This is not to condone any violations of Campus Policy committed by any residents of Rasmussen Hall, but we feel that a forthright action would have been more effective in achieving desired results.

Being a Christian College, we are appalled at the unethical practices engaged in, and urge that they be stopped at once.

## UnderGrad Exams Coming

On the 31st of March and on the 1st of April, Dana Seniors will be taking their Undergraduate record

examinations, whether some of these students will be April fools or not remains to be seen. The Undergraduate record examinations are given every year to enable the student to see how they stand academically with other students enrolled in similar programs throughout the country. These tests also help the individual colleges in assessing their courses and the teaching techniques employed. The test is spread out over a two day period, approximately 3 to 4 hours each day. On the first day the test is concerned with a general knowledge test, and then on the second day each student takes a test that applies more specifically to his or her major area of study. The general knowledge test involves areas such as social science, the humanities, and natural science. All seniors should take the test and if they have not already been contacted they should immediately contact Dr. Verlan Hanson, Dana's Registrar and the administrator of the tests. To the freshmen, sophomores, and Juniors these tests might not seem like much however, to all of the seniors it is one of the final steps towards graduation. In a performance on February 22nd, a group named Lyon Hill from Omaha played at the Dragon's Head, attracting approximately 150 students in their performance from 9:00 to 12:00. The group boasts of Jeremy Lyon and Gary Hill, the leaders of the group on guitar and vocals, Jeremy's sister, Jeanie, on vocals and Darrell Klein on bass. Lyon and Hill have been performing in the Omaha area for 4 years, with Klein performing off and on for this same period - Jeanie joined a year ago.

They performed several of their own versions of songs made popular in recent years, concentrating on folk rock with a "Down-home" country flavor. Songs included Ronstadt's "When Will I Be Loved"; Crosby, Stills, and Nash's "Love Is Coming To Us All"; and other popular numbers such as "Inhibition", "Aimee", "Juite-Judy Blue Eye," and "Don't Cross the River." The student body of Dana has elected officers for the next term of Student Senate beginning in April. The people in the executive positions are President-Jerry Wallace, Vice-President-Dennis Downard, Secretary-Kim Shipley, and Treasurer-Luke Northwall. These four are intelligent, concerned Dana students, and each have their individual ideas and personalities, tastes and opinions.

Jerry Wallace is from Creston, Iowa and is presently a junior with a major in philosophy. In relation to his reasons and hopes for his presidential office, he said, "I hope that I can have a good relationship with all the members of the administration although I have not had formal contact with them before. I think I will feel free to tell them my opinions, which can be a problem in any representative political office." He said that a true communication is needed.

Wallace has many ideas that he expressed concerning Dana. He appreciates the small nature of the school that allows people to establish more intimate relationships, the quality of the faculty, and also the appearance of the campus. He stated that he would like to see some changes,

an example being more courses in journalism and political science offered with at least a minor available in each, and a philosophy of success in sports.

Also, he stated, "If there is a clear mandate represented in the results of the student questionnaire just recently completed, I will urge the Board of Regents to change the school's policy on those particular issues." Wallace mentioned the idea of an active "Ombudsman" between the students and administration, assuring the rights of students to adequate counsel as to their options and means of recourse in various situations such as infractions.

He continued, "I feel there's evidence to suggest that the Dean of Students office investigates more complaints than are given to them." He also felt that concerning policy changes, the school should trust the judgement of the students that have, after all, been granted admission to Dana.

Jerry Wallace has been active in various activities on campus, including lettering in football three years, working on the Danian and Hermes, and also in track and D-Club. His future

plans are to apply to law school.

Wallace stated, "I feel there should be more positions represented by the Human Rights and Concerns speakers, and I feel this can be accomplished." He mentioned he would advocate such topics presented as the legalization of the recreational use of drugs and current constitutional matters. He also had the idea of a very prominent person in the contemporary scenes of, for example, entertainment or politics, who could be sponsored by the co-operation of student organizations such as SAB and HRC, come to stay on campus in the manner of a Visiting Fellow and who would be of more interest and relevance to all the students.

**The new vice-president is Dennis Downard, at present a junior from Corning, Iowa. He is majoring in biology, and his plans are to apply to a physical therapy school during the second semester of next year.**

Downard expressed his opinion that Dana has a great atmosphere for learning and one-to-one correspondences on the campus and in the educational processes. He stated that there is room for improvement, and said he would like to see some policies be either enforced or dropped.

**When asked about his change of position from being this year's student body president to the new vice-president, he said, "I don't consider it a step down... I just believe it's a different degree of involvement." Downard said that he still**

**would be very active in Senate and that he firmly believes in the "new blood" theory.**

He would like to see the Senate take better advantage of their power; and he stressed involvement and co-operation as the basic issues involved.

Downard has been involved on campus as last year's president, and is active in football, D-Club, and Kappa Chi Lambda. He decided that he preferred chartruese as a color, lobster as his favorite food, and the group "Kansas" for music. His interests include sports and the great outdoors, "Star Trek", and he reads *Time* and *National Observer*.

**Kim Shipley is from Ralston, Nebraska, and is a sophomore with her major being special education. She said she is planning to attend summer school and graduate a semester early, and says she's interested in special reading and elementary education.**

When asked about her role as secretary of the student body government, she stated that she wants to get more involved with campus concerns and also, "I think we need some changes... I'd like to post the minutes of our senate meetings on the bulletin board so that they're available to everyone."

Kim said that she also appreciated that Dana is a small school and that a personal basis for learning is available with the faculty. She expressed opinions about increased administration and student contact and possibly changes in disciplinary actions and fines, and the judicial system.

Kim has been involved in various activities such as SAB, volleyball, Tri-D, the former Fellowship of Christian Athletes, and she was secretary of her freshman class.
