Summer renovation work includes cafeteria

Students can expect a number of changes to the campus when they return this fall.

The most noticeable renovations will be visible in the residence halls, cafeteria, library and computer services.

Installation of a new fire alarm system is planned for Blair and Mickelsen Halls. In addition, Mickelsen will see improved lighting and ceiling repair.

According to President Christopherson, the cafeteria will be undergoing some change, including the replacement of tables and chairs. "We may do some things this summer to enhance the serving and the atmosphere in the dining hall," Christopherson said.

"One of the thoughts is that round tables may enable us to seat more people, and also create a little more sense of community in the cafeteria."

Renovations to the library, which began last summer, are scheduled to be completed this fall. The third floor will be re-carpeted, and new furniture is also likely to be in place for students' use.

Bob Schmol, Vice-President

for Business Affairs, says they hope to complete the area west of the press box. "We'd like to have the soccer field and practice football field up there, so they can both be accommodated."

Rasmussen Hall will require the most work this summer, however, in preparation for new and returning residents.

Only the fourth floor has been used for student housing this year, but all floors will need to be ready this fall.

Computer services will be improved, with standardized computers in each of the residence halls compatible with those in the main lab, as well as Career Services.

It is hoped that funding will allow each residence hall to be equipped with two or three new IBM-compatible machines and one new printer.

Residents can also expect improved phone service this fall, under a new system from HunTel.

According to Schmol, students will be able to purchase options such as voice mail and caller ID directly from the company.

He also said that the problems we've had this past year in accessing "out" phone lines should be eliminated.

Student Senate makes plans for 1994-95

Student Senate members made plans for next year at their final meeting Wednesday night.

The third annual Student Senate sponsored "Back to School Bash" was tentatively planned for Sept. 9-10. An outdoor picnic and games will be scheduled for the weekend.

Funds were pre-allocated for the Homecoming festivities to be held the week of Sept. 27-Oct. 2. Spirit week will include snarf eating and trivia contests, carnival night and a fashion show. At noon Saturday, food service will provide a hog roast at the football field. A comedian will provide entertainment for Saturday dinner and the traditional dance will be held in Borup Coliseum Saturday night.

Kevin Schaudt, representative of the Homecoming Committee,

said the committee tried to make Homecoming weekend more for the students instead of just for alumni.

Senate allocated wish list money toward the purchase of a VCR for Rasmussen Hall, a microwave for Blair Hall and new computers for all the residence halls.

Senator Paula Cultice reported that no parking hours will be changed from 2-6 a.m. to 3-6 a.m. to correspond with inter-visitation hours.

Student concerns addressed included the expansion of computer lab hours, the purchase of round tables for the cafeteria, Saturday finals and the tuition increase.

In order to find out more about the computer issues on campus a senator will begin to attend meetings of the Information Services Committee. This will give students a voice in this area.

Blair Telephone Co. will provide Dana with state-of-the-art services

The Blair Telephone Company recently was selected by Dana to provide telephone service to the college via Centrex, a "system" of services delivered through The Blair Telephone Company's central telephone office.

The Blair Telephone Company anticipates the new system to be in place by mid-summer, before students arrive back on campus for the 1994-95 school year.

Current system at capacity

Because of the overwhelming growth experienced by Dana in recent years, the current telephone system has reached its capacity.

Two alternatives were looked at when evaluating Dana's telecommunication needs. The first solution involved replacing the existing telephone system with a new system.

This would require investing in more hardware and software which would require maintenance, software updates, as well as additional hardware upgrades as the college continues to grow.

The second alternative was to utilize a "system" of services de-

livered by The Blair Telephone Company known as Centrex. Centrex utilizes facilities in the Blair Telephone Central Office. Utilizing this system would require no significant hardware or software investment on Dana's behalf.

Additionally, Centrex is the most effective way to eliminate the all too frequent dilemma currently experienced by users trying to obtain an out-line when all lines are busy.

This problem will be solved by utilizing central office facilities directly.

Calling features available

Centrex will provide many calling features that were available with the Mitel system such as station-to-station calling, call pick-up, call transfer, three-way calling, call forwarding, speed dialing, camp-on and callback

Centrex will also offer ring again, call forward remote access, call forwarding always, call forward busy/no answer and call forward remote access.

