Rabbi to speak at Dana

Rabbi Myer S. Kripke, a rabbi emeritus of Beth El Synagogue in Omaha, will give several talks, all open to the

public, at Dana on Monday, April 23. Kripke is an adjunct associate professor of theology at Creighton University.

He will speak at the 10 a.m. chapel period on "The Duty to Remember," to a religion class in room 212 of the Pioneer Memorial building at 2:10 p.m. on "A Jewish View of Jesus," and in Parnassus, in the Pioneer Memorial building, at 4:10 p.m. on "Before Camp David and After" (Egypt-Israel Peace Treaty).

The subject of his major presentation at 7:30 p.m. in the Dana Hall Auditorium is "On Being a Jew in the Twentieth Century."

The following day, April 24, is the international Day of Memorial for the Victims of the Holocaust.

The play is being directed by Kevin Barratt, a speech-theatre major. Kevin is a senior from Irwin, Iowa. Cast in the roles of Harry and Gertrude are Gary Boeck, a senior from Schlesweig, Iowa, and Joanne Hansen, a junior from Blair.

Since the play deals with mature subject matter, personal and parental discretion in attending the performances has been advised by the director. There is a \$1 admission charge for adults. Students will be admitted at no charge.

presented tonight

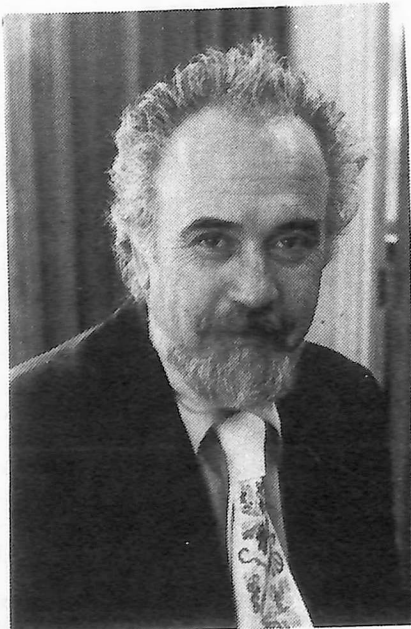

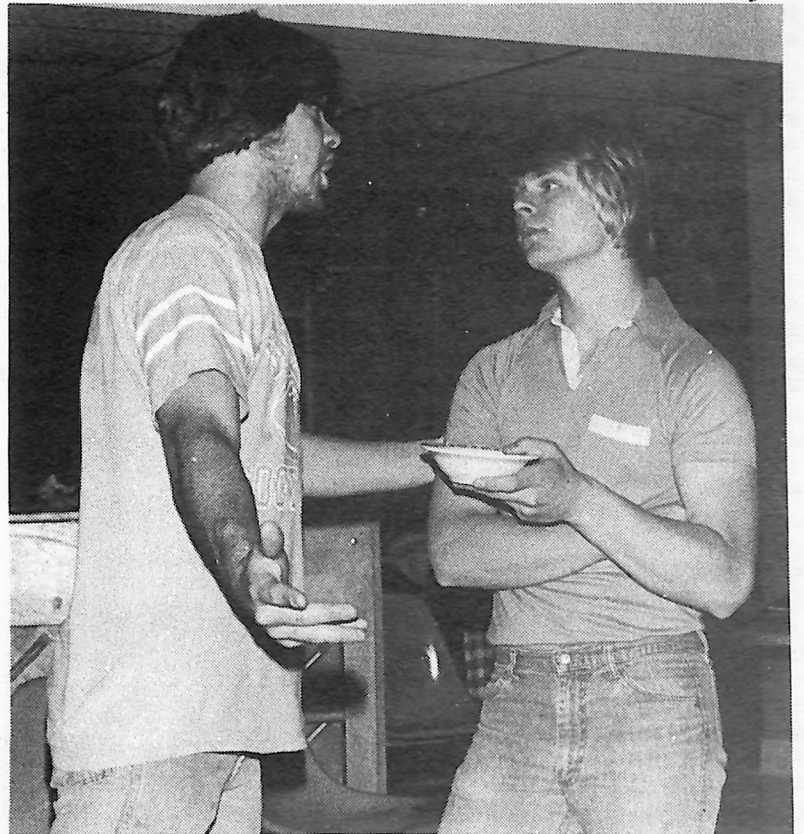

Dr. Stone writes manual

Dr. Larrie Stone was chosen by the Nebraska State Dept. of Education to write a manual to aid instruction in secondary science courses. *Enhancing Science Instruction through 35mm Photography* was published this winter and distributed to high school science teachers this spring.

The 92-page manual was inspired by an annual spring meeting of Eastern Nebraska science teachers, two years ago. The science dept. put on a half day program, here at Dana, and when the photography was demonstrated, a special interest was shown.

Dr. Stone spent over a year writing the basic guide. It also contains a collection of contributions from area science teachers on the usefulness and demonstration of various techniques. The manual will undoubtedly turn out to be a very useful tool in the area of educational science.

New pre-school swim classes

The next session of pre-school swim classes at Dana will begin on Saturday morning, May 5, with registration in Borup Coliseum the previous Saturday, April 28. The fee is \$10 per child.

Taught by Mrs. Jayne Arnold of Blair, the classes will meet for seven Saturdays through June 23, with the exception of June 2.

A free swim period for the children, their parents, and members of their immediate families is scheduled for every Wednesday from 6 to 7 p.m., beginning May 9.

Mrs. Arnold has scheduled the following beginning classes: age six months through two years, 9-9:30 a.m.; three through five years, 9:30-10 a.m.; and three through five years (for children who have taken lessons before), 10-10:30 a.m.

