New Name for Old Program

This year students and faculty members are participating in the improved Liberal Arts Reading Program (LARP) which is now entitled Liberal Arts Experience (LAE). The purpose of the course is to help participants sharpen their skills in critical thinking and oral communication.

Students are required to participate in the LAEx program one semester for each year of attendance at Dana College. The

difference in this course is that it is one credit and only lasts nine to 10 weeks.

As part of this course, participants will still be asked to read assigned texts, prepare comments for discussion and actively participate in weekly discussions. The changes and additions are as follows: write one short reflection paper, attend a designated number of multi-media events and select five liberal arts events or excursions.

Many students feel that the LARP program involved too much work. "Since it is a shorter semester, I believe it is within

the expectations of a one-credit course," stated Sybille Bartels, coordinator of the course committee. "We want to educate our students in a broader range of medium."

Faculty and staff members hope to see students grow more well-rounded through this improved LAEx course and encourage students to actively take part in the program.

At the end of the semester, students will be asked to evaluate the course. Any student is invited to the committee meetings at the end of the semester.

'Building Allies with People of Color'

Cheryl Crazy Bull, Vice President of Administration and Director of Institutional Relations of Sinte Gieska University, was invited by Dana College to speak about concerns of native Americans.

The concerns that Crazy Bull spoke about included human relationships and "building allies with people of color." Crazy Bull emphasized that the people in power throughout this land should build human relationships with people of color to better understand them.

Crazy Bull wants people in America to understand that an ethnic group from Europe came to America and empowered another ethnic group. As a result, native Americans have been deprived from their traditional values and culture.

Crazy Bull said that native American values and culture were of the land and the animals that roamed the land. Crazy Bull stressed that the alcohol abuse, stereotypical myths and livelihood on reservations that we witness today is a result of the treatment Native Americans received from the Europeans.

Crazy Bull has served at the Sinte Gieska University as an instructor and division chair; planning officer director of the

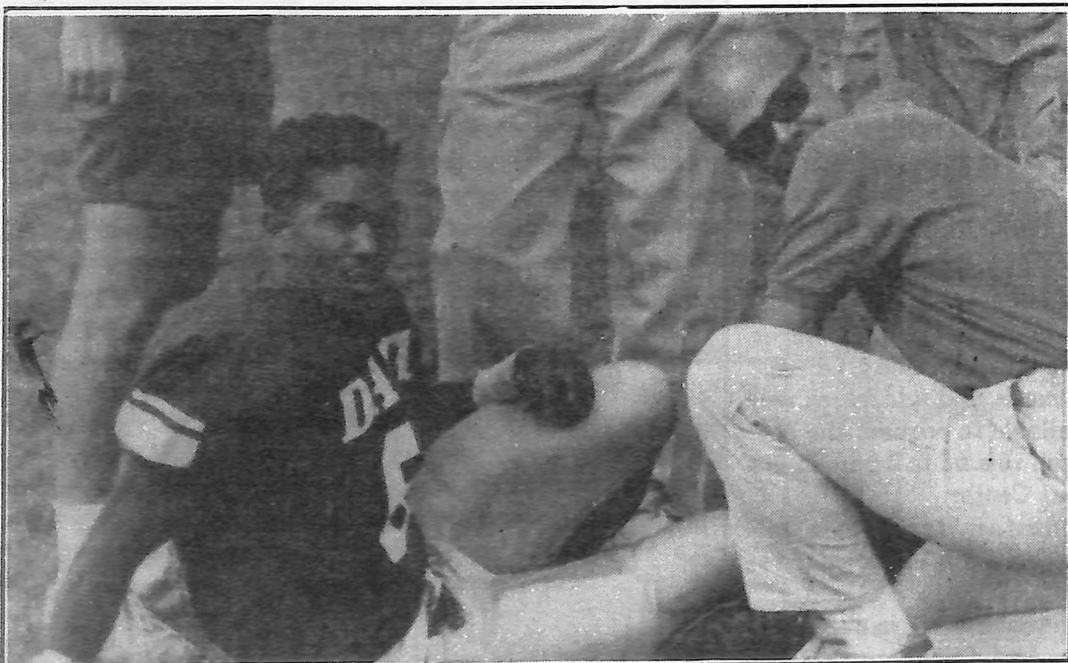
women's project; dean of instructional programs; and director of institutional relations. In August 1989, she was appointed vice president of administration and director of institutional relations.

Sinte Gieska University is located on the Rosebud Sioux Indian Reservation which covers an area of 5,337 square miles within south central South Dakota. The reservation population that the college serves is 18,000 Sicangu Lakota and 10,000 non-tribal members.

