

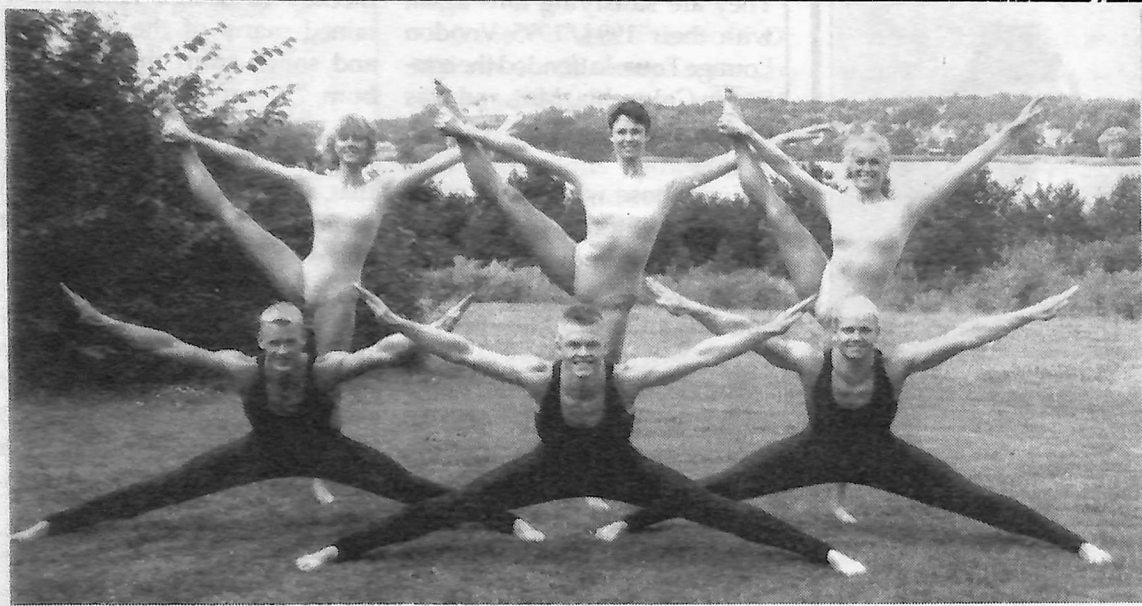

Sellon and Woitock will be inducted into the Dana College Hall of Fame

Dennis Sellon and Steve Woitock are the 1994 inductees into the Dana College Hall of Fame. The pair will be officially welcomed into the hall at a recognition banquet on Saturday, October 1, beginning at 6 p.m. in the E.C. Hunt Campus Center on the Dana Campus.

Sellon is a 1969 Dana graduate who was a standout linebacker for the Vikings football team from 1965 to 1968. The Randolph native holds the Dana single-season record for total tackles with 196 stops in 1968. He twice had 30 tackles in a single game that season, once against Westmar College and again against Concordia, and also recorded 27 tackles in a game that same year. He ranks in the top ten all-time at Dana for career solo tackles, assists and total tackles. He was a Tri-State All-Conference linebacker as a senior, in addition to earning All-Lutheran College All-American, NAIA District 11 and Omaha World-Herald State College Grid Team honorable mention. In addition to playing stellar defense for the Dana teams of the late 60's, Sellon often saw double duty as a half-back for the Viking offense, too.

Sellon has been employed as a teacher and coach with the Blair Public Schools since his graduation from Dana. He is currently head football coach at Blair and chair of the physical education department at BHS. In addition to his undergraduate degree from Dana, Sellon also holds a master's degree in kinesiology. Sellon was the boys' track coach at Blair High for 22 years, coaching several in-

dividual performers to state championships. In addition, Sellon is an active volunteer coach with the Blair Special Olympics organization.

Sellon and his wife Mary have three adult children. Son Dan is pursuing a medical degree and son Dave is a teacher and coach in Fremont. Daughter Dawn attends Midland Lutheran College in Fremont. Mary Sellon, the former Mary Lemke, is a 1980 graduate who is also a teacher in the Blair school district.

Sellon's award will be presented to him by Lynn Edgell, a 1970 Dana graduate who was a teammate of Sellon's in college and a longtime coaching and teaching associate at Blair.

