Dudley Riggs To Perform Saturday Night

Dudley Riggs' Brave New Workshop is a satirical, improvisational theater revue, doing sketches on some of life's most blinding institutions such as society, politics, and human nature.

Minneapolis is their headquarters; from their theater there they perform six nights a week, tour colleges and conventions country-wide, and spend hours each day creating new material

and learning to trust and anticipate each other when performing.

They were started back in the late fifties by Dudley Riggs, a former Ringling Brothers, Barnum and Bailey aerialist and movie stunt man.

Dudley Riggs' Brave New Workshop will be at Borup Coliseum, Saturday the 16th, at 8:00 p.m. Don't miss them!

Famous Dane in Borup Sunday

Victor Borge, the world-famous Danish musician-comedian will perform in a benefit concert for Dana College this Sunday afternoon October 17 at 2:30 p.m. in Borup Coliseum. Mr. Borge, a true pioneer in modern entertainment, promises to capture and hold the audience's attention with his sharp wit and skillful musical ability.

Borge began his musical career in Copenhagen, Denmark, at the age of ten. Overnight he was hailed as a prodigy and won scholarships to music conservatories in Copenhagen, Berlin, and Vienna. At fourteen he was given the honor of appearing as soloist with the Copenhagen Philharmonic Orchestra. Most child prodigies suffer from stage fright but Borge experienced the reverse. He felt uneasy on behalf of his audience who, he thought, showed some tension. Suddenly had an impulse to put his audience at ease and so he turned to them and gave them a

long, slow wink. The audience began to titter. The conductor, with his back to the audience and the boy's winking, nervously accelerated his beat causing the orchestra to run ahead of the soloist until the two were completely out of touch. Borge, in the middle of a cadenza, stopped playing and walked to the conductor's stand, turned the score back three pages, bowed to the orchestra, and again winking at the audience, resumed the concerto. The roars of laughter were deafening and then and there Borge's Comedy in Music was born.

He integrated more and more humor into concerts, soon becoming the idol of Denmark and a leading star of stage and screen. Inasmuch as Borge's satire had often been directed at Hitler and the swastika, he became one of the chief targets of the Nazis, putting a temporary stop to his career when the Nazis invaded Denmark.

Almost penniless and unable



to speak English, he arrived in America in 1941, having escaped on the last boat to leave Finland for America during the war. He spent a good portion of his first year here in

EDITORIAL

Homecoming is a special time of year that rekindles memories of the past and makes you think about how different things were "way back when." At least you'd think that things were different, but I can't see that time has changed the lives of Dana College students all that much.

Even though the campus has grown extensively in the past 15 years, the social structure that used to frustrate our ancestors continues to bother us. Family Planning Clinic Offers Many Services

It's called the Family Planning Clinic, but there's so much more available that the name doesn't imply. People are there that will listen, inform, and most of all, really help you. They have many services, some that you might not have realized before. Blair has a Family Planning Clinic, located on 753 North 21st. Appointments can be made by phoning 426-5258.

Among the most important services offered at the clinic are several medical tests including pregnancy and VD testing. Cancer detection includes PAP tests and breast and pelvic exams. Also, treatment of female infections, blood pressure, and blood tests for anemia can be administered.

Another service of the clinic is contraceptive treatment and supplies. Advice and counseling are available on the various aspects of birth control and human sexuality. Of course, the

clinic has a program of family planning education which includes anatomy, reproduction, contraceptive counseling, and prenatal, infant and child care.

The Family Planning Clinic bases its charges for services on ability to pay, and everything is completely confidential. Clinic sessions are held on the second Tuesday of every month, beginning at 6:30 p.m.

So much is so easily available at this clinic. Besides all the information, advice, and supplies, there are people who care, listen, and give peace of mind, too.

