



Room Procedures Changed

Room assignments for next year will incorporate a lottery draw system, to give all students with the same seniority an equal chance of obtaining their first preference for choice of dormitory floors.

Please note that in any of the following rules governing procedure, a pair of roommates of differing classes will be eligible for consideration according to the class of the individual with greater seniority.

PROCEDURES

1. All students who wish to sign up for the **same floor** they are now living on must do so by 3:00 p.m. on Monday, April 21. Do this by turning in your room request form to your present Head Resident.

2. All students who intend to have a roommate should sign up at the same time as your intended roommate. Each of you must turn in corresponding room request forms.

3. If you do not sign up with a roommate, and you do not wish to sign up for a single room, or you are not eligible to do so (see No. 4 below), you will lose your priority, and you will be given whatever space is available after all others have received their assignments.

4. Only next year's Juniors and Seniors are eligible to sign up for single rooms. We are sorry, but because of space

limitations, next year's Freshmen and Sophomores will not be allowed to sign up for single rooms.

5. It is understood that if you sign up for a single room, you will pay an additional charge of 50 percent of the regular room rate (next year, \$125).

6. Tuesday, April 22, will be the lottery draw day for next year's Seniors who are changing floors; Wednesday, April 23, for next year's Juniors; Thursday, April 24, for next year's Sophomores; and Friday, April 25, for next year's second-semester Freshmen and anyone who has not been included in the draw to this point.

7. On each lottery day at 9:00 a.m., a list will be posted at the Student Personnel Office to show the number of available rooms on each dormitory floor. You (and your roommate) will sign a room request form indicating your first, second, and third choices of floors. Do not fill in this room request form until you see what floors have available space. Signing for the draw must be done between 9:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. on your assigned day.

8. At 3:00 p.m. on each lottery day, the draw will be held. When your number is drawn, if your first choice floor still has an available room, you will be assigned to that floor, other-

wise, you will be assigned to your second or third choice floors. If none of your three choices is available, you will be given your pick of any floor with available rooms remaining at the end of that day's lottery draw.

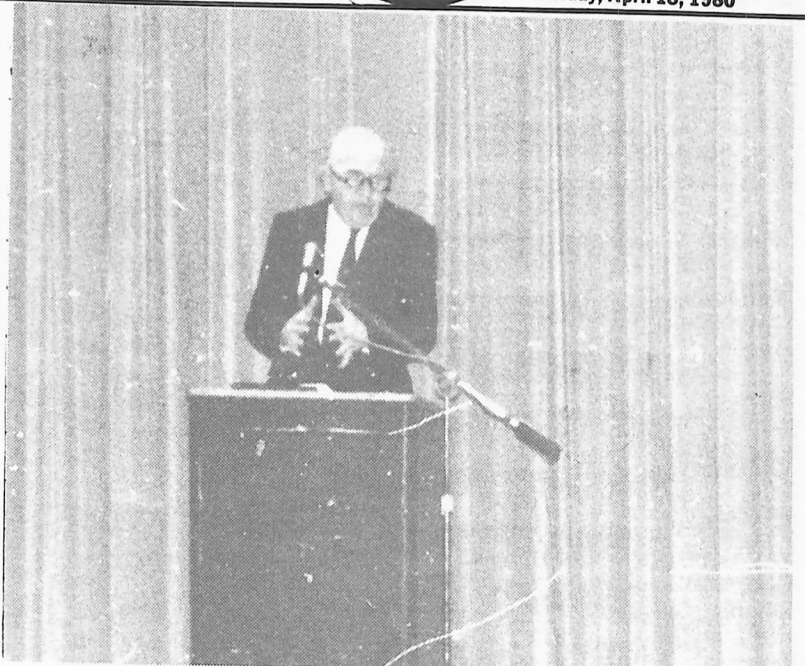
9. Once you have been assigned to a given floor, the order of the draw will determine your priority for selecting a specific room on the floor.

10. The College reserves the right at all times to change any student's room assignment.

11. It is not necessary for you to be present at the time the lottery draw is held. As long as you have properly registered, your priority will be assured according to the luck of the draw. Stop in as soon as possible, however, to discuss the assignment of your specific room.

