Peterson and Hudson join football hall of fame

Two Dana College alumni have been selected for induction into the Nebraska Football Hall of Fame.

Paul Peterson and Marion Hudson are among 11 individuals that will be inducted this year. Peterson was selected by decree of the executive committee of the Nebraska Chapter of the National Football Foundation. Hudson has been chosen as this year's inductee into the hall from the state college ranks in a vote of chapter members.

The Nebraska Chapter of the National Football Foundation will honor this year's hall of fame class Friday, Sept. 23, with a reception at the American Legion Club in Lincoln. The inductees will also be recognized at the Nebraska Cornhusker-Pacific football game Sept. 24 in Lincoln with on-field introductions prior to the game.

Peterson, a 1941 graduate, was regarded by many as the most influential person in the history of Dana athletics. He will become the 21st coach to be inducted into the Hall of Fame by the Nebraska Chapter.

Peterson played including full-back, linebacker and punter for the Viking football program. He took a year off from college and played shortstop with the Pittsburgh Pirates Class D minor league baseball team in

Jamestown, New York.

Peterson came back to Dana to graduate then accepted a job at Craig High School. One year later, he returned to Dana once again and contributed 42 years of service until he retired in 1984. He was an instructor, coach and the athletic director.

From 1943-45, Peterson remarkably coached all of Dana's athletic teams plus all the teams at Blair High School. He also coached the first collegiate women's basketball team in Nebraska sports history.

In 1980, Peterson was the Omaha World-Herald's State College Coach-of-the-Year in recognition of an 18-10 men's basketball record and his career

achievements to that point.

Hudson, a 1955 graduate and native of Omaha, was one of the school's first black students. He was a three-time all-conference running back in the Central Church College Conference (CCCC). He holds many Dana football records including average yards per carry (career, 7.78), yards per game (career, 103.6), yards per carry (season, 8.67) and single-game yards per carry (12.3).

Hudson ranks second at Dana for career rushing yards (2,383) and single-season rushing yards (1,093). He also rushed for four touchdowns in a game which ranks second all-time for Viking football.

Madsen to perform at Dana

On Sunday, Sept. 18, Dana College will host a concert performance by singer/songwriter Mark Madsen. The concert will be held at 3 p.m. in the Trinity Chapel of the Dana Classroom Center. Admission is free.

Madsen's performance will include several original songs from his recent album "Sacred Hoops: Songs of Peace" which center on the message of peace described by the Sioux Indian Medicine Man, Black Elk.

Madsen, who is an Associate Professor of Music and Coordinator of Vocal Studies at the

University of Missouri-St. Louis, blends traditional styles of classical, jazz, Broadway and folk music in a theatrical setting weaving the music and story telling, poetry and humor. A versatile performer, Madsen is an accomplished guitarist and holds a special interest in music for guitar and voice.

Madsen has appeared at Dana College in recent years as a performer for the Blair World of Entertainment Series and is the son of Lorraine Madsen of Blair.

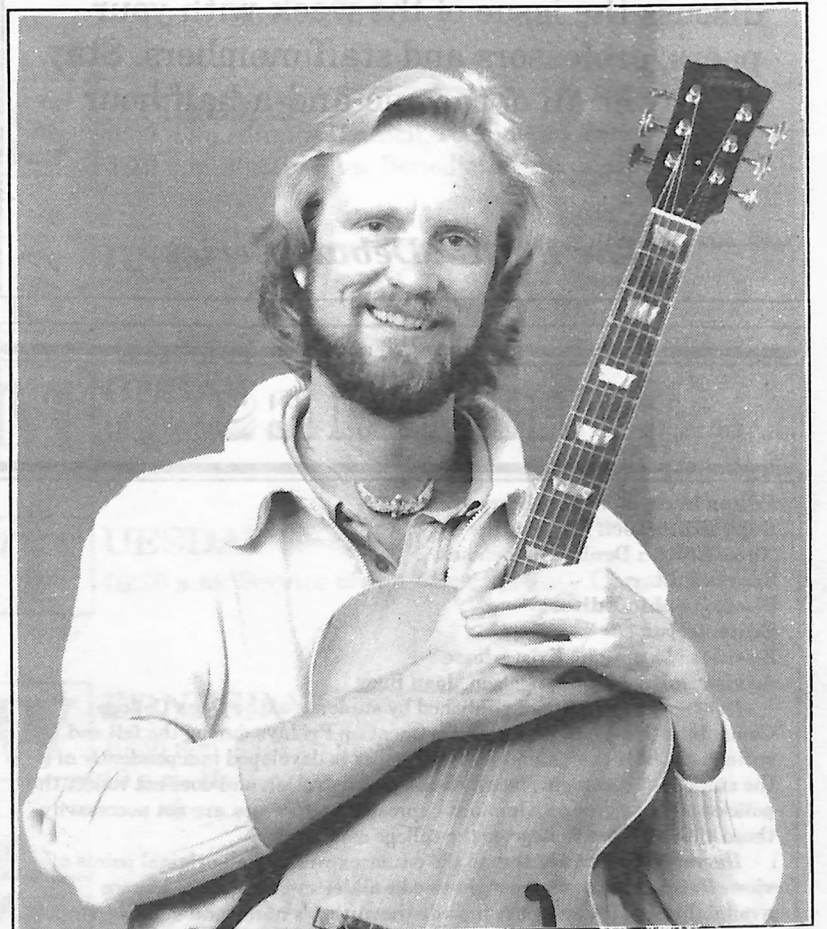
It's simple to post messages to the list. Just address your mail to:

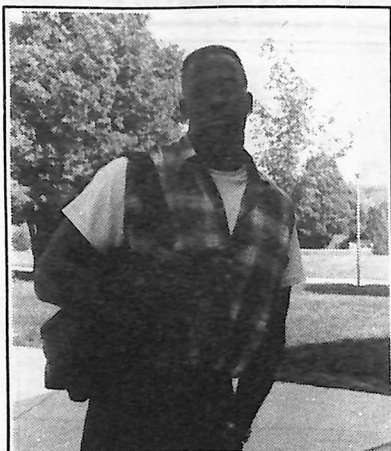

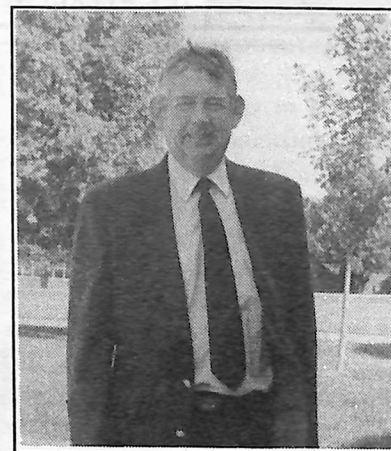

when I stepped foot on the Dana campus. It took awhile for me to really start talking to people and going out and getting involved in the campus. When I started to do that I became very comfortable with Dana.

I see many new freshman who have a hard time adjusting to college. For some, it's easy to adjust. They are out-going and have no troubles what-so-ever, but for many it's tough.

One way I overcame my fear was to get involved. My sophomore year I became more involved. I joined the Hermes and met a lot of different people. In a sense, that opened up my eyes to

say hey maybe there is something good about this place after all.

Now I'm the Editor of the Hermes. To tell you the truth, I really don't know how I got this job. I never dreamed I would be in a position like this when I came to Dana. All I thought I would do was to get an education for a couple of years and then go home.

Getting involved in the campus has really given me an opportunity to see what's out there and what I can achieve.

Her book, "Making Friends with Your Unconscious Mind: a User-Friendly Guide" has become a regional best seller at Walden Books. She recently signed another contract with

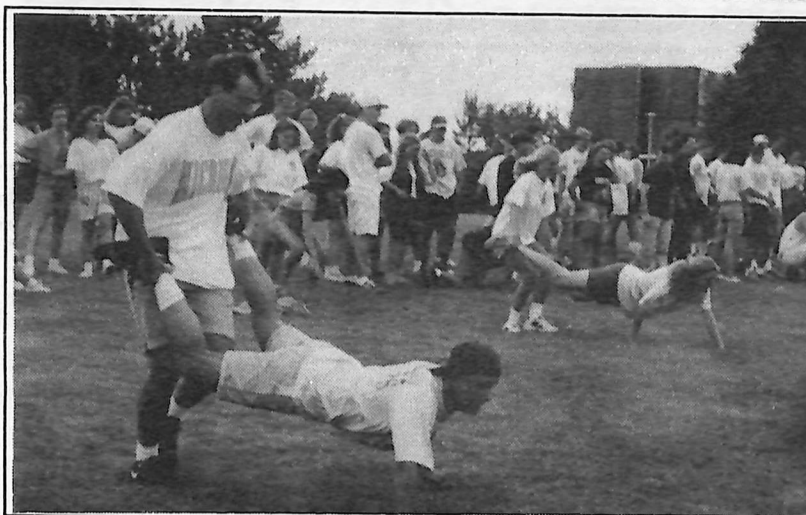
Norton publishers for "The Solution-Oriented Woman."

What a difference a year makes!

Last year the Dana Viking football team was trounced by the Dakota Wesleyan Tigers 43-19, and were seemingly kicked around the field by every opponent they faced, which cumulated into a 1-9 season. This year, add fresh faces to the defense and get a year's experience on offense and you get a total reversal.

The Vikings routed the Tigers Saturday in this year's season opener at Viking Field by the score of 42-19.

The Vikings' opening drive set the tone for the game. Dana marched 80 yards in 16 plays and used 9:46 of the clock resulting in a 19-yard touchdown pass from quarterback Jack Riggins to tight end Tyler Renken. The Vikings' defense stuffed the Tigers' opening possession. The offense then needed just three plays to score again when halfback Jessie Walker scored on a 26-yard touchdown run to put the Vikings up, 14-0.

Walker is a senior who red-shirted last season. In his return to the field, he rushed for 122 yards on 22 carries and two touchdowns.

