

# President Expresses "Confidence" at Opening Convocation

"This year certainly promises to be an exciting one for all. I believe that we have made an excellent beginning and that we can make vast strides if we devote our energies to these large but most important tasks, if we develop a wider perspective rather than a myopic view and if we realize that our goals are the same. I have confidence in you and know that you will not only accept the challenges placed before you this morning but that you will pursue them with diligence and enthusiasm."

Those were the concluding sentiments of Dr. Earl R. Mezoff, as the Dana College president officially opened the school's 90th academic year. The Opening Convocation ceremonies took place on Wednesday morning, September 4, in Alumni Memorial Auditorium.

In an earlier portion of his address, Dr. Mezoff explained that Dana is and should direct its future to these four statements: "It is a liberal arts college of the American Lutheran Church. Its future lies with the Church rather than independence from the Church. It is dedicated to an educational experience which is intellectually challenging and spiritually and culturally

enriching. It seeks to develop the unique talents of each person, not just students but faculty and staff as well, for a lifetime of service to God and mankind."

The president also outlined specific objectives which a joint faculty-student - administrative committee on Long Range Planning has recommended. They include goals emphasizing Christian development, academic development, and community living at Dana.

Among those taking part in the ceremonies in addition to Dr. Mezoff were the Rev. Lothar Pietz, campus pastor; Dr. Robert J. Glass, Dean of the College; and Kent Day, student body president. Ninety-four Dana students were recognized for being named to the Dean's List for the 1973-74 second semester. Musical selections were presented by the Dana College choir under the direction of Dr. Paul E. Neve.

Dr. Mezoff hosted the traditional President's Reception on Wednesday evening, September 4 in the campus center dining room. In addition to he and Dr. Glass, those in attendance included students as well as faculty and staff members.

Finally, standing boldly and symbolically over Dana College, old and new, is an empty cross. A reminder of a great sacrifice. 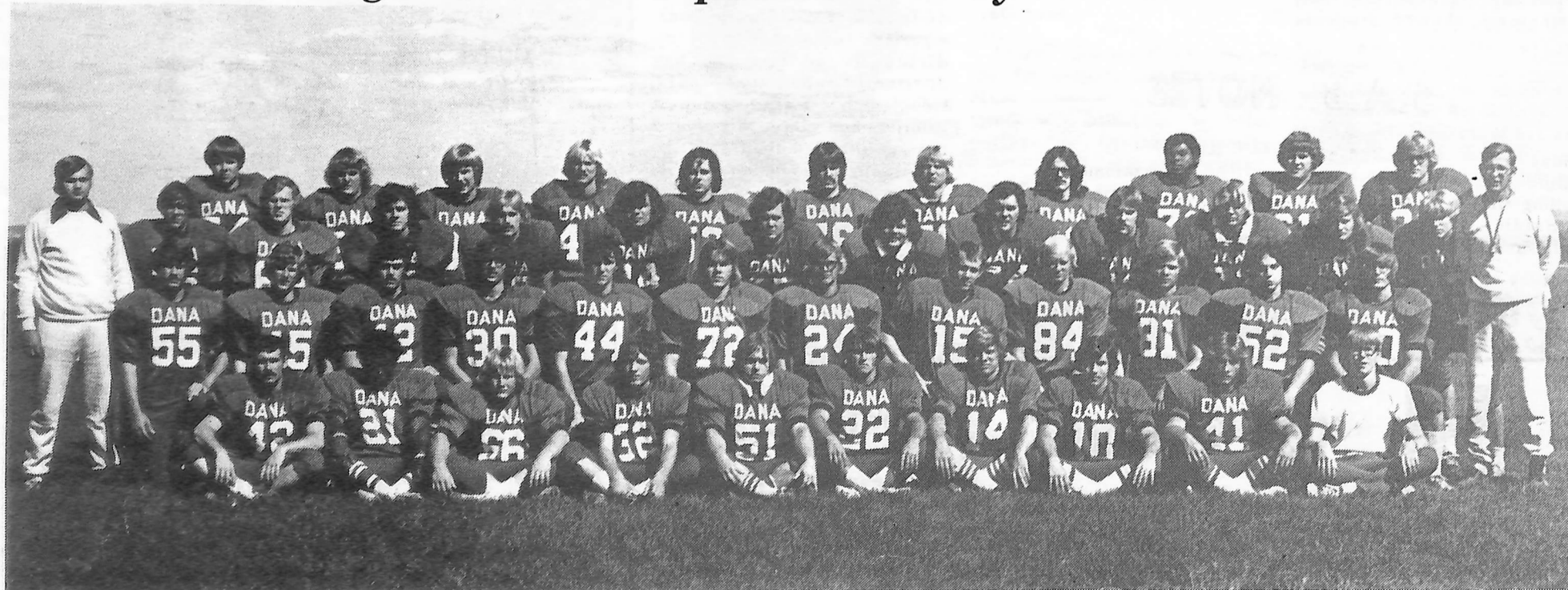