She is also a member of the South Dakota Advocacy Network for Women; National Women's Studies Association; Rosebud Reservation Sobriety Task Force; and the White Buffalo Calf Women's Society.

Crazy Bull feels being involved in these positions helps her better the native American's situation in society. Cheryl Crazy Bull is married to an attorney, Albert Jones. They have three children: Tess, Willie and John.

Lady Vikings Place Second in Nebraska Wesleyan Tournament

The Lady Vikings improved their overall record to 18-13 in the past week with a second place finish in the Nebraska Wesleyan Invitational, a non-conference loss and a conference victory.

According to Coach Kathy Foley, the Vikings "hammered" Concordia in conference play Thursday, Sept. 24, in Borup Coliseum. Dana defeated the Bulldogs in straight sets 15-2, 15-11, 15-9.

Stephenie Wilson had 11 kills and 18 digs to lead the team. Melanie Hild tallied four aces serves and 14 digs. Katie Krueger

had 35 assists.

The Dana Vikings had to dig themselves out of a hole last weekend to place second in the Nebraska Wesleyan Invitational in Lincoln.

The Lady Vikes began the tournament with three straight losses in pool play. They were defeated by Midland 7-15, 15-6, 11-15 and Central (Iowa) 10-15, 10-15 on Friday.

Pool play on Saturday began with another loss for the Vikings. They were defeated by Northern State (Colo.) 15-17, 10-15.

After the loss the Lady Vikes began to turn things around. They closed out pool play with a victory over host school Nebraska Wesleyan 15-13, 10-15, 15-11.

Their 1-3 pool play record

seeded the Vikings low in the tournament bracket, but they cruised to the finals with two more victories. Dana defeated Bellevue College for the third time this season 13-15, 15-9, 15-11 and scored a two set victory over Valley City State 15-13, 15-13.

A tough rematch with the Warriors of Midland set the stage for the tournament championship game. The Vikings lost a very close match 7-15, 15-2, 14-16. Dana led in the final game 14-11 before falling to the Warriors.

"We played sluggish on Friday," said Foley, "but we were able to come back and do very well in the tournament. The players gave every ounce of energy they had and fell just a couple points short."

According to Foley, Shelli Wiebelhaus had an "outstanding tournament." Wiebelhaus racked up 51 kills, 11 blocks, 17 service aces and 71 digs in the tourney. "She has played well consistently for us over the last few weeks," said Foley.

Wilson had 50 kills and an incredible 158 digs in the tournament. She leads the NAIA District II in digs with a 6.06 average per game.

Krueger had 181 assists for the Vikings.

The Vikings suffered a grueling five set loss to Dakota Wesleyan in Mitchell, S.D., on Wednesday. Dana was defeated in the see-saw battle 11-15, 15-7, 14-16, 15-13, 16-14.

Wiebelhaus again had a good night for the Vikings. She slammed 14 kills, had 13 blocks and 21 digs.

Krueger had 45 assists and 10 blocks in five sets.

Wilson came up with 40 digs and 14 kills.

The Lady Vikings have a rematch with Nebraska Wesleyan tonight in Borup Coliseum. On Tuesday they take on the Midland Warriors for the third time this season in Borup.