In these three groups, a parent must accompany the child in the pool for the lesson and for the free swim period. The maximum number for these three classes is 15 (including parents).

Two other classes are offered for children from three to five years. One, that meets from 10:30-11 a.m., is a mini-swim class for children able to listen to the instructor, put his or her whole face in the water, head under water, and do some floating on his or her front.

The other class, which meets from 11 to 11:30, is an advanced mini-swim class for children who have taken the first mini-swim class. The

Dear Editor,

As the residence hall staff of Blair Hall, we have not been oblivious to the debate that has been aired in this column in the past couple issues. On the contrary, we are deeply concerned with the underlying issues that have sparked this discussion.

First of all, let us assure you that we take our contracts and our jobs very seriously. But for us, the monthly check is taken, like the salaries for Executive Officers, organizational directors, etc., and in no way compensates for the time and effort invested in the job. We do not see ourselves as merely an arm of the administration or as police detectives. We accepted our roles out of a desire to help the residents in the total college environment.

We realize this is a very vague & elusive goals, subject in individual interpretations and radical disagreement within the college community and within our ranks. Yet it is our purpose, and though we do not mean to imply that we merit your pity, we are human, and we do make mistakes. It is an inevitable human tendency and a necessity in learning to deal with people. Hopefully, our errors can be minded or compensated for.

The rules and regulations exist for the benefit of all residents of Dana College, in spite of much dissent. And unless all residents make an effort to support these policies, they won't be effective. An R.A. or H.R. can not do it alone; it necessitates a commitment from everyone involved. Just as it is not only the R.A.'s achievement when things are going well, neither is it only the R.A.'s fault when things aren't as bright.

Ideally, the R.A. is a facilitator in the dormitory, not a police agent or scapegoat.

And the best way for this ideal to occur is for continuous open and honest communication; between the Hall staff and the residents. This will be especially important in the coming year with reductions in the student personnel staff. By ignoring actions not conducive to the goals of an academic community like Dana, you are reinforcing them, and insuring their repetition. If you have a complaint, a suggestion, an idea - tell us - preferably immediately. There is always someone on the staff whom you should be able to talk to openly. Only with your cooperation as a Dana student can residence hall life here become a worthwhile experience.

