

# Energy Crisis Hits Dana

The energy crisis is real because of three factors: the amount of consumption (an American uses three times as much energy as a western European; thirty times as much as an Asian or African), a conspiracy by the big oil companies (like Standard Oil and Exxon) to withhold gasoline supplies, raising prices -- and profits -- and forcing independent dealers out of business, and our continuing population growth (since 1960 the U.S. growth rate has fallen from 1.6% down to .83% in 1972. As a result, we still don't have zero population growth -- equal birth and death rates.)

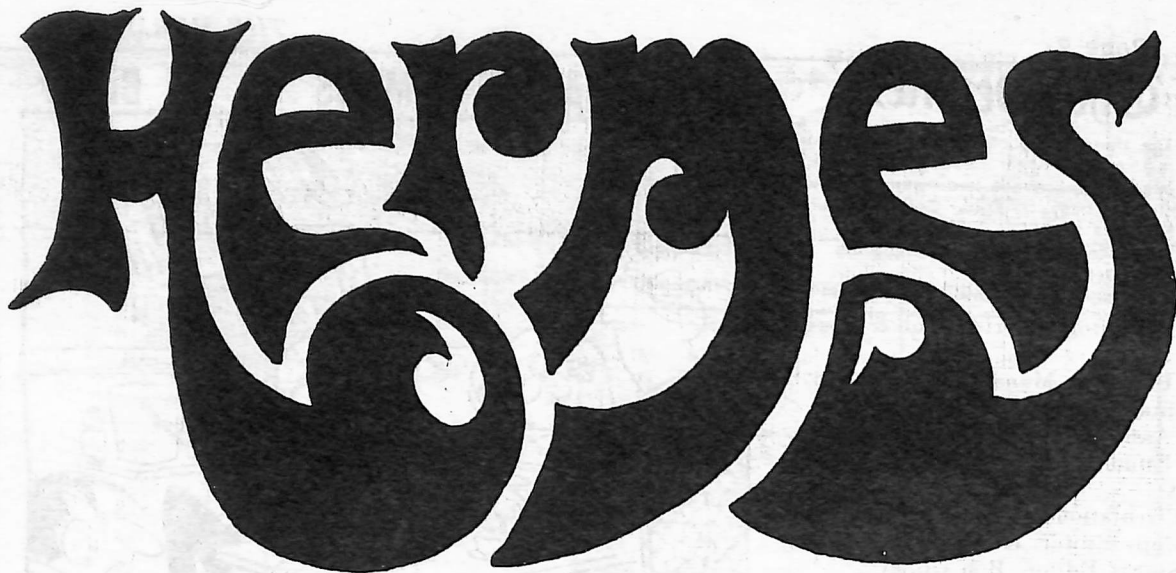
Bringing the situation to Dana, Mr. Keith Hansen of the Business office claims that our problem concerns fuel oils. The school normally uses natural gas. However, when the weather gets too cold and, as a result, more gas is needed in Blair, Dana must then switch to No. 2

fuel oil.

Dana is supposed to receive 55,000 gallons of oil this winter. However, because of factors such as the demand in other areas, transportation, and governmental interference, Mr. Hansen warns that a dorm or some other building may have to be closed.

Mr. Hansen suggests that students can conserve energy much easier than having the administration doing everything. These "wasters" were mentioned: hot water left on while shaving, showering, and brushing teeth, besides leaving doors and windows open and heaters on. He advocates energy conservation because it makes sense environment-wise and saves the student money. (Less is charged if more fuel is saved)

In conclusion, Keith Hansen's overall thinking concerning the energy crisis should be followed by all "Go back and think about what makes sense".

### H.R.C. Recycles

For several months the community of Blair has been collecting newspapers and cans for recycling. Now it is time for Dana people to become involved in using natural resources to the fullest.

On December 1st from 2:00 - 3:00 p.m. a truck will be parked outside the student center waiting to collect magazines, newspapers, catalogues and cans of any type. HRC is asking the staff, faculty and student body to bundle or group newspapers and magazines separately with string or in paper sacks. Cans may be put in sacks or boxes if you choose.

