## Peer counselors will be available to listen

Do you need help coping with problems? Need to talk or just have someone to listen and identify with? Aid will soon be available from a newly organized peer counseling team.

Peer Counseling is a group consisting of Dana students who will be accessible to students with counseling needs.

The 14 student members and two directors will undergo training that focuses on communication, listening and coping skills, and provides background on topics such as alcohol abuse, assault and eating disorders.

The group intends to identify and counsel students who may be experiencing problems in the college environment, according to student member Janet Reisdorff.

Some students may not feel comfortable approaching a resi-

dent assistant or staff member and that is where one-on-one help from other students is needed.

Confidentiality is a priority the group holds of utmost importance, says a member. Director Dawn Bernzen stated, "I believe things are going very well for the group so far. We already have some training in, and we'll be able to benefit students by being there for them to talk and help."

Along with directors Bernzen and Greg Earhart, the members include J. Lynn Asher, Amy Beebout, Roisin Bell, Mercedes Buller, Kim Burlingame, Heidi Gerth, Stacy Haas, Dana Holz, Sonny Larsen, Tim Marsden, Tommy Pelzer, Sarah Peterson, Tonya Reagle and Janet Reisdorff.

Counseling will be available once initial training is completed.

## Career Services suggests paths for job hunt

As a busy Dana senior, each day of the hectic college work week rolls by with thoughts of the future. Within their busy schedule, seniors are taking steps leading toward placement in the career field of their choice.

Following are suggestions from Mary Jo Kubie, director of Career Services, on what steps se-

niors should be taking. Along with the fun and excitement of senior year, by now seniors should have researched the career area they are interested in, looked into the geographical area they would most like to be employed in, checked out the businesses and companies around the desired location and looked into the background of the places of possible employment. They should continue to check ads for availabilities, subscribe to newspapers and find phone books from the location of their choice.

Seniors need to stock up on the stamps because now is the time to send out resumes and credentials to employers in your area of interest. The best way to prepare for interviews is practice, and Career Services is open for personal or group mock interview appointments. Seniors must consider interview attire in order to be comfortable and prepared for a sudden appointment.

Networking is also an important key while job searching. Seniors need to let people know that they're looking for employment and the area they are interested in.

Informing family, friends and acquaintances of the goals they have set for themselves may have its advantages. Joining organizations or attending professional meetings or conferences as student members will also help

make connections.

Seniors need to keep in mind that they may not land the job they've been looking for right away. They may have to start out with an entry level job and prove they are hard workers. Even if the position doesn't require a college degree it may lead to a position that does because many companies promote from within.

Looking ahead at upcoming events can also be a benefit in the job search. There are many career fairs including one in Bellevue March 23. The Human Resources Association of the Midlands is also planning a career fair May 10. Career fairs are great places to meet with employment recruiters about possible positions. Check with Mary Jo Kubie in Career Services for other important dates and for more information on career fairs in the area.

Personal contact is important so seniors need to get acquainted with those at possible job locations. Spring break gives a great opportunity to visit areas of career interest and places of possible employment and make the connections that may be necessary in order to gain the job they are searching for.

Seniors need to be on the lookout for all possible opportunities and make the best of the time they spend finding the secrets of job search success.

## Letter to the editor

Dear Editor,

I am writing in response to the letter published in the Feb. 25 issue of the *Hermes* concerning the cost, quality and service provided by the Food Service Department. First, I do not wish to turn this into a defensive forum. It is my full intention to answer the concerns addressed in the forementioned letter and to offer explanations as to the way the Food Service Department is run.

First, the meal prices for a non-meal plan person are as follows: breakfast-\$2.50, lunch-\$3.75 and dinner-\$4.50. The only meal that would cost a walk-in over \$5 is a steak and shrimp night which would cost \$5.25. So to imply that every meal for non-boarding students costs \$5 is a gross misrepresentation of the actual cost.

Secondly, when I took over as food service director three years ago we only had the three basic meal plans; 10, 15 and 19. There were strong requests by the students to offer a flexible program that would allow students options in their meal plans.

We first implemented the three flex plans two years ago in order to do just that, give the students more options in their dining choices.