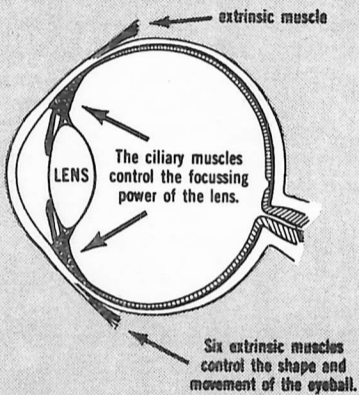

'Draft inevitable' says Pentagon National protest mobilized

The Army's top personnel officer has informed Congress that a return to the draft is inevitable.

According to Lt. Gen. Robert B. Yerks the declining size of the reserve and increasing difficulty recruiting men and women into the active force leave the nation with no other choice. "The only question," says Lt. Gen. Yerks, "is when."

Until recently such military views were only expressed off the record but increasing Congressional support for registration and the draft has had a dramatic effect on the Pentagon's position. As recently as December 28th the official Pentagon position was that the all volunteer armed services were in satisfactory condition. But the changing

political climate has encouraged the military's top officials to reverse their previous position.

Opponents to registration and the draft have called for nationwide protests on April 30th. A broad based coalition including the American Civil Liberties Union, the Students for a Libertarian Society, and the United States Students Association will be holding an 'informative rally' on the steps of the Capitol Building in Washington D.C. at twelve noon on April 30th.

The United States Students Association is already distributing buttons calling on youth to "Register to Vote: Don't Vote to Register."

The Students for a Libertarian Society has charged that:

In the hundreds of pages of Congressional testimony on the draft, not one Representative—either for or against conscription—makes any real effort to justify the global commitments that make a 2.1 million armed services necessary in peacetime.

The SLS, a California based organization, is holding a series of news conferences in major cities and is organizing a national resistance movement on college campuses.

The Friends Committee on National Legislation has established a Committee Against Registration and Draft which will help coordinate the national lobbying effort in Washington.

The Director of the Committee on Militarism in Education charges that our alleged need for more manpower is part of the same 'crackpot realism' that led us

into Viet Nam. According to Dr. Robert I. Rhodes, this 'need' rests on a series of dubious premises:

If the Russians start a conventional war in Europe; if it doesn't quickly escalate into a nuclear war; if NATO airfields and ports are not destroyed in the opening battles; and if we can build an enormous naval fleet that does not now exist, then the million men stationed in the United States will be useful in the next war.

Since these premises are clearly absurd, Dr. Rhodes believes that the new call for registration and the draft will increase the power of the Pentagon and cold war tensions, and recreate the bitter campus protests that existed in the late '60's and early '70's but will make no positive contribution to our national security.

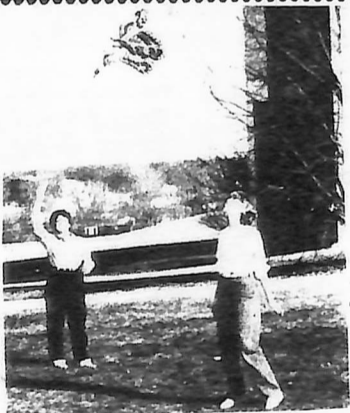

Although there are no major changes planned for next year, there will have to be a few changes in order for Pastor Bruce Bergquist to accomplish his new task.

