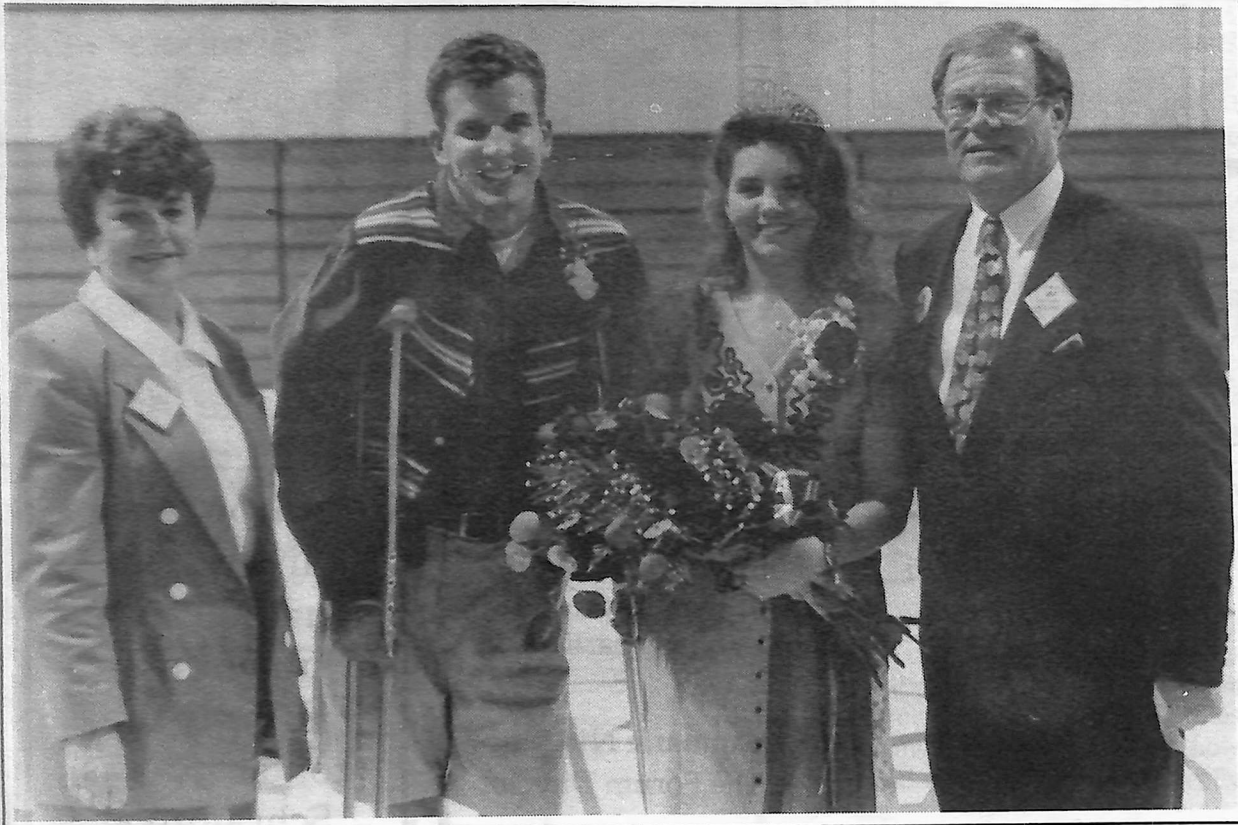

Victor Borge to perform at Dana

Maestro Victor Borge's magic fingers will be entertaining special guests of Dana College. Borge's unique combination of music and comedy is his trademark that amazes audience. He will be performing in the Lauritzen Theater of the Madsen Fine Arts Center Monday, Nov. 14.

The funds raised by this concert will be given away in scholarships. Over \$100,000 worth of tickets have already been sold, according to Phil Pagel, vice president of institutional advancement. Dana has been seeking patrons to buy eight tickets for \$5,000.

A special request will be sent next week to faculty, staff and students asking for volunteers to

help the night of the concert. In return for helping park cars, ushering or hosting, the Dana community will be able to attend the concert for free.

Borge is especially interested in scholarship opportunities. There is already a scholarship at Dana named after him. Pagel said, "It (the concert) is a tremendous opportunity for us to add to the scholarship fund in this short amount of time."

When Old Main burned down, Borge wanted to help. He held a benefit concert in Omaha that raised \$50,000 for the Old Main replacement. So why does Borge care so much about this little college on the hill? Although Dana gave him an honorary degree, he is not an alumnus. It is his Danish background that draws him to this particular college.