Woitock is a 1974 Dana graduate who is one of the top baseball players ever at the college. Woitock played for Coach Dale Lemon from 1971 to 1974 and held no less than 27 school records when he completed his Viking career. Woitock played in 114 games over four seasons and compiled a lofty .357 career batting average. He had 135 career hits with 30 doubles, 12 triples and 12 home runs while scoring 94 runs

and driving in 76. He excelled as a fine defensive outfielder as well. Woitock was a three-time All-NIAC first-team selection and was twice named first-team All-District 11 and was second-team all-district as a sophomore. He was Dana's baseball MVP as a junior and as a senior. The four-time letter winner was drafted by the Houston Astros and the Kansas City Royals and played one season in the Royals organization.

Woitock now lives in Savage, Minn., and works as a corporate credit manager at C.J. Duggey Paper Company in Minneapolis. His wife, the former Sondra Peterson, is also a 1974 Dana graduate. The Woitocks have two sons, Peter and Troy. Woitock is an active community member in Savage who has served as a volunteer coach for several youth sports teams locally. He is also a charter member and past congregational president of St. Mary Magdalene Lutheran Church (ELCA) of Savage.

Jerry Wilson, a friend and teammate of Woitock's at Dana and a fellow 1974 grad, will present Woitock's award at the hall of fame banquet.

Danish gymnastics team to perform at Dana

A special on-campus appearance will be made by the National Gymnastics Team of Denmark on Monday, Oct. 10, at Dana College. The presentation, which will include gymnastics and folk dancing, will begin at 7:30 p.m. in Borup Coliseum.

Dana students and employees with an ID card will be admitted free of charge. General admission tickets will be available at the door. The costs are \$5 for adults and \$2 for children 12 and under.

Thirty young men and women will perform an exhibition of rhythmic gymnastics, vaulting, tumbling and a special series of Danish folk dances presented in authentic costumes. This will be

the troupe's only area appearance as part of a year long world tour which includes stops in Spain, France, Costa Rica, Guatemala, Mexico, Cuba, Fiji, the Philippines, Singapore and Thailand. The Danish gymnasts are amateurs who either have interrupted their studies or are on leave from their jobs to get an experience for life.

In Denmark today every community boasts at least one gymnastics club. Danish gymnastics has its roots in the political, ideological and cultural outlook of the Danish people and is closely linked to the concept of association and clubs based on centuries-old tradition.

The Omaha Symphony is in concert next Saturday and Sunday, performing works by Mozart, Mendelssohn and Ravel. Tickets

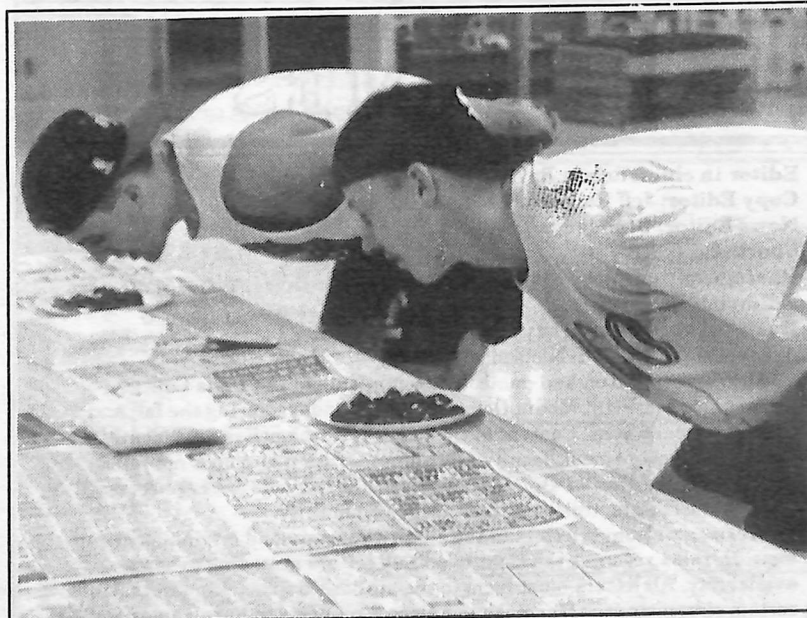
are under \$10.

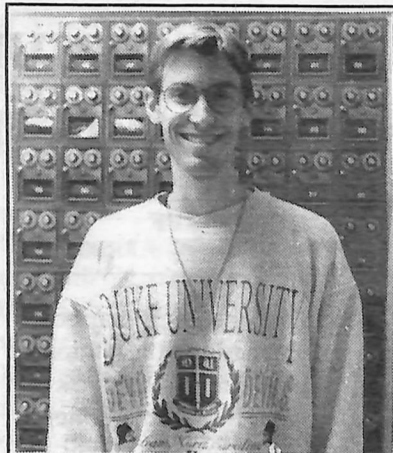

New softball, women's basketball coaches

Dana College President Dr. Myrvin F. Christopherson announced the hiring of Kelly Prokupek as head softball coach and admissions counselor and Kris Grappendorf as head women's basketball coach at Dana.