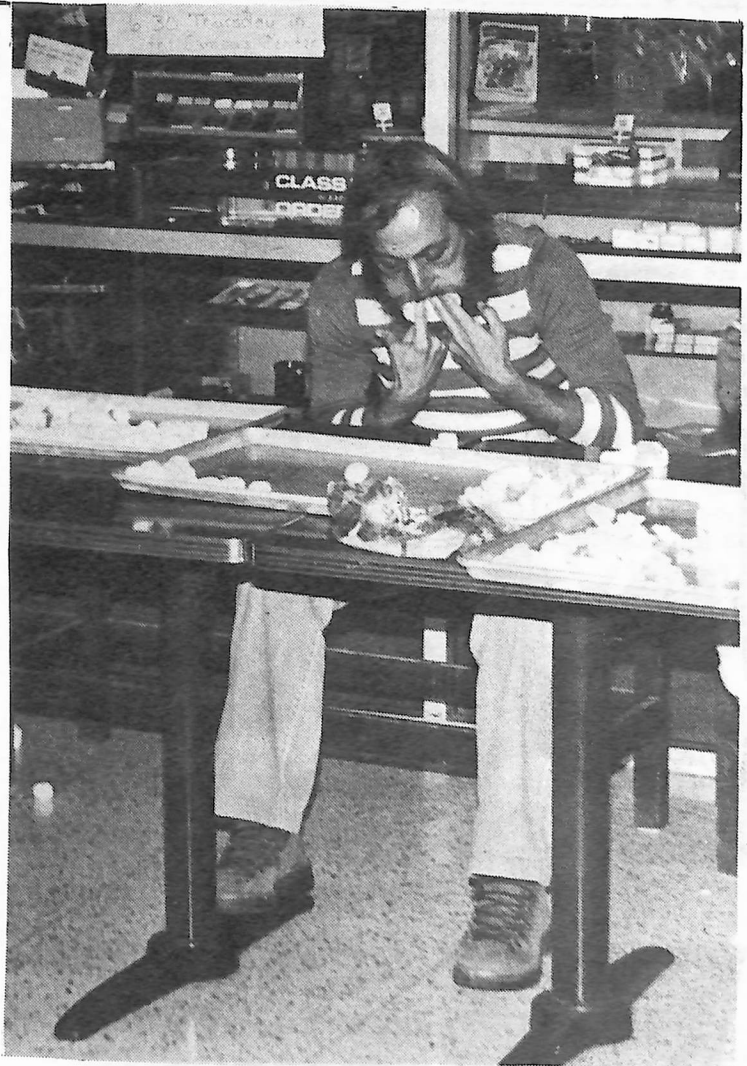

Blair's Danish Day

A "Fulfilling" Experience

Residents of Blair, as well as many out of town visitors, got a good taste of Danish life last Saturday when the Blair chapter of the Danish Brotherhood of America sponsored their annual Danish Day. And "taste" is the best word to sum up the large part of the day's activities, for authentic Danish food of every kind abounded. Our first stop was the Fiesta Grande, where a lunch of various Danish foods was served. The meal began with sødsuppe, or sweet soup, which is actually a hot fruit compote made with peaches, prunes, gooseberries, and raisins. Next was medisterpølse, a type of sausage, and of course there was aebleskiver, those delicious little pancake balls that can only be eaten with the fingers.

The next stop was the smorrebrod at the Congregational Church. Here, Dana's Danish Club made and sold open-faced sandwiches of roast beef, rullepølse, frickadiller, and cheese. Each sandwich was garnished with some type of fruit or vegetable, like radishes, grapes, cucumbers, beets or an olive.

Once we were sufficiently filled, we headed for the Blair Fire Hall where most of the displays and activities were held. Here were demonstrations of weaving, handmade straw and paper Christmas ornaments, rosemaking, embroidery, and several other arts and crafts displays. Raffle tickets were sold by the Danish Brotherhood, the prizes being Bing and Grøndahl figurines and plates. But in order to maintain a true Danish

spirit, there had to be the food. One wall was devoted to the sale of homemade breads, rolls, cookies, and every kind of Danish pastry imaginable. There was also a Kaffebord, where the typical Danish coffee was perpetually being served. Kringle, a type of Danish coffee cake, was specially ordered from Larsen's bakery of Racine, Wisconsin, and was sold both whole and in individual servings.

At 3:30 the Danish Dancers from Dana performed in front of the Fire Hall. Eight couples performed the authentic folk dances of Denmark in their colorful Danish costumes. Following their performance, John and Dawn Nielsen read Danish Folk stories inside the hall.

The events then turned once again to the Fiesta Grande, where a Smorgasbord was served consisting of a wide variety of Danish foods. Flounder, herring, and various cheeses were all imported directly from Denmark, while many other foods were prepared at the restaurant in the Danish way. Frickadiller and rullepølse were the main courses, with pickled herring, creamed peas and corn, and sødsuppe adding to the meal. For desert there was aebleskage, an apple cake served with whipped cream and some kind of jam or jelly.

The last event of the day was a dance and skaal held at the Fire Hall.