Dana College takes part in Danish documentary

Dana College will be seen by thousands of people in Denmark on one of its national television networks.

The Danish Broadcasting Corporation (DBC) was on campus Wednesday filming a documentary to be shown nationally in Denmark. The documentary will be about America's view towards the first two years of Bill Clinton's term as the President of the United States.

The documentary will be a 30-minute piece that will air on Oct. 24 on a television program called the Horizont (Horizon), a program about foreign politics. Dana will get three to five minutes of air time in the program.

According to Thomas Hass, cameraman and editor of the documentary, DBC is based out of Washington D.C. They went to Little Rock, Ark., on Tuesday to get people's view on Clinton before they came to Dana. They travelled to De Moines, Iowa, Thursday to film a political campaign.

DBC filmed Dr. Richard Jorgensen's American government and history classes and then interviewed Jorgensen and three Dana students (Jeff Buman, Jason Austin and me) about their thoughts on President Clinton and his first two years in office. Then they filmed the Dana campus and the Dana Choir later that evening.

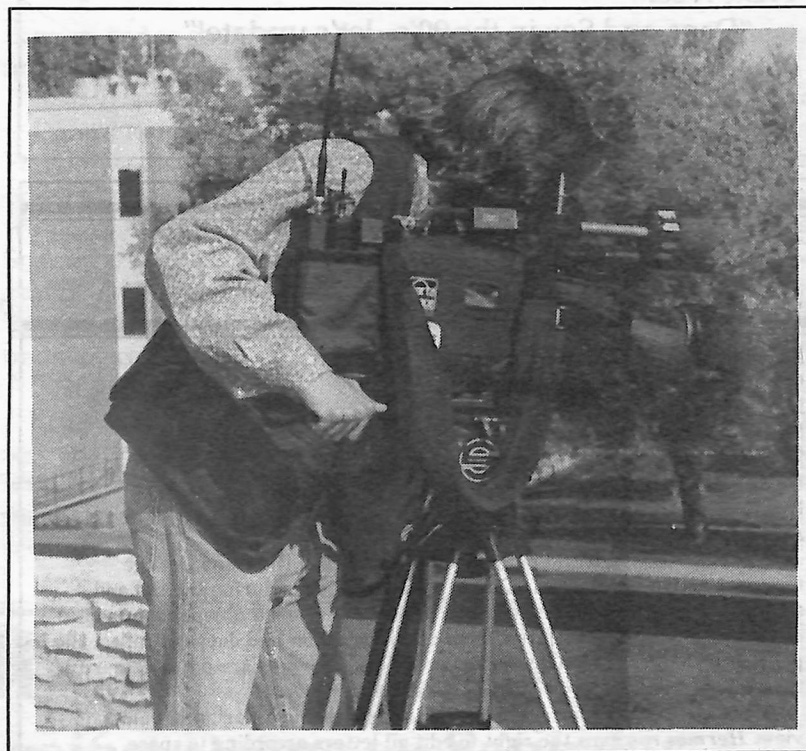
The interviewer for DBC is Frank Esmann. He was regarded as the Dan Rather of Denmark television by Dana public relations director Burke Peterson.

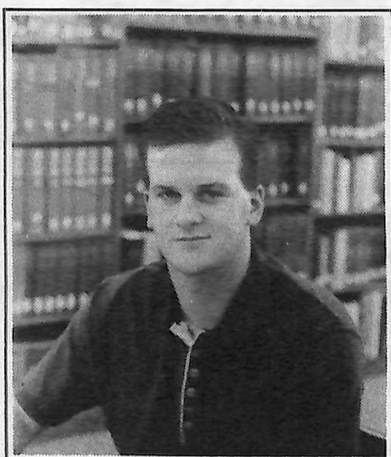


If you could change one thing about Dana College, what would it be?

Vikings try to halt a three game losing skid against Doane

The Dana football team will hit the road tomorrow to take on the defending Nebraska-Iowa Athletic Conference (NIAC) champion Doane Tigers at Crete. The Vikings are coming off a 37-14 loss to Midland Lutheran in last Saturday's homecoming game at Viking Field.

Dana vs. Doane

Doane has a 1-3 record with tough losses to Hastings, Peru State and Colorado Mines. They beat Concordia last week, 37-20.

Doane is 1-1 in conference play and is arguably the best 1-3 team in the nation says Dana's head coach Jim Krueger. He states Doane's record doesn't reflect how good a football team they really are.

Doane running back Joe Wilkins is the leading rusher in the NIAC. At one point this season, he led the nation in rushing. Last week he was fourth in the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) Division II rankings.