HRC is also involving Blair in this project. Anyone who cannot contribute their papers and cans from 2:00 to 3:00 p.m. on Saturday, may go to Hinky-Dinky parking lot between 10:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. and leave their bundles.

Any money earned from this project will be donated to the "Crucifixion" fund.

### Task Complete

The poll concerning the religious affiliation of Dana students was recently completed. The group of Kathy Mai, Sondra Schjodt, Kent Chapman, George Bryant, Lorell Petersen, and Fred Jensen collected information from 130 students.

We found that 70% of them are Lutheran and 30% are of other backgrounds. We also asked about the religions of their parents and observed an interesting relationship. 70% of the parents had Lutheran background and 30% other religious connection. When we asked if their religious association had anything to do with their coming to Dana, 39% put "yes," 56% put "no," and the rest put "partially." Then the next question was whether they thought Dana has a Christian atmosphere. Here 41% answered

"yes," 34% "no" and 25% "partially." As for how often they go to church, we found 67% go at least more than twice a month and 33% "once or never." It may be interesting to note that 70% of the Dana students are Lutheran and 67% of the student polled go to church regularly. Finally the result showed that 31% of them are affiliated with religious groups on campus. Out of the 31%, 20 students are affiliated with LYE, 11 with Ekklesia Kaininai or the Campus Church, 6 with FCA, 5 with Chi Rho, 4 with the Altar Guild, 3 with the Church council, and 2 with the Chancel Choir. Some were affiliated with more than one group.

We hope this information will help you draw a conclusion as to the religious life at Dana.

## County Appeal For Dana Tops Record

— Public Relations Release —

With 90% of the calls completed, the 1973 Washington County Appeal for financial support of Dana has reached \$28,245. The figure represents a 10% increase over last year's record when the Appeal produced \$25,000.

According to Appeal Co-chairmen, Bob Krogh and Kayo Vinton, volunteer workers are hopeful of closing the campaign this week by completing calls on

some twenty-five business and professional people who have been unavailable until now.

Although only in its fourth year, the Washington County Appeal for financial support of Dana has become one of the College's most relied on annual giving projects. Dr. Mezoff commended the co-chairmen, the volunteers and the donors for their enthusiastic and generous support of the 1973 appeal.

### Prof. Niel Johnson In The Spotlight

Niel Johnson attended a regional archival symposium on the University of Iowa campus Saturday, November 10. Several historians and archivists described the major features of the federal and state censuses and suggested various techniques for using them in historical research.

John Updike's "Rabbit, Run" became emphatically the Thing to Read soon after its publication in 1960. Now recognized as a classic, the novel has become a candid motion picture dealing with a man's desperate attempt to avoid involvement and responsibility.

James Caan is "Rabbit" Angstrom, a former high school athlete who finds his loveless marriage to a dizzy alcoholic too difficult to take but who, when offered love by a quasi-prostitute, finds that also more than he can handle.

Carrie Snodgrass shines as the slatternly wife whose great joy is watching TV cartoons and whose drunkenness results in the drowning of her infant daughter. Anjanette Comer is superbly effective as the semi-professional with her own shabby brand of dignity.

The Vikings this year have 6 returning lettermen - Bryan Traylor, Jim Huseman, Jerry Wilson, Dennis Riley, Eddie Johnson, and Steve Woitock. These men plus Barry Olson will make the nucleus of the varsity squad. Back-up men will mainly be Probst, Damkroger, Larsen, Kruder, Davies and Gilpen.

Last year we lost Gary Bott and Terry Miner, both of whom were 6'6" so we are left with a height problem. Our scoring average last year was 71 points per game versus 81 for our opponents. This is a very good indication of what we have to work on and compensate for. We will have to drastically improve our

defense and take advantage of our speed through fast breaks and keeping everyone moving on offense. Brian Traylor will have to maintain his 20 pt. average and our 4 senior guards will have to average about 12 points each per game. And Jim Huseman is going to have to get in and score if we expect to improve our offense.

Our first two games will be at home. They'll be good games and we have every expectation of winning both of them. We beat Dordt and Bellevue decisively last year and we're expecting as much this year. The next games are in the NIAC Tournament at Seward and we have to be looking ahead at those.