No special telephone sets are required for Centrex. Some ad-

ministrative personnel, however, will see a change in their phones since the Mitel sets currently in use are not compatible with Centrex.

Caller ID will enhance security

Another available feature that will enhance phone security for Dana is the Who's Calling feature. Callers will see the telephone number and name of the person calling them provided the call comes from Blair, Arlington, Fort Calhoun or Kennard.

This feature is achieved via a small display unit that can be rented for \$2 per month, leased to own for \$5 per month for 12 months, purchased outright for \$55 or provided by the user. The monthly rate for Who's Calling service is \$3.50.

The Blair Telephone Company is working to put together college targeted option packages. These packages will include several calling features at a special rate.

Single billing will continue to be provided to each student, and all Sprint account numbers will remain as they are today.

Scott Stickler chosen to wrestle in Russia over summer

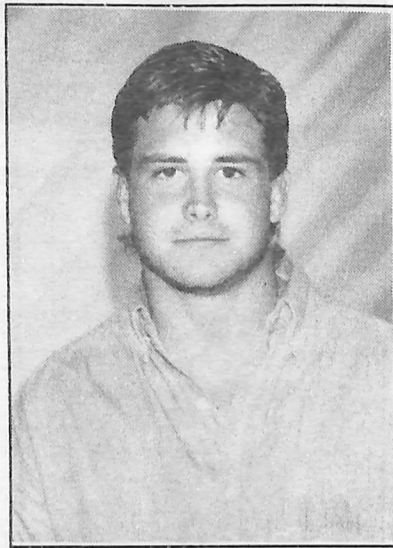

Scott Stickler, a senior from Clarinda, Iowa, has been selected to wrestle on a USA/NAIA (National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics) all star wrestling team that will tour Russia this summer.

Stickler, who wrestled at the 142 pound weight class this year for Dana, finished the year with a 26-9 record and a very strong showing at the national wrestling tournament where he placed fifth. Stickler is a business major and was also named to the NAIA All American team this season.

The team that will tour Russia is made up of 12 other wrestlers from NAIA Division II schools from throughout the country. The team will be coached by Spencer Wohe from Hancock, Minn. They will leave June 26 and they will wrestle in four different Russian provinces.

The competition should be extremely tough on the tour, ac-

Russian pianist makes American debut at Dana

Russian pianist, Svetlana Rodionova made her American debut at Dana Monday. The performance was held in the Neve Room of the Madsen Fine Arts Center at 7:30 p.m.

Rodionova was born in St. Petersburg, U.S.S.R., where she began studying music at the age of six. She also studied in St. Petersburg and completed her masters in music in 1991 from Rimsky-Korsakov State Conservatory.

While in school Rodionova received many honors, including being the last student to study with the late Moisei Halfin. Achieving a wide repertoire and performing solo and chamber

music with great success in the concert halls of Russia, she became ranked among the best young musicians of her city.

Svetlana also performed in Czechoslovakia, Estonia, Lithuania and Kirghizia, as well as Barcelona, Spain, where she moved in 1992. While in Barcelona, she taught piano at Escola de Musica Virtelia and performed extensively. She met her husband, Matt Patton, who plays with the Omaha Symphony. In 1993, Svetlana and her daughter, Anastasia, moved to Omaha, where they now live.

She played songs by two romantist composers Monday. She played two pieces by early romantist Robert Schumann and eight preludes by late romantist Rachmaninov.

District Champs!

After exploding for 18 runs in their first National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) District 11 softball tournament game against Nebraska Wesleyan, the Dana Lady Vikes, 44-15 overall, picked up wins of 3-1 and 10-5 in the championship game against College of St. Mary to secure the District 11 championship.

In the first game the Lady Vikes opened up the top of the fourth inning with 11 runs and added one more run in the fifth to finish off the Plainswomen, 18-3.

The championship game was decided by a tighter score with Heather Olsen throwing a two-hitter and her defense committing only one error. The Lady Vikes peppered 10 runs over seven innings while holding College of St. Mary to five runs with three of those coming in the fifth inning.

"We only ended up with three errors for the whole tournament, and I think we batted over .350 as a team," stated Courtney Leyba, a sophomore third baseman from Denver, Colo.