Wilkins has rushed for 540 yards on 83 carries for an average of 6.5 yards per carry. He also leads the NIAC in scoring with six touchdowns.

Troy Troshynski will quarterback the conference's no. four

offense. Troshynski has thrown for 482 yards this season. He has two touchdown passes and six interceptions.

Troshynski's main targets will be receivers Craig Rockwell and Jeff Hill. Rockwell has 16 catches for 180 yards and two touchdowns. Hill has caught 11 passes for 169 yards.

According to Krueger, Doane is more of a passing team and will try to capitalize on Dana's sixth-ranked passing defense.

"On offense, they like to pass a little more than they run but they've got a great back in Wilkins," said Krueger. "We must stop the pass and keep Wilkins in check and keep them down around 14 or 17 points."

Dana is still the top passing team in the conference despite its poor showing in last week's game against Midland. Krueger said the Vikings haven't controlled the ball as they did in their first two games and they must do this to win.

Dana loses to Midland

Midland Lutheran's quarterback Sanice Francois showed why he is one of the best quarterbacks in the conference when Midland rolled over Dana 37-14 in the 1994 homecoming game.

Francois ran for 119 yards, passed for 67 yards and scored

two touchdowns. The touchdowns were on runs of 59 and 28 yards.

Midland dominated Dana for three quarters. The Warriors had a 37-0 lead going into the fourth quarter. Dana scored two late touchdowns on runs from fullback Mike Haddock and quarterback Lawrence Bradley.

Bradley could be known as Mr. Versatile; he returns kicks, catches passes, makes tackles and sparingly plays running back.

Midland racked up 332 yards rushing and 431 total yards. Midland held Dana to 310 total yards, 239 of which were yards rushing.

Dana's quarterback Jack Riggins was held to just 15 yards passing on two completions. Riggins is the NIAC's top passer. He had been averaging over 234 yards passing per game and was ranked 10th nationally last week.

A bright spot for Dana in the dismal game was Haddock. He rushed for 119 yards on 20 carries and scored a touchdown.

Coach Jim Krueger suggested that his team wasn't ready to play Midland. "You have to show up ready to play football. On offense we couldn't get a first down for a good part of the first half. Defensively, they came at us with plays we'd worked against all week and we acted like we'd never seen them before."

Volleyball team continues to struggle

Times aren't getting easier for the Viking volleyball team. On Sept. 30 they faced the Hastings Broncos, who were ranked eighth in the National Association of Inter-Collegiate Athletics (NAIA).

The Vikings were ready for the challenge. They were up 7-6 before the Broncos took control and won the first match 15-7. The Broncos went on to win the next two matches 15-3 and 15-6 to finish the bout.

Even though the Vikings are having a tough time in conference play they still keep fighting. The Vikings showed this against the Concordia Bulldogs.

Their first match against the Bulldogs was a nail biter; they

ended up losing 16-14 and dropped the next match 15-6. The Vikings came back to win the next two matches 15-9 and 16-14. Just as the Vikings were on the verge of winning their first conference match they lost the last game 15-8.

Coach Susan Turner said she feels encouraged even though the Vikings are on a losing streak. Turner said her Vikings have been playing with a lot of heart and determination. She believes that with some hard work and concentration the Vikings can turn the season around. The Vikings are second in conference play for service percentage (.913) and third for blocks per game (3.19).

The Vikings face Nebraska Wesleyan Friday, Oct. 7, in Lincoln. Dana will play Doane and Northwestern next week to top off the three matches on the road.

Cross country team competes in Concordia Invitational

Dana's cross country team competed in the Concordia College Bulldog Invitational last Friday.

Dana's team had practiced very hard for the invitational, hoping to bring home a victory. Unfortunately, they were not prepared for the grueling heat of the day (record high temperatures) and the many obstacles that Concordia had added to their courses. There were parts of the race where the

runners had to go over hay bales and logs.

Dana's top finisher was Anna Hovde (21 minutes and 51 seconds), who placed 18th in the women's three mile run. Angie Sparacino (24 minutes and 37 seconds) placed 24th and Valerie Bensen (25 minutes and 49 seconds) placed 26th.

Ben Sandy (30 minutes and 20 seconds) led the Dana men's team with his 27th place finish. Shannon LeFave (36 minutes and seven seconds) was 45th and Austin

Brown (38 minutes and 45 seconds) was 46th.

