## 1994-95 projected income and expenses announced

In spite of the tuition increase announced for the 1994-95 school year, tuition and fees will cover just over half (55.95%) of the Dana College operating budget.

An additional 19.36 percent is obtained through room and board charges and the bookstore.

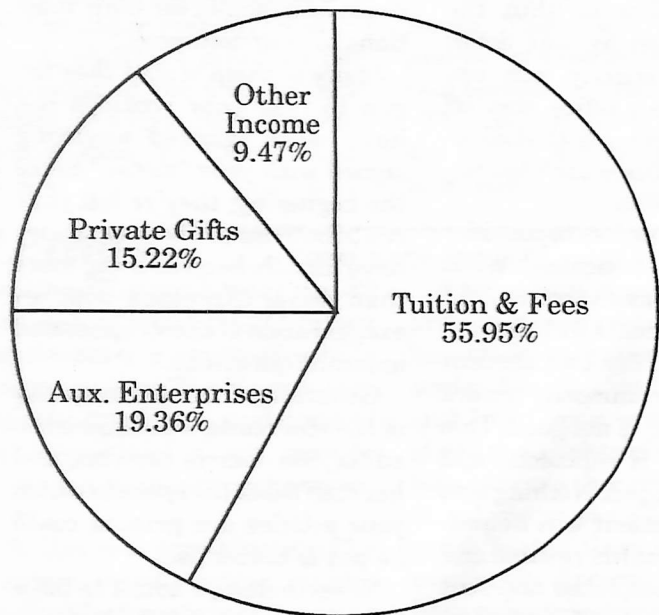
Private gifts constitute 15.22 percent of the budget.

Government grants, endowment income, farm income, interest income, conferences and student fines make up the remaining 9.47 percent.

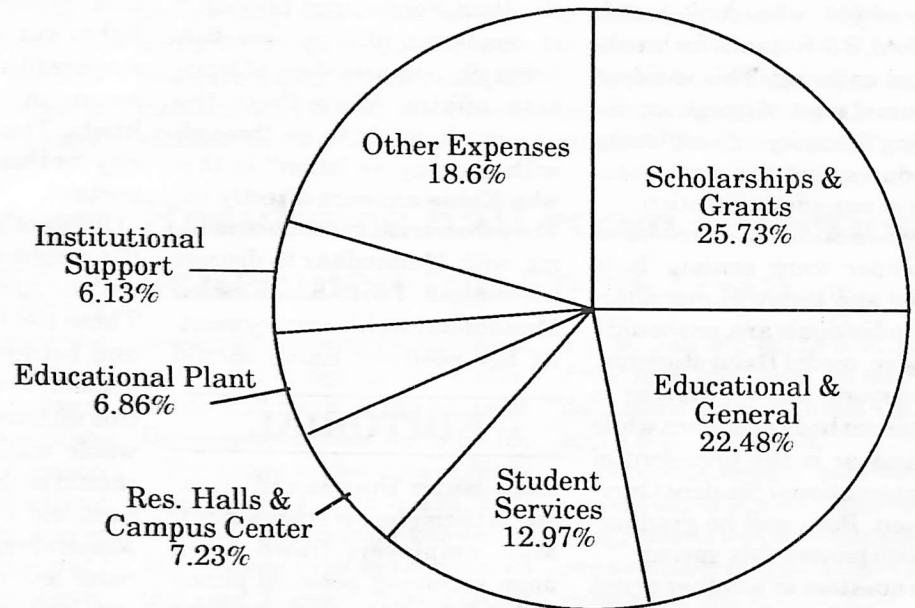
More than one-fourth (25.73%) of Dana's income is reissued to the students through scholarships and grants.

Educational and General (22.48%) covers faculty salaries.

The 12.97 percent allotted to student services pays the salaries of those staff members (i.e.

registrar, residence life, security, admissions, financial aid, campus pastor, career services, etc.) and partially funds the student media.

Residence Halls, Campus Center and Educational Plant (14.09%) covers the general upkeep of the campus.

Institutional Support (6.13%)

funds the public relations, development, alumni and church relations offices.

Additional expenses include general administration (Board

of Regents, President's Office, Academic Dean, Business Office), computer services, library, Omaha Village apartments, the cafeteria and bookstore.

## Student Senate continues to address student concerns

Budget requests and student concerns were the main topics at this week's senate meeting.

### Concerns

Students who spend a great deal of their time in the Madsen Fine Arts Center would like to have a pop machine and/or snack machine put in the building.