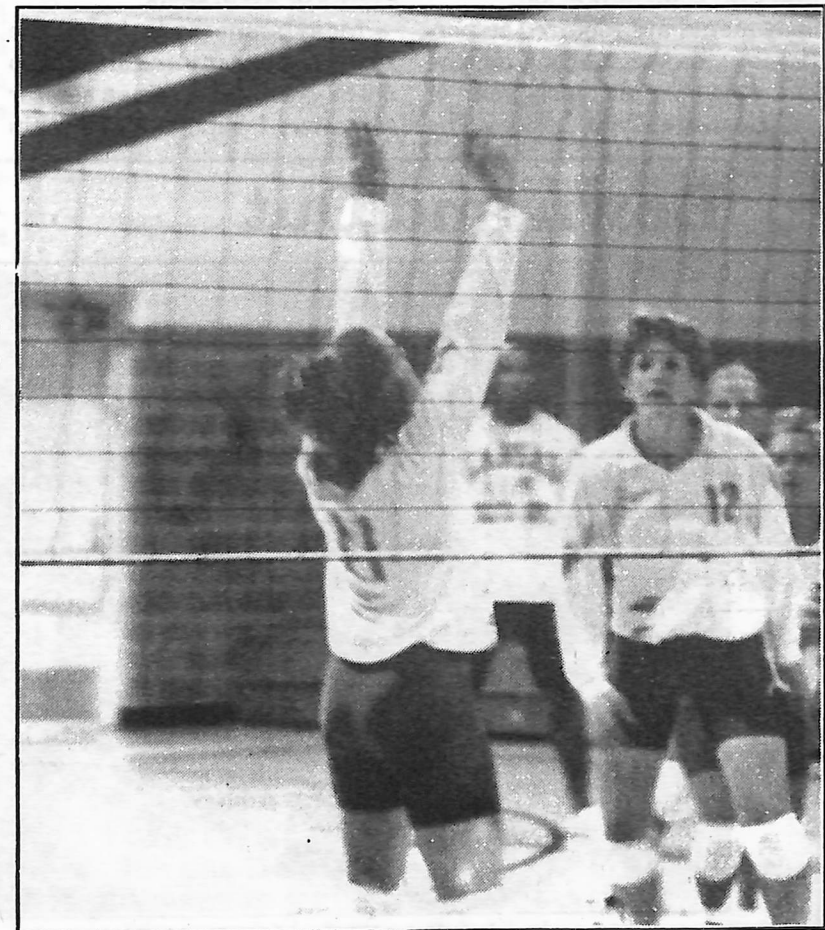
Community Fun Run

Vikings Lose Despite Record Setting Efforts

Last Saturday's Nebraska-Iowa Athletic Conference opening football game at Viking Field was a storybook game for the Dana Vikings except for one important factor - it lacked the storybook ending.

Despite record setting performances by Dana quarterback Mike Carubba and wide receiver Brent Leefers, the Vikings fell short on a come-from-behind bid and dropped a 38-33 decision to the Midland Warriors.

Carubba completed 25 of 44 passes for 437 yards, a new Dana school record. He gave the due credit to his team members, but still regretted the outcome: "The offensive line gave me tons of time to throw. The receivers ran great patterns and always managed to get wide open. The protection was there, so we started picking away at their defense and we stuck to it. The only problem is we didn't get the win."

Midland opened the scoring with a field goal and a 75-yard touchdown scamper by quarterback Sanice Francois. They held

a 10-0 lead when the Vikings erupted for 20 points in the second quarter. Running back Jon Bohlken took the ball over the goal line on a one-yard run to cut the lead to 10-7. Carubba connected with wide receiver Manny Johnson on a 37-yard touchdown pass (point after attempt failed) then with Leefers for a 28-yard strike to give Dana a 20-10 lead. Midland managed another touchdown late in the half to cut Dana's lead to 20-17.

The Warriors used their running game effectively in the second half, scoring three touchdowns on the ground. Francois put together a number of run-oriented drives that produced three touchdowns and a 38-20 lead for the Warriors early in the fourth quarter. Dana started its comeback with two touchdown passes from Carubba to Leefers, covering 65 and 10 yards respectively and narrowed the margin to five points. The Vikings marched down the field once again, but a game winning touchdown was not in the cards. The Warriors took final possession and ran down the clock to end the game.

Leefers completed the game with 11 receptions for 253 yards,

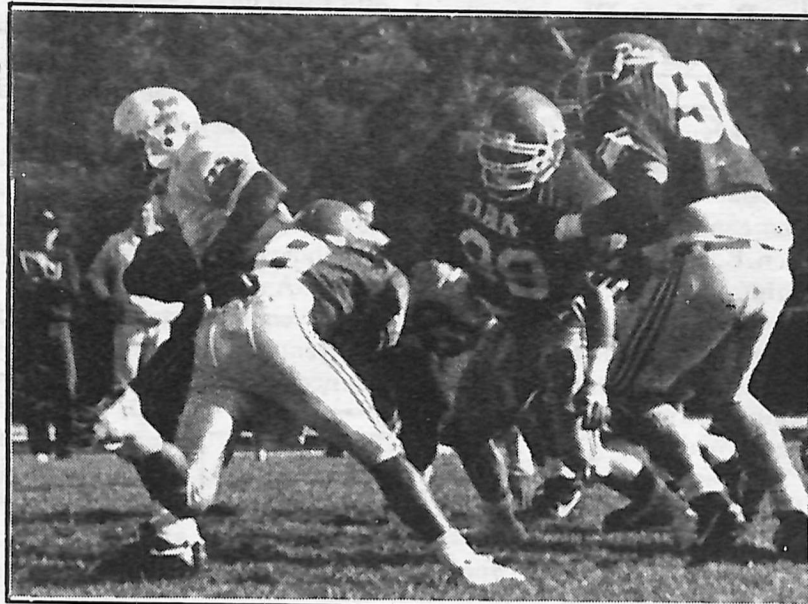
eclipsing his own record of 238 yards set two years ago. He said the reason for such a successful passing attack was "they were playing primarily a man-to-man defense. And with the speed of guys like Manny, we just overwhelmed them."