Kelly Prokupek

Prokupek comes to Dana after one season as an assistant coach and one season as a graduate assistant at Creighton. She played at Creighton and was an outstanding pitcher and hitter for the Lady Jays. As a senior in 1991, she was a second-team All-American and ended her career by pitching 91 1/3 innings without allowing an earned run. That included an 81-inning scoreless streak which ranks third all-time in National Collegiate Athletics Association Division I. She was a two-time All-Western Athletic Conference selection and was twice named Most Valuable Player of the league's post-season tournament. As a senior, she set single-season school records for hits and doubles at Creighton.

She takes over a Viking team that went 48-18 last season and finished in the top eight at the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) national tournament in May.

"Kelly Prokupek impressed our selection committee a great deal," Christopherson said. "As a player under one of the great softball coaches in our area, Mary Higgins, she developed the discipline and commitment it takes to be successful. That has carried over into the coaching arena for her as well, and we're confident that Kelly will

be a top-flight coach and admissions counselor for us at Dana."

Kris Grappendorf

Grappendorf is a former Dana player who served as an assistant to former coach Kathy Foley last season. Foley has resigned as women's basketball coach to devote full time to her position as athletics director at Dana. Grappendorf played for Foley and the Vikings from 1988 to 1992, earning first-team all-district honors as a guard in 1992. She was also a two-time NAIA Scholar-Athlete All-American. Grappendorf holds all Dana school records for assists and is the No. 2 all-time career scorer for the Vikings.

The Chariton, Iowa, native is a 1993 Dana graduate and is currently working on her master's degree at University of Nebraska at Omaha.

"Kris has been a positive element of our women's basketball program for several years," Christopherson said. "As a player, she excelled in the classroom and on the basketball floor. As an assistant coach, she had the respect of players who were once her teammates and demonstrated that she is certainly ready to lead our program as head coach."

Grappendorf takes over a team that finished 6-21 last year, a rebuilding season in which the Vikings did not have a senior on their roster. One of her key returnees is her younger sister, Heidi, who led the Nebraska-Iowa Athletic Conference (NIAC) in scoring and was an all-conference selection last year as a junior.

Sandy wins Highland Invitational

Dana competed in the Highland Invitational at Troy, Kan., on Saturday. The Viking men placed fifth in the team standings with 109 points and the Dana women were fourth in their competition with 37 team points. The Highland meet was run on a four mile course for the men and a two mile course for the women.

Ben Sandy, a freshman from Newcastle, Wyo., won the men's race and was Dana's first individual medalist of the year. Sandy won the race in 21 minutes and 32 seconds to defeat runner-up Jeremy Swafford of Neosho County Community College by 34 seconds.

Sandy's time was the fourth-fastest in Dana history for four-mile runs. Tom Wilhelm set the school record of 21 minutes and 10 seconds in the 1970 Tri-State Conference meet.

"Our men ran well as a group and Ben (Sandy) was outstanding," said Viking head coach Jay Birmingham.

The Vikings' top women's finisher was Anna Hovde, a freshman from Gillette, Wyo. Hovde finished fourth in the two-mile

run with a time of 13 minutes and 53 seconds. Hovde's time was 45 seconds off the winning pace set by Amber Grady of Benedictine. Hovde rallied from the back third of the pack at the starting line and passed 15 runners to get into fourth place.

"Our three women all ran consistent races and all moved up and improved their position throughout the race. If the race had been three miles instead of two, Anna (Hovde) might have won it."

For the first time this season, Dana had a women's team score. With just three varsity runners this season, the Viking women are two short of the number required for team scoring at most meets. The Highland meet was an exception.

Angie Sparacino (freshman, Houston, Texas) placed 15th and Valerie Bensen (sophomore, Newcastle, Wyo.) placed 19th for the women's team.

The rest of the men's individual results were: Joseph Mwatotele took 24th place; Shannon LeFave placed 27th; Matt Cox finished in 28th place; and Austin Brown finished 29th.

Pikula brings experience to Dana as new hall director

Trent Pikula is the hall director for Holling, Rasmussen and Argo halls.

Pikula is from Brainerd, Minn. He earned a degree in English at St. Olaf College. While he was there Pikula was the hall government vice president and was a resident assistant for two years. He did front desk work as a hall receptionist which included helping visitors and checking hall security.