# EDITORIAL

NOT THE BEST OF TIMES, BUT NEITHER THE WORST

It is true that Dana is not in the best of times but neither is she in the worst of times. A newsletter sent to the Hermes by the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare predicted an increase in the cost of higher education and a decrease in enrollment. Sure, Dana's costs increased by \$200 this past year but the enrollment of full-time students remained steady and the freshman class is the largest in four years. This may indicate an upswing in Dana's enrollment.

Certainly Dana's football team was winless last year but this year's squad is bigger and has greater potential. Also once again Dana's budget finished in the black.

For once the students and the *Hermes* should take an optimistic view of Dana and its future. All hope is lost when optimism is lost. Pessimism stymies growth and improvement.

## LETTERS TO THE EDITORS

Dear Editors:

Dana is a college with problems. Not problems that can't be worked on and solved, yet problems that will take cooperation and understanding on the part of both the administration and on the part of the students. Some of these problems involve recruiting and keeping students, others involve rising costs and declining benefits.

Attempts that can be made by student government to remedy some of these problems seem very meager and yet if accomplished they could make a big difference in campus life.

Primarily, the Constitution of the Student Body must be overhauled. This is a task that has been in and out of student government for at least two years. With the help of Dean Palm (and I strongly recommend that you stop in and meet him) we should begin work soon.

Work was begun last year on the pond between Argo and Old Main, but due to a lack of manpower it sits. We will resume work soon.

Intervisitation was another issue on campus last year and will remain an issue this year. Percentages showed students

overwhelmingly in favor of an extension of hours. This year's student government will extend these hours if it is at all possible.

These are just three insignificant points in relation to rising costs, cutbacks, and students leaving, but these are three goals that are attainable. Attaining a goal is always an inspiration. Completing any of these projects, however, takes more than complaining across a table in the Head, cafeteria, or even the Fiesta. To revise a constitution takes hours of paper work, to extend intervisitation takes energetic and intelligent surveys, votes, and debates, and to make a decent park out of a mud hole takes time and muscle. It is the sincere hope of student government that this year we can pool our most valuable resources, our students, and get something done. Perhaps if this is done more students will show up in September and maybe more students will be happy here and stay, more students . . . more cash . . . more cash, less cutbacks and more benefits. Maybe in a few years Dana can achieve as good a reputation as she deserves, both from within and without.

Old Main tower finally has some color to it. The folks who painted it this summer took their

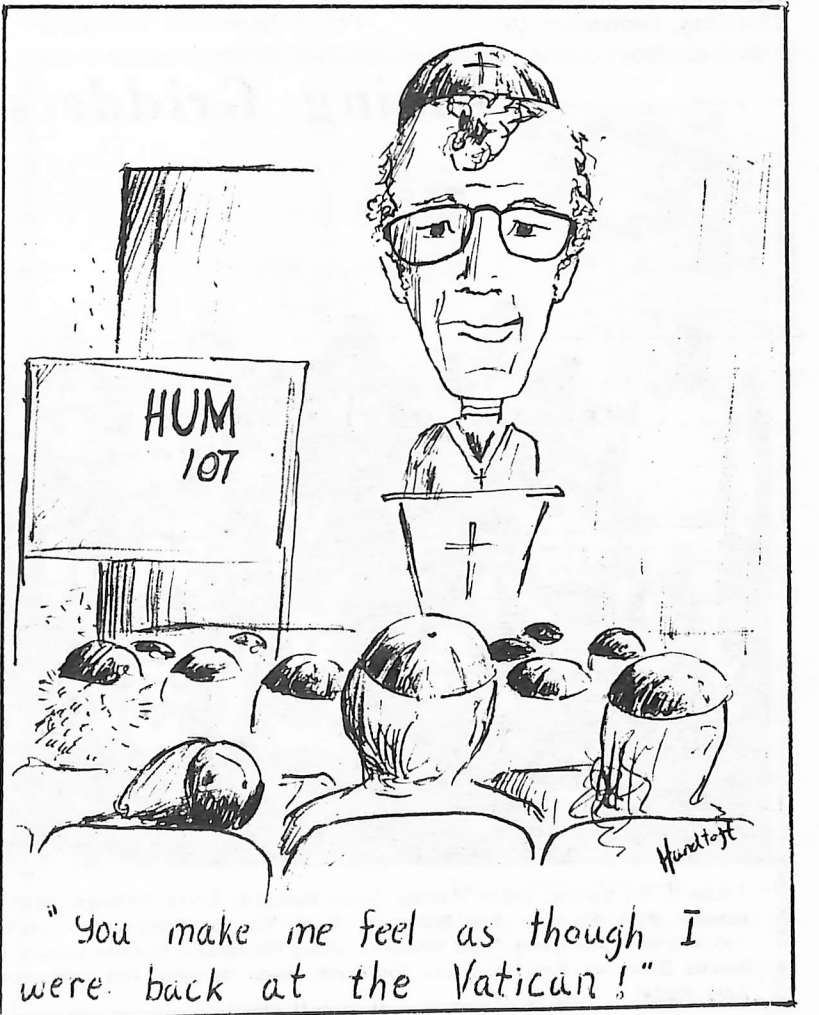
life in their hands but then that isn't too amazing since anybody who walks into AMA does the same.