We had to make some adjustments this school year, including additional cafeteria meals on all flex plans because the first flex program offered even less meals per week. There will be changes made next year, as well, in order to encompass the extended class schedules.

In addition to the flex plans we have expanded the upstairs services to include pizza at both lunch and dinner, specialty bars at lunch, Belgium waffles at all meals and increased portion sizes.

Furthermore I have always tried to accommodate all reasonable requests made by the students concerning all aspects of the Food Service.

In regard to the Dragon's Head, I feel some points need to be clarified. First of all I have never claimed or will I ever claim to be a McDonald's or Hardee's. The Dragon's Head is a small grill operation with a menu limited by the extremely small amount of space the service personell have to work with.

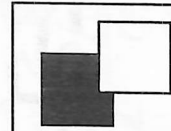
I would like to also point out some of the changes being made in the Head with the addition of the flex plans. We have instituted daily lunch specials, added

a salad bar and increased the menu to include cheddar cheese balls, cheese sticks and fresh baked cookies. As for the lines and waiting period for orders, I again reiterate that we are very limited in actual cooking space and the fact of the matter is, some items take longer to prepare than others. As with the cafeteria, I always welcome any requests or comments concerning the Dragon's Head.

As I stated in the beginning, I would not become defensive about this or any other comment made about my department. I honestly believe that the only way to make the Food Service Department work is to take all comments and concerns into consideration.

Senior resident assistant was a new position for the 1993-94 school year. The purpose of this position was to assist the hall directors in their duties.

Instead of having part-time hall directors, Dana now has two full-time hall directors. The senior resident assistants are there to share the duties of the hall directors.

The two hall directors are Greg Earhart, living in Mickelson, and Jennifer Dunlop, living in Holling. Jennefer Neumister, living in Argo, and Kyle Herzog, in Blair hall, are the senior resident assistants.

The senior resident assistants are responsible for duties of a resident assistant and many duties of a hall director. One of the main differences between hall directors and senior resi-

## Viking baseball to begin last season under Lemon

Dana baseball head coach Dale "Juice" Lemon will embark on his last season as the Viking skipper Thursday when the Vikings take on Buena Vista College. They were suppose to open the season tomorrow but due to a muddy Peterson Field the game has been postponed.

Lemon is 12 wins shy of reaching 500 career wins as a head coach. He has won 488 games in his 34-year career including 30 years as Dana's head coach.

Lemon said that the Vikings will improve on last year's record of 12-16-2. He said that the Vikings will challenge for the Nebraska-Iowa Athletic Conference (NIAC) title.

The Vikings infield will be led by senior all-conference short-

stop Gregg Yanta. Yanta hit .309 with two home runs and 14 runs-batted-in (RBI).

The other Viking all-conference player from a year ago is sophomore catcher Jeff Dyrda. He led the Vikings in batting average with a .354 clip. Dyrda also had 12 RBIs and four doubles.

The Viking pitching staff will be inexperienced this spring with the loss of last year's pitching ace Craig Barsness (4-4, 2.68 ERA). This year they will be led by returning senior Chris Ulven, junior Pat Forck and sophomores Dustin Wolfe and Mike Tupa.

Starting pitcher Wolf had an impressive freshman year when he went 3-3 with a 4.06 ERA in seven starts. Relief pitcher Tupa led the Viking returners with a 3-0 record and a 3.26 ERA.

## Priority date for financial aid forms is approaching

The Financial Aid Office would like to remind students of the approaching "application priority date" for the 1994-95 academic year. Students who will be returning in the fall and are applying for financial aid should have all completed applications on file by April 1 in order to be given priority for the most favorable types of financial aid.

Students applying for any type of financial aid are to complete the Dana College Application for Financial Aid, a single-page form, and return it to the Financial Aid Office. In addition, those students who want to be considered for "need-based" aid as well as the non-need-based Unsubsidized Federal Stafford Loan must complete either the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) or the Renewal FAFSA. International students requesting need-based aid include the Federal Pell Grant, SEOG, work-study, state grants, certain college grants/scholarships, Perkins and Stafford Loans.