He also supervised the renovation of a residence hall. Repairs were made on the hall's heating

and lighting facilities. A new roof and pation were installed and new furniture and carpet were added. "This is similar to what they did to Rasmussen this year," says Pikula.

Pikula plans to earn his master's degree in education administration and eventually become a dean of students.

The hall director opening at Dana was brought to his attention through an advertising flyer. He sent in his resume and cover letter and was interviewed in November 1993. Within three weeks he was offered the job.

The requirements of a hall director, according to Pikula, are "to facilitate the smooth running of

residence halls and provide a place for students' personal growth."

Dana's small size was an attraction for Pikula. "The flyer said the job required long hours, hard work and self-motivation. I wanted to go where hard work would be appreciated and I would be a person rather than a number," he says.

Pikula's hobbies include many outdoor activities such as fishing, hunting, camping and waterskiing. He also enjoys reading and watching Star Trek. "So far, I haven't had an exceptional amount of free time here at Dana," Pikula says.



Vikings prepare to take on Midland

The Dana Vikings will try to bounce back from a 44-20 loss to the Teikyo Westmar Eagles on Saturday when the Vikings take on arch-rival Midland Lutheran College in the 1994 Homecoming game at Viking Field tomorrow.

Dana vs. Midland

Dana and Midland have 2-2 records and are reeling from two-game losing streaks. Midland is 0-1 in the Nebraska-Iowa Athletic Conference (NIAC) and tomorrow's game will be Dana's NIAC opener. Midland was ranked 23rd in the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) Division II football polls last week but will probably drop out after a 29-16 loss to Northwestern on Saturday.

The Warriors' option-based offense is the fourth ranked offense in the NIAC (356 yards per game). Their main threat is quarterback Sanice Francois, Midland's top ground gainer with 317 yards rushing. Midland is the third-rated rushing team in the confer-

ence, averaging 222.5 yards per game. Running back Mark Weichel is behind Francois with 186 yards this season.

Francois has thrown the most interceptions in the conference this season (seven). He has thrown for 421 yards with three touchdowns. Francois' top receiver this season has been Ryan Mlnarik, who has 16 catches, 219 yards and three touchdowns.

"Francois is a great individual talent with big-play capabilities," said Viking head coach Jim Krueger.

Dana comes into the game with the No.1 offense in the conference (399 yards per game). Quarterback Jack Riggins is the top passer in the conference, with 937 yards, six touchdowns and five interceptions.

Running backs Mike Haddock and Jesse Walker lead the Viking ground game. Haddock has rushed for 242 yards with three touchdowns and Walker has 213 yards and four touchdowns.

Krueger looks for a great game tomorrow. "This is a great rivalry for us and it's always an emotional game when we play them. (Midland) Coach (Steve)

Schneider had done a nice job turning their program around in the last couple of years and they will bring a very solid football team over here," Krueger said.

Teikyo Westmar 44, Dana 20

The Vikings shot themselves in the foot Saturday when they committed seven turnovers (three in the fourth quarter) in the 44-20 loss to Teikyo Westmar. Westmar capitalized on those fourth quarter turnovers when they racked up 26 points in a span of five minutes and 53 seconds.

"Seven turnovers is way too many," said Krueger. "We killed our own drives with turnovers and we set them up with great field position."

The Vikings led at halftime 13-12. The Viking scores came on a 40-yard touchdown pass from Riggins to wide receiver Richard Williams and a one-yard run by fullback Mike Haddock just before halftime.

Westmar took a 18-13 lead early in the third quarter when running back Adam Saperstein caught a seven-yard pass from quarterback Jimmer Hart. Westmar scored

again early in the fourth on Saperstein's 10-yard run and running back Jason Martin scored on runs of 16 and 67 yards to blow open the game at 44-13. Dana quarterback Lawrence Bradley scored on a five-yard run late in the game.

The next test for the team is against Hastings tonight at 7:30 in Borup Coliseum.

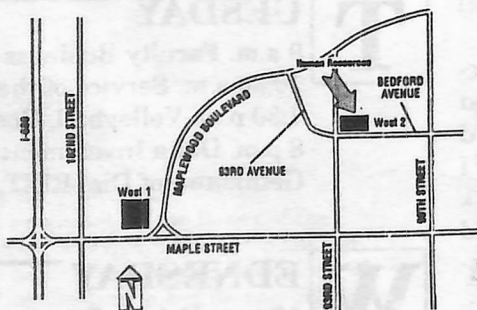