12. The following dormitory floors will be restricted to new Freshmen next year, and no one presently on campus will be allowed to sign up for these floors:

- Mickelsen Hall, all floors
- Rasmussen Hall, 2nd floor East
- Rasmussen Hall, 3rd floor East
- Holling Hall, 2nd floor North
- Holling Hall, 3rd floor North

Dr. John Macquarrie, Canon of Christ Church of Oxford University, England, will be here April 14-18 as the fourth lecturer in this year's Visiting Theologians series. He will speak on the general theme, "Aspects of Being Human," with his individual lectures on five of those aspects -- freedom, transcendence, alienation, conscience, and commitment. All are set for 8 p.m. in DHA.

Born in Scotland, Macquarrie received his M.A., Ph.D. and D. Litt, degrees from the University of Glasgow. He is ordained in the Episcopal Church, was a

British Army chaplain from 1945-48, and pastor of St. Ninian's Church in Brechin, Scotland, from 1943-53. That year he became a lecturer in systematic theology at the University of Glasgow; in 1962 he came to the U.S. as professor of systematic theology at Union Theological Seminary in New York City. Since 1970 he has been Lady Margaret Professor of Divinity and Canon of Christ Church at Oxford.

Macquarrie's most recent books, both published in 1978, are *The Humility of God* and *Christian Hope*.

German Convention Hosted

Dana Deutsche Verein - Dana's German Club - hosted the 4th annual convention of the Nebraska Federation of Students of German, April 11 and 12 on the Dana Campus. One hundred nineteen High school students and teachers attended the activities scheduled by the Verein members.

Friday night, a Fashings ball or costume ball was held. The Danish Dancers performed at the Fashings Ball and several High schools presented their entries for the German play contest. A German band provided German music.

Saturday morning a Jahrmaklet or fair was held in which the attending schools could exhibit and sell things that they had made.

The convention-goers could then choose from a variety of other activities. Contests were held in Language and poetry. The seminars were on "A love song for Germany" by Dr. John W. Nielsen, "Hitler and the Third Reich" by Dr. Richard Jorgensen, "Writing a German poem" by Dr. Richard Sieling and "German Dance" by Merle Brodhoff and the Danish Dancers.

Films on Contemporary Germany and a filmstrip on careers in German were viewed.

The convention culminated in an awards banquet featuring a German menu. President James Kallas was guest speaker for the banquet.

Letters To The Editor

A matter has recently arisen that we feel should be brought to your attention. You may already know that Dr. Penick has tendered her resignation. I think I speak for most when I say that we will miss her very much. The problem does not lie in her resignation, however. We are concerned about the future of the French Department and the reputation of Dana as a Liberal Arts institution.

Assurances have been made by both President Kallas and Dr. Cliff Hanson that the obligations of the College to those students with a declared French major shall be fulfilled. However, we are concerned that for financial reasons the French Department will be dropped entirely in the near future. We strongly urge that alternative measures be given careful consideration by the administration before any French courses are stricken from the curriculum.

I think I speak for most people on this campus when I say that we strongly believe that foreign languages as a whole are an essential part of a well-rounded liberal arts education; something that we came to find at Dana. Practically speaking, French is one of the most important languages in the modern world. Of course, we do not mean to belittle or demean the importance of the Danish and German programs at Dana, but we do feel that it is essential for a Romance language to be included in the foreign language offerings. We realize that there are economic considerations, involved, but is Dana so financially strapped for funds that the French Department, and the French major specifically, must be discontinued. Need we compromise the ideal of a Liberal Arts College to such an extreme degree. Some feel that foreign language study is a waste of time. We, as French students obviously do not feel either are true. Another solution should be possible.

We are concerned about maintaining the fine reputation Dana has both in the immediate community and nation-wide. Reducing the number of foreign languages offered only serves to reflect the typical American in-

difference to the importance of foreign languages, both at home and abroad.