Secretary Meredith Novak said that the majority of the faculty are opposed to this suggestion because of the possible risk to the equipment in that area.

Students are also concerned that lately, there has been no one in the computer lab to help or to laser print.

There currently are only three laser printers on campus accessible to students. The others are located in Career Services, which also has limited hours, and in MFAC, which doesn't use Word Perfect.

Senior senator Tammy Hoyer is going to talk to Paul Snow and Carla Andersen about possible solutions such as work-study students.

President Kyle Herzog spoke with Bob Schmoll, vice president of business affairs, about the

possibility of changing the direction of the yield sign coming up the campus drive so that cars wouldn't have to stop on the hill. Schmoll is going to check to see what city requirements there are.

A letter stating the concerns of students towards the issue of increasing tuition was drafted and will be sent to Dana President Myrvin Christopherson.

The letter contains the suggestions for a four-year fixed tuition guarantee and increasing scholarships with increasing costs.

### Budget

The senate budget had \$140.12 remaining for this semester. There was also a temporary surplus from last semester of approximately \$9,000.

Helping Our People Expand (HOPE) received \$995 for a guest speaker. The Muslim Organization received \$200, also for a guest speaker.

Intramural directors asked for an additional \$500 to pay for referees.

With the large number of teams, the money originally budgeted was not enough to con-

tinue to have games.

Intramurals received the money so that all the teams can play each other and have a final tournament.

Student Activities Board (SAB) reapportioned \$348 from a previously planned ski trip to pay for a public address system for the Turquoise Sol concert/dance this spring.

They also reapportioned a \$38 refund from the Picture Man at Winterfest to help pay for the hotel bill for a comedian they sponsored.

### New Business

A proposal for the Student Activities Advisory Board (SAAB), which would include SAB, Intramurals and club sports, was brought before the senate members.

It is a proposal which Kevin Schaudt, director of residence life, says will make all activities involved stronger.

"It will bring structure and organizational status to these groups," says Schaudt. "It will also provide leadership opportunities for students."

Senate voted to make a bylaw pending the administration's approval.

## Servicemaster provides improved maintenance

## Dana enrollment at 21 year high

For the past 21 years, Dana has escalated enrollment to higher numbers.

Since 1972 Dana College has upgraded their number of students. Statistics show that in the fall semesters the number of students has been in the mid-upper 400's and 500's.

The official Sept. 10, 1993, enrollment of Dana students was 617. The women made up the

"As indicated from feedback surveys, the overall cleanliness of the buildings has improved," states Newsome. "We're getting better with repairs but still not as quick as our target."

According to Bob Schmoll, Vice President of Business Affairs, this new system provides a higher level of management than was possible through the sole efforts of the college. Also, Servicemaster is better equipped to meet federal regulations.

Schmoll noted the equipment brought in by the company including new snow blowers and lawn mowers. "Computers also make it possible to track preventive maintenance so that minor repairs are made before it becomes an emergency," says Schmoll.

The total number of full-time enrollment was 551 students. The women again made up the majority with 299 enrolled and the men had 252.

According to Dr. Paul Formo, Academic Dean, "Looks like next year we will have more students." General information and statistics show that in the past 21 years Dana is attracting more students.



## B & E charges should be dropped

Recently two Dana students were cited with B & E charges for apparently illegally entering the Career Services office. For those of you who don't watch Rockford, B & E stands for breaking and entering. This incident has raised a lot of questions regarding security, disciplinary procedures, and the professionalism of our administration.

The two students involved in this caper were seniors Kyle Herzog and Binay Manandhar. Both individuals are, or should I say were, model Dana students. As everyone knows, Herzog is the student body president while Manandhar is the president of the International Student Organization. Both will be graduating with honors this spring.

The question of whether or not they actually broke into the Career Services office has already been answered. Yes, the lock was jimmied and Manandhar used the facilities. The question remains: were their actions justified? If not, then what drove these two hoodlums to the point of *anarchy*? As the story goes, Manandhar needed to use the Career Services facilities. Since he is involved in many things, has a full schedule and works many hours in Blair, it was nearly impossible for him to find time to use the resources in the Career Services office. His only alternative was to work on his resume on the weekends. After receiving notice from Mary Jo Kubie, the director of Career Services, that the office would not be available on Saturdays, Manandhar took matters into his own hands.

Herzog and Manandhar then let themselves into the Career Services office, quite easily I might add. Manandhar worked on the computer and left. Nothing was destroyed, stolen or dis-

rupted. The only clue left behind was a closed window shade that wasn't closed on Friday. After this was discovered, an investigation ensued and Manandhar was found to be the intruder.