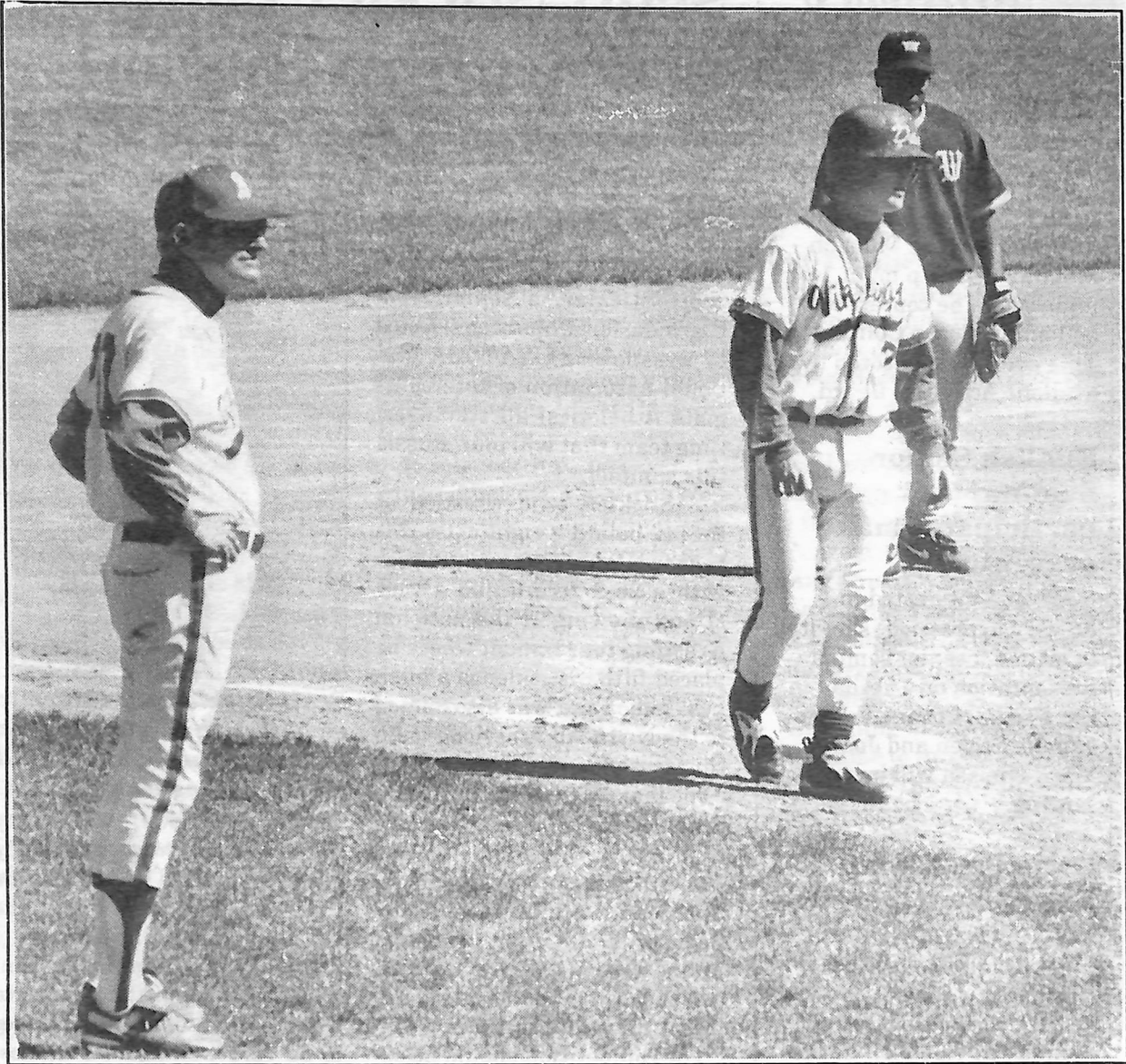
Along with the solid defense and hitting, Susie Chavez and Olsen gave up only 13 hits during the three game tourney.

"We have to win a best-out-of-three in North Dakota," stated Leyba. She is referring to their upcoming date with Mary, North Dakota.

If they should win, "it's nationals," stated Leyba.

The Vikings will play Mary this weekend in the NAIA Bi-District series for the right to advance to the 16-team NAIA National Softball Championships next week in Columbia, Mo.

Mary is the District 12 champion and is ranked 19th in the nation. The Vikings go into the series ranked 18th. It's the highest rating ever for a Dana softball team.