"Jessie red-shirted last season. This season he is in top shape and is a great leader. I think he

is one of the best backs in the conference," said Viking head coach Jim Krueger about his star halfback.

The other player in the Vikings' offensive backfield also had an outstanding opening game. Pre-season All-American fullback Mike Haddock rushed for 77 yards on 17 carries and two touchdowns. His second score sealed the Viking win when he ran from five yards out to put Dana comfortably in front, 35-13 in the fourth quarter.

Starting quarterback Riggins and back-up Lawrence Bradley teamed to give Dana a formidable threat at that position. Both shared time in the opener; each played three series' before giving way to the other.

"Both will share time until one evolves into the all-time starter," commented Krueger on the quarterback derby. "Jack is still the starter, but Lawrence adds another weapon to our offense."

Probably the biggest surprise in the Viking win was the defense. Last year the Vikings had the worst defense statistically in the conference. On Saturday the Viking defense allowed only 292 total yards and 19 points.

"Defensively, we are better than we were last year, but we still have a ways to go. We held our opponent to less than 300 yards offense which is encouraging because I know we'll even get

This week:

It only gets tougher for the Vikings this weekend as they square off against the NAIA Division II #25 Benedictine Ravens at Viking Field.

It's the season opener for the Ravens who smashed the Vikings last year 54-14. The Ravens are rebuilding this year according to Krueger. They lost 20 seniors to graduation but Krueger insists that his team must play their best to win.

"They are very well coached. They lost a lot of seniors but now they are just reloading. They have a really good football program," stated Krueger.

Offensively, the Ravens will rely on halfback Toriano Pride. He was a backup last year who will see extensive action this year.

"Pride is an outstanding back," commented Krueger. "He is very elusive and has outstanding speed. He'll be even tougher behind their huge and powerful offensive line. We must stop Pride to win."

On the defensive side of the ball, the Ravens possess a fierce nose guard in Shawn Connor. Krueger feels if his offense wants to win they must not commit any turnovers and they must block Connor.

"I know we can score 20 points or more but we cannot turn the ball over. Also our defense must

The Dana Viking volleyball team had to come into the 1994 season with a lot of high hopes since they were ranked #26 in the NAIA Volleyball Top 25 pre-season ratings.

High hopes turned to reality when the Vikings were spiked by the Dakota Wesleyan Tigers last Tuesday night in their season opener.

The Vikings who lost 11-15, 15-8, 9-15, 11-5, committed 21 attack errors on the night. The Vikings are now 0-1 in match play.

The DWU game marked the beginning of an era for Susan Turner as the new head volleyball coach at Dana. She comes to

Dana from Notre Dame College in South Euclid, OH, where she coached volleyball, women's basketball and softball.

Prior to her stint with Notre Dame, Turner coached volleyball at Walsh College in Canton, OH. She led Walsh to four conference and one NAIA district championships.

Angie Heise led the Viking attack with 13 kills in 33 attempts. Angela Spreen added 10 and Stacy Haas contributed with eight kills.

Stephanie Wilson set up 28 assists and made eight digs. She was also 100 percent in her serving.

The Vikings resume play tomorrow at the Sterling Invitational in Sterling, KS.

Davis named new baseball skipper

Dana College announced in early August the hiring of Paul Davis as the head baseball coach at Dana.

Davis is a former Creighton University pitcher who also played collegiate baseball at the University of Florida and Valencia Community College in Florida.

At Creighton, Davis played in the 1984 and 1985 seasons and had a 4-4 career record. In the '85 season, Davis started five games

and went 4-0 for a Blue Jay team that posted a 35-27 record.

He is a 1985 Creighton graduate with a degree in psychology.

Davis will succeed Dale Lemon, who retired earlier this year after 31 seasons of coaching Dana baseball.

Five football players earn national honors

Two Dana College football players have been named pre-season NAIA Division II All-Americans and three more players have been selected as Scholar-Athlete All-Americans by the College Football Preview (CFP) '94. CFP is an annual small-college football publication based in Cedar Rapids, Iowa.

The Vikings' preseason All-Americans in CFP '94 are fullback Mike Haddock and offensive tackle Brett Williams.

Haddock is a 6-1, 230-pound junior from Plainville, Connecticut. Last season, Haddock

rushed for 1,060 yards which led the Nebraska-Iowa Athletic Conference (NIAC), and scored seven rushing touchdowns.

He set a Dana school record when he rushed for 264 yards against Concordia last year. He also grabbed a team-leading 37 passes.

Williams is a 6-4, 295-pound senior from Mentor, Ohio. Williams was a first-team All-NIAC choice last season who opened most of the holes for Haddock to

run through in his 1,000-yard season.

The three players named to the CFP '94 Scholar-Athlete list are Mike Tupa, Jeff Lutt and Neal Anthony.

Tupa is a junior defensive back from Rolla, ND. Senior fullback Lutt is from Great Bend, KS. Anthony is a junior defensive lineman from Lincoln and is a transfer from Nebraska Wesleyan.