Kubie took her discovery to Dr. Paul Formo, vice president of academic affairs, and Bob Schmoll, vice president of business affairs. Were these the proper channels to go through with a policy violation? Is this who Kubie answers directly to? They then tried to set up a meeting with Manandhar to discuss the matter. Twice Kubie called Manandhar at his employment. At her position, Kubie should

know better than to call someone at their place of employment. Most employers frown down upon receiving personal phone calls while on the clock. And she called twice!

Eventually a meeting took place and later, Herzog confessed to being an accessory to the B & E. Kubie, Formo, Manandhar and Herzog discussed sanctions that should be applied. An offer was even made for Manandhar and Herzog to spend some hours helping out in the Career Services office. In return, the B & E charge would be swept under the rug. This is teetering on the edge of bribery, isn't it? Sticking to their principles, Manandhar and Herzog did not jump to accept this deal. They still feel that they did nothing wrong.

This matter was eventually handed over to the Student Development office, where it probably should have went in the first place. Dan Travaille then dished out the punishment of 10 hours of community service and a written letter of apology to Kubie. This might sound like a slap on the wrist to most of you. But how could you write a sincere letter of apology for some-

thing you're not sorry for? This punishment is currently going through the appeals process.

The ultimate concern of the administration seems to be security. What about the fact that a security guard came by and told Manandhar to shut the lights out when he was done? Apparently security was unaware that this office was off limits. This tells me that security for this office wasn't too important.

Ultimately, one has to consider the weight of this incident. What will the punishment accomplish? These two students feel cheated and betrayed. For two student leaders to have animosity toward this institution is not good. This whole matter is ridiculous and should be dropped. Nothing was hurt and a student was helped. Manandhar got his resume and cover letter completed and sent out. Isn't that what Career Services is all about?

## How far does the authority extend?

Is it appropriate for colleges and universities to inquire into the private lives of its members? This is a question that has always been an issue on college campuses. Colleges and universities have a long tradition of trying to regulate the private behavior of their members through such inquiries.

For example, the report on a Feb. 26 incident includes the individual's class and work schedules as well as mentions who takes the individual to work. What do these details have to do with the incident? Is this a violation of the students' rights of privacy? But legality is only one question. There is the further question whether it is appropriate.

Are policies being administered appropriately? Are they even valid or harmonize with the institution's environment? I find some policies at Dana vague, and I question the intent in some parts, particularly with regards to procedure and authority. Also the question of whether these guidelines apply on Dana College grounds or to Dana College students no matter where they may be. Consequently, I see the

During the past school year a number of your articles have been published in the *Hermes*. Before preparing this letter, I asked some of my fellow students and faculty for their reactions to your columns.

hend some of the points you're attempting to make under what appears to be simply jabber and an ugly representation of the English language.

If you would like to contribute another article to the *Hermes*, I suggest you keep in mind the following, gained from my conversations with readers of this paper:

1) Write as I understand you are able. Ms. Larkins (who knows your true identity but declined to reveal it to me) said you are "smarter" than she is (I know Ms. Larkins is very intelligent), so I know you can write in ways that could be interpreted as readable. The readers then would not so easily reject your writings and possibly agree with what you have to say.

As a print communications major, I object to your style of

following problems in Dana's policies and the way they are regulated:

1) Since the policies appear to be vague and broad, there are discrepancies between what the policies say and interpretations of the policies by the people who are administering them. Because these guidelines are not specific, what this means is, if the administrators exercise their authority to make interpretations from their perspective, I see nothing wrong with students making in-

terpretations from their point of view.

2) Anybody seems to have the authority to carry out an investigation just because there has been a violation. For example, an incident that took place on Feb. 26 was reported to Dan Travaille on March 7. The investigation was taking place during this time, and I wonder if it was within the authority of the people doing the investigation.

3) If the policies are to have any validity, they need to be administered consistently regardless of the situation. For example, the incident report states "this clearly fits the description in the student handbook." On the other hand, Dan Travaille, who holds

the authority for disciplinary issues stated, "I do not feel this incident fits entirely within the scope of 'breaking and entering'".

4) These particular procedures seem to be symbols of the larger political struggle to regulate people's private lives. What takes place in the school has nothing to do with the student's private life. I oppose such efforts in general.

The policies and the guidelines should be reviewed immediately to address these issues. I also feel that the student's input is vital in establishing the policies so that it is fair. The procedures for filing reports should be followed. The investigative process should be carried out confidentially if at all possible until all parties have had the opportunity to share their side of the story.

