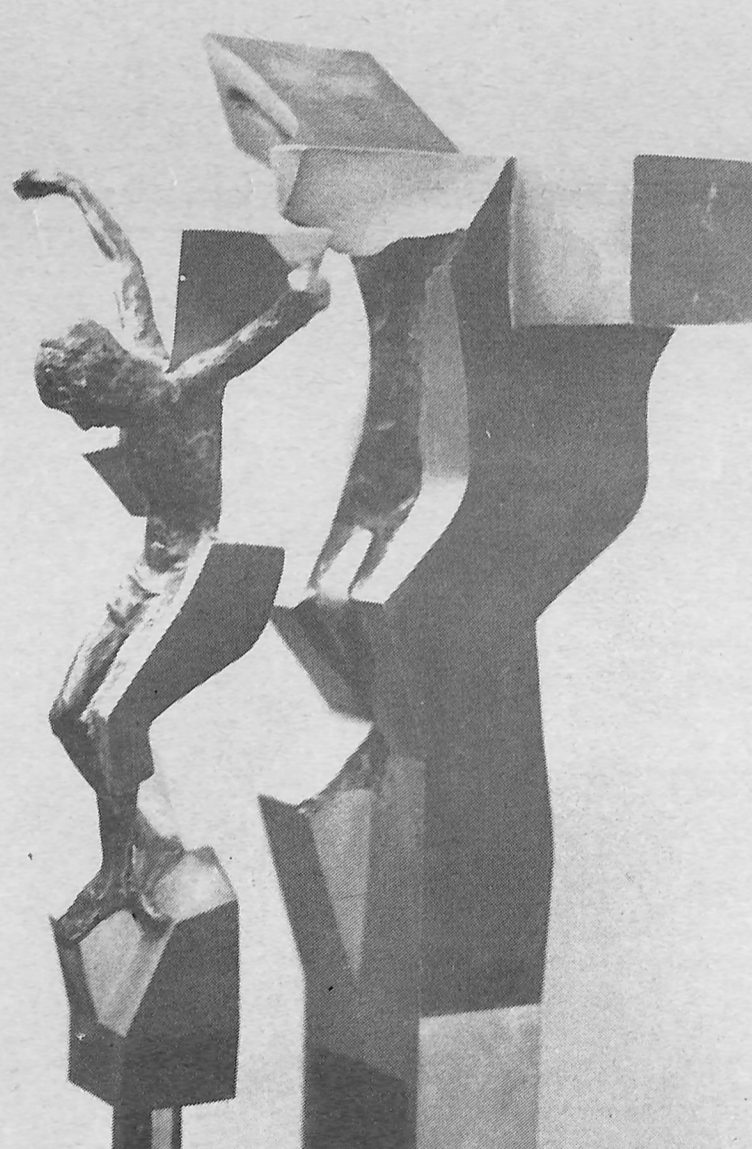

selections from Broadway and contemporary composers. Specific examples include: a medley of Mills Brothers songs,

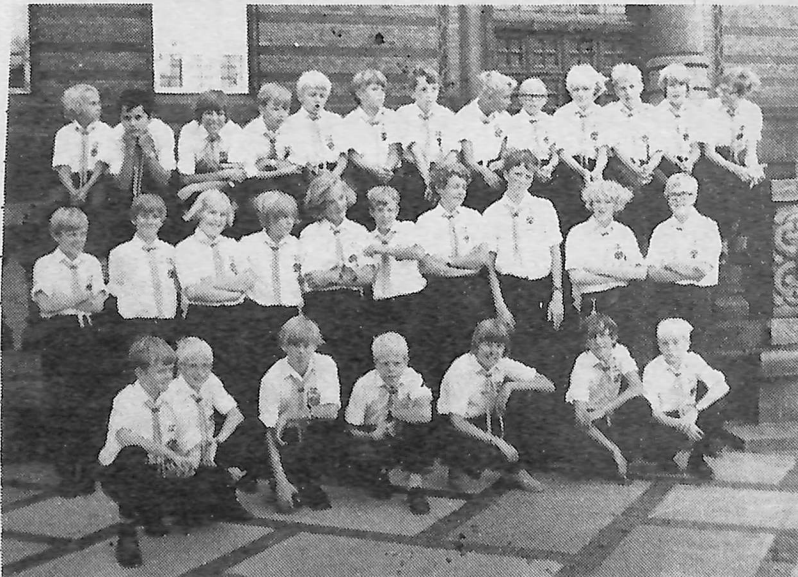
"On the Sunny Side of the Street", "Bridge Over Troubled