Danish Day seemed to be a great success, and I felt that it gave a good sampling of Danish heritage and custom. Danish Day certainly proved the saying, "If its good, Its Danish."

Besides the entertainment provided by Mr. Borge, an honorary Doctor of Music degree from Dana College will be presented to him prior to the beginning of the concert.

The degree, originally approved by the Dana faculty and regents in 1968, has had to wait until now for presentation because Borge's performance schedule would not permit him to make a personal visit until this year. The degree will be conferred by Dr. Erwin H. Goldstein, Chairman of the Board of Regents; Dr. Earl R. Mezoff, President; and Dr. Robert T. Glass, Dean of the College; during a 2:30 p.m. public ceremony in Borup Coliseum.

Following the conferring of the degree, Borge will entertain the audience with a program entitled, "Something Special for Dana." He indicates the program will include excerpts from his more than thirty years of performing and, quite possibly, something special not included in his regular stage show. The entertainment portion of the program will be presented without intermission.

Tickets will be available at the door in Borup Coliseum beginning at 1 p.m. this Sunday.

Rock Scores Three TD's In Viking Victory

Thanks to the rushing of Bill Rock, the Dana Vikings defeated Westmar 27-8, in a game played here Tuesday, September 28th, to run their season record to 2-0.

The Vikings got on the scoreboard in their first drive as Doug Meggison hit John Hibbing with a key 17-yard pass to set up his own run-in for the touchdown. Following an Ed Spicer PAT and an unsuccessful Beaver attack, the Vikings took the ball deep into Westmar territory before Rock carried the first of his three touchdowns. Spicer again accounted for the extra point, making the score 14-0 in favor of Dana.

Neither team scored again until late in the second period when the Vikings and Westmar traded touchdowns. Bill Rock carried a 12-yard tally for the Vikings, followed by another Spicer kick. Then the Beavers put together a series of plays bringing them downfield, climaxing with a Jim Sanders touchdown. Sanders followed his performance with a conversion run in what proved to be Westmar's last hurrah.

The only scoring in the second half was another Rock TD, this one good for fourteen yards and came with only seconds remaining in the third quarter.


Rock, a 5'4" sophomore from Avoca, Iowa, racked up 101 yards rushing for the Vikings, while Keith Brown of Westmar gave Dana's defensive corps a headache. Standouts on defense for the Vikes were Jay Paist and Mark Tibby with sacks and Jerry Wallace with a recovered fumble.

Hastings Crushes Dana 48-0

For the second week in a row the Dana Viking football team had to board a bus before eight o'clock in the morning to travel to a game the same afternoon. For the second week in a row the Vikings played visitor to a Homecoming game. For the second week in a row they found themselves behind by three touchdowns at half time. At this point, though, the similarities ended.

Unlike their commendable attempt at a second-half comeback the previous week, the Vikings showed no appearances of life against Hastings College, and went down to defeat 48-0. The victory gave Hastings a 2-0 record in conference play, as they opened their season with a victory over Doane College. Dana is now 0-1 in the conference and 2-2 for the season.

Dana's offense was a national leader after two games, averaging 399 yards a game in total offense. Although the game against Dakota Wesleyan was sub-par, the Hastings game was a complete reversal of form. The Broncos held Dana to an amazing net total of 67 yards passing and -5 rushing for the game. More importantly, Hastings intercepted four passes, recovered four fumbles, and blocked two punts. Half of these turnovers came within the Vikes' twenty yard line. The intimidating Bronco defense let the invaders from Blair cross midfield only twice for the game.

Dana's defense was also a factor in the loss. They failed to hold Hastings on a couple of goalline stands as well as giving up the big third down play too often.

About the best thing any team can do after a fiasco like the Hastings game is to put it out of their mind and get prepared for the next game. Fortunately, Dana has more than enough talent, both offensively and defensively, to do just that. The Vikes' next game will be their Homecoming game against Concordia and it will be an excellent chance to win Dana's fourth straight game on their home field.

Tigers Eat Vikings

After starting their season with two straight victories, the Dana Viking football squad was abruptly brought back to reality by Dakota Wesleyan University, 28-14. The Tigers, from Mitchell, South Dakota, were ranked seventh in the nation in the NAIA division II ratings going into the game, and their solid performance against Dana raised their record to 5-0 for the season.