Leyba named District 11 Player-of-the-Year

Dana's Courtney Leyba was named the District 11 Player-of-the-Year in a vote of district coaches Sunday morning in Omaha.

Leyba, a sophomore third baseman from Denver, Col., is batting .432 with 59 RBIs, three home runs, 17 doubles and a slugging percentage of .616 this season. In 185 at-bats, she has only struck out once.

Altogether Dana placed six players on the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) All-District 11 first team. Along with Leyba, pitchers Heather Olsen and Susie Chavez, outfielder Michelle Wheatley, catcher Karri Roberts and designated player Dayna Foster made the team.

Four more Vikings were selected to the second-team all-district. They were first baseman Laura Morrison, shortstop Sonia Farwell and outfielders Melinda

Almand and Amy Croughwell. Seven Vikings were selected to the All-Nebraska-Iowa Athletic Conference (NIAC) first team. They were Leyba, Chavez, Olsen, Roberts, Wheatley, Foster and Croughwell.

Morrison, Farwell, Almond and second baseman Kim Glass were selected to the second-team all-conference.

Chavez was named the NIAC Pitcher-of-the-Year in a vote of conference coaches. To date, Chavez has a record of 17-4 with an ERA of 1.09 in 122 1/3 innings of work. She has fanned 106 batters while only walking 41. In two seasons at Dana, Chavez has compiled a 26-8 record.

Viking head coach Steve Kissel was voted District 11 Coach-of-the-Year and shared honors with Dave Hulsart of Northwestern for the NIAC Coach-of-the-Year, since their teams tied for the league championship. Kissel has a career record of 214-149 at Dana.

Lemon will be named Professor Emeritus at graduation

Dale "Juice" Lemon will be named Professor Emeritus of Physical Education during the Commencement ceremonies at Dana next Sunday.

Lemon is retiring after 31 years of educating Dana students and coaching the Viking baseball team.

As head baseball coach, Lemon won 503 games, 10 Nebraska-Iowa Athletic Conference (NIAC) championships and two conference titles in the former Tri-State Conference over a 35-year period. He coached baseball at Valley City State in North Dakota for four years before taking over the Viking baseball program.

Lemon was named the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) Coach-of-the-Year and inducted into the Dana College Athletic Hall-of-Fame in 1980. His son, Doug, has also been inducted into the Hall-of-Fame.

Viking assistant coach Steve Lewis said this about Lemon. "He is a good man and has good knowledge of the game [baseball]. Just look at his 10 NIAC championships."

Prior to his coaching career, Lemon earned a reputation as an outstanding athlete in high school and college. As a student at Lincoln Northeast High School, Lemon played basketball (state champs his senior

year), football, track (won the gold medal in 880 relay his senior year) and was the Lincoln City Golf Champion in 1950.

Lemon attended the University of Arkansas on a basketball scholarship for two years before returning to the midwest where he graduated from Nebraska Wesleyan University. He lettered in football, baseball, basketball and track there.

Earlier this year, Lemon received many honors for his service at Dana. He was honored at the spring athletic banquet in April, the Dale and Jane Lemon Scholarship was created in his honor and he was given the Heart of Dana Award for the month of April.

Vikings lose to Hastings to close the season

The Dana College baseball season ended Saturday with a twin bill loss at Hastings in Nebraska-Iowa Athletic Conference (NIAC) play. The Vikings also dropped a NIAC doubleheader at Doane Thursday.

The Vikings ended the season

with a 15-27 overall record and a 9-15 record in the NIAC. Head coach Dale Lemon ended his 35-year collegiate coaching career with 503 victories.

At Doane, Dana lost 6-1 and 10-4. In the first game, R.J. Ryan hit a solo home run for the only run of the ball game for the Vikes. Dustin Wolfe (8-6) pitched well but was settled with the 6-1 loss.

The Vikings committed six errors in the nightcap and Chris Ulven (2-9) got the 10-4 pitching loss.

The Vikings lost 11-8 in the first game against Hastings and 2-1 in the nightcap which was the final game of the Vikings' season. Gregg Yanta (1-2) held Hastings to three hits in the nightcap but still got the loss.

Yanta was named to the All-NIAC Baseball Team by a vote of the league's coaches this week. Yanta, a senior infielder from Wisconsin Rapids, Wis., hit .337 for the Vikes this season.