The Dana Application has been distributed by campus mail along

with instructions for completing the Renewal FAFSA. Renewal FAFSAs were sent by first class mail to home addresses. Anyone not receiving applications should contact the Financial Aid Office.

Because the FAFSA and Renewal FAFSA are sent to a federal processor and not the Financial Aid Office, students are strongly encouraged to have their application mailed no later than Friday if the application is to be received by the college by the April 1 date.

Students or parents who would like assistance in completing the FAFSA or Renewal FAFSA are invited to ask for help from the Financial Aid Office. Parents may call 1-800-444-3262 or 402-426-7226. Students are asked to make an appointment by calling x. 7226.

Students whose applications are received by April 1 will receive a preliminary award letter by May 1. As end-of-the-year academic records are used to determine official eligibility, the students receiving preliminary awards will be given additional notice after grades have been processed.

## Vikings eliminated by Northwestern in NIAC tournament semi-finals

A late charge by the Northwestern Red Raiders eliminated the Dana Vikings 101-75 in the Nebraska-Iowa Athletic Conference (NIAC) semi-final playoff game in Orange City, Iowa Saturday.

### Northwestern

Although the score might indicate a 26-point blow out, one did not occur. Northwestern held a 36-31 lead at halftime and only led by nine with 8:09 to play.

Vikings head coach Dave Jensen said, "We played a real good first half and were in the game half way through the second half. It was real close."

Then Northwestern's Craig and Ross Douma hit a couple key three-pointers and Northwestern dominated the final eight minutes of play. The Vikings

couldn't mount a final charge and Northwestern coasted to victory.

"We lost our poise because of their crowd and they beat us down the stretch. The score was no indication of how close the game was though," commented Jensen.

The Vikings were led by junior center Chris Tignor with 16 points while guard Jason Jackson had 13, forward Shawn Fasbender 12 and Coursey 11. Coursey led the Vikings with eight rebounds.

The Vikings only shot 39 percent from the field and had their worst three-point shooting night of the season at 12.5 percent. "We had a terrible night shooting the basketball. You can't beat a team like Northwestern by only shooting 39 percent," said Jensen.

Despite the loss Jensen said he felt good about the season. "We didn't achieve most of our goals but we have to feel good about it. We wanted to be over .500 and we ended up 16 and 17. We also wanted to win most of our conference games this year. We didn't do that either.

"We have to feel good because we got people excited about Dana basketball again and we earned respect in the conference."

Everyone except guard Rob Mendoza will return next year for the Vikings.

Next year the Vikings will be led by forward-guard Coursey. He has been recently voted to the NIAC All-Conference team by the NIAC head coaches. Coursey averaged 18.8 points and 3.6 rebounds a game this season.

## Softball team opens season in Pittsburg State tournament

The Dana College softball team will open their season tomorrow in a round-robin tournament hosted by Pittsburg State of Pittsburg, Kansas.

The Vikings hope to rebound from a disappointing opening game loss in last year's District 11 National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) post-season tournament to Nebraska Wesleyan.

Viking head coach Steve Kissel said that the Vikings will have a good year if they avoid injuries. He said that this team is one of the most talented he has ever coached.

The Vikings will have a young team this spring. They will only field three seniors, but have eight returning starters from last year's team.

Kissel feels his main weapon is junior pitcher Heather Olsen. Olsen was last year's Nebraska-Iowa Athletic Conference (NIAC) Pitcher-of-the-Year. She had a 15-6 record with 0.95 earned run average (ERA). She also struck out a school record 152 batters.

Sophomore Susie Chavez will compliment Olsen on the mound. Chavez had a 9-4 record last

year with a 1.77 ERA. She also struck out 72 batters in 79 innings of work.

Returning for the Vikings behind the plate is sophomore catcher Karri Roberts. She hit .326 last year with two home runs and 31 runs-batted-in (RBI). Melinda Martinez, sophomore, will share duties with Roberts. She hit .398 with 12 RBIs.

Kissel says there is a battle for the first base position this spring. Last year's first baseman was senior Laura Morrison. She was an all-conference player last year who led the Vikings with 35 RBIs and 17 doubles. Battling for the position with Morrison is freshman Amy Croughwell.