## Professor From Denmark To Lecture Here

Professor Iver Kjaer of the University of Copenhagen is making Dana College his headquarters during the time he is gathering material on dialects and immigrant history in a number of Danish-American communities in a four-state area.

He will present a lecture on "Proverbs in Denmark" at 8:00 p.m., Monday, October 29 in

DHA and a lecture on "The Danish Language in America" at 3:10 p.m., Friday, November 9 in Parnassus. The first is sponsored by the Dana Chapter of the American Scandinavian Foundation, the second by The Humanities Program.

The visiting scholar was a member of the faculty of the University of California,

Berkeley from 1965-67 and is now an Associate Professor of Danish Language at the University of Copenhagen. He is the author of a book on proverbs in Denmark.

He holds degrees from the University of Copenhagen and has also completed advanced study in Iceland and Finland.

For homecoming, the Dana Vikings are hosting the Hasting Broncos in a NIAC conference game. The Broncos are a tough team this year, having already beaten Wesleyan and played a good game against Doane. The Vikings are 0-6 on the year but are showing vast improvement as they are putting together bigger and bigger chunks of the game. They played only one good quarter at Westmar, 2 against Midland, and 3 at Doane, a much tougher team. Doane last year was 3rd nationally in the NAIA.

Some elements of the Dana team have played very well, most especially the kickoff return team. They have provided excellent blocking to enable 2 touchdowns to score of 97 and 90 yards, both by Rick Mewhirter. The punting team has done fairly well with the boot of Ed Spicer, though sometimes inconsistent.

This year's team is very young and they play with a lot of desire. Even with their poor record, they have not lost a winning attitude that usually does not accompany a team without a win. It always seems that when a team is most down, they come pounding back when least expected. The Vikes are about due and they surely deserve and need the support of the fans at Dana. They greatly appreciate it and it

helps tremendously in the way they play.

Game time is 2:00 on Viking Field. This also is the last home game for the Vikings this season.

The Broncos are tied for second in the conference now behind the strong rushing of Larry Phillippi (3rd in NIAC) and the passing of Shultz. Shultz has a 43% completion record, averaging 100 yards a game. They run from the I formation with split backs and 2 wide receivers. They also show a fairly strong defense.

I think the team last week played as good a game as they've ever played especially effortwise and in their attitude. Some individuals proved themselves, like Rick Mewhirter. He has now put himself in the conference lead for kickoff returns with a 31 yard average. He also ran for 89 yards from scrimmage (total) against the toughest defensive team in the state. Rick Waite filled in well for the injured Mike Herbert and several other defensive players, Randy Fursteneau, Dan Dye, and Mike Todd, played very well. Ed Spicer got us out of the

hole many times as he punted 8 times for a 40 yard average. The measure of a football player is in how much he wants to play and in that game everyone was fighting to get in. They never lost that attitude all through the game.

It seems every Homecoming, we always play one of our best games. The whole atmosphere of playing at home and with a larger crowd just helps in getting fired up. We're playing a strong team but the guys want a win awful bad, real awful bad.

## Doane Cashes In Over Vikes, 28-7

The Doane Tigers kept themselves in the NIAC lead as they downed Dana in the Tigers' homecoming game. The Vikings put together three good quarters of football but in the second quarter the roof fell in as Doane hammered for three quick touchdowns. The Vikes really felt the loss of middle linebacker Mike Herbert when he suffered a concussion in the first half of play. But the team surprised the Tigers in showing some very good football, even though being short-handed through injuries and sickness. Alertness and quickness forced Doane into many penalties that helped to thwart their offense and specialty teams. Dana's kickoff team continued to block well as Rick Mewhirter scored his second touchdown on kickoffs this year, this time going 90 yards.