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# A Host of New Faces on Campus

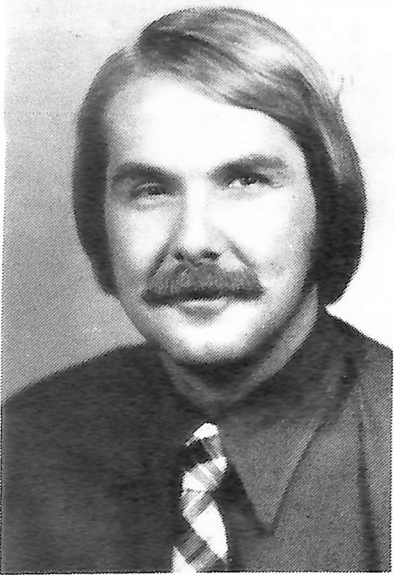
Freshmen aren't the only new faces preparing for the '74-'75 school year. Six new members joined the veterans on Dana's faculty and staff.

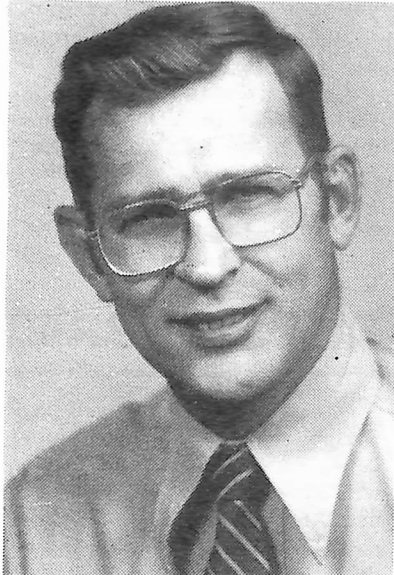


Mr. Richard Palm

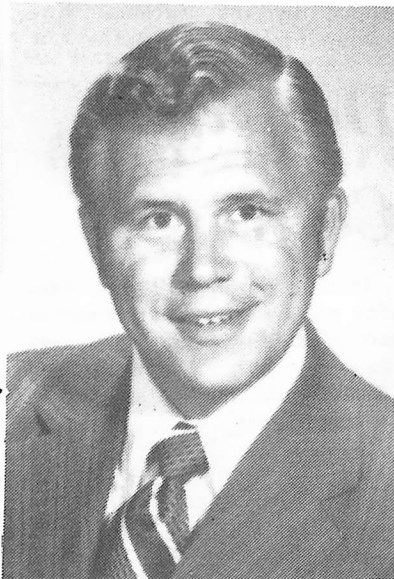

# Enrollment Increases

Enrollment for the freshman class showed a 30% increase over last year's class. A total of 191 freshmen registered for the fall, compared to 148 registered at this time last year. The total semester enrollment for all four classes is the same as last year. 577 students are registered to date, the exact same number as last year's enrollment.

Other enrollment figures show 117 seniors as compared to 128 last year; juniors increased by one over last year's 117 and sophomores went down to 108, from 136 last year. Dana also has 41 part-time students as compared to 44 last year.

Geographically Dana has students from 30 states and 8 foreign countries. Australia, Denmark, Ethiopia, Ghana, Japan, New Guinea, Nigeria and Rhodesia are represented. Nebraska leads the list of contributing states followed by Iowa, Minnesota, Colorado, Illinois, Pennsylvania, Ohio and California.

Mr. R. Showers, Director of Admissions at Dana, gave much of the credit for the increased freshman enrollment to current students. Mr. Showers also gives his staff much of the credit for their work in the past year in contacting interested students.