There is a long tradition in American universities of assuming the role of loco-parentis as far as authority goes, but not as far as responsibility goes. In simpler words, "We'll tell you what to do, but if you get in trouble, that's your look out." In European universities the tradition goes the other way: "You're one of ours, and we'll protect you, but we aren't your parents and won't tell you what to do." I tend to prefer the latter model.

The universities are in a strong power position over the individual students, and there is never a shortage of petty tyrants who wish to regulate and control. Let the universities aid, let them explain, let them support, but I say let there be an end to controlling people beyond the boundaries of their authority.

New York, and Virginia. This presentation is open to the public. Faculty and students are cordially invited to attend. Event Credit will be given.

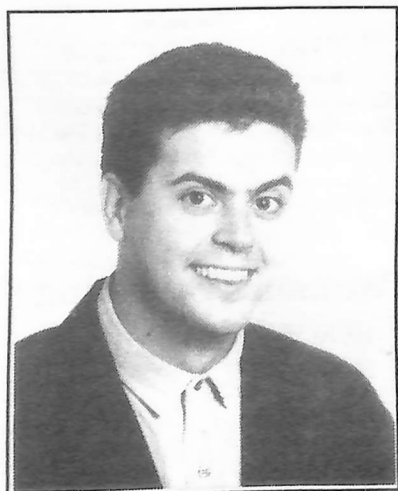

Students signing up for double rooms must either come together or have the deposit slips and a signed Housing Request form for both students.

No one will be able to sign up for more than one room. Rooms can't be changed until July 1.

## Vikings heating up with three wins over Hillsdale Baptist

The Dana baseball team won three out of four games in two twin bills against Hillsdale Baptist (Okla.) at Paul Peterson Field Tuesday and Wednesday.

Dana finally found its hitting stroke when they clobbered Hillsdale 11-1 and 9-0 in Tuesday's doubleheader. Hillsdale returned to Peterson Field Wednesday and won the opener 11-4 but Dana won the nightcap 8-4 to up its record to 5-7 on the season.

### Dana 11, Hillsdale 1

In the third inning of game one, Matt Rega smashed a two-run home run to give the Vikings a 3-1 lead. The Rega homer was the first of the season for Dana.

The Vikings added four runs in the fourth which was spurred by Kelly Danker's two-run double. Dana crossed the plate four times in the fifth to end the game on the Nebraska-Iowa Athletic Conference's 10-run rule. The key runs in the inning came on a Rega two-run double.

Dana's starting pitcher Dustin Wolfe pitched his third straight complete-game victory of the season. He gave up five hits and one earned run while striking out four batters.

Offensively, Rega went two for four with four RBIs. Scott Mitchell had two hits and Danker drove in three RBIs.

### Dana 9, Hillsdale 0

Gregg Yanta opened a Viking four-run first inning with an RBI

double. Then Rega followed with a two-run single and Mitchell drove in an RBI double to make it 4-0 after one inning.

A two-run triple in the fourth by Danker increased Dana's lead to 6-0. Pitcher Chris Ulven shut down Hillsdale the rest of the way and Dana scored three runs in the fifth for the Viking 9-0 win.

Ulven pitched a complete-game shut out for his first win of the season. He gave up four hits while striking out two and walking three.

### Hillsdale 11, Dana 4

In game one on Wednesday, Hillsdale scored three runs in the first inning off of Viking pitcher Tim Heun. The Vikings pulled within a run on Jeff Dyrda's RBI single in the second and Tommy Pelzer's RBI sacrifice fly in the third to make it 3-2. Hillsdale led 6-3 after eight but put the game out of reach with a five-run seventh for the 11-4 win.

Heun pitched 4 1/3 innings for

his second loss of the season. He allowed five runs and seven hits while walking two and fanning two.

### Dana 8, Hillsdale 4

In the nightcap, Dana relied on Yanta and Rega for a three-run first inning. Yanta opened the scoring with an RBI single to score Mitchell and Rega drove in two runs with a single to put Dana ahead 3-0.

Hillsdale came back with two runs in the second but Dana answered with an RBI single from Mitchell and an RBI double by Yanta to make it 5-2. Dana put three more runs on the scoreboard and Hillsdale added two before the game was called because of darkness.

Aaron Williams (1-0) pitched 4 1/3 innings while giving up one earned run on four hits. Mike Tupa picked up his first save of the season by pitching the last 2/3 of the fifth inning.

Offensively, Yanta went three for three with three RBIs. Rega had two hits and two RBIs.

## Vikings snap four game losing skid