The team is looking forward to the Wayne State Invite in Wayne, Neb. on Saturday, Oct. 8. Also Dana will host its first cross country invite in at least twenty years, on Saturday, Oct. 15. That will be an open invite to anyone interested.


There are six schools, including Dana, that will be there running the 5000 meter course (3.1 miles) for the women and 8000 meter course (4.96 miles) for the men.

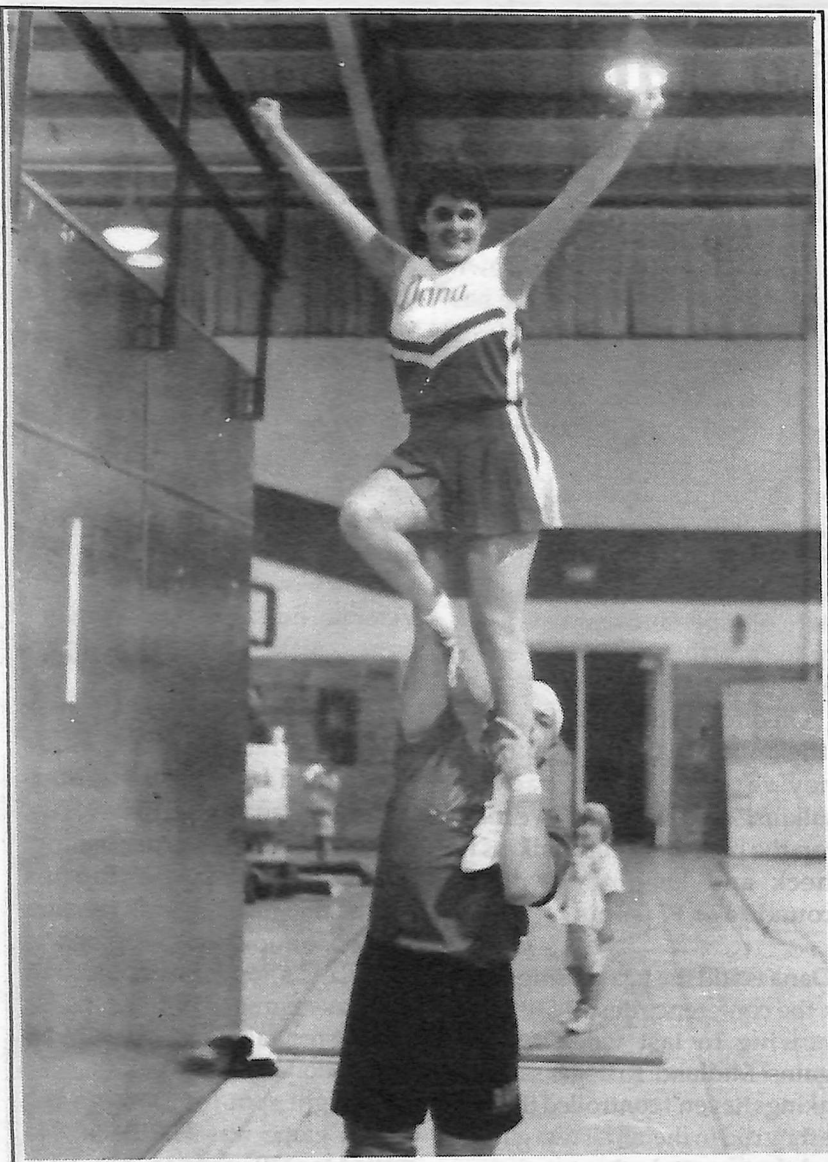

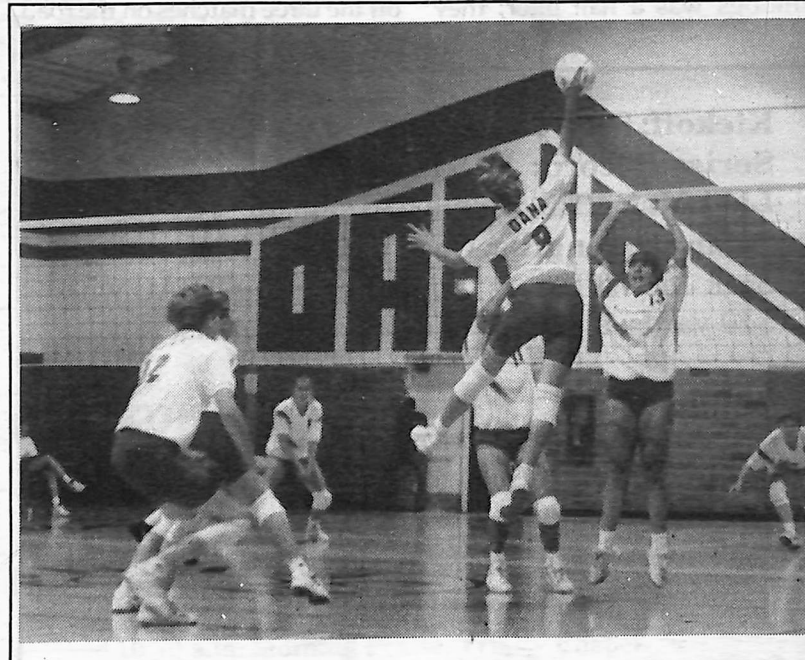
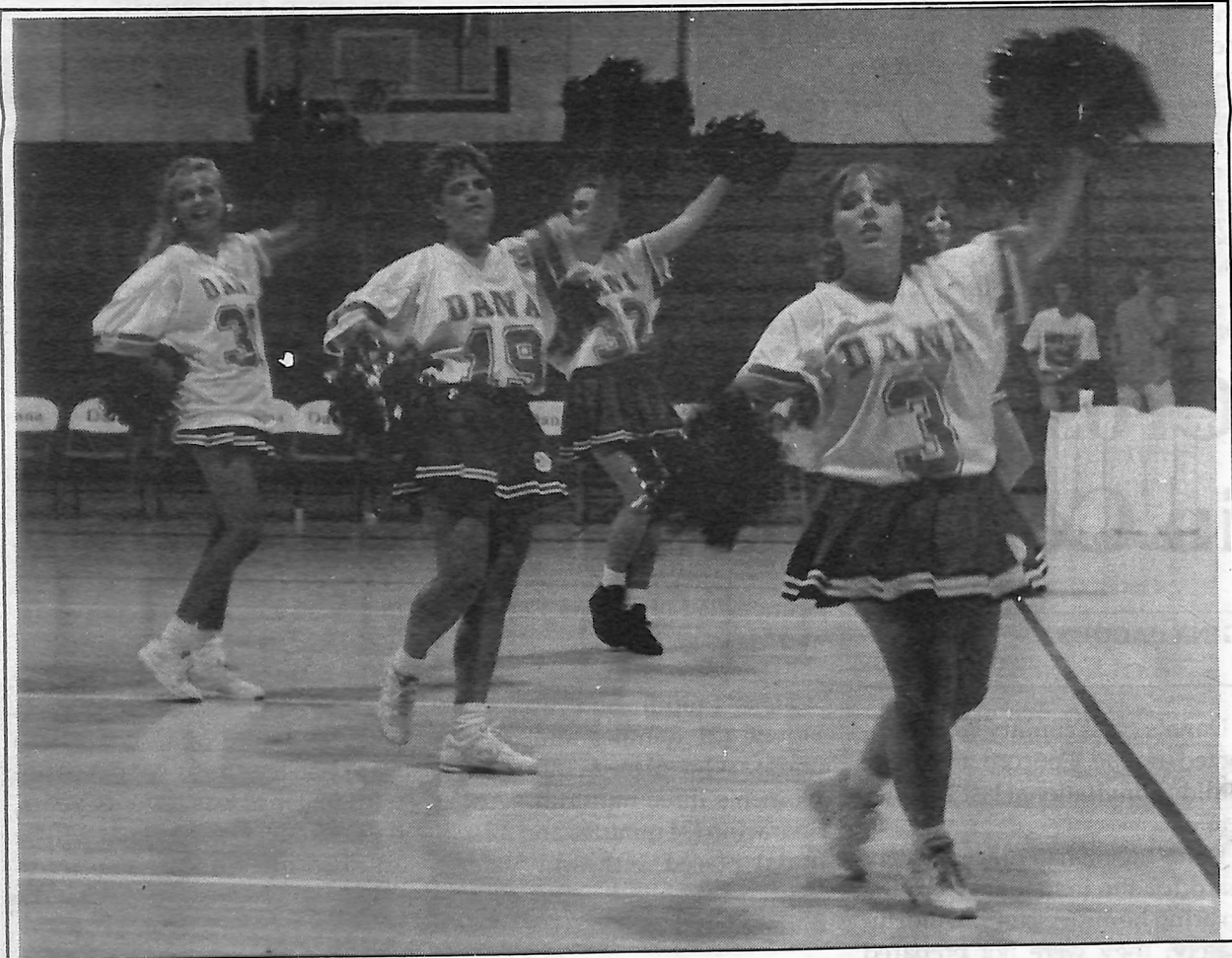