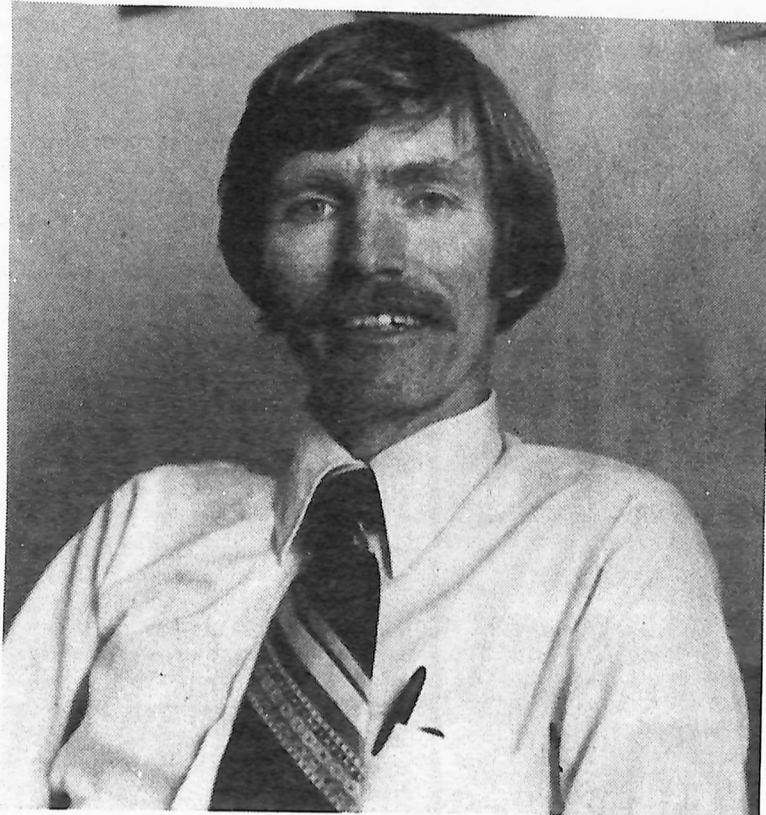

There are people in the community who could be consulted about particular areas.

"We are very much aware and want to do everything we can to meet that need," said Bergquist.

Students are going to have to shoulder some responsibility and take the initiative to do all they can in cooperating with Bergquist. Bergquist said that he believes the people are going to make things work.

"We've got a good chance and this college is coming

through with good solid basis for continuing," said Bergquist.

Bergquist realizes that this new responsibility is an overwhelming prospect, but he still feels very optimistic.

"Dr. Kallas had very little choice, I had little choice. I accepted the appointment because I believed Dr. Kallas' decision and respect his abilities," said Bergquist.

"We've been on a downward trend...I have good hopes with Dr. Kallas- he is an effective fund-raiser"

Although the college is in financial trouble, Bergquist feels that the next few years will be a turning point for the college, and it will be revitalized.

"A time of crisis often brings out the best in people, and I look for that here," said Bergquist.

"I can understand the reaction (the editorial car-

toons) and concern of the students. It's hard to see this kind of thing happen to anyone.

I can understand the resentment, but I realize the students are there to get behind Kallas and pull Dana together. Some people may be afraid of a pastor as being Dean of Students, I would like to assure them that PASTORS CAN BE HUMAN!"

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Double Cruzzle...as important as football???

Mark Landsburg, B.A., M.A., class of '75, U.S. Navy veteran, Peace Corps alumnus, Scrabble strategy book author, inventor of some fifty games, author of a treatise entitled "The mathematics of gambling," 5 and 7 card poker expert, blackjack specialist, backgammon enthusiast, volleyball addict, word lover and puzzle solver is proving the old bromide of "building a better mousetrap" with a mousetrap that's been around for the past half century.

The mousetrap? Crossword Puzzles! The better mousetrap? Double Cruzzle, a trademarked, copyrighted game manufactured by Omnion, Inc., a Los Angeles based developer of games and puzzles. Double Cruzzle, a unique competitive crossword puzzle game, with patent applied for and pending with the U.S. Patent Office, is the brainchild of Landsburg and two local Los Angeles businessmen who are also crossword puzzle addicts.

The three, seeing a golden opportunity and seizing upon it, developed Double Cruzzle which is presently on sale throughout Southern California, the company's first test market, and from all indications threatens to become a runaway best seller as well as a year in-year out staple like the granddaddy of them all. . . Monopoly.