The Viking defense gave up its greatest number of points in four games, nearly doubling its season average of 19.7 points allowed per game. "We had a pretty good defensive game plan but it just broke down," says defensive back Mike Allen. "Defensively, we had a bad day. They executed pretty well and basically we didn't."

Head coach Leo McKillip said Midland's running game was Dana's downfall: "Their quarterback and running game just killed us. We did not do our jobs, and their people were excellent. We had a record-breaking day on offense, which is great, but a win was the key thing in this game."

"Not to take anything away from them, but we may have underestimated them."

The next Vikings game is on Saturday at Doane College in Crete, Nebr. Dana goes into the game with a 1-3 overall record and an 0-1 mark in NIAC action.

Doane enters the game with a 1-0 NIAC record and a 2-1 overall mark.

When asked about this week's contest, Allen seemed positive. "We've got to go out and play a good hard game against Doane," he said. "We're getting better every week, so we've just got to buckle down, get rid of the mistakes, and we'll be alright."

Linebacker Ryan Murtaugh had 22 total tackles, including

13 unassisted stops. He also had a fumble recovery that led to a Dana touchdown. Johnson recorded 113 yards on pass receptions and 82 yards on kickoff returns. Leefers leads Dana scorers with 36 points on six touchdowns. Linebacker Jeff Powell suffered a bruised calf and is questionable for Saturday's game.

Soccer Club Improves Record to 3-2-1

The Dana soccer team improved their record to 3-2-1 by defeating Nebraska Wesleyan 5-3 Saturday. The win raised their NIAC club conference record to 3-0.

Dana drew first blood in Saturday's game when Gerson Katoko scored on a break-away goal to give Dana the early lead. Then, Katoko assisted Binay Manandhar's goal midway through the first half to give Dana

a 2-0 lead. Nebraska Wesleyan finally got on the scoreboard before the half ended to make the score 2-1.

Dana gave themselves a comfortable lead early in the second half on goals from Katoko and Juan Cruz. Nebraska Wesleyan battled back and scored two goals of their own to make it an exciting 4-3 game. Joe Mwatatele finished off Nebraska Wesleyan with a goal late in the game to give Dana the win.

The Dana soccer team did not have very much time to celebrate their win. Tuesday night they

played a tough Platte-Columbus team. Platte-Columbus downed the Vikings by the score of 7-2. Scoring goals for Dana were Juan Cruz and Julio Cruz. Other outstanding performers were Kaleb Asafhar and Becca Darby.

The loss to Platte-Columbus dropped Dana's record to 3-3-1. Dana will try and reach the .500 mark by beating Morningside on Saturday and Teikyo Westmar on Sunday. The game against Morningside is away and the Teikyo Westmar game will be played on Blair Field at 2:30 p.m.

blown up their rear as Reagan and Bush have capitalized on.