Playing on their home field, Wesleyan jumped off to a quick 14-0 lead, primarily on the strength of their skillful running of the option pitch from the wishbone formation. At the same time, the Vikings were having trouble getting their own offense rolling. Dana's defense stiffened in the second quarter, but the Tigers scored another touchdown in the closing minute of the half to bring the score to 21-0.

The second half belonged to the Vikings all the way. Greg Icken electrified the crowd and put Dana on the scoreboard as he returned the kickoff 97 yards for a touchdown. The spirit generated by this score proved contagious to the rest of the team and minutes later Doug Meggison capped a well conceived drive with a two yard scamper for a second touchdown. Meggison passed to Rick Rostan for the two point conversion and Dana trailed only 21-14.

The Vikings had a couple of more scoring opportunities but failed to take advantage of them, once fumbling the ball away to the Tigers after a well balanced drive had brought Dana all the way to the seventeen yard line. Dakota Wesleyan put the icing on the cake near the beginning of the fourth quarter as their final score of the game made it 28-14.

Although the first loss of any season is disappointing, the full impact of this game may not be seen from the scoreboard, but rather from the training room. Todd Roecker and Bill Rock, Dana's two leading rushers for the season, both sustained injuries in the game and neither played in the important fourth quarter.

The Monroe team, also Omaha-based, came from a 2-1 deficit to defeat Offutt on second period goals by Steve Donovan and John Kamphey. Scoring for the air base team was Dale Gehrandt, who put Offutt in the lead temporarily following Shocker Cliff Ehler's goal.

In the championship tilt, Monroe's John Kamphey was the star, putting the Shockers on top to stay with two goals in the second period. Mr. Steak's Hank Schmah had knotted the game at 1-1 with a goal in the opening minutes of the second half. Scoring also in the game was Monroe's Steve Donovan.

Dana fell behind early in the fight for third place, as Offutt scored two unanswered goals in the first period. After the Bellevue-based squad scored again early the next period, Dana came back on a goal by Godwin Onwuelezi and momentum seemed to be in their favor. But the team from Offutt foiled two additional attempts by the Vikings, bringing the ball downfield after the second attempt to score and thus put the game out of reach.

Coach Kurt Rasmussen credited the team with a fine effort on both offense and defense. Cited were Godwin Onwuelezi for his all-around play, Jeff Hall and Kent Masoner for their work on defense, and Buikexlo Ponalo for his work on

offense.

Also looking forward to winning this Saturday, are the members of the Dana College Soccer team, who will be hosting Mr. Steak at 10:00 a.m. Coach Kurt Rasmussen, in his first year at Dana, feels that the Vikings are on the verge of showing their true potential. "I feel that our team is ready to bear down and win this one, especially after losing to Mr. Steak last Sunday in a game we clearly controlled."

Dana Fourth In Invitational

The Dana Viking Soccer Team lost their first three games in the Eastern Nebraska Soccer Association, but they came at the hands of first division teams.

On September 19, the Vikes had troubles getting their offense attack going against Olympia Beer, a team from Omaha whose only loss is to a tough Lincoln squad. Dana's defense got tougher as the game went along, but couldn't stop the Olympia fellows from scoring eleven goals to the Viking none.

The Vikings came back the following Sunday to almost upset the Monroe Shockers for their first win, but had to settle for a 4-3 loss. Dana scored first on a kick by Godwin Onwuelezi in the early minutes of the game. Monroe came back to score twice before Jeff Hall tied the score at 2-2 before the halftime whistle sounded. In the second period, the Vikes again went ahead on a goal by Onwuelezi. But the Vikings couldn't put a stop to the Monroe offense as the Shockers kicked in the final two goals to wrap up the game.

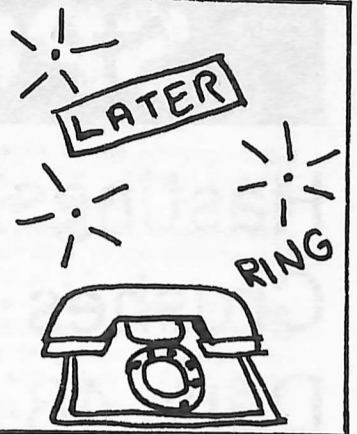

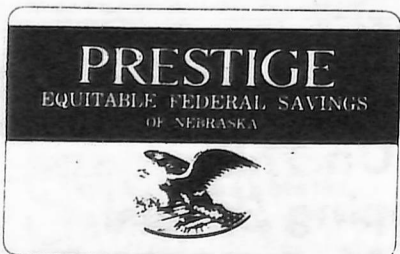