Landsburg however sees greater implications in the game's success. He sees it as the first opportunity for people of every age and sex who have had a desire to compete and

He envisions touring pros competing in crossword opens and invitations in every city in the English speaking world, while other professionals are engaged in crossword leagues and teams and championship world series conclusions each year. More than that he sees colleges, high schools and even grammar schools forming school teams and competing against each other. To add weight to his assertions Landsburg offers proof that Double Cruzzle, on sale in the UCLA book store and the USC book store as well, has created, in a very short time, student interest in some version of the PAC 10 for crosswords with special emphasis on the beginnings of a crosswords rivalry between the two arch rivals of Southern California. Sort of an attempt to "cross wits" "cross town" with crosswords. Inquiries have contained pleas for assistance in setting up crosswords' organizations for the Southeastern Conference, the Big 10, the Pac 10, the Big 8, the Southwest Conference, the Middle Atlantic Conference, the Southern Conference, the Yankee Conference, the Missouri Valley Conference, have been prevented from doing so because they were not young enough, or strong enough, or talented enough, or fast enough to be professional athletes, to now engage in organized competition on both the professional and amateur levels with their attendant rewards. "At last an arena for minds," says Landsburg. "It's fantastic!"

the Mid American Conference and hundreds of high schools and independent colleges. Landsburg freely admits he and his associates are unable to cope with the avalanche of mail, but he promises to reply to each correspondent more rapidly now that two secretaries have been added to the staff for just that purpose.

As if he were not busy enough, Landsburg has formed the United States Crossword Opens, Inc., and in addition to everything else, is aiding interested individuals to form local affiliated organizations which will sponsor annual tournaments, for substantial prize money, while conducting clinics, contests and individual lessons in a club-like atmosphere the balance of the year. "That's the start of the pro tour," he exults. "Can't you just see it? Some little old lady with arthritis defeating a university professor for the top prize of \$10,000. Or some 13 year old kid knocking off last year's champ. It's all possible. It will all happen."

And the game? The game of Double Cruzzle? It's composed of two books containing 30 puzzles each. The puzzles are similar in each book. The players open to the same page in their respective books and begin to enter their answers on a specially designed plastic-

surfaced wipe-off board using the special marking pens included with the game. The first one to finish wins and there is no limit as to the number of players who may compete. It's that simple. And every bit as exciting as Landsburg makes it.

"Mark my 'words,'" says Landsburg, "You'll live to see Dartmouth playing Rutgers, Notre Dame playing Navy, Ohio playing Michigan, Alabama playing Georgia and UCLA playing USC in crosswords tournaments with the same big crowds that now attend football games. It can be done because we now have the technology to televise the most minute things onto extremely large screens, and with that problem solved it's now possible to follow anyone's play and "ooh" and "ah" when he, or she, makes a particularly good move. With fighters, baseball players, football players, basketball players, hockey players, tennis players, golf players, and all the rest having had it their way for as long as any of us can remember, we believe it's time for a change. And that time is now. Brawn is out, brains are in. And the meek and weak shall inherit the earth."

Batters streak

The Dana Vikings have played some good baseball since late March. The earlier weather-plagued southern trip left them 0-6, and it took a while, but the Vikings have climbed ahead finally with a 9-7 record to date. Dana has won 9 and only lost 1, a close 6-5 decision to Nebraska Wesleyan last week, and the team has hopes of keeping the hot streak going. In the Nebraska Intercollegiate Athletic Conference games they are on top with a 3-1 record, the same as Concordia-Seward. Dana faced Concordia at home on April 18 and goes to Wesleyan on April 21, making this a very crucial week. Dana won both games against Concordia.

Hot bats and good defense have given the Vikings their boost. Coming off the southern trip they were batting .206 as a team but have been hitting .388 in the games "up North." Now the overall average stands at .294. The opponents average is .281.