# Improvements Highlight

Two "daredevil" painters teamed up with the Dana College maintenance department to make many improvements and repairs on Dana's campus this past summer. Old Main received most of the attention.

The two painters, who previously confined their endeavors to flag poles, climbed around and hung from Old Main to paint its towers, windows, rain gutters and trim. Also, four new offices for business and theater faculty were built on Old Main's second floor, lounge areas including carpet and chairs were installed on the second and third floors, plus glass was placed in the tower.

The Maintenance department, consists of superintendent of buildings and grounds, Clyde Johnson; plant engineer Dale Matson, regulars Arthur Deemer, Willard Meier and Eugene Thomas. Seven college work-study students were kept busy with routine campus upkeep and other projects. A floor crew cleaned and waxed the floors in the dormitories and Borup Coliseum. Grass-cutting and plant care was done by the grounds crew. Repairs in dormitories, cleaning air-conditioners and locks, painting rooms, ceilings and posts around the campus were tended to by others.

# Senate Opens Year

The Student Senate held its first meeting of the year in the student government room of the Campus Center on Wednesday at 6:30.

The following were proposed and passed during the hour-long meeting:

- a motion to appropriate \$266 to the Soccer Club to pay for insurance for next week's match against Creighton University and other possible matches.
- a motion to ask the student life committee to request that the maintenance department post signs around the track to keep horses and the like off the track.
- a motion that women's dormitories have the same inter-visit hours as the men's dorms.
- a motion that the Senate reaffirm its laws against freshman initiations.
- a motion that the Senate Committee on Student Life get last year's inter-visit bill going again immediately.

Anyone interested in joining the Swim Club should contact Mike Jones soon. The swim meets will primarily be held during the January interim. Practices will begin at the end of this semester.

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# Trip Slated

The Humanities Program has arranged an excursion to Minneapolis for the weekend of October 11 and 12. The group of 64 Dana students and faculty members will leave Friday morning to see the evening presentation of Moliere's "Tartuffe" at the Guthrie Theater.

On Saturday, the group will visit the Walker Art Gallery, the Minneapolis Institute of Art, and Minnehaha Park, as well as the campus of St. Olaf and Carlton in Northfield.

# Initiation Reinstated

For the first time since 1971, from September 4 to 7, freshmen had the most exciting (!) time in their college career, with freshman initiation.

Some of the activities included: Wednesday, freshman took upperclassman's trays back at dinner. Freshmen could have been asked to name any building on campus or ten upperclassmen. Later that night was a scavenger hunt. Thursday's events consisted of: freshmen having to blow bubbles from gum before eating dinner using only a spoon. Friday, frosh students had to eat from the floor to a chair.

Gary Erbes, in charge of fresh-

man initiation, said that it was a success because it meant different things to different people. The softball and volleyball games Tuesday night and the tug-of-war on Thursday nights were the more popular events. The freshmen waned after the first two days on wearing their beanies.

# Viking Footballers Open Against Martin Luther

The Dana Vikings open their season here this Saturday when they meet the Lancers of Martin Luther College of New Ulm, Minnesota. About 50 players comprise the team under new head coach Gary SeEVERS.

The former Little All-American and Nebraska College Athlete of the Year had his men in full pads and live contact on the very first day. SeEVERS says he wants Dana to "get on a winning note" as soon as possible.

Freshmen make up the great bulk of the team but despite the youth, Coach SeEVERS does not believe in "rebuilding seasons." He says the team is "definitely capable of winning" and points out the team's size as a positive aspect. There are 14 men on the team weighing over 200 pounds.

SeEVERS plans on employing a multiple offense with different sets, alignments and variations. He also wants to keep a balance of running and passing to have a definite 2-way threat. The defense will line up in the standard college defense- the five-man line and two linebackers, plus the "monster man."

The offense is captained this year by Dave "Bozo" Larson, a tackle from Primghar, Iowa. Bozo is a senior who has started for Dana the past three years and occasionally played some defense. Also watch Bob Jones, who plays next to Bozo, as a guard. Bob was voted All-Conference last year as a Sophomore.

The defensive captain is Terry Jensen from Schaller, Iowa. Terry has started at defensive back for three years and should be in the running for All-Conference this year as senior.

Playing close to Terry will be last year's Outstanding Freshman and Most Valuable Defen-

seman, Mike Herbert. The stocky 5'8", 195 pound linebacker also was named All-Conference as he averaged about 20 tackles a game. Mike, who is from Horscham, Pennsylvania, says he is "just one individual out there with my job to do like everyone else."