1st quarter: Doane 0, Dana 0  
On the opening series of downs, the Dana defense surprised the Tigers with some fine play. The Tigers committed two penalties and the Vikes sacked the quarterback to force them to punt. The first quarter was a punting game as each team had to punt 3 times. Ed Spicer of Dana kicked some very long punts that kept the Tigers in bad field position. A clipping penalty called back a punt returned for a touchdown by Floyd Guillory of Doane. But Doane reached Dana's 6 yard line when on an end-around, the end threw a pass back to the quarterback. A penalty on Dana moved the ball to the 6 yard line. A Doane back fumbled away the ball to stop their scoring threat.

2nd quarter: Doane 21, Dana 0  
Dana moved into Tiger territory when Mewhirter turned the corner well on a play from

scrimmage. The Vikes got closer and missed on a field goal try. Doane moved downfield on the razzle-dazzle running of Floyd Guillory, their do-it-all man, and he later scored on a pitch-out play. On Dana's next possession, a bad punt by Spicer gave the Tigers good position. They took advantage of it and scored quickly with LeBlanc going over the top at the 1 yard line. In Dana's following series, a halfback pass was intercepted, of which Doane again took advantage, this time scoring on a quarterback keeper by Knapp. Before the half ended, Dana made a drive as Doane roughed the Viking kicker, got another major penalty, and tipped a pass to Viking receiver Charlie Corbin at the 17 yard line. But Spicer missed on another field goal attempt.

3rd Quarter: Doane 28, Dana 7  
Rick Mewhirter took the opening kickoff and strided out

90 yards for a touchdown, his second kick return and third touchdown of the year. Doane looked to come right back as they marched downfield, but a goal line stand by the Vikes forced them back to try a field goal that missed. Dana could not move on their possession and punted away. This time the Tigers put it together and scored a touchdown with LeBlanc getting his second of the night.

4th quarter: Doane 28, Dana 7  
Doane began a drive on a face-masking penalty early in the quarter, but a stiff Viking defense forced them to try another unsuccessful field goal attempt. Rick Mewhirter added to his yardage total with a 40 yard spurt and a pass to John Hibbing put the Vikes in scoring position. Held to a 4th down, the Vikings faked a field goal but the pass was intercepted near the goal line.

## Record Review

JETHRO TULL  
A PASSION PLAY

With the advent of "Passion Play" one begins to actually wonder whether or not God even knows for sure what lurks in those eccentric labyrinths of Ian Anderson's mind. Anyone having seen Tull this last summer will recall the theatrical act, labeled "Passion Play", with greatly perplexed emotions, however entertaining it was. But even this was only an over-simplified version of Tull's original "Passion Play."

Originally "Passion Play" was to have been a stage show of four movements; it would have included a section of animal songs and involved the band dressing up as animals after several film sequences. Also to be included was a bisexual act (Ian explains God must be both sexes in order to have created both the male and female.) It was to be accompanied by a double album soundtrack; however the project was abandoned after Ian heard that Emerson, Lake and Palmer were thinking of doing a theatrical show. When ELP's act fell through, out came the new "Passion Play."

The essence of "Passion Play" cannot be fully realized without the impact of the accompanying stage act; so for the benefit of the under-privileged I shall enlighten you. The show begins with the film of a large white-turning - red dot throbbing, mistily a ballerina appears, lying motionless on her back. Slowly she rises and jumps through a mirror; at this precise moment Tull begins with the actual score of "Passion Play". The music continues until the narration of "The Story Of The Hare Who Lost His Spectacles" begins, which then comes another film; this one with two ballerinas and people dressed like animals wandering around concerned with the Hare's lost spectacles. The play ends with a ballerina jumping through a mirror again.