Steve Daeges (Harlan, Iowa) has been hot. He was hitting .540 before going 1 for 6 in the last double-header, dropping to .488. Freshman Don Savino (Oak Park, Illinois), .370, and Dan Prusha (Omaha), .347, are going strong now. Sophomore Randy Rosenthal (Ralston, Nebraska) is hitting .348 and another freshman, Mike Wyskowski (Omaha), is at .303.

On occasion the Vikings have gotten some pretty good pitching efforts as well. Senior Bob Andrews, (Emerald, Pennsylvania), has allowed but one run. It was earned in

his last two starts to even his record at 2-2. Sophomore Scott Simms (Nebraska City, Nebraska) stands at 3-0 with each of the wins coming since the trip. Both have emerged as perhaps the top pitchers right now. Junior Gary Fauskee (Brooten, Minnesota) is 1-3 with a 3.86 earned run average. Andrews and Simms will go against Concordia, and Fauskee and one of the other two will probably work against Nebraska Wesleyan.

The next week coming up will be a stern test also. If Dana or the University of Nebraska-Lincoln does not have to play a weekend, postponed make-up game on Monday, April 23, those teams will square off in Lincoln. Nebraska is currently on top in the Big 8 with a 5-1 mark and is 25-6 overall. Dana then goes to UNO on April 21 for another big one. Then it's back to conference action for the rest of the season, plus a home date with pesky Bellevue College.

All games are important, not only for conference standings, but for the right to get into the NAIA district play-offs. Dana has been in those play-offs ten straight seasons.

Dana is still looking for some consistently good weather. The Vikings have only played in 60-degree temperatures, or above, twice in the most unusual spring anyone can remember. They have not even had a single good-weather practice day with a dry field! Still, they are playing well. They are hoping for good, warm sunshine the final four or so weeks. It'll happen sooner or later!

Road race planned for Plainview

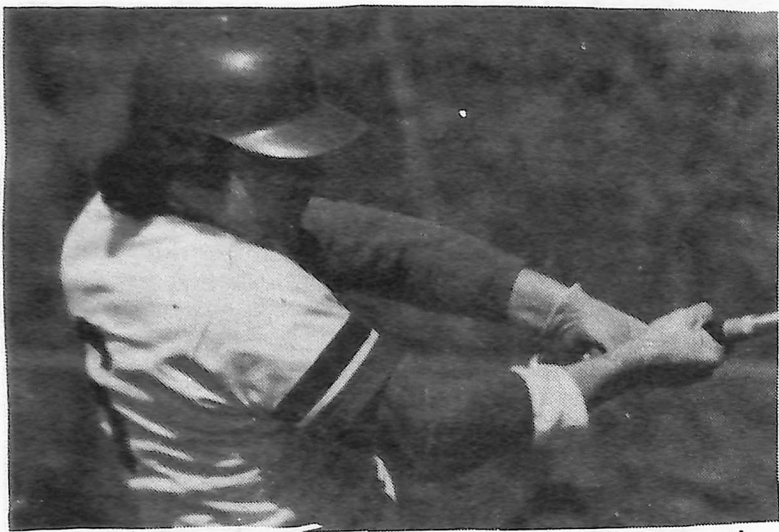

Ahrens ready to resume rebuilding task

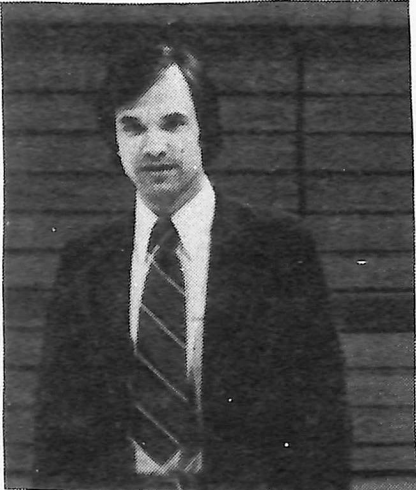
Lee Ahrens has now been named as women's basketball coach succeeding Richard Palm who is leaving at the end of the year.