The *Omaha World-Herald* published an article on November 8, 1979 that related the findings of the Federal Commission on Foreign Languages and International Studies. This commission was headed by Dr. James Perkins and a Dana alumnus and member of the Board of Regents Rep. Paul Simon. The following is a direct quotation from the commission's report: "America's scandalous incompetence in foreign languages also explains our dangerously inadequate understanding of world affairs. Our schools graduate a large majority of students whose knowledge and vision stops at the American Shoreline, whose approach to international affairs is provincial and whose heads have been filled with astonishing misinformation."

According to information in the same article only 8 percent of colleges and universities still require study of a foreign language for under-graduate admission. That figure was 34 percent in 1966. Quoting from the report, "Ignorance of foreign languages and cultures is one explanation of the weakened U.S. position as an exporting country."

We admit that the French Department is small. But there are seven declared majors in the department which is a high percentage to the number of students. The French Department is far from inactive. In addition to classroom studies, French students are teaching in the public schools in Blair, produced a radio program last semester participating in cultural and Parnassus events, and experienced French life firsthand through interims and "au pair" work.

French itself is an important part of the Humanities program, humanities seminar and even the Music Department enlists the aid of members of French classes in pronunciation and interpretation.

Dorm Changes

Next year there will be four freshmen floors for men on campus. These floors are Rasmussen Hall, 2nd and 3rd East and Holling Hall, 2nd and 3rd North.

According to Dr. Bergquist, this change is being made in hopes of improving life in men's dorms. It will be a better way of orienting freshmen into college life because it will be easier for them to make friends. Dr. Bergquist feels that it is hard for freshmen to adjust to college life and by putting them on the same floors they can achieve a sense of unity. If freshmen are placed on separate floors they will also have more opportunity to choose upperclassmen friends because

relationships will be more spontaneous. Dr. Bergquist hopes that the quality of life in men's dorms will improve by establishing freshmen floors.

There are some more changes that may take place in the dorms next year. It is hoped that dorm atmosphere will be improved by establishing a dorm council that would plan activities for each dorm. It is also hoped that some kind of dorm judicial system can be formed so that dorm members can decide what to do about minor infractions. It would be a form of self-government in the dorms. Both of these ideas are in the basic planning stages so there is no guarantee that they will come about, but they are indications that improvement of dorm life for Dana students is being seriously considered.

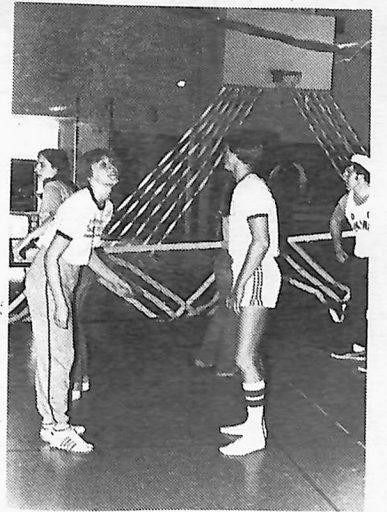

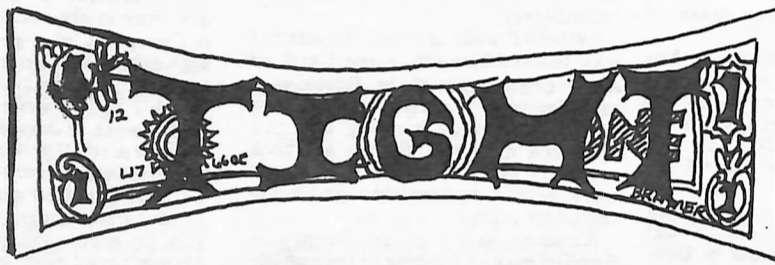

The new student body president at Dana College said he was elected because students felt he'd be an articulate spokesman for their views. "People feel I'll stand up for students and I won't fold in to the administration," he stated.

The new president ran an active campaign, advertised on the college radio and won handily in the election held the first week of March. "It's not that big of deal," he said modestly, "there weren't that many candidates anyway."

What's interesting though, is that the Dana student body's new spokesman is Danish.

Mogens Knudsen has the clear, blue eyes of a Scandinavian, speaks flawless English and is a fan of John Steinbeck and Mark Twain. "All Danes like Twain for his sense of humour," he said.