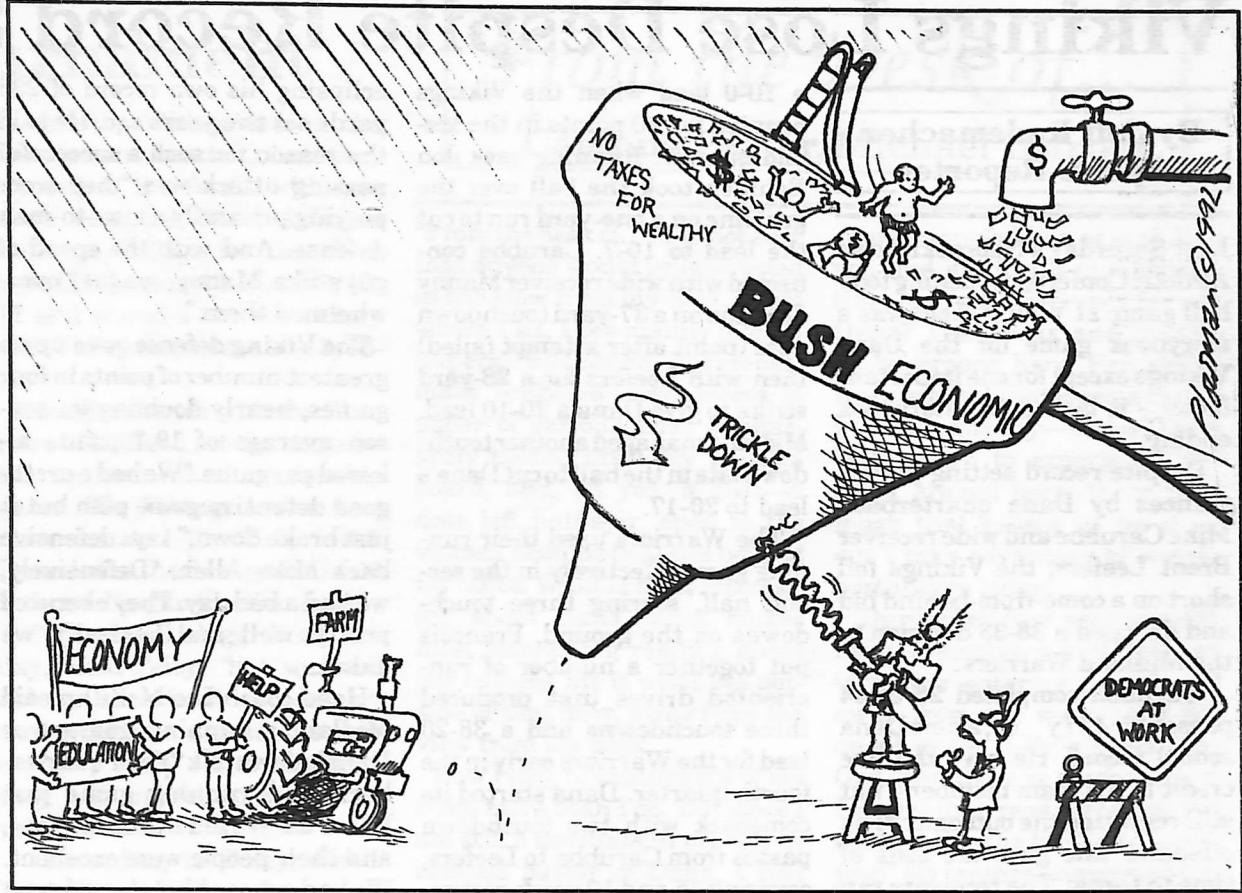

Dana Olympics Among Events Planned for Homecoming Week

The long awaited Homecoming is soon approaching. The week of Oct. 5 is full of activities for everyone. This year, Student Activities Board (SAB) is holding a campus-wide Olympic competition comprised of six teams: Blair Hall, Mickelsen, Holling, Argo, Omaha Village, and off-campus students.

The competition is based on a point system. The team with the most points will be presented with a spirit bell at half time Saturday. Points can be accumulated throughout the week at various events.

The activities are as follows: **Monday:** Coronation. Sign in sheets representing each team will be available at the door of coronation for all students. The team with the highest percentage based attendance will get 100 points. Second place will receive 50 points and third place, 25 points.

Tuesday: "Guess the Number of Candy Footballs in the Jar" will be taking place in the campus center from 11:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. The team that the winner represents will receive 100 points. The individual winner

will also get a prize. Attendance will be taken at the volleyball game and points will be given accordingly.

Wednesday: Dana Olympics (part 1). Starting at 8 p.m. in the Dragon's Head, there will be several games for people to participate in. Points will be given to the teams that the winning individuals represent. For each event points will be: first place-25 points, second place-15 points and third place 10 points. There will also be individual prizes for the winners.

Thursday: Trivial Pursuit! There will be a large Trivial Pursuit card with questions pertaining to Dana. The card will be in the campus center from 11:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. This event is open to all faculty, staff and students. No team points are available but an individual prize will be given to the winner.

Also on Thursday the Residence Hall Association (RHA) is hosting a carnival. The carnival is being held in the Campus Center from 8 p.m. to 11:30 p.m. The carnival will provide games and prizes but no points will be given.

The hall/floor decorating will be judged by faculty in the afternoon. Decorating can start Monday night. Supplies will be given to RA's after coronation. The winning team will receive 100

points, second place-50 points, and third place-25 points.

Friday: "Yell Like Heck!" This event will take place at the 5 p.m. Pep Rally in Borup Coliseum. Each team will have a section to sit in and whoever yells the loudest wins. Faculty will judge the competition. Points will be 100, 50, and 25. Percentage based attendance points will also be given.

Saturday: The alumni basketball game is starting at 9:30 a.m. in Borup. Dana Olympics (part 2) starts at 10 a.m. in the oval. Several games are planned such as tricycle races, football toss, and a surprise whip cream pie throwing contest (in whose faces will be a surprise).