Now, taking a look at the album itself we come up the basic theme which resembles the "Passion of Christ"; although somewhat hidden in the gibberish free verse. The album comes complete with an informative program, relating to the play and the lyrics, which actually only tend to add to the over all confusion of the play. Ian rationalizes that, "If my writing was simple then, there is a danger that the performance would become automatic, night after night, because my pictures would be fixed. As the lyrics are suggestive, not definitive, I can modify my movie screen images every night, and the difference in picture quality and content lends a different expression to what I'm singing. If I was singing simple Cat Steven's lyrics I wouldn't enjoy it." Cat Stevens as most know suffers from, among other things, a complex of being misunderstood.

Beginning with this issue, *The Hermes* is starting a series of record reviews. We welcome any and all contributions.

I would rather not try to untangle the web of Ian's wit; however, if one finds it a necessity, a good explanation can be found in the Aug. 10 issue of the *Rolling Stone*. Simply as a hint; unlike "Thick Brick", which is concerned with childhood and authority, "Passion Play" deals with religious thoughts of good and evil.

Turning to the score one is not too surprised to see Ian no longer writing simply songs but now epic legends. Typical of "Thick Brick", "Passion Play" is all structured in his free-form, with the exception of the narration of the "Hare". The music itself is very tremulous, jumping from peaceful multi-dubbed passages of John Evan's synthesizer and Ian's flute, to the very explosive versifications which almost seem sadistic. As a whole and singly the band performs with the precision of a great chamber ensemble.

I suppose I'm a little prejudice when I say that Tull could come out with a dog show (I don't put it past them either) and would love it. What can one expect from Tull now that they have announced an "indefinite retirement" (no need to fear though Ian is already talking about a U.S. tour for next year)... a movie? A movie tentatively labeled "War Child", in which Ian will play the role of God. The theme will be much the same as "Passion Play" however broader. The major set backs now are money and mainly a director; but with a few prayers we might see within a year. Of course Tull's not for everybody but then they don't try to be. Oh, by the way Cat Stevens will be on ABC's "In Concert" November 9.

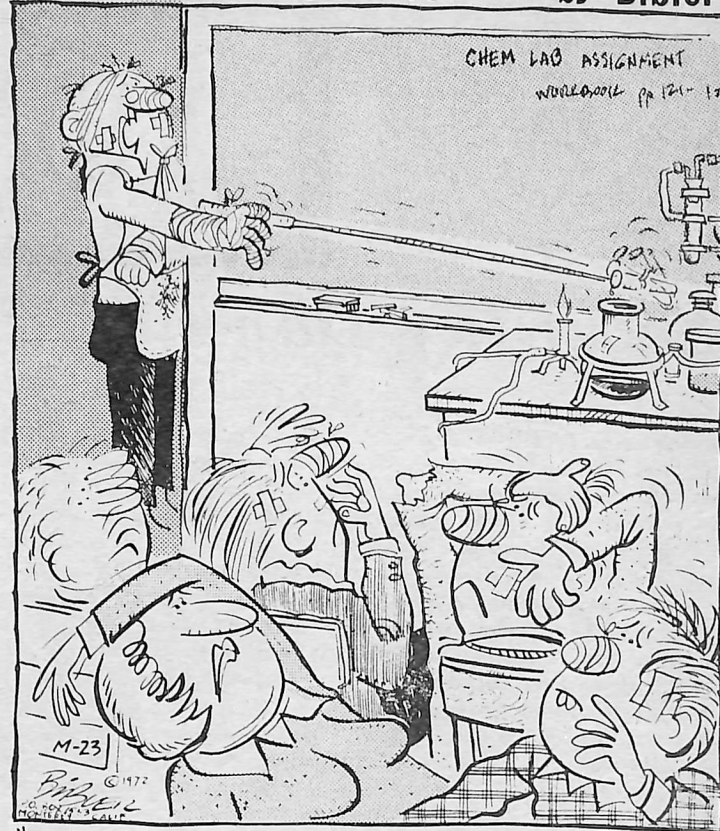
## Sandcasting Candles

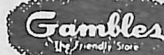