The 21-year-old Knudsen has studied English since he was 11 and is continuing his affair with the language as an English major. He only intended to study at Dana for one year, "but I liked it so much I got stuck."

Knudsen grew up in Herning, a city of about 60,000 people in central Jutland, the main peninsula of Denmark. His father is a government employee, his mother works in a store and there are three children in the family. He polished his English by attending summer school in England and first became interested in coming to the U.S. when he was 15.

He heard about Dana College through the Danish-American Foun-

ation, earned money to attend by working in a Herning slaughterhouse and left home in 1978. His first impression of Americans was their friendliness.

"When I went through England I was delayed by a strike and I met an American teacher from Brooklyn," said Knudsen. "I arrived in New York at 5 a.m. Sunday morning and this man took me home, fed me and took me to the bus." He added that people were helpful to him throughout the rest of his journey.

Knudsen said that his fluency in English made adjusting to college life no more difficult than an average American student. Television programs, music and clothes were no different because so much of Denmark's entertainment and styles are Americanized. But politics, religion and sexual morals were another story.

Denmark, long known for its sexual tolerance, provided some interesting contrasts for the local students to digest. "When I told my fellow students a lot of people lived together in Denmark without being married they about dropped off their chairs," he laughed.

Knudsen added that Danish children learned about drinking in their homes instead of on the streets as he observed here.

American politics also provided some interesting contrasts. "In Denmark," he said, "I was considered middle of the road, but people here think I'm close to being a Communist. Americans don't know the difference between a Social Democrat and a Communist." He added, "it seems that anything that smells of reform or a government program is called socialist, which is a dirty word here but not in Denmark."

The Dane said he understood why Americans seemed to know so little about international topics when he saw how they received information about the world. "The television networks are centered more on amusing people rather than informing them. It's not profitable to produce documentaries or informational programs."

Knudsen added that Americans seemed more church-oriented than Danes. He said about 90 percent of the Danish belong to the state financed church but only a few percent actually attend services.

Knudsen, now a junior, said he liked Dana College although he noted some differences in education between the two countries. "I've noticed students are more interested in facts here than in Europe. A lot of people come out of high school without ever having written a critical analysis while in Denmark I had to write a critical paper every week. Europeans are also more academically oriented while Americans are more career oriented."

"I'm impressed with Dana's quality of education though, there are a lot of good programs and good professors. I wouldn't stay over here if I didn't like it."

For the future, Knudsen hopes to make a career of translating Danish literature into English. And he hopes to stay in the U.S. "I'm hopelessly lost in learning for the sake of learning and there are more opportunities for education here."

Joe Eagen, a Dana College senior from Harlan, Iowa, will give a voice recital in Dana's Alumni Memorial Auditorium at 8 p.m. Monday, April 21. The event is free and open to the public.

Dr. H. D. Doubek, a practitioner in Belleville, Kansas, will demonstrate the medical uses of hypnosis next Monday, April 21, at 7 p.m. in DHA.

During his collegiate career football, basketball, track and baseball were some of the Coach's extra-curricular activities.

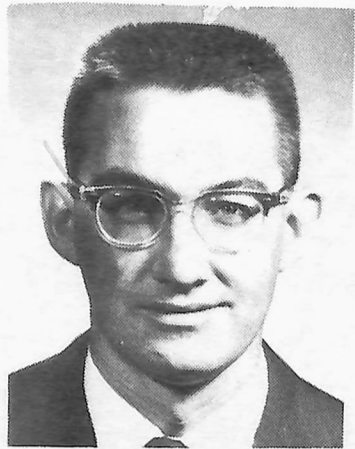

We are very grateful for the support and hopefully it will continue throughout the season. A good active crowd can really help the team during play as well as help in the outcome."

Vikings Hope For Repeat Title, Then Districts.

Dana College rocked Nebraska Wesleyan 15-6 in the opener Tuesday but fell victim to bases on balls and lost 9-2 in the night cap. The split leaves Dana on top in the NIAC, however, with a 5-1 record while Wesleyan's is 3-1. The Vikings pounded out 15 hits in the first game, of which two were home runs by Randy Rosenthal. Dana and NWU each had but six hits in the second game.

Rosenthal, who had been struggling at the plate up until Tuesday, hit the first pitch over the left field fence in the first inning. It followed a walk and gave Dana a 2-0 lead in a hurry. A single run in the second made it 3-0. In the third inning Rosenthal lead off with another first-pitch-homer. Dana really poured it on in the fourth inning as they sent 12 men to bat, getting seven hits and eight runs -- their best inning of the season so far. Mitch Lave's double and Gary Fauskee's triple were the big hits, each driving in two runs. Don Savino had a RBI double also.

Fauskee relieved a struggling Jerry Smith in the third inning to pick up the victory, his second of the year. Three unearned runs were scored off him in the fifth but he finished with two fine innings, the sixth and seventh, retiring six in a row.

DeBuhr got two hits in this game giving him five singles for the double header. It was the third straight double header in which he made five hits and it raised his batting

average to .458. Savino had four hits in the two games, despite having to leave in the fourth inning because of illness. Kurt Amen and Bob Dudley received injuries as well, so the Vikings got pretty well beaten up before the day was over.

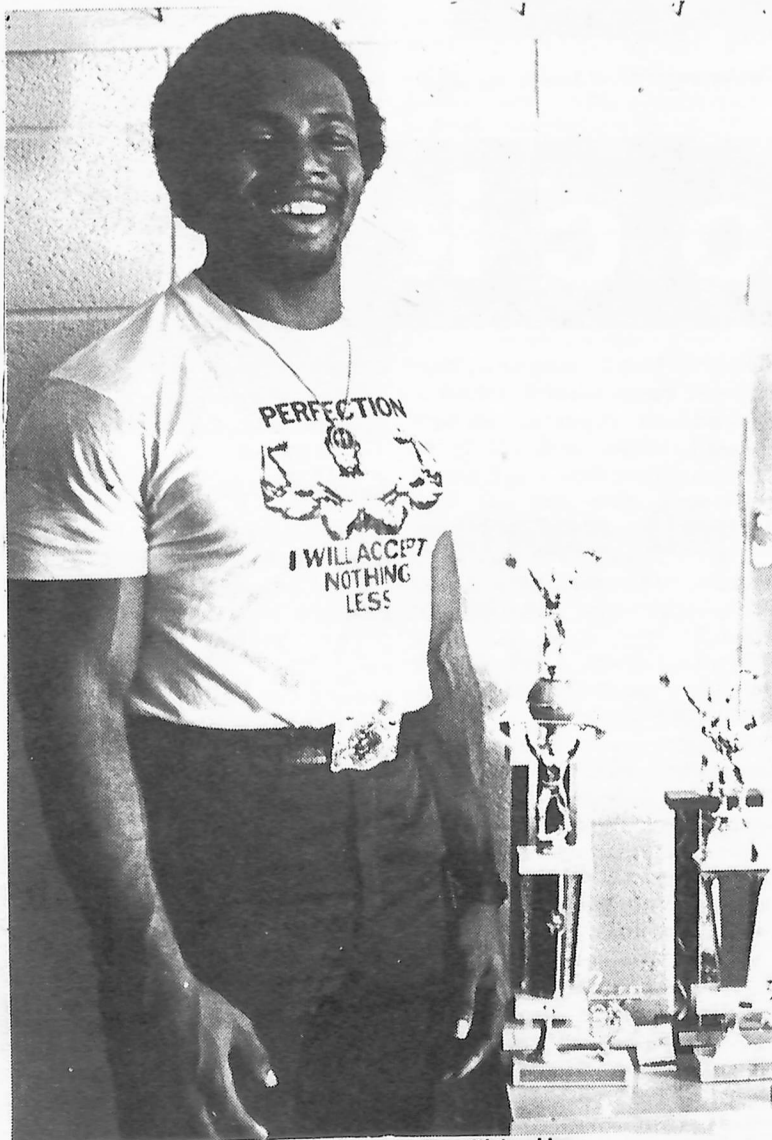
The biggest the best and the beast.
